SOME IDEAS TO HELP IN COMPREHENSION

FIRST: REMEMBERTHE IMPORTANCE OF PRE-READING

Before playing a sport or doing other physical activity, it is important to warm up and prepare your body for the upcoming task. It is the same way with reading. You need to warm up and prepare your mind for reading so that you can perform your best


Before reading, be sure to engage your student in discussion about the topic. Ask what he/she already knows about the topic. Have them try to recall as much information as they can and think about related ideas learned in the past. One of the most important tools of pre-reading is to preview the selection and look for unfamiliar words. Have the student write down the new words, decode them and look up their definition (with your help???) Their comprehension will

THEN: ENGAGE THE STUDENT IN PREDICTING

Make a list of some of the words (about 8) in the story your student will read (e.g."..., biscuit, New York, ..., Russia"). Then have the student predict how they are related. (Your student might say, "Biscuits are made in New York and Russia.") Next, have the student read the passage. (Part of the passage might be: "The Empire Biscuit Company is located in New YorkEmpire Biscuits are sold all over the world, even in Russia." Then have your student compare his/her predictions with the actual reading and revise his/her predictions if necessary. (For

instance, after reading he/she should correct the prediction made by saying: "Empire Biscuits are made in New York. They are sold in Russia.")
