
Of equal concern are the long term impacts on children's health. I have contacted District 6330 District Governor Nancy Ottewell, and she recommends we follow Amy's letter. The suggested ways to help are:

- 1. Club level donations can be made to the **Rotary Club of Flint Charitable Foundation**. These funds will be utilized to support water related efforts in the Flint area.
- 2. Individual Rotarians are encouraged to donate to **The Flint Child Health & Development Fund** which was established at the Community Foundation of Greater Flint to support the delivery of critical public health, medical, and community-based services and interventions that address and mitigate the short and long term impacts experienced by Flint, Michigan families exposed to lead as the result of the 2014-2016 Flint Water Crisis.
- 3. Individuals wishing to **donate water** can do so through one of the established distribution sites. The site for donations is dependent on the size of the donation.
- 4. People wishing to **volunteer** can report directly to the Red Cross (1401 S Grand Traverse St, Flint, MI 48503) anytime between 9:00 am and 7:00 pm. Please do not call ahead, just come. Please be prepared to volunteer in winter conditions.

## THE ROTARY FOUNDATION NOTES

#### **Giving Tuesday**

You will remember that The Rotary Foundation takes part in Giving Tuesday, the Tuesday after Thanksgiving, when on-line donations to charities are encouraged. This year, donors from 38 countries gave over **\$178,000**. Not only did The Foundation raise 76% more this year than on Giving Tuesday 2014, it also had the most online donations made on a single day in the past two years. Thanks to everyone who participated and helped make Giving Tuesday 2015 a success!

Our neighboring district in western Michigan, District 6290, had the highest participation with 66 donors raising \$7,000 to support our Foundation's activities. The district now has an opportunity to receive a visit from Trustee Chair Ray Klinginsmith!

#### Recent District Giving to the Foundation

You are all doing a fantastic job in giving to the Annual Fund and Polio Plus this year. Thanks for your generosity. Thus far, you have given a total of **\$95,910** to the Annual Fund, and **\$29,435** to Polio Plus. We are well on our way to our goal of \$160,000 for the Annual Fund and \$40,000 for Polio eradication.

Since early January, 85 additional Rotarians have donated to the Annual Fund. Large increases in donors show for Durand, Frankenmuth, Midland, and Pigeon. Birch Run is a 100% EREY club and Bad Axe is 90%. This means that every member of the Birch Run Club has given to the Annual Fund, and almost every member of the Bad Axe Club has done the same. Eight clubs have given an average of over \$100 per member, with Cass City leading with a whopping \$281 per member!!

Some clubs wait to send in their members' contributions until the end of the Rotary year. We encourage these clubs not to wait: send in the donations as your members give them to you.

#### **District Grant Activity**

For the current Rotary year, our District awarded District Grant funds to 17 clubs and RYLA. Thus far, only 9 of these clubs have requested the first installment of these grants. Your club can receive the first 50% of the grant by completing the information sheet that Paul Moore sent to you.

If your club project is now expending money, or ready to expend money, you should set up your District Grant bank account, deposit your club's funds and the first installment from the District, and write the checks to make payments as due. Some clubs incorrectly seem to think they should not request funds until the project is completed. Club members should not be paying for expenses and holding on to the receipts for reimbursement until the end of the Rotary year. #### **Global Grant Activity**

The Saginaw Sunrise Club and its partner Guntur Rotary Club in Andhra Pradesh, India, have filed the final report on their Global Grant that provided hygiene training, reverse osmosis plants (for clean water), and toilets to villages in India. We await final approval of the report and closing of this grant. Congratulations to these two clubs.

# WHO's New Director of Polio Eradication: The End is in Sight

In February, **Michel Zaffran** will take over as director of polio eradication for the World Health Organization (WHO). Most recently, Zaffran has served as coordinator of WHO's Expanded Programme on Immunization. He has also served as Deputy Executive Secretary of the Global Alliance for Vaccines and Immunizations (GAVI), and represented WHO on the working group that designed and launched GAVI. We caught up with him recently to ask his thoughts about this new challenge:

I am extremely excited, but also emotionally very moved, to have been selected for this position. I started working for the World Health Organization in September of 1987 in the immunization program. A few months later in May the World Health Assembly endorsed the resolution to actually eradicate polio. I was just at a very junior level but remember seeing my bosses work on the resolution, and so I was there from the very beginning. So to actually toward the end of my career be coming back and heading the program for its last miles basically is very exciting and very moving.

