
Global Grant Scholarship News

Vermillion Rotary Club – Rotary on the Platz:



and listen to some good music and meet their neighbors.



We all scream for Ice Cream!



How can the Rotarians in Lemars, Iowa raise money in the Ice Cream Capital of the World? How about selling ice cream?

Every year at the Plymouth County Fair, the Lemars Rotary club staffs the drug store in the pioneer village. But rather than sell prescriptions, the Rotarians of Lemars sell ice cream...lots of ice cream. This year they sold 6,200 ice cream cones, 1,150 hot fudge sundaes, 1,400 cups of ice cream, and 3,590 root beer floats. The ice cream cones are still only \$1, the best bargain at the Plymouth County Fair. The fair attracts over 100,000 people every year and the Rotarians are proud to promote RI every chance we get, including Rotary signage and clothing.

This year's ice cream fundraiser grossed over \$17,000 and after expenses the club was able to net some \$11,000 to support local and international Rotary projects. The biggest local project for the Lemars Rotary club is \$6,000 in scholarships for graduating seniors at Lemars Community High School, and Gehlan Catholic High School.


It is a grueling five days at the ice cream drug store, staffing the fundraiser from 11 am to 11 pm Wednesday through Sunday. But when it is all over, they succeeded in putting smiles on over 12,000 ice cream customers, and helping to promote the good works of Rotary.

Guatemala wheelchair distribution

Seven Rotarians and two family members journeyed to Xenacoj, Guatemala, for a week of activities. Team members included Jack Burns (Winner), Wendy Fransen (Watertown) and her daughter-in-law Katie Fransen from Wagner, Cindy Hansen (Rapid City Rushmore), Tammy McKillip (Sioux Falls South) and her daughter Tia from Sioux Falls, Alicia Larson (Sioux Falls South), Kimberly Sumpter (Madison) and Shelli Masek (Sioux Falls North). Masek is a Rotarian and also an employee of Hope Haven International. This is the tenth team she has lead to the Hope Haven International factory in Guatemala.

The group left early on the morning of August 8 and landed in Guatemala City. The drivers met them and went directly to Hogar Migual Migone orphanage outside of Mixco. This is an orphanage of



approximately 45 boys. Twenty girls live in their own castle-like home just down the street. The group was given a tour of the facilities and then was mobbed by children. Some of the team helped prepare the evening meal while others played with the kids. The travelers then made the hour drive to Chuya, a guest house owned by Mark Richard of Hope Haven International.

Sunday was spent in the colonial city of Antigua attending church, taking in some local attractions and shopping.

Monday the real work started. The team went to the factory and worked the entire day rolling pallets of Naugahyde, assembling wheelchair frames and organizing the seating clinic area. The team and staff enjoyed the interaction. Hope Haven employs 20 full time people with at least half of them being wheelchair users. There are also part time employees at the shop.

Tuesday was a wonderful and long day. The morning was spent at a public school helping Ingrid Cuadra, her daughter Ivania and another teacher, Joel with the students' English lessons. Ingrid goes to this school a couple days a week to teach English. The team helped in the classrooms as well as each getting their own students to tutor for the upcoming spelling bee. The team really enjoyed the enthusiasm of the students and their eagerness to spell all the words correctly. Shelli and Katie found out they are also pretty good PE teachers. After lunch the group split in two with Jack, Wendy, Kimberly, Tammy, Tia and Cindy and Brian the driver installing a ceramic stove in the home of a very poor village family. The group had pooled together money to buy this stove and for other group efforts. These stoves are becoming more popular because they can be vented to the outside and the residents aren't forced to inhale the odor of the cooking fumes. The Brookings solar oven was put to use by Jack for bread and vegetables. This group also delivered Kids Against Hunger packets to poor families of Xenacoj. The families appreciate this gift and appreciate the visitors as well. The rest of the team went to Ingrid's small office where she gives private English lessons to those that can afford it. Alicia helped administer tests and Katie and Shelli graded papers. Even though the government gives this program no monetary support, they still demand to see a type of standardized test score. Wednesday the team drove back to Antigua to spend the majority of the day repairing wheelchairs at Hermano Pedro. This is a large facility that is a hospital, clinic, malnutrition unit, orphanage and home for the aging. More than 300 people permanently reside here and there are as many as 200 at a time in a wheelchair. The group set up shop in a large room and fixed wheelchairs for most of the day. Many chairs require simple



brake adjustments yet others required complex makeovers. The team was assisted by Hope Haven physical therapists Ilse and Sergio and the staff therapists from the Hermano Pedro.

That evening the group attended the Antigua Rotary meeting and flags were exchanged with Jack and Wendy, and explained topics in English. Their club is made up of a few native born Guatemalans and many expatriates from other countries. The possibility of a Rotary Friendship Exchange was also mentioned. They are also working on an RI grant for a school in their city.

Thursday tore at the heartstrings. It was the day of the wheelchair distribution. Many families

came from hours away and waited in a van because the 64 degree weather was too cold for them. There was a family that couldn't afford to come so a driver was sent for them. The team worked in pairs with either a therapist or Hope Haven seating professional. Dick Rutgers, missionary and seating specialist was also on hand to lend expertise. The joy of the kids and the families brings such energy to a long, hard day. One of the team members was heard to say, "If these kids don't bring a tear to your eye there is something wrong with you."

For the Friday free day the team headed to beautiful Lake Atitlan. This was a gorgeous day on the lake starting a Panajachel and going to San Pedro and Santiago before making the long drive back.

