"It was the best of times, it was the worst of times......it was the season of darkness, it was the spring of hope". This famous quote from Charles Dickens' "A Tale of Two Cities" is a good description of this Rotary year. I'm sure that every Rotarian can relate to this quote in one way or another.

On July 1, 2020, when my term as District Governor began, we were in the midst of the Covid 19 pandemic and despite my eternal optimism it will still be here on June 30, 2021, when my term ends.

My anticipation of a year of travel, project participation, face to face meetings and fellowship disappeared as I realized in the spring of 2020 that changes had to be made to continue functioning as a vibrant District . My disappointment turned into satisfaction and enjoyment as the year unfolded. There have been some negatives related to this pandemic year. You have all experienced the restrictions and downside of dealing with the virus. I will not talk about that; instead, I would like to talk about the many positives that have occurred in District 7820 this year.

When you assume the role of District Governor, in a typical year, you look forward to travel and fellowship with Rotarians and friends. This year, however, was unique. For example, just about every club experienced me popping in on Zoom. Attending virtual Area Council, Area Governor meetings and committee meetings became the norm. I may be the first DG not to incur travel expenses.

The Rotary Clubs in District 7820 did not lie down and give up this year. They adjusted and though a little beat up, have survived. I would like to thank all the Presidents and Leaders of your Clubs for persevering. We will only become stronger in years to come.

As year-end reports indicate, the 7820 Leadership Team was very busy. There were many successes this year. Training in the District has become more relevant and because it was online, sessions were shorter and presented more often. The Task Force on Systemic Racism met regularly at least twice a week since last June and we have been recognized at the Zone level for our forward thinking and action. Our Redistricting Committee works tirelessly, and we will be more than ready to become D7815 on July 1, 2022. We have identified concerns with membership, and we are dealing with them at a Club, District and Zone level. We are in very capable hands dealing with the Rotary Foundation both at a District and Zone level. Our youth programs were reduced significantly for the most part and the Student Exchange Program is on hold until 2022 but our newly formed 7815 Youth Committee is ready to gear up for an active future. The District sponsored a six-week pilot program on Resilience in Volunteering which was well attended and quite successful. We are now in the forefront in resilience training in the Zone and we will be sharing our expertise with other Districts in the future. Despite pandemic

restrictions, District communication has improved immensely and the cost to do this has been minimal. We have learned many valuable lessons in this area and we are even looking at an additional communication platform which may improve Rotarian interaction. We have had two successful Joint District Conferences and Data Management has moved to a new level in helping our Cubs to thrive.

I want to thank our leaders for their work in the District and also to our very dedicated Rotarians volunteering and leading at the Zone level. Our District is well respected in the Rotary world because of the good work you are doing at the District and Zone 28-32.

I also know that our leaders in the next few years will continue to work towards enabling District 7815 to be a model District.

There are many individuals that I could acknowledge for their dedication and work for Rotary but there are too many. Our District, this year, was indeed well represented with strong active leaders. I will acknowledge the work of one individual by name because Kevin Armstrong as Executive Director has contributed unselfishly to improving the District throughout the year. He has made my year as District Governor enjoyable and productive. Thank you, Kevin.

Thank you, Rotarians for the honour of representing you and being a small part of a vibrant District. Please continue to "Live Rotary".

As the incoming Chair of the District Leadership Team, this year has been getting busier and busier with my preparation for the role. For example, the Rotary International Assembly is the signature learning event for incoming district leaders and would have been held in person in Florida in January. We were clearly not going to be travelling during the pandemic and so it was converted to a virtual conference held over eleven days in February. I confess that, in anticipation, I harboured a lack of enthusiasm for this event but was keen to see how it was going to be done. I am delighted to report that this was the very best online learning event that I have been part of. The format, the technology, the curriculum and the facilitators were truly world class. It was a fabulous example of how Rotary International has transformed many of its core processes to adapt to the new pandemic environment. I left with renewed enthusiasm for Rotary and the work we need to do to serve our communities.

In addition to the regular tasks that come with this leadership role, I have been spending a lot of time with Darren Hansen, my counterpart in District 7810, as we plan the creation of District 7815. As members of the 7815 Leadership Team, we have been meeting regularly to design the new district with best practices built in from scratch. This behind-the-scenes work is a unique opportunity to create robust structure and processes to enable the new district to be a model for Rotary districts around the world.