My past experience has prepared me very well for this role. I have been working with all of the key partners for many years. And as the WHO's director of polio eradication, I will need to interact closely with the various stakeholders and ensure their contributions remain well coordinated.

Over the past three years, specifically as part of the Polio Eradication End Game Strategic Plan, I was the chair of the Immunization Systems Management Group responsible for coordinating the efforts of partners to prepare for the withdrawal of type 2 oral polio vaccine (OPV) from 155 countries and for the introduction of the inactivated polio vaccine (IPV) into 126 countries. All of this work has been done very closely with Rotary, with the Center for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), the Gates Foundation, and UNICEF.



So let me talk a little about this important step. As you know, the OPV is a very efficient and very effective vaccine. But in some rare cases, it can actually cause the disease from the attenuated (weakened) live virus it contains. It can even return to being virulent, circulate, and cause outbreaks.

There are three strains of the polio virus. Last year, the Polio Eradication Global Certification Committee certified that no natural cases of type 2 have occurred since 1999 and that the virus had been eradicated. From a public health perspective, it is no longer acceptable to be causing the disease with the weakened form of type 2 when it no

longer exists in nature. So during a two week period at the end of April, all countries that are currently using OPV either in routine programs or in campaigns — there are 155 such places — will switch from the trivalent OPV (which contains weakened forms of all three types) to a bivalent OPV (which only contains types 1 and 3).

At the same time, we are introducing the injectable inactivated polio virus vaccine (IPV), which contains all three types of the virus in a killed form, into routine immunization systems. This will ensure that people continue to have protection and immunity against type 2 in case an outbreak were to occur, either from vaccine not entirely removed or because of an accident at a laboratory or manufacturer.

## The End is in Sight (cont.)

#### What remains to be done

We have celebrated some very good milestones recently, but now is not the time to give up. The fact that we declared Nigeria no longer endemic, that cases are just restricted to Pakistan and Afghanistan, sends a signal — which of course is a very good signal — of positive results. But at the same time there is a danger it can obscure the fact that we need to continue for a period of time to have very good surveillance in Africa and continue immunizing children. There are countries in Africa that are at risk, should anything happen, like we have seen in the past where the virus is imported from endemic countries.

Rotarians who have been so engaged and active in helping the program so far cannot let go. They need to continue to support the program and not only in Pakistan and Afghanistan, but in Africa where we need to ensure that there are the right campaigns conducted with high quality. What Rotarians should do is to continue to advocate that the job is not done yet.

When we stop transmission in Pakistan and Afghanistan, and even after we have certification of global eradication, we will need to maintain high quality surveillance to ensure the virus is contained and not released into the environment.

And we need to make an effort — and Rotarians can contribute to this substantially — that the lessons learned through the polio eradication initiative, that the laboratories that we have established, that the skills that we have developed, that the staff we have trained, are not lost to public health. But that they are transitioned to new public health challenges. This is the fantastic broader legacy of the program.

I would like to recognize the unique role that Rotary and Rotarians have played in this fantastic adventure. You had the vision as early as 1979 that this should be done and you convinced the rest of the world to move ahead and do it. You have been there at the very beginning; you have been there all along.


## **Annual Fund Progress Report**

## **District Grants and Global Grants Training**

Dates have been set for training for clubs so that they can apply for District and Global Grants for the 2016-2017 Rotary Year. Please mark your calendars.

On Saturday, **April 9**, we will have a session on District Grants, followed by a training seminar for Global Grants. Both training sessions will be at COPOCO (the credit union) on Wilder Road in Bay City. We will also offer training for District Grants during the District Conference on **May 20-21** in Alpena. We are uncertain of the time and day of this training.

At least one member of a club must attend a training session in order to apply for a District Grant. We know that there is resistance from some clubs about having to attend training for District Grants, if someone from the club has attended the training in the past. We have discussed this issue and have decided that attendance from someone in the club is still required. We encourage clubs to send a different person for training this year. We will also address a few changes in the criteria for awarding the grants. If your club has not applied for a District Grant in the past, we strongly encourage you to send a representative to the April 9 training session.

