Did you know that more than 2.5 billion people lack access to adequate sanitation facilities? At least 3,000 children die each day from diarrheal diseases caused by unsafe water.

Several District 6310 projects organized by lead clubs in our district and in partnership with host Rotary Districts give communities in the Dominican Republic, India and Africa the ability to develop and maintain sustainable water and sanitation systems and support studies related to water and sanitation.

We can be proud of our successful projects. Not just for the creation of multiple projects, but Rotarians from many District 6310 clubs have participated in work trips to these countries and financial support that includes the Rotary Foundation, District 6310, the various host country districts, and all 32 clubs in District 6310!

While very few people die of thirst, millions die from preventable waterborne diseases, providing the impetus for our members to also improve sanitation facilities in undeveloped countries. We in District 6310 have emphasized water and sanitation projects for many years now.

Our efforts started in the Dominican Republic by providing toilets and latrines that flush into a sewer or safe enclosure and then add education programs to promote hand washing and other good hygiene habits. We can be pleased as Rotarians of our ongoing labor and matching financial support to:

There are numerous other outstanding pathways for those who would like to venture to surrounding communities and explore the rich array of natural resources and historic landmarks in the area as well.

The club has a committed team of volunteers working together to create an outstanding program to engage all Rotarians. Highlights include a special panel featuring Rotarians who have taken this year's theme, "Be a Gift to the World," to heart. They will share how they got involved in providing service abroad and the impacts their projects are making.

Council on Legislation for Rotary International By PDG Georgene Hildebrand



Every three years, Rotarians meet at the Council on Legislation to review and vote on proposed legislation. The Council gives us a voice in how our organization is governed. The next Council convenes 10-15 April 2016 in Chicago.

What the Council does

Each Rotary District (537) sends a representative to the Council. Representatives deliberate and act upon all proposed enactments and resolutions. **Enactments** seek to change Rotary's constitutional documents, and **resolutions** express an opinion or make a recommendation to the RI Board. The RI Board reviews and acts on resolutions adopted by the Council and items referred to the Board. This year Council on Legislation will review 117 Enactments and 164 Resolutions. (It's about 500 pages of review.)

Selecting representatives

Each district selects a representative and an alternate during the 2013-14 year through a nominating committee. District 6310 is being represented by PDG Georgene Hildebrand and PDG Eileen Jennings was selected as the alternate. These nominations were approved at the District Business meeting in April 2014.

Rotary Foundation Annual Fund

Thank you for your Rotary Foundation Annual Fund contributions this Rotary year! We are well on our way toward our target for Foundation Giving in District 6310.

The Annual Fund supports charitable causes around the globe as well as projects right in our own back yards. How does this work? Annual Fund contributions are directed globally to areas in need as determined by the Rotary Foundation. However, 50% of our contributions to this year's Annual Fund become available to District 6310 Clubs during the 2018-19 Rotary year. We are planting seeds today which we can harvest in three years for projects that we in District 6310 choose.

How much should I give, you ask? Our suggestion is \$ 115 per year per Rotarian. That is \$ 2.22 per week, about 32 cents per day. Can we make the world a better place in which to live on 32 cents per day? Yes, we can.

Thirty-two cents. Less than the cost of one first class postage stamp per day. It is the difference between the cost of a large coffee to go vs. a small or medium. Skip desert weekly and use your savings to provide clean water to a family in a 3rd world country.




Annual Fund Progress Report

Securing a Polio Free World

As of March 2, Pakistan has had five cases of the wild poliovirus versus 14 at this time last year. Two cases of circulating vaccine-derived virus have been found in Lao PDR. By the end of April 2016, we will switch from the trivalent to the bivalent oral polio vaccine. By not including the vaccine for the type 2 poliovirus in our vaccine, we should drastically reduce the number of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus.

The **Midland Morning Rotary Club** conducted a tremendously successful program to generate contributions to The Rotary Foundation Annual Fund in February.

Club President Michelle Kocan and Foundation Chair Jude Patnaude wanted to devise a way to get many members to give to the Foundation in a short period of time. They decided to use club Recognition Points to incent the giving. The club offered a two-to-one match of Recognition Points for contributions made at the February 9 meeting. This was also extended to members who were unable to attend but made contributions during the six days prior to the meeting. The program for the meeting that morning was Eileen Jennings, speaking about giving to The Rotary Foundation, especially the Annual Fund.

The contributions by club members far exceeded expectations. Twenty-five (25) members made contributions totaling \$5,197. Last year's total contributions to the Annual Fund was \$6,318, so this one week effort almost totaled the entire contributions last year. The club also contributed \$2,000. When added to prior contributions this year, monthly contributions made by a few members on line, and another committed contribution, the club projects that its total giving to the Annual Fund for this year will be \$11,670!!! Using RI's membership number of 47, this means the club will give \$248.30 per member to the Annual Fund this year.

