**New Community Service Project and Publicizing in Rotary Club Central and Rotary Showcase:** Inspired by Rotary International President Ian Riseley (2017-18) call for Rotarians to plant a tree for every member in your Rotary Club by Earth Day 2018, the Club participated in a new community service project on November 11, 2017. The Club teamed up with a Title 1 elementary school, Kailua Elementary School, and collaborated with the Hawaii Baptist Academy Interact and Environmental clubs in tending to two plots in the marsh and planting native plants, bushes, and trees. The Hamakua Marsh Restoration project is **publicized in the Rotary Club Central and Rotary Showcase**.

Community Service Narrative for the Rotary Club of Hanalei Bay

Since our drive and passion is for a **Safer and Healthier community** our two **major signature projects** are **The Heart of Gold Campaign** and **The Kilauea Agricultural Park.** The Heart of Gold Campaign is comprised of installing **50 AEDs** around the island of Kauai. Sudden Cardiac Arrest causes more than 350,000 deaths a year. If we could save just one life with an AED, this project is a worth its weight in gold. **CPR and AED training classes** are a must and given with all new installations. **We have trained over 200 people** so far. We now have 28 AEDs around the island and people are now asking us for AEDs. The **Kilauea Agricultural Park is a community farm** for the benefit of the community. We are raising money for a Farmers Market building and have already funded and **donated a \$35,000 pavilion for the community to gather and talk story**. We will be having an **"Adopt-A-Tree"** program for all that are interested. The blessing of the Gazebo gathered over 50 people who attended this ceremony.

Every Spring we have our "**Greatest Garage Sale Ever**" and the community lines up at 6:30 to get in. We collect, sort and arrange all the donations of the community and make it available for all those that want those new treasures. The whole club takes part the day of the sale. No one wants to miss it. This year we made \$8,000 in 4 hours.

Every October the **Clothing Swap** happens at one of our houses. We collect all good clothing from members and friends and display them. All women in the community come on a Friday afternoon and seek their treasures among the hangers. Raised over \$1300 this year and all was donated to **Polio**.

We participated in the **Fit Fest** in July in Hanalei and promoted our programs to the public. Because of this we were granted a \$2300 grant for our AED program. We also participated in the Princeville Night Market educating our community.

**Rescue Tubes,** which we introduced in 2009, is catching fire all around the world. Water rescue, living on an island, is the utmost importance in our every day living. A member of our club attended the **Water Rescue Conference** in Vancouver and introduced the rescue tubes which was a great success.

We started the **Food Pantry in Kilauea** two years ago and it continues to grow. We fed 7,184 people in 2017.

In November we collected money to purchase over 95 gifts for the children in the Foster Care Program. Everyone who wanted a bike, got a bike by a generous donor who helps the Rotary Club. This program we do every year is called **Adopt An Angel**. The community joins in with these donations.

The first Saturday of every month we are out on Kuhio Highway in our "**Rotary Works for You**" shirts, plucking up trash and waving to all those that are honking and thanking us. This is best for the Community, Rotary and the environment.

The **Weinberg** Project will happen in June where we will help weed the Kilauea Community Agricultural Park and the \$10,000 will go to the **Food Pantries** on the Northshore of our island.

In November we decorated Christmas trees for the seniors at Mahelona Hospital in Kapaa.

Our newest community service project this year was focused on Na Keiki. We partnered with the YWCA on a sexual abuse prevention curriculum to teach children from Pre-K through Grade 12 on body safety and boundaries. We graduated 12 Rotarians to work with our East Hawaii schools to share this much-needed training.

The three hands on projects that we completed fell in line with DG Nalani's Mauka to Makai initiative for this year. The three projects were: pulling invasive weeds on top of Mauna Kea, planting Ulu trees, and refurbishing a fence for a transitional home. On Mauna Kea, we met at Hale Pohaku where we learned that the astronomers were concerned that the weeds would hitch a ride on a vehicle and make their way up the slopes of the pristine mountain. After a brief meeting, we were out pulling weeds. We collected over 50 bags of weeds and were treated to a home cooked luncheon and tour of the astronomy facility. Our second project kept our members busy for three weekends digging holes to plant two varieties of ulu trees for a sustainable farm project. We planted over 60 trees and we are planning to assist with helping to create an educational learning environment for future generations. Our final "hands on" project was completed in two phases over three weekends. Members from our club met at the Hawaii Island Home for Recovery to pressure wash a 500-foot wooden fence which is situated on top of a 10-foot brick wall. The tricky part for our older members was to use the pressure washers while balancing on the wall and ladders during a torrential down-pour during the first phase. We had to wait for dry, sunny days to complete the project but on two beautiful Saturdays everyone grabbed a roller, a brush, or the wand of paint spraving machine. When we finally completed this painting project, the neighbors were thrilled to see that their side of the fence had a fresh new face.

