Rotary Leadership Institute

Rotary Leadership Institute (RLI) is a leadership program that provides general Rotary education to Rotarians who are early in their Rotary careers or who might have a strong interest in future Rotary club leadership. The purpose of RLI is to "assist in improving the Rotary knowledge and leadership skills of the future leaders of our Rotary clubs." The curriculum is divided into Parts I, II, and III. Each Part consists of six-50 minute sessions facilitated by certified RLI faculty members. The price of each session is \$75.00 and that cost includes all training materials as well as breakfast and lunch. Our district has always encouraged clubs to cover all or part of the cost for their members to attend.

On May 30th District 6310 will host the Institute at Baker College in Owosso. The event will take place at the Baker College Welcome Center located at 1309 South M-52 in Owosso. For the past two years, presidents-nominee have received Part I of the training at P.E.T.S. This would be an ideal time for those who have already taken Part I to take Part II!

Around the District



It was a battle of wills during May's 10th Annual Altrusa Bee for Literacy, when 12 three-member adult teams competed and went through more than 300 words before a winner was declared -- and that winner was the Rotary Club of Saginaw team, called the Rotary Spellarz.

Team members Melissa Spranger (club treasurer), Sam Merrill, and Catherine McMichael won with the word hematite (a mineral) during a long, long "final two" battle with The Word Slingers, a team from The Saginaw News. The money raised benefits a program for second graders at the Mid-Michigan Children's Museum. Fourteen members of the Alma/St. Louis Rotary Club read "Andy & Elmer's Apple Dumpling Adventure" to all ten second grade classrooms in Alma (Hillcrest Elementary) and St. Louis (Carrie Knause Elementary) during literacy month in March. The book was written by Andrew Shoup of the Fairborn Rotary Club in Fairborn, Ohio on the occasion of their Club's 75th anniversary celebration. The story focuses on Rotary's 4-Way Test, which describes Rotary's ideals:

Is it the truth?

Is it fair to all concerned?

Will it build good will and better friendships?

Will it be beneficial to all concerned?

Rotarians read the book to each classroom, talked about Rotary as a service club and what it does in the community, provided each child with an associated activity book and a 4-Way Test book mark. A copy of the hardcover book was left in each classroom. An additional 30 copies of the book were distributed to businesses around the community to leave in their waiting rooms. The club hopes that this effort will increase the awareness of Rotary in general, and what the Alma/St. Louis Rotary Club does locally in our communities. The project was funded by the Alma/St. Louis Rotary Club and a Rotary District 6310 grant submitted and received by the club for this project.

The Rotary Club of Millington honored four students (pictured at left with District Governor Dee Brock) from Millington High School with the Golden Rule Award on April 27. Four students are selected each year by the high school teachers and counselors to receive this award.

On Saturday, May 9, 2015, members of the Rotary Club of Pinconning & Standish, in conjunction with a representative of the Pinconning Arts Council, planted 44 trees and shrubs at the Pinconning band shell to delineate the perimeter of the band shell's audience viewing area.

The landscaping of the band shell is the Rotary club's community service project for the year. Work began last November with the placement of six large trees to stake out the limits of the site. The trees planted on Saturday were provided to the club by the Saginaw Correctional Facility as part of the prison's inmate horticulture program. Additional shrubs were acquired from the Arenac Conservation District as part of its annual tree and shrub sale.

All items planted are native Michigan species and should do well at the band shell. Trees planted include arborvitaes, tulip trees, black tupelos, and tamaracks. The shrubs are highbush cranberries and ninebarks. These plants have joined the river birches and serviceberries planted last fall to compose a very nice setting. The purpose of this project is two-fold: to create an outdoor theater using plants alone; and to demonstrate that it is possible to create a beautiful environment using native plants rather than exotic ones imported from other parts of the world.

The wisdom of this effort will be shown in the years ahead as the trees and shrubs mature.

The Pigeon Rotary Club recently had a program by the Laker Robotics Team, their school advisor and Rotary mentors. The students, with very little assistance from advisors, from the middle school (first year in competition) and from the high school (second year in competition).

The students start the season at a kick-off in late fall where they see a video of the challenge for each level. The club saw both videos. The students then receive some common-to-all equipment and are then told to be creative. Creating can cost money which is also controlled by the rules. One of the big needs right now is a second laptop computer to facilitate practice.

The club also watched a video of the Lakers in action at the recent state competition. All students are underclassmen which should bode well for competing in the future.



Rielley Himes, the Mt Pleasant High School Citizen of the Month, recently shared a video with the Mt. Pleasant Rotary Club. She put the video together as part of the Believe project for her English class. It is a moving video about her travel through the "resource room" and struggling with and overcoming a learning disability.

Rielley believes you can do anything you want to do with a bit of hard work. She also wants to bring attention to how labeling students "special" may not be the right solution. Her college plans are to go into teaching Special Education.

The Midland Noon Rotary Club's annual Spirit of Rotary Award recipients for 2015 represent the Rotary motto of Service Above Self with a twist — the three winners chosen were each born in a different decade (1970s, 1980s and 1990s). So, when the club honored Leslie Perry, Kristen Squires and Luke White at the award luncheon on April 30, the theme was "The Spirit of Rotary Through the Years."

The Spirit of Rotary Award is given annually to honor community members under the age of 40 who are not Rotarians but are shining examples of Service Above Self by leading lives of service and demonstrating leadership potential.

"The selection committee was amazed to discover that in prioritizing the top three candidates for this award, there was representation from three decades. It was a sign to us that indeed the Spirit of Rotary exists throughout the ages; and that values and ideals are enacted from generation to generation," said Stephanie Leibfritz, chairperson of the selection committee. Following is a little information about the recipients.

Leslie Perry is the engagement director for the Greater Midland Community Centers, where she is responsible for leading the organization's marketing communications, human resources, and fund development efforts. "Leslie is a champion of Rotary's Four Way Test in her personal life and work life. She believes in opportunities to be successful in life for everyone. Growing up on a farm in Frankenmuth, she had the value of hard work instilled at a young age. She overcame many challenges to achieve many goals," said Chris Tointon, the Midland Noon Rotary member who nominated her.

Kristen Squires is the senior events and marketing manager at Midland Center for the Arts, where she creates marketing plans, places media buys, organizes various MCFTA events and oversees its multiple social media accounts. "Kristen's values and ethics guide her to making the right decisions. She conducts herself ethically in business decisions and in life. What I admire about her is how she is constantly reinventing herself, learning from her mistakes and thinking of others when making decisions," said Rotary Club member Mike Hayes, her nominator.

Luke White is a senior at Midland High School whose years have been marked by service and leadership. He was elected student representative for his class during his freshman year and currently serves as secretary for the student council. "Luke is an ambassador of appreciation, respect, and love. It is how he lives each day. He wakes up thinking about how he can make a positive impact on the world, then he gets busy just doing that," said Rotarian Paul White, his nominator.

The club donates \$500 to a charitable organization of choice designated by each award recipient. Perry's contribution will be made to Girls on the Run Saginaw Bay County; Squires' will go to Great Lakes Bay Animal Society, and White's will benefit Pregnancy Resource Center.