Great friendships and great memories were made—eating iguana, fabulous weather, having a boat break down in the middle of the lake, laughing at ourselves, feeling a few earthquakes, teaching the driver the term "hoochie mama," meeting kind, wonderful people and doing things for our fellow man who will never in this world be able to repay anyone. That is the best part.

The elephant in Rotary's living room

Some clubs count participation in a service project toward attendance.

In my travels as a newly fielded district governor, I've run into a misperception that several clubs have told me is getting in the way of membership growth.

The elephant in the living room? ATTENDANCE.

Let's step back. Several years ago, Rotary's Council on Legislation declared that almost ANY legitimate Rotary activity qualifies as a make-up. This includes not only attending another club's meeting, but also a committee meeting or board meeting, working on a project (some clubs say for at least one or two hours), etc. "Etc." means anything that can reasonably be called a Rotary service activity. Now, of course to get "credit" for a make-up, the member has to report that qualifying activity to the club secretary. Most clubs use a sign-in sheet at a committee meeting or project and then forward the whole list to the secretary.

Measuring engagement

Why did the Council do that? Because the point of tracking attendance is not to make people come to meetings. When measured this way, it's a measure of engagement — a key performance indicator of how your Rotary club is doing at involving members in Rotary activities. Believe me, we have the data to prove that when a member isn't engaged and involved in the club, it's a short trip to a resignation letter. Look at your members' attendance percentages. Those at the bottom of the list are thinking about resigning. What can you do to get them engaged, involved, and — hopefully — passionate about something the club is doing?

More importantly, tracking engagement (attendance is a surrogate) is an important way of ensuring that members get the return on their Rotary investment that they deserve. Members who don't show up for club activities aren't getting the benefit of Rotary, and if we can identify those folks early, we can intervene and get them involved in something they're interested in.

Participation versus attendance

So, let's not only treat attendance as a key performance indicator for engagement but let's explain it the same way to prospects. Rather than, "You have to attend four meetings a month," say, "We expect you to participate in some Rotary activity four times a month — you pick the activity that works for you, and you pick the time." I think that's a whole different message, and actually what we're attempting to promote and measure.

It's not about making people come to meetings. It's about offering them a platform where they, in their own ways and based on their own preferences, can **Be** a **Gift to the World**.

School of St. Jude Support Project

Many clubs in our district use this easy way to get involved in an international project and this project gives them lots of feedback from the school and the student to truly show them that they are helping to change the world. The students write letters to their sponsors twice a year and their grade reports are also sent to the sponsor. A separate district account is open so that all interested clubs can donate to The School of St. Jude. It takes \$100 to \$200 or more to get involved and when the total reaches \$1500 we will send it to **sponsor a child and a teacher**. We sent \$1320 in May 2015 to begin our District sponsorship.

This is an annual commitment as the child needs to be sponsored every year. The sponsorship for the student includes uniforms, shoes, food, clean water, transportation to and from school, school supplies and a high quality education. In the upper grades it also includes boarding as fourth grade through eighth board at the school during the week and from ninth grade on the students board at the school for the whole semester. For the teacher it provides classroom supplies.

The teacher and student we are sponsoring are posted on the District website, in downloads. Read their reports for a complete story. Here's a brief from Kailey Gramberg, Sponsor Relations Team at St. Judes:

"We are very pleased to provide to you a detailed profile of your newly sponsored student; **Glory Fred Kundi**, who is studying at our Sisia Lower Primary Campus.

Your newly sponsored teacher; **Ms Lightness Daniel** has been part of our teaching team since 2012. In 2015, she is continuing her role as our librarian at our Smith Secondary Campus."

Polio Report

AFRICA HAS GONE OVER A YEAR WITH NO REPORTED POLIO CASES. And more good news, we just had another week without a reported case of polio in the world. So far there has been a drop of polio cases from 145 last year to only 36 this year. The difficult battle in Northern Nigeria has been won. The Nigerian Muslim religious leaders were key this success by finally advocating and telling their members that the vaccine was safe and life saving. Getting their support was a priority of Rotary, the Gates Foundation and the World Health Organization. And it took all of us.

Now a new chapter in the fight to eradicate polio is taking place with the introduction of the inactivated polio vaccine (IPV), a shot. In the US and Europe we went to the IPV years ago as the live virus drops at times would revert to a form that could on rare occasions cause paralysis. In addition the live virus could cause paralysis in adults on chemo therapy for cancer or immunological diseases. Fortunately the IPV does not have this problem. In addition the IPV supplements the orals drops giving an even better response. The IPV has been introduced to 20 new countries since January and is now being started in Pakistan.

This new phase should bring the end of polio but is very expensive. So funds continue to be crucial. 1952 – 58.000 Americans had polio

3,145 died - 21,000 crippled for life

More than in 9/11 attacks – 2,996 deaths

500,000 world-wide with 50,000 deaths and thousands crippled for life

Dr. Jonas Salk developed vaccine in 1952 - largest medical experiment in history

Dr. Albert Sabin - oral vaccine few years later

1979 US last case

1978 Dr. Benny Santos starts polio eradication program in the Philippines

1985 Rotary launches PoloPlus

1988 Mexico immunizes 13 million children: China 100 million children over a 2 day effort

Global Polio Eradication Initiative Members: Rotary International, World Health Organization (WHO),

UNICEF and US Center for Disease Control

Rotary initially raised \$247 million to complete the effort

Approximately 60 cents to immunize a child for life.