One of the most rewarding tasks of the year was to jointly oversee, with Darren Hansen, the second, joint District Conference with D7810. This was our own local example of how an in-person model can be converted to a virtual model so successfully. The conference committee was led by Lorraine Ennis of the Rotary Club of St. John's East and Bonny Hoyt-Hallett of the Rotary Club of Fredericton. Darren and I are very proud of them and the whole conference committee for creating such a fun and informative event.

I sincerely hope that pandemic restrictions will allow me to do *some* travel safely around the district before my year is complete. But in the meantime, I am easily available on whatever virtual channel works for you if you have a question or would like me to attend a club meeting.

The District Conference took place on May 14 & 15, 2021. Alex Twells of District 7820 and Darren Hansen of District 7810 collaborated with conference chairs Lorraine Ennis (7820) and Bonny Hoyt-Hallett (7810) to produce a very well put together conference.

Friday - A Round with Rotary

129 registered and 59 attended.

We had presentations from a mixologist from Moncton, a brewery from Saint John and wine from Yarmouth along with recommended food pairings.

Saturday - Rotary Reimagined

298 registered and 176 attended

There were four breakout sessions

- Session 1 Darren Hands 44 approximately attended.
- Session 2 Tyson Bowen 22 approximately attended.
- Session 3 Kevin Robart 42 approximately attended.
- Session 4 Blake Hunter 54 approximately attended.

RI President Elect Shehkar Mehta addressed the conference. It is important to note that he took some very precious family time to be with us. He is recovering from COVID and his son is currently in hospital with the disease.

Canadian RI Director and Shekhar's Vice President, Valarie Wafer, also spoke at the conference.

Survey results are in and while the conference was a success, it is evident that people miss the in-person interaction.

We secured sponsors for every single event for the conference. Proceeds from the conference split between the purchase of two Oxygen Concentrators for use in India in honour of RI President Elect SHekhar Mehta and the remainder reserved as seed money for the 2022 Conference which will be a kick off for the new district of 7815.

For the first time, we had closed captioning in French and this was received very well.

We are actively recruiting Jennifer Jones as our Rotary Keynote speaker.

This Rotary year has been very challenging for both engagement and recruiting new members to the Rotary Clubs in the district.

Covid-19 has shut down most in person meetings, community events and fellowship events that are the lifeblood of both Attraction of new members and the retention of present Membership.

We started the Rotary year with a net decline of 77 members as of July 1, 2020. The membership data to the end of April shows this trend is continuing as we are showing a net decline of 36 members for District 7820 even though some clubs continue to show impressive growth many are struggling to keep their members engaged

One of the bright lights of this year has been the introduction of Corporate/Community memberships to many clubs across the District. To date we have seen 22 NEW Corporate/Community members inducted in Clubs across the District. DG Ian has provided funding for plaques to be presented to each of these members to hang in their place of business.

The challenge for all clubs over the next month is to contact present membership to keep them involved and returning next year when we expect to return to some sense of normalcy.

District Grants 2020-21

Despite uncertainty due to the Coronavirus global pandemic, it was a busy Rotary year for the District Grants Committee (Brian Smith, Miriam MacLeod, Doug Hill, with lots of guidance and support from Jillian Gibson). Thanks to quick revisions and adjustments from Rotary International, we were able to fund 10 COVID response District Grants earlier in the Rotary Year than usual. These grants were all local, within the District. District 7820 Clubs assessed needs and moved into action quickly. The projects' scope varied from providing food security assistance, computer tablets for seniors' homes, and supporting SPCA operations. About \$20,000 in RI funding was issued for these projects in our District.

The regular District Grants Program was delayed by COVID, and it was late August before funds were made available from RI. Despite the delay, District 7820 Clubs were able to take advantage of almost \$22,000 in Grants. Projects were a combination of local and international in scope. In the district, funds supported a school breakfast programs, a Search and Rescue Command Centre, and environmentally friendly cigarette butt disposal in a prime tourist area in the French colony St. Pierre et Miquelon. International projects supported a Venezuelan student in Canada with a scholarship, and three projects in Africa addressed education for girls, clean water, and food security for the community hospital. The Committee is busy now instructing recipient clubs to complete the reporting necessary before 2022–21 grants can be provided.

This project provides X-Ray equipment for the Maternity Hospital in Martuni, Armenia, a hospital with skilled medical staff, but insufficient funds to purchase much needed equipment.

