## Keeping Track With Pat



For Rotarians around the world, October is designated as Economic and Community Development Month. We carry out service projects that enhance, in both our own communities and in world areas, economic and community development. From my club visitations, I am overwhelmed by the service projects that our clubs undertake to help their own communities, and in partaking in district and global grants that are available how we impact the world. As a district, we do very well in this area; and we can be proud of our accomplishments.

Also in October, we celebrate World Polio Day. I would like to tell my story as it relates to polio. I grew up in the small city of Durand, Michigan, less than 4000 people. I resided on one of those tree-lined streets in a neighborhood occupied by a large group of children – all ages. Back in the 50's, we kids were always outdoors playing together. One day, one of our playmates did not show up to play, and we didn't think much of it at the time. Within a few days, the families in the neighborhood became aware that this young boy had contracted polio and was in a hospital in a neighboring community.

Panic ensued. All anyone talked about was the horrific disease, polio, and how it handicapped young people. Of course, we were all given the original vaccine, and as young kids we all knew who Dr. Salk was. And, we were all terrified.

This young boy was brought home in an iron lung and during the day, this iron lung was placed in front of the large picture window, so he could look outdoors and watch his playmates play. We were not allowed on the porch of that house or at the picture window. All we could do was wave to him.

My house was directly across the street and no matter where I sat in the living room, I could see that iron lung. He did get better and was removed from the iron lung, but they moved out of town so we didn't get to talk to him or play with him anymore. I did hear he eventually walked again with the aid of crutches and grew into a young man.

Last year, I was invited to Midland Noon Club's meeting where they had an iron lung on display. It tore at my heart. I had never realized the mechanics of that terrible working machine that kept my friend alive. At that moment, I became aware of how horrific this disease is, and more than ever I want to "End Polio Now" or as Bill Gates stated, "Drop to Zero". We, together, must eradicate this disease.

To this day, living in Durand, I drive through my old neighborhood frequently. Instead of looking at my childhood home, I look at that picture window, and what comes to mind is the suffering that polio creates. Until the world is free of this disease, it represents horrific suffering to me.

I urge all the clubs in District 6310 to observe World Polio Day, October 24<sup>th</sup>, and do something special – whether you pass the jar around and contribute to polio, work with pizza places and restaurants to celebrate, or at least participate in our World Polio Day livestream event taking place at the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation headquarters in Seattle, beginning at 2:30 p.m. Pacific time, which would be 5:30 p.m. our time. You can watch the live stream at [endpolio.org](http://endpolio.org). I will be watching; hopefully some of you will also.

Have a great October. It is my favorite month!

In 1985, Rotary introduced Polio Plus and in 1988, announced the goal to eradicate polio from the face of the earth. Rotary has asked all clubs and members to join in one project – Polio Eradication. Only 11 cases of wild poliovirus have been reported this year. Perhaps this will be the last year of new cases being discovered.

World Polio Day will be held October 24, 2017. Consider gathering with friends and tune in at 5:30 PM EDT for the fifth annual polio event live streamed from [endpolio.org](http://endpolio.org). Learn about our successes in eradicating this disease and what you can do to help. The October issue of the *Rotarian* magazine has excellent articles on this subject.

# District Grants Approved

Your District Grant project applications were reviewed and submitted to Rotary International on September 26. Our grant application was approved in record time by RI on October 6 – only 10 days later!

Paul Moore will soon notify clubs that you may begin work on projects that were approved.

We regret that we were unable to fund all projects submitted this year. We received a record 36 project applications asking for a total of \$63,423. The District had only \$35,528 to allocate to these projects.

The committee gave the highest priority to humanitarian projects, but also tried to fund equipment and construction projects. We also required – again – that the application show that the Rotary Club would have active involvement in the execution of the project. A couple of projects that seemed very worthwhile did not receive funding because there was no evidence of club involvement.

We fully funded 25 projects, and partially funded four projects. We were unable to fund seven projects. Every club that requested grants received at least one grant approval, and seven clubs received more than one grant.

