Habilitat Vocational Visit -

We were invited to Habilitat by one of our new member Chad Stephans to tour his workplace and after meet with the residents. Habilitat is a recovery drug treatment center that houses over 100 residents. We held our regular meeting at their facility and included all the residents as our guests. We had former district governor, Del Green open with "What is Rotary" and ran the rest of the meeting on an open discussion on how RC of Honolulu Pau Hana could help service the residents vocationally when transitioning back into the community.

HPH Members sat amongst the residents and throughout the meeting stood up individually after listening to the wants and needs of the approx. 50 attendees and offered their services to the group. Help in support such as resume building, computer training, hula lessons, school applications, and recommendations for organizations that work with criminal records.

After the meeting was adjourned, we continued an informal fellowship with the residents.

We found out that Habilitat's success rate is over 67% or almost 2 out of 3 never use drugs again after completing their 2 ½ year program.

We are now working with Habilitat together with Keiki O' Ka Aina, a non-profit Family Learning Center on a mentorship program.

All that was shared held a common thread of truth and respect. And the underlying sense felt by both Habilitat residents and Rotarians was hope and excitement - for this newly established commitment far exceeds our 4-way test.

Conducted a networking activity –

Lance passed out sheets with everyone's name while Tiffany passed out yellow and orange cards. Those with Orange cards were to stay in their seats. Those with Yellow cards had to move. We were given 15 minutes to tell each other about our Vocation. We did well with the results. It was fun and it was suggested that this be done more often.

Vocational Speaker, Heather Patterson -

Heather is founder of Happier Talent Development and CHO – Chief Happiness Officer. Heather's mission is to help both businesses and individuals transform the status quo to a state of optimum happiness on all levels. In a nutshell, good relationships equal goals achieved. And everyone as well as every business wants to achieve as well as improve their goals.

Much of what Heather spoke about our members agreed to, which might have made it a challenge for her. It's hard not to be happy when you live and work in the place where most of us were born and raised, Hawaii. However, even so, not everyone is happy where they work. Often, the choice is not personally satisfying, it's a matter of finances, supporting a family that often times are multi-generational. And keeping up with those ever-soaring private school tuitions is yet another cause for anxiety and feeling stuck in a workplace cycle that can get depressing.

Heather helps individuals and businesses look at what they are doing and revamping not just what but how they are doing what they do to achieve optimum happiness on all levels.

We, the members of Honolulu Rotary Pau Hana are all very happy people, we are happy at our jobs which are of our choosing, happy that we are in service to our community and as Sean Hoban pointed out, it is the 5th unofficial rule of our 4-way Test...**Is It FUN!** The answer is yes, because we do have Fun!

Vocational Service:

Hosted two male Thai college students who were in Hawaii 4 June thru 5 July 2016. The two students were hosted together in Hawaii. The hosting period started with PP Kate Braden and was completed during the current President's time in office. The students came here under the auspices of Rotary International's New Generations Exchange (NGE) program. The main purpose of the NGE program, "...is to foster goodwill and understanding through better cultural education and exposure." The second purpose is to provide the students with a vision for their future vocations. Student Maicharoen (Gun) Passavit has taken accounting classes, and student Sajai (Oh) Raksit studied human resource management in Thailand. RC Doiprabaht in D. 3360 in Thailand sponsored the students. Sixteen Rotarians from five separate clubs along with six non-Rotarians provided enjoyable activities and numerous vocational/learning experiences for the young participants. The Thai students visited and shadowed professional and experienced

people in diverse businesses and educational institutions including: the MidWeek editorial office, education offices at Marine Corps Base Hawaii and Pearl Harbor, Ilima Hotel, Windward Community College, Hagadone Printing, an accounting office, Iolani School and more. Various hosts also brought the students sightseeing to many beautiful and interesting areas on Oahu, where they enjoyed snorkeling, canoeing, hiking, motor boating, concerts, the Fourth of July parade in Kailua and much more.