The giving program led to four new Paul Harris Fellows and nine additional Paul Harris levels earned. The club has three Paul Harris Society Members and one new member recruited.

President Michelle and Past President Jude were thrilled with the results. Concentrating the program on one meeting got more people to participate than they were able to get with past promotions that lasted three months. Michelle was simply bubbling with excitement as she collected more and more checks and cash from members at the meeting.



Upcoming Events

In the spring the **Rotary Club of Pinconning & Standish** will hold its first **Saginaw Bay Nature Festival**, with most of the activities taking place during the week of April 18 – 23, 2016. The festival, whose theme is "Connecting people to the land and water," is both a community service and a fundraising project with all proceeds going to student-related activities of the club – the purchase of dictionaries and thesauruses for students in Pinconning, Standish-Sterling, AuGres-Sims, and Arenac Eastern districts, sponsorship of students to attend the annual Rotary Youth Leadership Award camp, and college scholarships for high school graduates. Northwoods Wholesale Outlet of Pinconning is the main financial sponsor of the event.

The festival has four components:

- A Nature Art Competition in local schools. Submittals may be in any medium but must relate to subjects found in the Saginaw Bay region. This project is being done in cooperation with Studio 23 Art Center, and is sponsored by the Rotary Club of Bay City.
- A Conservation Project Competition in which students identify
 a conservation issue and propose a solution to be
 implemented with help from local Rotarians. This project is
 being done in cooperation with the Environmental Science
 Institute at SVSU, and is sponsored by Chemical Bank.

- 3. A Birding Derby concentrating on migratory waterfowl common to the bay in spring. Programs on bird migration will be done in every 4th grade class with guided tours of Pinconning County Park to follow. Tours for the general public will also be provided during festival week. This project is being sponsored by Bittersweet Quilt Shop of Pinconning.
- 4. A Lecture Series on issues related to the Saginaw Bay. This project is being sponsored by members of the Rotary club. **Thursday, April 14, 4:00 PM** -- Roger Eriksson, *Birds of Michigan Photography*. Join one of Michigan's leading wildlife photographers as he shares photos and stories about capturing the beauty of Michigan birds on film.

Monday, April 18, 4:00 PM -- David Karpovich, *Environmental Science Institute at SVSU*. Hear about watershed research and educational efforts to design and implement projects to address the conservation needs of the people of the Saginaw Bay region.

Monday, April 18, 7:00 PM -- Mike Kelly, *The Saginaw Bay Fishery*. The Saginaw Bay is known as one of the world's greatest freshwater fisheries -- join a discussion of the fishery's past and the work going on to make it better.

Tuesday, April 19, 4:00 PM -- Zachary Branigan, *The Magic of Migration*. Learn the *why* and *how* of the great annual migration of birds through the region.

Tuesday, April 19, 7:00 PM -- Tom Long, *Landscaping for Wildlife*. Learn the importance of using native Michigan trees and shrubs when landscaping, both to benefit wildlife and to create a sustainable environment in your own backyard. In addition, MSU Extension will be presenting programs to every 9th grade biology class on using native plants to benefit wildlife, with native plants being provided to students for planting during festival week.

Wednesday, April 20, 4:00 PM -- Dan Borushko, *Astronomy* [at Pinconning Boys & Girls Club]. Learn about telescopes and the constellations seen from this part of the globe from a local amateur astronomer, and join children in viewing the midday sky [weather permitting].

Wednesday, April 20, 7:00 PM -- Trevor Edmonds, *Invasive Species - Plants & Animals*. Learn about species accidentally or deliberately introduced into our region, the detrimental effect many of them have on native species, and the ongoing efforts to control them.

Thursday, April 21, Noon -- Isabelle Osawamick, *Ojibway Footprints on the Land*. Join Pinconning/Standish Rotarians at their weekly meeting to discover the meaning and pronunciation of Michigan place names left us by Indigenous Peoples, from a representative from the Saginaw Chippewa Indian Tribe's Anishinaabe Language Restoration Department. **Thursday, April 21, 7:00 PM** -- Jeanne Henderson, *Backyard Bird Feeding*. Learn how backyard bird feeding helps with winter bird survival, the importance of maintaining clean feeders using preferred foods, and opportunities to participate in bird-count reporting.

All programs will be held in the Media Center of Pinconning High School, except for the Astronomy program which will be held at the Boys & Girls Club.

On Saturday, April 23, a wrap-up banquet will be held at the Chippewa Indian Tribal Center at Saganing where artwork submitted by students will be displayed. Winners of the art and conservation project competitions will be announced. A silent auction and raffle will also be held. A Facebook page for the festival is currently under construction and can be found by Googling "Saginaw Bay Nature Festival."
