Presidents:

- Are you and your club members proud to be a Rotarian?
- Do you want to show the world that you are Rotarians? Here is a simple and exciting way to do that!

Inform your club members that they can:

- Call your local County Treasurer's Office or where you buy your license plates for your car and inquire about a license plate that will accommodate decals.
- In Minnehaha County, the Treasurer's Office (phone: 367-4211) has plates that are called <u>organizational plates</u> that are used for this purpose. If you are going to replace your plates and they have not expired, the cost for a set of organizational plates is \$10. If the plates are ready to expire, the cost is zero.
- Poll your members to get a count and your club secretary can order the Rotary decals to affix to your member's special license plates.

• The decals can be found in the Russell-Hampton Company catalog that your club secretary should have.

• If you do not have a catalog, your secretary can call the catalog company at 1-800-877-8908 to order one for your club.

• The decals are found on Page 76, Item #R56124

The cost of the reflectorized decals is: \$1.15 each; Buy 12 \$1.10 each; buy 25 \$1.05 each; buy 50 \$0.95 each; buy 100+ \$0.85 each.

Since its founding in 1983 by Michael Levine, the Dallas Brass has become one of America's foremost musical ensembles. The group has established a unique blend of traditional brass instruments with a full complement of drums and percussion, which creates a performing entity of extraordinary range and musical challenges. The Dallas Brass repertoire includes classical masterpieces, Dixieland, swing, Broadway, Hollywood and patriotic music.

According to Mr. Levine, "a Dallas Brass concert is intended for the entire family. Our ideal audience has a range in ages from 5 to 95. Our goal is to entertain and enrich by playing great music, while showing our audience how much we enjoy what we do." In addition to their solo engagements, the Dallas Brass appears with symphony orchestras nationwide. Symphonic credits include the Cincinnati Pops conducted by Erich Kunzel, New York Pops conducted by Skitch Henderson, and the Philly Pops conducted by Peter Nero. The Dallas Brass has performed at Carnegie Hall, the John F. Kennedy Center in Washington, DC, and has toured overseas to Europe and the Far East. Leroy "J.R." LaPlante is an enrolled member of the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe. He is a practicing attorney in Vermillion and serves as the Chief Judge and court Administrator for the Crow Creek Sioux Tribe in Ft. Thompson.

Daugaard said in a news release he was pleased that LaPlante had agreed to join his administration, adding, "J.R. is well-respected across the state, and he will help me to work with our tribes toward a better future for all South Dakotans. I know he will do a great job as our first Secretary of Tribal Relations."

Previously, the Office of Tribal Government Relations was a unit of the former Department of Tourism and Sate Development. However, Daugaard elevated the position to Secretary as part of his Executive Reorganization Order.

LaPlante, who was born at Eagle Butte, said he was "excited to work with Gov. Daugaard and our tribal leaders on the issues facing our state. "This new department is a unique opportunity to bring together leaders from all of South Dakota's governments and build stronger tribal-state relationships."

In both his law practice and his work, LaPlante has focused on serving the Native American community. He was the former Administrative Officers for the Cheyenne River Sioux Tribe and has an extensive background working for Native American human service organizations.

He is a member of the first cohort of Native Nation Rebuilders selected by the Bush Foundation in 2010 and served as an Equal Justice Works, AmeriCorps Legal Fellow with South Dakota Access to Justice in 2009.

LaPlante's Lakota name is Tasunke Waste, which means His Horse is Beautiful.

The Rotary Global History Fellowship recently named him a charter member of the HEROES which honors those Rotarians whose deeds and dedication to the ideals of Rotary are recorded for posterity. He if the founder of ROTARY GLOBAL RUN 4 WATER, a water fundraiser which helps clubs raise money for their own water projects or to support other water projects. George presently lives in Sarasota, Florida and is a member of the RC of Lakewood Ranch.

July is Literacy Month

If illiteracy were a simple problem, Rotarians would have solved it by now.

The issues are myriad: a scarcity of schools and learning materials, insufficient government spending on education, and cultural stigmas that limit education for women and girls, to name a few. And the problem goes far beyond the inability to decipher words on a page. In an increasingly complex world, poor reading comprehension condemns adults to the lowest rungs of society.

Rotarians, however, are committed to improving the situation. Rotary clubs worldwide have been carrying out thousands of literacy projects for decades. Basic education and literacy is one of Rotary's areas of focus.

Rotary's work in literacy has included rebuilding schools destroyed by natural disasters in Sri Lanka and Haiti, partnering with the Dollywood Foundation's Imagination Library to promote early



childhood reading, and teaching students to read and write through the concentrated language encounter method in Brazil and Turkey.