Our homeless project took place during the holiday season where we coordinated with Project Hawaii to wrap presents and decorate the hall for their annual Homeless Keiki Christmas Party. This was a very heartwarming event for everyone involved with over 50 homeless children in attendance.

This year we also sponsored a community craft fair for local, low-budget vendors to have a cost-efficient location to sell their products during the holidays. It was a great way to get vendors together and to help our Interact and new Rotarians share the Rotary spirit and information with the holiday shoppers.

And finally, Rotary's area of focus that we supported was in "Growing Local Economies. What started out as just a Mauka to Makai planting project, ended up being a way to help a single mother, get an ulu farm off the ground and into reality. Kaivao farms will be a sustainable ulu farm, which will also grow hala and wauke. These last two plants will be used for cultural demonstrations on how to weave mats and create simple clothing and wraps that can be used in everyday life. Kaivao farms will be working with local schools and universities to create educational models for research and training for future generations. The farm's 5-year plan is to be self-sustainable and provide learning and working opportunities for the Hilo community.

Our Club Service and Public Relations chairs collected and uploaded our community service projects into Rotary Club Central and Showcase to share our progress on our Mauka to Makai and tree planting efforts.

## **Community Service Narrative for Rotary Club of Honolulu**

This year our Club launched five new projects, raised another \$300,000 towards the cost of building Rotary Centennial Park in Waikiki, planted 126 trees to date, and engaged more members in service by increasing the variety of ways to make a difference. We also did a thorough Weinberg Friends project at the YWCA Fernhurst residence. Highlights follow. Many are listed in Club Central.

## Six New Projects Launched:

**Tree Planting (1):** So far this year we have planted 126 trees: 23 at Palama Settlement, 3 at YWCA Fernhurst, and 100 at Kahauiki village. Our club's funds were also used to purchase 50 naupaka, 50 na'u, and 6 gardenia which were planted at Kahauiki by First Hawaiian Bank volunteers, so if you count those, we're at 232, but we're not counting them. To meet our goal of 160, we plan to plant 34 more trees this spring above Hamakua Marsh. This addresses Rotary's main cause of clean water.

**Limu Removal (2):** This year we adopted a 10 by 10 meter plot in Maunalua Bay, with a goal to remove all alien invasive limu from that plot and then to keep it free from such limu perpetually. We spend one Saturday per quarter out in knee-deep water in the Bay, pulling limu into bags that are then used as compost.

**YWCA Fernhurst (3):** On 9/23/17, our President-Elect Bub Wo organized a multi-pronged effort to spruce up the YWCA Fernhurst Residence for women recently furloughed from prison. Bub worked with the women to plan the project; one was the artist who designed the images that we painted onto new picnic tables for them. We created a garden, repainted exterior walls, planted trees, coached women in job-interview techniques and personal finance, and distributed clothing. In all, 51 volunteers worked on this one-day project, including two volunteers from the E-Club and one from the Metropolitan Honolulu Club. We spent \$3,000 on supplies and earned a \$10,000 Weinberg grant that was provided to another nonprofit.

**Kahauiki Village (4):** Past President Mel Kaneshige is overall project manager of this massive effort to house up to 50% of the entire island's homeless families, and member Kirk Hovious is overall volunteer coordinator. Over the course of multiple weekends, our Club's members painted the homes, planted 100 trees, and furnished two homes with basic household necessities. The Club committed \$6,500 for trees, shrubs, gravel, landscaping supplies, and lunch. This supports the cause of saving mothers and children.

**Partnership with HPU Rotaract to Feed the Homeless (5):** On March 30, we launched a series of four evening dinner-service projects in which eight volunteers (half from HPU Rotaract and half from our Club) provide meals to individuals living in Institute for Human Services shelters. Our volunteers interact with the homeless residents, and our bonds with HPU Rotaract increase. Project cost is \$3,600.

