All board members should be elected by the end of December, for the next term beginning July 1. All officers for 2016-17 should be posted on BOTH the District website and the RI website for your club, by your club leadership. Rotary and District leaders must have your club officers emails online to be able to send information. In addition, update your personal profile with a photo, phone and email, to facilitate communications. And then check that all club members have emails, and new members are added to your roster on RI website.

Finally, use the **Clubrunner "synchronize and compare" function** at the District or your Club website to match the databases.

NOTICE FROM RITO CLUB AND DISTRICT OFFICERS

Rotary has introduced several updates to the Club & District Administration pages that makes your administrative tasks easier:

Quick links: Designate favorite links from the Club & District Administration section and access them from your My Rotary dashboard.

Terms of access: Incoming club and district officers have access to club and district information by 1 June. Most outgoing club and district officers will retain access to the information for 12 months.

Overall redesign: Related activities are grouped together on Club & District Administration pages.

Ever since **Rotary Club Central** was launched in 2012-13, we have been collecting feedback and making improvements.

Here are two important improvements, related to goals, for 2016-17:

- The membership goal will no longer be based on retention of new and existing members. Instead, it will represent the number of members in a club at the end of the Rotary year.
- The Annual Fund goal will no longer be divided into levels of giving. Instead, it will be a single goal for total Annual Fund contributions made by the club and its members.





E-clubs

Rotary e-clubs are a lot like other Rotary clubs: they meet weekly, carry out service projects, support The Rotary Foundation, and socialize with each other. So what's different about e-clubs? You join your meeting online when it's convenient for you, day or night, any day of the week.

How does an e-club operate?

E-club members use webinars, videoconferencing, message boards, instant messaging, or tools like Skype and Google Hangout to communicate. For example, a club member might post content online for that week's meeting, then other members join the discussion throughout the week. Some e-club members also meet in person at service projects, social activities or the RI Convention. Any Rotarian can make up a missed meeting by participating in an e-club online meeting. Find an e-club.

Who can join an e-club?

Members can be from anywhere in the world. Some e-clubs focus their membership in a particular region or community. An e-club could be right for you if you:

- Have a busy schedule and need a flexible meeting time
- Live in different places throughout the year
- Travel frequently
- Have limited mobility
- Live in an area without a nearby Rotary club

How do I start an e-club?

First contact your district governor who will help you get started.

E-clubs need:

- A dedicated website
- Founding members who are able to manage the club's website
- An online meeting platform to host meetings
- Private sections of the website that only members can access to protect members' online personal data
- Online financial transaction systems that allow members to pay dues, make donations, or process payments
- The ability for visiting Rotarians to make up a club meeting.

E-clubs are responsible for all costs associated with purchasing a URL and hosting their website on the Internet.

Katia reports on first semester

I am nearly three months into my first semester at Leiden University, and I am learning so much every day through my classes, academic research, and campus involvement. Most of my time is spent in class or at the library. Each element of my education is so interesting that it does not feel like work.

I'm learning about the theories, processes, and institutions of international relations alongside scholars and instructors from a wide variety of disciplines and nationalities. Every day, we engage in meaningful discussions on the state of the world and on practical solutions to issues in contemporary global politics. It is eye-opening studying international relations in a truly international setting, especially when discussing common problems from different viewpoints.

I have also begun work on my master's thesis. I will be examining the impact of decreased international funding on education in developing countries. Specifically, I am focusing on what kind of effect this decrease has had on the literacy and socioeconomic conditions of girls in Haiti and Mali. I'm very excited about this project, which I hope will combine my theoretical interest in international relations with practical concerns about the importance of basic education and literacy on individual well-being and global development.



I'm thrilled to report that I have become involved with UNICEF Netherland's student organization at Leiden University. (Katia pictured top row, second from *left.*) I have become a committee member in their Awareness division. In this capacity, I am working with other students to communicate the importance of children's rights and UNICEF's to our classmates and the community at large. We organized and worked a sorority event earlier this month, the proceeds of which will be donated to a UNICEF project which is building schools in Ethiopia.

