

Theresa Ward, Director of Therapeutic Recreation at the Westchester Center for Rehabilitation and Nursing was grateful for the Rotary's contribution to the center, especially for the time the Rotarians took to teach her how to connect and play the WII. Rotary Club of Metro New York City at National Immunization Day in India

The Rotary Club of Metro New York City has a history of continuous commitment to Rotary International's Polio Plus initiative. PP Nadine Homann has participated in an NID in India several years ago, IPP Stefan Jekel has received the District's Walter Maddocks Award (polio eradication recognition) in 2011, and, last year, at the occasion of the club's 10th charter anniversary celebration, a check of \$5,000 to "End Polio Now" was ceremonially presented to Rotary International's Past President Richard King.

This past February, as part of Rotary International's quest to eradicate polio, Stefan traveled to India to participate in the National Immunization Day (NID). Stefan joined a group of over 40 Rotarians and friends from North America - led by PDG Brad Howard (District 5170, Bay Area, California). The group members' origin spanned from Canada to Florida, from the West Coast to the East Coast. The group was one of several teams from the US and from around the world – adding to the 2.5 million, mostly local, NID workers and volunteers (see text box for additional stats).

India has been outbreak-free for two years now and is therefore considered non-endemic. One more year of no new case of polio, and the country would be considered polio-free. This would leave only three polio countries: Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. Indeed, "the eradication of polio is tantalizingly close," as the Wall Street Journal wrote in its Feb 25, 2013 edition at the occasion of Michael Bloomberg's \$100 million donation towards polio eradication.

The National Immunization Day in Numbers

- 225 million doses of Polio Vaccine, carried around the country in 2 million vaccine carrier bags with 6.3 million ice packs
- 209 million homes visited
- 172 million children immunized
- 2,500,000 vaccinators
- 1,170,000 vaccination teams
- 709,000 vaccination booths
- 155,000 supervisors, with 155,000 vehicles (cars, motorcycles, mopeds, bicycles, boats, elephants, camels or whatever it takes)

After a few days of sightseeing (New Delhi, Agra, Jaipur), the team focused in on the humanitarian background of the trip. The group went to visit several initiatives of Rotary International and local Rotary Clubs including the partnership with the Time Magazine-honored Jaipur Foot and Limb Factory (Bhagvan

Mahaveer Viklang Shayate Samiti), the cooperation with a school in Kusumpur Pahari Continued on page 11

(near New Delhi airport) and the sponsorship of the polio ward in St. Stephen's Hospital in New Delhi (the largest non-governmental hospital in India).

In the four meetings leading up to the trip, the

club dedicated its 'Happy and Sad Dollars' to the NID efforts. The \$350 went towards various school supplies and polio vaccine expenses. The school supplies were presented to the aforementioned school and stationery was distributed both at the school as well as in the streets during the NID.

The NID took place over two days and 172 million children under the age of 5 were vaccinated (see text box for additional stats). Stefan and team were assigned to Sonepat, one hour outside New Delhi. The first day consisted of vaccinations at the Sonepat train station and at a Sonepat school later in the day. Day 2 consisted of door-to-door vaccinations in Sonepat. For the vaccination work, multi-cultural and gender-diverse teams of 5 people were formed. Almost any parent was in support of getting their child vaccinated. The initiative, including the presence of foreigners, was extremely well-received and featured in several newspapers. Among the several tokens of appreciation received along the trip by local Rotary Clubs, the biggest rewards undoubtedly were the smiles on children's faces. All together, a very positive and rewarding experience one will never forget.

What still lies ahead: The Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation is set to raise \$5.5 billion for a new Global Polio Eradication Initiative's (GPEI) "polio eradication and endgame strategic plan" to wipe out the virus by 2018. Rotary International, as a member of the GPEI alongside Unicef, The World Health Organization and the United States Center for Disease Control, will ferociously continue its advocacy, social mobilization, organizational and financial support - adding to the \$1.2bn that RI already raised among its members and the \$8.5bn raised from donors.

More on the Eradication of Polio

Rotary's leadership, beginning in 1985, inspired the World Health Assembly to pass a resolution to eradicate polio, which paved the way for the formation of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative in 1988. In fact, it is the largest-ever internationally-coordinated public health effort in history. It is spearheaded by national governments, WHO, Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) and UNICEF, and is supported by key partners including the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation. Underpinning the effort is a global network of more than 20 million volunteers worldwide who have collectively immunized more than 2.5 billion children over the past 20 years.

While polio is a distant memory in most of the world, the disease still exists in some places and mainly affects children under five. One in 200 infections leads to irreversible paralysis (usually in the legs). Among those paralyzed, 5% to 10% die when their breathing muscles become immobilized.

The three countries are Afghanistan, Nigeria and Pakistan. They face a range of challenges such as insecurity, weak health systems





and poor sanitation. Polio can spread from these 'endemic' countries to infect children in other countries with less-than-adequate vaccination.

Unlike most diseases, polio can be completely eradicated!

There are three strains of wild poliovirus, none of which can survive for long periods outside of the human body. If the virus cannot find an unvaccinated person to infect, it will die out. Type 2 wild poliovirus was eradicated in 1999.

Every child must be vaccinated to eradicate polio! This includes those living in the most remote and/or underserved places on the planet. 'Days of Tranquility' are negotiated so that vaccination teams can reach children living in conflict zones. All manner of transport is used – from donkeys to motorbikes to helicopters – to reach children in remote areas or DIFFICULT terrain.

Who Are the True Heroes of Polio Eradication? A Hero's Story

Ali Maow Maalin (born c. 1954) is a Somalian hospital cook and health worker as well as an occasional vaccinator for a WHO smallpox eradication team was the last person known to be infected with naturally occurring Variola minor SMALLPOX in the world. He was diagnosed with the disease in October 1977 and made a full recovery.

Maalin was subsequently involved in the successful poliomyelitis eradication campaign in Somalia. Maalin was among the 10,000 volunteers who participated in the effort to eradicate poliomyelitis from Somalia, which succeeded in 2008. He explained his motivation for volunteering: "Somalia was the last country with smallpox. I wanted to help ensure that we would not be the last place with polio too.

Maalin worked for WHO as a local coordinator with responsibility for social mobilization, and spent several years travelling across Somalia, vaccinating children and educating communities. The Boston Globe describes him as one of the "most valuable" local coordinators for WHO. He encouraged people to be vaccinated by sharing his experiences with smallpox: "Now when I meet parents who refuse to give their children the polio vaccine, I tell them my story. I tell them how important these vaccines are.

We as Rotarians must and will redouble our commitment to END Polio NOW.
