
SWIZZLE, SONG AND GOMBEYS

The Long on Shorts

Although all Bermuda Shorts and their Bermuda attire are imported, they are the national dress for Bermuda. Wear them as a uniform, day attire, evening wear, casual wear, walking out wear, or digging in the garden wear. In Bermuda, meet the Queen or a President in them. Bermuda Shorts, like the Scottish kilt, are original garments for all seasons, representing a standard of turnout difficult to surpass in their originality.

They are as well con-

of trousers, complete

with a proper fitted

loops or a self-

structed as a good pair

waistband or with belt

supporting waistband



and a seam in the center back.

They usually have one pocket on each side and one on each side of the bottom. They are formfitting, designed essentially for and can look very good on the slim or medium-built person. Most people wear them from April to November but they can be worn all year. They are not cheap - about \$50 a pair in Bermuda.

They are very rarely "onsale."

Given Bermuda's very high humidity for most of the year, and the high temperatures from June to October, they are very practical, very useful, very comfortable - and can also be very elegant. They are in various colors. Conservative colors are gray, beige or navy blue. But some prefer orange, pink, green or vellow. Some are in Irish Linen. They should be dry cleaned, never machine washed. Washing those in Irish Linen will soon ruin them. Dry cleaning in Bermuda is expensive so there is a practical alternative.