I am genuinely enjoying the intensive learning that

this one-year program demands. And, importantly, I feel that my research and work with UNICEF are already allowing me to take important steps in applying that knowledge to finding sustainable solutions and making an impact. I am, as always, extremely grateful for Rotary's support, which is enabling me to concentrate fully on my studies and campus involvement, and I'm excited and energized to see what my second semester will bring.

Scholarships for 2017-18

Now is the time to recruit outstanding candidates from our district for our District Global Grant Scholarship for 2017-18. If you have a candidate from your community or if you have a college or university in your area, please share this information with them and encourage them to consider these scholarship opportunities. Candidates should be identified by February so we can have time to complete the selection process by early spring. There are two different Rotary Scholarships. (Note a flyer is available on the District website -- feel free to post on college campuses or to share with college students you know!)

1. Global Grant Scholarship

Global grants support scholarships for graduate students studying abroad in one of the six areas of focus.

- · Peace and conflict prevention/resolution
- · Disease prevention and treatment
- Water and sanitation
- Maternal and child health
- Basic education and literacy
- · Economic and community development

Scholarships range from one to four years and therefore can include an entire degree program. Prospective scholars must show proof of admission to the chosen university before the grant will be approved.

Global grant scholars are expected to participate in club or district activities before, during, and after the scholarship.

Global grant scholarships are funded using cash and/or the District Designated Fund, matched by the World Fund. The global grant budget must total at least US\$30,000, but a scholarship may be a component of a larger grant application — for example, a scholarship plus a humanitarian project.

2. Peace Fellowship

Each year, Rotary International selects up to 100 individuals from around the world to receive fully funded academic fellowships at one of our peace centers. These fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

In just over a decade, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 900 fellows for careers in peace building. Many of them go on to serve as leaders in national governments, NGOs, the military, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and World Bank.

Two types of peace fellowships are available.

Master's degree

We offer master's degree fellowships at premier universities in fields related to peace and conflict prevention and resolution. Programs last 15 to 24 months and require a practical internship of two to three months during the academic break. Each year, we award up to 50 master's degree fellowships at these institutions:

- · Duke University and University of North Carolina at Chapel Hill, USA
- · International Christian University, Japan
- · <u>University of Bradford</u>, England
- University of Queensland, Australia
- · <u>Uppsala University</u>, Sweden

Professional development certificate

For experienced professionals working in peace-related fields who want to enhance their professional skills, a three-month program in peace and conflict prevention and resolution at <u>Chulalongkorn University</u> in Thailand is offered. This program incorporates two to three weeks of field study. Rotary international awards up to 50 certificates each year.

Optimism on Polio Eradication

We are confident (but also praying) that in the next few months we will see no more cases of paralysis cased by polio. This optimism is based on the decrease in wild polio paralysis cases in the world from 66 to 34 this year.

Afghanistan has had only 12 cases this year and environmental samples are negative. Pakistan however continues to have positive sewer samples nation wide. But the number of cases in Pakistan has dropped from 49 to 18 so far this year.

Our brave health care workers in the constant face of danger continue to go door to door risking their lives to save children from a life of paralysis. Talk about heroic action. In Pakistan they even have to have a guard accompany each worker.

The Global Polio Eradication Initiative (Rotary, Gates Foundation, WHO and UNICEF) is now adding a "killed" polio vaccine given by injection. The US and Europe did this around 15 years ago. This major change is because giving the shot after oral drops stops the virus from circulating. That circulation has to be stopped to keep polio from eventually coming back.

After we have success with no cases being found, the surveillance must continue for a number of years as weakly circulating polio virus could revert and start paralyzing. This is why we all need to continue donating \$40 per member every year. Remember every dollar Rotarians give is still matched with 2 dollars by the Gates Foundation. So our \$40 becomes \$120 stopping polio paralysis for ever.