**Momentum Builds for Rotary Centennial Park in Waikiki:** This Rotary year alone, we have raised over \$300,000 towards the \$550,000 cost of building this park on empty City land in Waikiki. The thousands of local residents living within 10 minutes of this square block will soon have a peaceful place to congregate and to learn the history of Rotary in Hawaii over the past century.

# **Community Service Narrative for Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunrise:**

**Youth Outreach House Dinners** - Provided monthly or bi-monthly dinners to YO House in Waikiki. Dinners fed approximately 30 homeless young adults.

**Weinberg Project at RYSE** – The club's Weinberg Project involved painting and general repairs at RYSE in Waimanalo. RYSE is an organization that runs a homeless shelter and provides long-term stay and transitional housing and support services to youth and young adults. Kokua Kalihi Valley will be the recipient of the \$10,000 Weinberg grant.

**Hawaiian Humane Society Blanket Drive** – Blankets and towels were collected at Honolulu Sunrise meetings for a month and then donated to the Hawaiian Humane Society for their use.

**River of Life** – Once a month 4-6 members serve lunch at the River of Life homeless shelter.

**He'eia Estuary Clean Up – Rotary Gives Thanks - Sunrise** members and Roosevelt Interact Club members cleared invasive species and planted trees at the He'eia Estuary in Kaneohe. Volunteers toured the Heeia Fish Pond to learn about its vision to provide sustainable fishing sources to native Hawaiians

**Punahou Bus Stop Painting** – Mayor Caldwell contacted our club to paint an unsightly bus stop located on Punahou Street. A dozen Honolulu Sunrise members painted the bus stop with the paint supplied by the mayor.

**Kahauiki Village** – This homeless project has been a labor of love for Honolulu Sunrise. Over the course of four months, Sunrisers donated their time twice a week to prep, paint, furnish and landscape units at Kahauiki Village for the homeless. Honolulu Sunrise proudly completed four units and was able to provide supplies and furnishings for each.

**1000 Tree Giveaway** – Honolulu Sunrise partners with the Outdoor Circle to distribute 1000 trees to the community.

**Maunalua Bay Cleanup** – Sunrisers, along with 10 volunteers from Mid Pacific Interact Club, assisted Malama Maunalua to help remove invasive algae from Maunalua Bay. The Bay is infested with algae that affects other native and aquatic life.

The goal of our club was to incorporate as many community groups as possible into our projects. We placed our emphasis on homeless issues and youth-oriented projects.

<u>Aloha Medical Mission Dental Clinic at the Palama Settlement</u>. This dental clinic provides free serves to homeless/low income families in the Honolulu Area. The project involved the Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunset, UH Rotaract, Men's Shed (community corps) and several other Rotary Clubs for a total of 56 volunteer hours. The project involved cleaning and painting the clinic followed by fellwoship.

*JABSOM H.O.M.E. van.* Supported free medical service provided to homeless families on Oahu. \$4,450 provided an AED Machine, Vaccines and Advanced Wound Care Supplies which benefit mostly families with children. The H.O.M.E. Van has now become a **required rotation** for all medical students at JABSOM. Medical students get hands on experience while learning to give back to the community.

<u>Women in Need Facility.</u> Collected and provided hygiene supplies and clothing to the Women In Need Facility serving recently incarcerated women and women from abusive households. 50% of the club members and a private company provided the supplies. No cost. (Supports Mother & Child)

<u>Ocean Conservancy International Coastal Cleanup.</u> Provided 18 volunteer hours from Honolulu Sunset, UH Rotaract and the Waikiki Yacht Club members cleaning up trash from the shoreline and waters of the Ala Wai boat harbor. The Yacht Club provided a boat for the water cleanup and refreshments for the workers at the completion. (Rotarians at Work Day)

*Century Bike Ride Aid Station.* Honolulu Sunset and UH Rotaract provided 64 volunteer hours manning an Aide Station during the event.

<u>*Ride So That They Can Walk.*</u> (Polio Plus Project) Financial donations from club & friends + 15 hours. Club members participated and collected money in support of the <u>Polio Plus Project</u>.

**Bell Ringing for Salvation Army.** Member/Owner of Bubbies Ice Cream in Hawaii Kai provided the venue on Dec 9<sup>th</sup> for 5 members to ring bells and sing carols to encourage giving to the Salvation Army Christmas Kettle. We were joined by several family members. 15 volunteer hours.