For 2016-2017 we will have \$37,583 available for District Grant projects. Grant applications will be due by June 30, 2016. If you are new to the process, you may need time to plan your project. Clubs new to the process may have trouble completing the application by June 30 if they wait to send a trainee to the seminar in late May.

We did not conduct a Grants Management Training session for **Global Grants** last year. We had a session where we talked about this at last year's District Conference, but it was not the training required by Rotary International. We have heard from five or six clubs that are either definitely planning to apply for a District Grant, or are thinking about it. We strongly encourage all of these clubs to send at least one club member to the training session on Saturday, April 9. If your club will not be sponsoring a Global Grant this next year, you are welcome, but you do not need to attend this training.

Details about the Training for District and Global Grants will be forthcoming. At this time, we just want you to plan ahead so that your club can send someone to the training.

## News from Former Ambassadorial Scholar Tyler Matthews



It was a pleasure to meet with the Midland Rotary Club in early January to provide an update on my experience in the Army. I'm forever indebted to the members of District 6310 for providing me the opportunity to serve as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar at Oxford. Here is a quick update on my plans as I transition from the military, as well as two recent applications of how Rotary has influenced my service in the Army.

This month we're moving to the San Francisco Bay Area. I've accepted a job at Facebook and will start there in early February. I've always been interested in how people share, connect, and relate with each other---at Facebook it will be my job to understand how this occurs online in the sharing economy, with the end goal being a more open and connected world.

Meanwhile, I will continue to serve as an Infantry Captain in the US Army Reserves as an adjunct professor of military science at the University of California-Berkeley. My wife Jordan starts grad school this month through the University of Michigan's online Masters in Nursing Program. She'll complete her degree from California with periodic travel back to Michigan, and will continue to work as a RN in a Bay Area hospital. Her goal is to start her career as a Family Nurse Practitioner in late 2017.

**Rotary Applications in my Army Career.** My experience as a Rotary Ambassadorial Scholar prepared me for effective leadership and service as an infantry officer in complex operating environments in Afghanistan in 2014. Two events in particular stand out.

First, my Rotary experiences and lessons learned in Oxford prepared me to train my platoon's soldiers to be culturally informed and sensitive when working with our Afghan partners. Second – because of our platoon's cultural sensitivity and savvy – my platoon was able to effectively execute complex missions in support of the Afghan National Elections in the spring of 2014, in which we helped Afghan security forces and election officials carry out a very successful election. Time is of the essence. Darkness. Accidents and emergencies happen. Being prepared is what our first responders train for. Having good tools will help them win the battle to save lives.

Bringing light to the darkness was the goal of the **Birch Run Rotary Club** "Life-Saving Lights" Grant Project. As a result of local fund raising and a matching grant from the Rotary Foundation, two Honda EU2000i1A Generators with 20,000 Lumen Lights were purchased for use by the Birch Run Fire Department and the Taymouth Fire Department.



On Tuesday, January 19, 2016, the Birch Run Rotary Club welcomed Birch Run Fire Chief Dave Matzke, Taymouth Fire Chief Bob Bowns, Assistant Fire Chiefs Larry Prueter and Ed Gubbins who brought the two lights to the Rotary Club meeting. These powerful lights will help save lives. Not only do they put out five times more light than anything on the trucks, they are portable and can be used as a power source for the jaws, saws-all, and other equipment. The cost for the two light systems was \$5,512.68.

Club President, Carmen Sawchuk, would like to thank all of the volunteers; family, and friends of the Birch Run Fire Department, Taymouth Fire Department, and the Birch Run Rotary Club for making this project a success. An additional "Thank You" goes out to the Frankenmuth Jaycees for allowing these volunteers to assist at their World Expo of Beer.

"This was truly a combined community effort. The Birch Run Chamber of Commerce co-sponsored a truck raffle. Proceeds from the raffle also helped the Rotary Club to reach their goal," President Sawchuk stated.

In December the club membership again planned for their annual "Christmas for Kids" project. According to Emily Phillips, chairman of the toy collection campaign, the project started this year with contributions from Rotarians and community members, and shopping on Black Friday. It continued through December with another shopping trip and sorting, organizing and handing out the gifts to 91 families for a total of 184 kids in all. Many, many thanks to all the Rotarians, Emily Phillips, Curtis Chrysler for lending us their facilities again, and the whole community of Cass City for getting behind this great project!