Our District each year receives new District Designated Funds (DDF), which is 50% of the amount donated to the Annual Fund by members three years earlier. Of that total DDF, we can allot up to half for District Grants. District 6310 has always allotted this full 50% for District Grants. This year, that maximum amount was \$35,528.

We were impressed with the quality and quantity of applications received. There were no grant applications that we felt were unworthy. We are very sorry that we could not fund more of your projects. However, we were delighted that we received grant applications for all – and more – of the money available. These grants are here because of your past generosity to the Annual Fund of The Rotary Foundation.

### Alumni Relations Chair



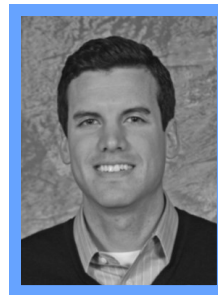

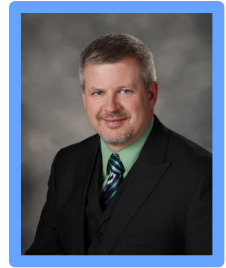

These young men and women have great challenges throughout their exchanges but have seen the positive changes it will have in their lives for years to come once they return home!

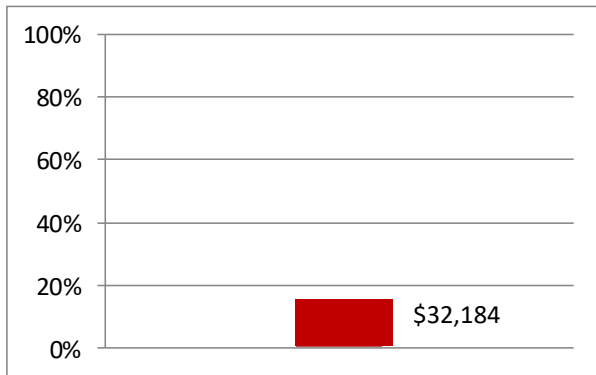

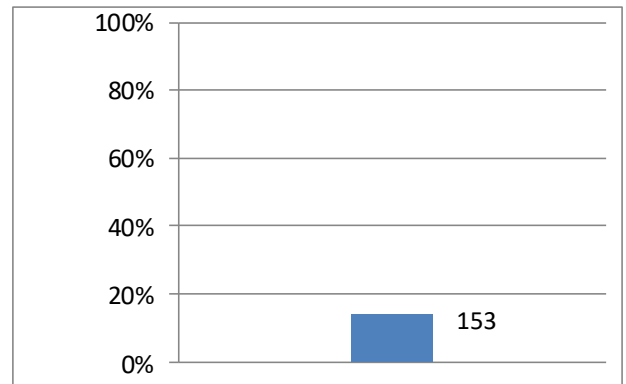
# Annual Fund Progress Report

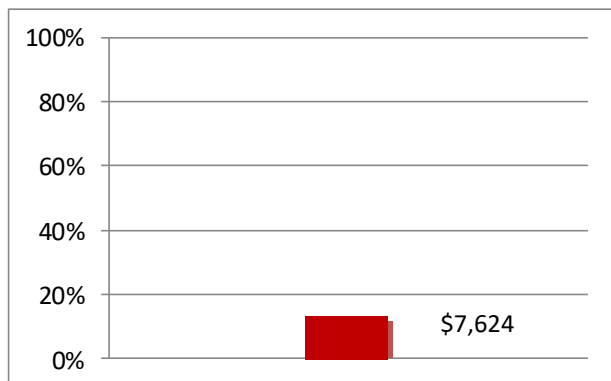


Contributing Members as of October 1, 2017

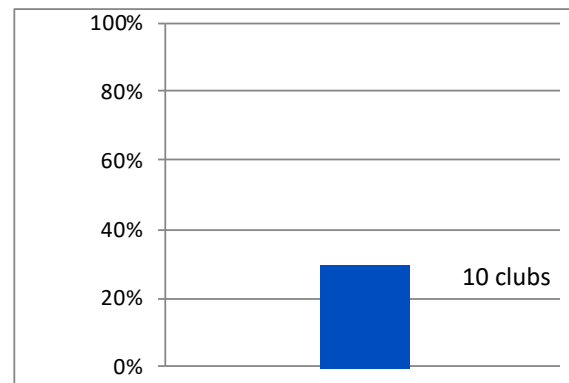

Since its start in 2000, the Shelter Box project has helped more than 1 million disaster victims rebuild their homes and lives. The green plastic boxes, costing about \$1,000 each, are being shipped regularly to sites across the world where people are in need.

Shelter Box kits contain all of the essential tools people need to start repairing and rebuilding homes. The kits and boxes also contain the items that help transform shelter into a home - like cooking sets, solar lights, and activity sets for children. The program also provides extra aid items, such as School Boxes that contain everything needed to get lessons up and running after a disaster, depending on the situation.

"We deliver the essentials people need to begin rebuilding their lives in the aftermath of a disaster," said Mr. Lichty. "Each disaster is different, and so is every community. We don't believe that one size fits all, so we make considered assessments to provide the exact support that gives people the hope and the power to transform their own lives."