<u>Kahauiki Village.</u> Participated along with D5000 Rotary Clubs. Sunset Rotary provided household supplies for two village houses. Donations came from Rotary Club members and employees of Prime Care Services Hawaii, Inc. (a private company) 25 volunteer hours.

<u>Holiday Shopping with Families.</u> Provided families with seriously ill children, residing at the H.U.G.G.S. House with holiday shopping. These families are away from home so that their seriously ill child can receive medical treatment. The club provides \$1,600 in D5000 Grant funds to allow 3 families respite from their medical bills and concerns. 27 volunteer hours. (**Rotary Gives Thanks**)

*Waipahu Junior Reserve Officer Training Corps.* This year we supported the JROTC at Waipahu High School. The organization provides **training, discipline and leadership** to high school students. Their request, which we provided, was for \$1,630 of D5000 Grant funds in support of field training and supplies. **They will participate in a joint JROTC color guard at the D5000 conference in May.** 

*Jefferson Elementary educational support* Provided D5000 Matching grant funds for "**Person of Character Banners**" used to encourage study and pride in addition to shelving needed for library facilities. (Literacy in the school room)

# Community Service Narrative for Rotary Club of Metropolitan Honolulu

Marco Polo Project - In July 2017, the worst residential highrise fire in Honolulu's history occurred in the Marco Polo condominium. Three people were killed and 50 families left homeless. Some are still unable to return to their homes because of hazardous substances that have not yet been removed. Metro Rotary joined in with the Rotary Club of Pearl Harbor, Rotary Club of West Honolulu and other Honolulu rotary clubs to put on a 'party' on the rooftop parking deck on 8/17 to raise morale. We provided all food and drinks, bounce houses and games for the children, live entertainment and covered the cost of tables, chairs, tents, etc. The reaction from the residents was heartwarming. They were able to come together in the wake of a tragedy and just have fun.

Keiki Backpack Project - Metro Rotary has long supported this program with volunteers and funding. Twice per year (9/2017 & 3/2018), Metro Rotarians participate at the Hawaii Foodbank facility to pack a month's worth of weekend food packets. At the last Keiki Backpack day, Metro packed bags of food for a week-long school vacation – the first time such a thing has been possible. Metro packed 800 bags of food for Princess Ka'iulani Elementary School low-income students and 450 bags of food for Linapuni Elementary School- a total of 1,250 packages of food.

Pauahi Hale Project – Pauahi Hale is a 4-story low-income building on Pauahi Street, managed by Safe Haven. They use the building to provide persons with serious mental illnesses who have been living on the streets with a secure, non-threating, residential environment. Rotary Club of Honolulu offered support from members, family and friends on a Saturday (9/2017) to paint one of the floors of the building. There were 15 people there to paint the 3rd floor of the building working 5 hours to complete the job. It was a wonderful way to give back to the community.

Friends of the Library Clean Up Project - McKinley H.S. Cafeteria - Since 1947, the FLH Annual Sale has invited Hawaii residents to browse selections of new and used, out-of-print and bestselling books and media. After 70 years, the sale is an island tradition. Metro Rotary has been providing support to this event for years by assisting with the clean up of the event. The Sale of the books prior to clean up supports the State's Public Library system, and the remaining books are sent to under developed countries to help with literacy in underprivileged populations. Metro Rotary was well-represented in 2017 with 15 members, family and friends. The work encompassed, packing books into provided boxes, taping them for loading into the shipping containers, cleanup of the shelving and the supplies necessary to put on the sale, and general clean up of the cafeteria.

Kalihi Elementary Service Project - In an area where many students are considered to be living at poverty level, Metro Rotary had a team of volunteers who went to the school in November 2017 and beautified the campus by stenciling school slogans on the walls, empowering and motivating students in underprivledged population and making the campus a more positive learning environment.

Salvation Army Bell Ringing - A long-standing Metro tradition, we ring bells at 2 locations downtown to collect money for the non-profit organization. This year the Club Member that had been in charge of this project for many years passed away (John Seth), and we included a collection of funds from our club as a tribute to him and his years of service. Combined, Metro collected over \$900.00. This last year, 12/2017, there were 14 participants from the Club, including family members and friends. We look forward to carrying on this tradition for years to come.