An orphanage near Durban, South Africa will be provided with a rain- water harvesting & purification system, toilets, drinking water stations and a solar power installation.

Planning for 2021-22

Dental Services for Shirak Marz, Armenia

This project calls for the purchase of new and replacement dental equipment for an existing dental clinic in Gyumri, the capital of the province of Shirak Marz. This will enable the clinic to extend services to children in poverty stricken areas of rural Shirak Marz.

Training Committee Annual Report 2020-2021

As per our District's Strategic Plan, we had intended to host 7 one-day TLCs (Training for Leaders of Clubs) across the District in Spring 2020. We were able to hold one TLC for mainland clubs on March 7 in Halifax, which saw more than 80 people attend. It was a full day of Rotary learning and fellowship, which included information sessions on Data Management, Public Image, RI foundation, Youth, as well as two entertaining and inspiring presentations from RI Director Jeffry Cadorette on Healthy Clubs.

That day we rolled out the new Rotary Action Canvas planning tool which you will find attached to this report. We didn't have as much time for planning as one would like (when do we ever!) but this was a good introduction for clubs to the modified business model canvas, to help you with your future planning. If you would like help on the use of this tool, please let Alana or another District Leader know.

And then the Covid19 pandemic settled in. Sadly, but with the health of our members top of mind, we canceled all following in-person sessions. Wanting to ensure we still provided leadership development for our members, we adapted by moving to an online Zoom platform for the remaining sessions. **TLC**Part 1 took place on April 25 with information on our merger with D7810 (when we will become D7815), and updates from the following committees: Youth, Foundation, Data Management, and Public Image; and a Top 10 List from Zone Assistant Coordinator Doug Logan on how to keep your club and members healthy during the pandemic.

TLC Part 2 was held on September 12, with 88 registrants; 75 people attended the meeting. The focus areas for this 2.5 hour training was role specific for Presidents, Secretaries, Treasurers, and Board Members; Data Management, specifically ClubRunner and MyRotary; the Rotary Canvas planning tool; and information from the D7820 Anti-Systemic Racism task force. An evaluation was sent following the event and 25 people participated, which was a fantastic response!

The overwhelming feedback was that clubs needed help on ways to fundraise in a covid reality; many had to cancel their events outright due to the pandemic and weren't sure how to move forward when holding in person events was, at best, doubtful. The training team then embarked on research on gamification and hackathons, and in the end decided that the best approach would be for members to hear from clubs who had successfully created new fundraisers or adapted their existing fundraisers for our new reality.

To that end, **TLC Part 3: Fundraising in a Covid Reality** was held on December 5; 52 people registered, and 41 attended the 2 hour sharing of information, and brainstorming session. The first hour consisted of 4 clubs (Truro – Bollywood Night, Hillsborough – Reverse Car Auction, St. John's NW – Trip of the Month, New Minas Sunrise – Meat Sale) reviewing their projects and answering questions from the group. The second hour was open for discussion and involved a lengthy conversation on the value of Rafflebox and other online platforms. All who participated indicated that it was a worthwhile activity, and we believe many inter-club connections were forged afterwards.

A District Board Retreat was held via Zoom in October 2020, so it was a much shorter event that our usual 1.5 day retreat. As members may recall, in 2019 RI created a partnership with Toastmasters International; at the retreat our Board members listened to a presentation from Melinda McCormack, Toastmasters District 45 Club Growth Director 20-21. We had an update on the 7815 merger activities, and spent some time discussing Diversity, Equity and Inclusion, and how to help our clubs take the next steps in that area. It was decided not to have a February 2021 board retreat, as members' efforts were being focussed on merger activities. As we move towards our merger on July 1, 2022, we are working with our co-horts in D7810 to align our committees' activities so that next year we are mirroring the other's programming as best as possible. This will ensure a seamless transition come 2022. District team members have participated in the two part 7810 PETS training on April 10 and 24.

On April 17, 2021, our district held its usual Spring **TLC** (for 2021-22 leaders) via Zoom. The event was well attended, with 78 for the morning session, and 71 for the afternoon session. The morning included updates/information on the 7815 merger, Data Management, The Rotary Foundation, Public Image, and an in depth look at the new Anti-Systemic Racism Toolkit. After a lunch break, we returned to have an overview from DGE Alex Twells on the RI Annual Theme for 2021-22, as well as information on the "Each One, Bring One" concept, and more about the goals for next year. We continued with role specific break outs for Presidents, Secretaries, Treasurers, and all other Members. Then PDGs Louisa Horne and Doug Logan took a deep dive into membership, challenging us to consider how our clubs currently engage members; and to identify strategies for attracting and engaging members on an ongoing basis. The slide decks for all presentations are now on the District website under TLC Training Materials, TLC-April 2021; the videos of the general sessions are on our Youtube channel.