The 4-Way Test

Annually we have the Dr. Charles Nishioka 4-Way Test Essay Contest offered to Waipahu High Schools students and last year 40 Early College students participated. This is an excerpt from one of last year's winner:

A young girl struggles with making poor decisions, due to poor thinking process. She asks herself, "How do I know what I'm doing is the right thing?" Zavani

So what if the young girl, who doesn't know what decision is right applies the 4-way test as a guide to making her decisions. She will most likely make good decisions and impact the people around her! She is sure to set a positive example for others, help others in need and benefit the world by making it a better place. The 4-Way Test is a great way to live life in a world full of choices. I am one girl who will put this rest to use.

The Dr. Charles Nishioka 4-Way Test Contest this year will be conducted in May.

The 4 Way Test is promoted at all meetings. At the end of the meeting, the 4 way test is recited prior to adjourning the meeting.

Another way the 4-Way Test is promoted is through the distribution of dictionaries to all the third graders in the Waipahu Complex, (6) schools and approximately 840 dictionaries were distributed to 3rd graders and teachers). The 4-Way Test is recited by the students and teachers and members share how they use the 4-Way Test in their everyday living.

<u>Vocational Talks by Members:</u> Members were given the opportunity to share their vocation at the club meetings. This increased our awareness and we earned more about our fellow Rotarians' business culture and background. The talks centered around how they chose their vocation and what they do. At the end of the talk, members find that there was so much they did not know about their fellow Rotarian and find these talks to be invaluable.

Vocational Tours-This year the club did more vocational tours than in the past and member participation ranged from 40-80%. This gave fellow Rotarians an opportunity to showcase their workplace and increase business networking. The fun part of the tour was also the fellowship that followed the vocational visits, which members enjoyed. Businesses visited: Island Pacific Academy (K-12 private, independent, college-preparatory school operating in Kapolei), Waipahu Aloha Clubhouse (local community center that offers people who have mental illness hope and opportunities to achieve their full potential), Marauder Café (culinary program at Waipahu High School), Pacific Tsunami Warning Center @ Ford Island, and Kaneohe Marine Air Stationhelicopter squadron.

One of the most rewarding and invigorating club programs promoting the 4-Way Test is the RCWW's Third Grade Dictionary Project. This year, our club ordered, and is in the process of delivering, more than 1,030 dictionaries to all elementary schools in the Wahiawa-Waialua (North Shore) *kuleana* (area). Promoting the 4-Way Test to these eight- and nine-year old children is one of the best ways to teach about and promote responsible and contributory citizenship.

There were three vocational classification talks presented by club members to-date. Dr. Carver Wilcox talked about his early life growing up during the heat of America's civil rights strife, entering the military and subsequently nurturing and succeeding his career as a Dermatologist hat brought him to Hawaii. Alex Kanamu shared about Highway Response, his 24/7 Wahiawa-based towing company, and how his business helps people, but also aids in community development (beautification and clean-up). Nathan Arnold took us on a virtual tour of his native Australia, growing up and learning in native (Aboriginal) schools and communities in a rich and raw environmental setting that influenced his passion for helping keep the planet clean and green through applying alternative energy options and promoting peace that way.

Our Rotary Recreational Fellowship activities include marching together with RC Mililani Sunrise members in the Annual Lion's Club Veterans' Day Parade; serving as Santa's helpers when preparing for and delivering our annual Al Wonder Christmas Luncheon for the Wahiawa ARC; preparing dictionaries for delivery with a member from a California club; and working together in fun and fellowship while executing the 2017 Wilkinson-Wakai Golf Tournament Scholarship Fundraiser.

We initiated a youth Summer Intern Scholarship program (meets youth mentoring as well), pairing a local Aquacuture business (Bullit Hatchery) with a Leilehua High School junior who would have otherwise worked at McDonald's restaurant to earn extra money to augment his family's household income—but instead, gained valuable hands-on, applied science and entrepreneurial business training in addition to a scholarship award for his service learning participation.

On January 6, 2017, our club honored the dining room manager (Sugar) and two servers of DOTS Restaurant (Chita and Imelda) for their exceptional service and accommodation consistently extended to us. We also recognized Joe Acosta, Wahiawa community member, former HPD officer and founder of ALEA Bridge, a homeless resource and support services nonprofit. He and his team go the distance in getting to know the homeless citizens of Wahiawa, sometimes including Mililani and out to the North Shore.