Club Flexibility

Flexibility has been a buzz word in the Rotary world since April when the Council on Legislation approved proposals giving clubs more options for members, meetings, and attendance. Now, you can visit the new <u>Club Flexibility</u> web page on <u>www.rotary.org</u> which explains ways clubs can implement the new flexible options. It's up to your club to decide how — and if — you want to use them, but you can start by visiting the club flexibility page which includes helpful resources such as: Five ways to use the new flexibility, Frequently asked questions, Sample bylaws, and "Start Guides" for alternative membership types and flexible meetings formats.

5 WAYS TO USE THE NEW FLEXIBILITY

It's up to your club to decide how — and if — you want to use the new options. Start by reviewing the updated <u>Standard Rotary Club Constitution</u> to see which guidelines are flexible. Once you've decided what changes would benefit your club, edit your club bylaws to reflect them, and try them out. If you decide they aren't working, try something else.

Here are some examples of how your club can apply the new flexible options:

- 1 Change your meeting schedule. Your club can vary its meeting days, times, and frequency. For example, you could hold a traditional meeting on the first Tuesday of the month to discuss business and service projects and get together socially on the last Friday of the month. You just need to meet at least twice a month.
- **2 Vary your meeting format.** Your club can meet in person, online, or a combination. including letting some members attend in-person meetings through the Internet.
- **Relax attendance requirements.** Your club can ease attendance requirements and encourage members to participate in other ways, such as taking a leadership role, updating the club website regularly, running a meeting a few times a year, or planning an event. If your club is dynamic and offers a good experience for members, attendance won't be a problem.
- Offer multiple membership types. Your club could offer family memberships to those who want to bring their families, junior memberships to young professionals with leadership potential, or corporate memberships to people whose employers want to be represented in the club. Each type of membership can have its own policies on dues, attendance, and service expectations. Rotary will count these people in your club membership and will consider them active members if they pay RI dues.
- 5 Invite Rotaractors to be members of your club. You can invite Rotaractors to join your club while remaining members of their Rotaract clubs. If your club chooses to, it can make special accommodations for these members, such as relaxed attendance requirements or reduced fees, as long as they are reflected in the club bylaws.

Still trying to figure out *how* to make these changes? Join the <u>Membership Best Practices Discussion Group</u>, an online forum where Rotarians from around the world share tips and examples on attracting and engaging current and prospective members. Try posting questions or ideas relating to club flexibility and connect with members who can offer feedback and guidance.

The Prospective Member Experience

When a Rotary club is vibrant, innovative, and making a difference in the community, it will attract prospective members. Bringing in new, qualified individuals diversifies your club and increases its impact. Make sure the first contact a prospective member has with Rotary is a positive one.

Share the <u>Creating a Positive Experience for Prospective Members</u> resource with Rotarians to remind them that working with prospective members is an important responsibility and a delicate task. From the time an individual is identified or expresses an interest in Rotary to the time they join, make the most of the opportunities to get to know them better and for them to get to know your club.

Need help finding new members? Check out the <u>Finding New Club Members</u> tool in <u>Membership</u> <u>Assessment Tools</u>. This prospective member exercise will help clubs identify good candidates for membership and determine the best way to introduce them to their club.

Why do Members Leave?

Most of us can agree that membership isn't only about attracting new members; it's also about engaging your existing members. The Zone Membership Development team has recently created new reporting that provides a comprehensive analysis of membership trends and membership termination information, that I am able to access district level information over a 3-year period with the *Membership Termination Profile* report. RLI offers leadership training in shorter program

The Rotary Leadership Program is undergoing additional change this year. In an effort to make program completion more achievable by streamlining and making parts of the program accessible on-line, the leadership program will consist of a single course this year. The course is designed in a manner that enables faculty to assign video parts of the course to be completed outside the group setting, but will still provide ample opportunity for group discussion. The course is based on the original three-session program, but is being edited by our neighboring district to the west, which includes Wyoming and northern Colorado. They, like us, are hampered by long spaces between clubs, and Rotarians unable to travel for three sessions to complete the program. We anticipate that our district will do some minor editing to meet our needs, but plan to have coursework available in January. Additional information will be forthcoming.