Training Chair Alana has worked with a few clubs this year to help them move the needle; and is available to assist other clubs as needed, whether it be strategic planning, board governance, or other.





Bob Munroe - District 7820 Interact Chair

As with most clubs and organizations, Rotary sponsored Interact Clubs also experienced many operating challenges presented by Covid-19 in the 2020/2021 Rotary year. Many clubs were unable to resume activities, normal or modified due to restrictions imposed by either government guidelines or individual school policies.

Not unexpected, there were no Interact Clubs chartered this current Rotary year to date. Through my communication with clubs around the District, I estimate the number of "Active" status Interact Clubs to be 21. The information available through Rotary International on Interact Club numbers is not complete, due to sponsoring Rotary clubs failing to complete and submit the annual compliance document "Report Your Interact Club Advisor". Failure to do this minor task can begin the journey down the bumpy road that can end with Rotary International suspending and potentially terminating the sponsored Interact club. Many sponsoring Rotary Clubs need to take this annual requirement seriously and follow the guidelines and assistance offered by the District chair in dealing with this compliance matter.

Adding to the oversight and mentoring activities of sponsoring Rotary Clubs was the closure of schools to outside visitors. As an alternative to no sponsor participation, some Interact Clubs enabled their Rotary club representative to sit in on their club meetings via Zoom.

Notwithstanding the difficulties that limited the Interact volunteer and fundraising activities, many Clubs were still able to carry on some of their usual projects. Clubs were involved with in school peer tutoring, food drives for local food banks, staffed Salvation Army kettles, and participated in litter cleanups around school and neighbouring properties. These are a sample of activities from around the district.

In prior years our Interact Clubs were well represented as part of the District Youth Program during our traditional District Conference, and they participated in their own Conference that ran parallel with the timing of the Rotary Conference. With the Covid 19 mandated cancellation of the District Conference, the ability of interactors to physically meet members from other clubs and share ideas was missed. However, this year on May 1, 2021, a virtual Interact conference representing Interact Clubs from both District 7810 and 7820 was held via Zoom. It was very successful from a content perspective and plans are underway to host a virtual meeting next year if required and increase Club participation.

If your Rotary Club currently does not sponsor an Interact Club, make the move to revitalize your Youth Services Program and participate in Rotary International's fastest growing youth program.

Systemic Racism Task Force

In May of 2020, the then District Governor Louisa Horne, issued a call across Rotary District 7820 to come forward and be an actively change agent to combat systemic racism, with a particular focus on anti-Black racism sparked by the murder of George Floyd in the US. In June, a 10 member District Systemic Racism Task Force was struck and got to work. The Task Force members were self selected and represented various clubs across the district, commonly bonded by a commitment to meaningful change. The Task Force met intensively every week for the first few months, to build their own level of awareness around systemic racism, and anti-Black racism and well as create a strong environment of trust across the Task Force.

The Task Force identified that a few key foundational steps were needed to anchor any broader strategies or tactics. The first key foundational step was the creation and release of a District commitment statement around combating systemic racism. The second foundation step was creating and releasing a communication asset, using a common reference point, the 4-way test, so Rotarians could start to think about Systemic Racism and how it didn't align with our core Rotary values and beliefs. The final foundational step was the creation of a framework that would then serve as the key structural reference point for any broader strategies, tactics and tools developed to support clubs activating change at the community level. In January 2021, the Task Force released systemic racism tool kit which included;

- Resource Guide and Accompanying Presentation
- Discussion Primer
- What can you do? Infographic
- Coaching Reference Sheet
- Conversation Kit
- Anti-Racism Discussion Vocabulary and Accompanying Discussion Slide Deck
- Assessments Club & Self

