GG1524827. Rotary Eye Hospital in New Delhi. A \$400,000 grant with the RC of Delhi South Metropolitan, the RAG for Blindness Prevention, and the International Agency for Preventable Blindness. One of our members is a board member of the RAG and is involved in promoting the Rotary partnership with the IAPB (and the International Eye Foundation). The project will be presented at the Rotary International Convention in Atlanta.

GG1743935. Teacher Training Yangon, Myanmar. TRF Centennial Project. One of our members serves on the International Partner Committee for the grant and is involved in planning and funding coordination for the grant. Area of Focus is Basic Literacy.

GG1635873. Brighter Futures for the Paiwan Children of Wutan Elementary. TRF Centennial Project. A \$94,000 grant with District 340 and the Rotary Club of Taipei Min-Kuan. We supported the funding for the grant and assisted with funding coordination. Area of Focus: Basic Literacy

GG1642410. Save Life of Newborns and Children. A \$47,000 grant with the RC of Ala Moana, District 3350, and the RC of Pranakorn Sri-Ayuthaya. The grant will provide echocardiogram equipment for a district hospital and training for hospital staff.

GG1744433. Nepal Education Project. An \$88,000 grant with Districts 3292 and the Rotary Club of Panauti and District 3480, the Rotary Club of Taipei. This is a ground-breaking grant in Nepal, with TRF approving a school rehabilitation project as a humanitarian relief project. There are 6 District 3292 Clubs, 9 District 3480 Clubs (from Taipei), and the District 5000 Clubs, Honolulu, Kona Sunrise, Kahului, and Kihei-Wailea. The project falls into the Basic Literacy Area of Focus.

GG1744904. Water Project in India. A \$43,000 water project led by the RC of Honolulu Sunset and RC of Katpady in District 3182. The project will fund a water well, water purification system, and storage tanks and will supply clean water to a coastal district in Southern India. RCs of Hanalei Bay, and West Honolulu are also involved in the grant.

Our Friendship Exchange activities are expanding very quickly thanks to two new members who are developing a Volunteer Training Team Global Grant with the Rotary Club of Dar-es Salaam in Tanzania. Our members are developing a Teach the Teachers program in Tanzania to train pediatric surgeons and hospital staff in advanced surgeries—it utilizes the skills of recently retired surgeons from the US and innovative funding for hospital equipment. Our members are in Tanzania now working on the design of the grant.

We are also heavily involved in establishing a Sister Club relationship between our new Lahaina Sunset Club and the RC of Yamato Mahoroba, also a new Club, whose sponsor is our Sister Club, the RC of Kashihara. We are working on plans now to celebrate the 60th Anniversary of our Sister Club and a visit from the RC of Yamato Maharoba during our District Conference. Both Clubs are in District 2650, our Sister District in the Kyoto metro area in Japan. District 2650 Rotary Friendship Committee leadership has been active in forming Sister Clubs in District 5000 this year. One of our members is also involved with promoting Sister Club participation at our District Conference and planning a reception and other activities for Clubs that attend.

Our Club joined the other Rotary Clubs on Maui in celebrating Polio Day. Our Club carried out a PolioPlus drive at the Kihei Safeway and raised over \$2,000. Club members have also been active in DG Clint's Polio Hero program.

Club members are actively involved in Rotary Action Groups. One of our members is on the Board of the RAG for Blindness Prevention, a member of the RAG for Microfinance and Community Development, and the Hawaii Membership Chair for the RAG for Peace. Our Tanzania team has joined the Health, Education and Welfare RAG

A few months ago, several of us attended a presentation by a seasoned Rotarian who talked about the "twang." According to her, "twang" is the sound made by one's heartstrings when a service project truly resonates with us. Upon hearing this idea, we immediately thought of two Past Presidents who spent the greater part of the year determined to get clean water to a Philippine village which school, which has had no clean water or effective sanitation. A. P. Banez Memorial Elementary School is located in the remote village of Tacloban, in the Philippines, and did not have sanitary toilets for their 800 students. Through hard work and fundraising island-wide, our Past Presidents were able to raise sufficient funds to supply the school with proper toilets and handwashing stations.

However, during this process, PP Rick learned of another situation. Camansihay Elementary, located nearby, had relied on a river bed for water, but it dried up a few years ago. There is a spring upcountry from the school but there is no practical way to access it. A local Rotary club proposed developing a solar powered water pump system that would deliver the water to the school and to the local residents. The solar aspect is a way to keep costs down and to make it a truly sustainable project. Again, we teamed up with this effort, thanks to the aloha that our two Past Presidents hold for these projects and the area.

Once again, they went out of their way to fundraise for this cause. Through donations from our club and from the community at large, enough funds were raised to make this project a reality. In February of this year, they were able to travel to the Philippines to make sure the project was a "go." Of course they didn't go empty handed. Our club supplied them with books and funds to purchase more books and school supplies for the students ... about 150 pounds worth!

This has been a heartwarming endeavor not just for the past presidents, but for the rest of us who have vicariously watched it unfold.

Twang.

Several months ago, some documents were discovered that told the history of a sister club relationship between our Club and the Kamakura Club of Japan. After a flurry of hastily translated communication, we learned that both clubs were very interested in renewing the relationship, even though two generations had gone by. So far, we have hosted four members from Kamakura this past February and we have invited them to attend our District 5000 Conference in May. Six members have made their reservations and four more are in the process. They will be attending the reception for Sister Clubs as well as all other Convention events. Our two clubs now enjoy a genial, ongoing communication.

Future plans include sharing information on community service projects and perhaps sending a delegation to the Kamakura Club by 2019.
