Students and their parents are invited to attend and all preschool classrooms participate (ages 2, 3, and 4). Students and their parents enjoy a fresh fruit snack at 5:30 PM.


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After that the students join "Auntie Gale" in a big circle. We sing some of our favorite songs in English and in Hawaiian for the parents that the students have learned to sing during our Rotary Sings Programs. Then students are divided into small reading groups as they sit on the floor and our Rotarians read books to each of the various groups. After that, each classroom of students is invited to select a new book to take home with them from a large assortment of books provided by our club. The entire Family Literacy Night runs one hour. 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Youth Service & Community Service - The Rotary Club of Kaneohe Book Donation Project. years ago the Rotary Club of Kaneohe made a decision to forego its practice of buying a lei to present to its weekly speakers and instead decided to donate a book in the name of the speaker to an elementary school in the Kaneohe District. The Club allocated a budget of \$500 each year to make possible donation of books to two elementary schools during the year. To date all the schools that accepted the donation have been furnished with approximately 20-25 books per school for their library collection. In the 2014 to 2015 Rotary year, a second round of donations took place with books being furnished again to Ben Parker Elementary School and Puohala Elementary School.

The process starts with a letter to the school's principal explaining our Book Donation Project and a request to have the school's librarian provide us with a list of books that they would like added to their collection. Books are ordered from the list within our budget allocation and upon receipt of the books a book plate with the speaker's name and organization or company is placed on the inside of the book cover. The books are delivered to the school library. Initially we arranged to have the presentation done by the club President during a lunch assembly but that practice was discontinued due to scheduling and logistical issues. In its place the schools have been kind enough to mention our efforts in their parent newsletters. We have continued the Book Donation Project as many elementary schools seems to have had their budget for purchase of new books for the library reduced or eliminated and the librarians are very grateful to have our donated books added to their book collection.



Last year our club planned and organized "Imua Readers!" a network of trained volunteers who after-school coach one-on-one a kindergartner or first grader who is classed as at-risk for reading. Our club sponsored the initial supplies, with a D5000 grant of \$1,500. We now have 6 volunteers (2 of us are Kihei-Wailea Rotarians) coaching 6 first graders at Kamalii Elementary school in our area. Results are already happening. One of our first graders was reading at only 14wpm. She is now up to 34wpm. We do have plans to grow Imua Readers! with the help of Rotary clubs. Stay tuned.