The full kit can be found at: http://www.rotary7820.com. It was decided that the kit should be available to all Rotarians but also to the broader community and to that end, the resources are available to anyone who visits the District website. Since the release of the tool kit in January, over 75 presentations have been delivered to clubs across Canada and the top part of the US as well as a number of community organizations that are interested in activating change related to systemic racism in their organizations. While the first phase of this work focused on Anti-Black racism, the Task Force has recognized that there are many groups that experience systemic racism and the goal was to create a framework that could be modified to support expanded dialogues focusing on the lived experience of other group. The Task Force has identified that anti-Indigenous racism and building relationships with Indigenous communities will be their next area of focus, activating in the Spring of 2021. Rob Christie - Co-Registrar, Rotary Leadership Institute

As co-registrar for RLI Atlantic, I have been concerned for some time now about the diminishing number of registrations for the RLI courses from Rotarians within our District of 7820. I chatted with DG Ian about the numbers and he asked that I make a presentation to the Area Governors at their recent meeting and follow it up with a note to our Annual General meeting next week.

Firstly, let me provide you with a little background as to the goal of RLI. RLI International is a grassroots coalition of Rotary districts implementing a leadership development program for "potential" leaders of Rotary Clubs which was established in 1992, RLI believes that excellent Club leadership (all types of club leaders) is essential to the future of Rotary in a complex and fast changing world. The overriding goal of the courses for club Rotarians is to create ENTHUSIASM for Rotary by opening up to them the world of Rotary outside of their own clubs and also showing them the great potential of Rotary service for the benefit of the world that can be furthered with excellent leadership in our clubs.

Let me share with you some comments made by our Rotarians who have attended the RLI courses as it gives one some idea of the impact of this program in providing leadership in our District. Mel Dean, current Area Governor for western Newfoundland and Labrador had this to say, "Personally, I would not have felt confident to become club president prior to graduating from RLI." He went on to say, "I learned about ethics and the relationship to vocational service. Also, I had my first introduction to the Rotary Foundation and the eradication of polio.,

Ron Wilson, Area Governor for Northern Nova Scotia, summed it up when he stated, "All organizations must provide the opportunity for potential leaders to learn and grow within the organization. Complementary to this is the desire of members of the organization to learn about the organization and to show a willingness to accept a leadership role. Together these will provide the path forward to a functional leadership succession plan." He went on to say that many Clubs struggle each year to fill leadership positions with the result that those brave souls who agree to fill a position do so without adequate understanding or training to carry out the duties they have agreed to carry out.

Our Zone Director and incoming RI Vice-president, Valerie Wafer, said at a recent meeting that, "Leaders are made at the club level". Here in 7820, I see our greatest challenge is to ensure that our existing and new Rotarians have a solid appreciation and understanding of Rotary.

I am very concerned that the strength and future of our District is being compromised by the lack of member involvement in our training opportunities. RLI is but one of our excellent training programs offered by the District and we have a challenge ahead of us to ensure that our members are ENGAGED to strengthen our clubs,our District and Rotary International if we want to be part of changing the world!

Tom Campbell - PEI Area Governor

As with all clubs in District 7820, we on PEI were faced with changes to our regular Rotary routine this year. A large part of Rotary is fellowship, in particular the weekly face-to-face meetings for laughs and seeing friends. All clubs did adapt though. While attendance fell for some clubs while on Zoom, other clubs kept their membership up with engaging speakers and presentations.

All clubs are back to meeting sometimes in person. This will get stronger as more and more people get vaccinated, and we move into a post-pandemic world. Saying this, a few clubs are looking at keeping a hybrid model. This will allow people who cannot attend a meeting in person, those travelling (in the near future), etc. to still be a vital part of the club.

To come together across PEi as Rotarians, we did two events.

We hosted an all PEI Rotarian Zoom meeting in January. Each club gave an update on their activities. We also had a guest speaker from the District speaking on Corporate Memberships. One club has already adopted this model, and at least one other club is looking at it. We had about 70 members on this call.

For our second project, all five Rotary clubs on PEI are proud to partner with the PEI Women's Institute on their annual roadside cleanup on May 8. The Rotary clubs, stretching from Montague and Eastern PEI, to the Charlottetown area, to Summerside will have a group of Rotarians out for cleanup and fellowship. We are expecting about 70 members across the Island to participate. We hope to have good visibility as we will be wearing our bright red End Polio Now ponchos.

For the past few years we have been in a decline overall in members; primarily due to two large clubs losing members. We will work on and hope to reverse this trend in the coming two years.

Over all PEI Rotary held its own this Covid year. We are definitely looking forward to the coming years, as we are strong on PEI and hope to be stronger.