The **Rotary Club of Pigeon** will be sending \$1,000 to support one teacher for one year to teach at the Rotary Haiti Community School of Bellevue, Haiti. It is in an area of great poverty and much natural devastation. The money is used to pay people to do useful work such as making clothes. The money earned is spent. That starts creating an economy where little or none exists at this time. The club's contribution fits the international portion of Rotary International President Ian's goals.



The Rotary Club of Pinconning & Standish recently gathered for their first social event in lieu of the regular weekly noon meeting. 19 persons gathered at CJ's Bar & Grill in Pinconning following the adopt-a-highway clean-up of M-13.

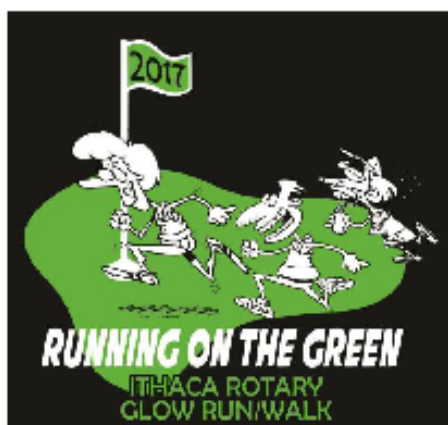

# 2017 Global Handwashing Day

## Theme: “Our Hands, Our Future!”

October 15<sup>th</sup> is Global Handwashing Day, a global advocacy day dedicated to increasing awareness and understanding about the importance of handwashing with soap. Every year, Global Handwashing Day is celebrated with events, campaigns, and handwashing programs around the world.

Before each Global Handwashing Day, the Global Handwashing Partnership selects a theme that will inspire celebrants and encourage handwashing with soap beyond October 15. **This year’s theme is ‘Our Hands, Our Future’**, reminding us that handwashing protects our own health, but also allows us to build our own futures, as well as those of our communities, and the world.

Thinking of the future, we strive for continued health, well-being, and productivity for ourselves, our families, and our communities. Handwashing is an affordable, effective way to achieve these goals. For example, handwashing with soap could prevent many of the 272 million yearly schooldays lost to diarrheal disease, and 50% of the infections acquired in healthcare settings.

Handwashing with soap has the power to improve access to education for children, protect the health of patients and communities, and reduce inequities. It has an important role in achieving the Sustainable Development Goals—contributing to zero hunger, good health, quality education, reduced inequalities, and more. Efforts on Global Handwashing Day to promote the benefits and practice of handwashing with soap, as well as fostering access to and improving hygiene facilities, will help us work toward a future where that potential is realized.

This October 15<sup>th</sup>, whether you are celebrating at school, in a health facility, or with your community, let’s wash our hands and invest in a better future!