On March 31at, our general meeting provided a networking opportunity for members and guests with featured speaker Rick Price, founder of Fast Lube—especially the flagship store he established in "beautiful downtown Wahiawa." His educational presentation about Rotary's history and work contributing to meeting the goal of providing service above self was a natural venue that encouraged conversations with members and guests extending well beyond the 60 minutes of our gathering.

This is a concise version of our RCWW's vocational service activities and achievement this year.

VOCATIONAL TALKS: After induction into our club, all new members are asked to present a 5-7 minute Vocational Talk during a meeting. To date four new members have presented their talks: 8/2/16, 11/15/16, 1/3/17, 3/21/17. Two new members will be scheduled for Vocational Talks starting with April meetings.

VOCATIONAL SERVICE AWARDS: In Spring 2017 our club will be recognizing 2 recipients for our Vocational Service Awards. The awards will be selected by the Board of Directors and presented to: A business or individual who provides outstanding service to our community and/or our club; and a non-profit or local organization who provides outstanding service to our community and/or our club.

RECOGNIZED COMMUNITY MEMBER FOR OUTSTANDING ACHIEVEMENTS: Multiple Grammy Award winner George Kahumoku, Jr. was recognized as a Maui Peace Hero for sharing his time, talent, and energy and Hawaiian music and values not only in Hawaii but worldwide during many international concert tours. "Uncle George" is also an author of two books and runs a farm in West Maui where he shares this produce freely with people in need. "Uncle George" also provided entertainment free of charge aboard the Trilogy Sailing Vessel for our club's Sunset/Full Moon Fundraising Cruise in November 2016. As a result, our club invited him to speak and will be surprising him by making him an Honorary Member of our club at our meeting on May 6, 2017. Uncle George will also be providing entertainment free of charge at the reception on Friday evening at the District Conference being held at The Sheraton Ka'anapali Maui in May.

CONDUCTED NETWORKING ACTIVITIES: On the 4th Tuesday of each month (July 26, August 23, September 27, October 25, December 20, January 24, February 28 and more to be scheduled the remained of this year) our club invites members and friends to a Club Social. These socials are advertised in the *Lahaina News* and many "potential members" have attended. These socials have drawn between 12-40 people in attendance. As a result of many of these socials we have inducted six new members into our club.

LITERACY PROJECT RELATED TO VOCATIONAL SERVICE AND UTILIZING THE VOCATIONAL SKILLS OF OUR MEMBERS: Two of our members are the Directors of the Read Aloud America Program. A RAA (RAP) program is being held four times this Spring in the early evening at a local elementary school in our community. Read Aloud America believes that parents have to be part of the literacy picture. RAP includes the whole family, from toddlers to grandparents, and embraces all adults who influence the lives of children: *tutus*, grandfathers, aunties, uncles, cousins, guardians and caretakers. It is not a one-shot event but a series of four high-energy, motivational sessions that take place during the course of one school semester. The RAP program sends families home with a booklet with enjoyable "RAP-oriented" activities into the home, so RAP's momentum can continue after the program ends. One of our members is the Program Director and serves as the "Toastmaster" of the program. The other member is the Operations and Grants Director. Many of our members serve as Volunteer Readers that read aloud to children in classrooms while the adults are listening to the Toastmaster share parenting tips for promoting literacy in their respective homes AND they are read aloud to!

OTHER: One of our members is very connected with Christian and Marilyn Jorgensen, the owners of CJ's Deli in our community. As a result of this friendship and our club networking with CJs Deli this local business has provided the catering needs to all Maui Island Rotary Events from Interact Workshops, to Camp RYLA, to the food needs for PRLS, the Zone Membership Workshop and the District Assembly. These catering services are offered at greatly reduced rates to Rotary. Due to their connection with our club the Jorgensens are now serving as the Host Family of our Inbound Rotary Youth Exchange student from Germany. They are not members of Rotary (at this time) – but we are working on it!!

Vocational Service:

We have instilled in our youth and members the 4-Way Test as it relates to life in the community and the workplace. We provide posters, and teach the values to our Interact and Earlyact partners. We have had each new member give a short synopsis of their vocation and career at separate meetings, dedicating time for them to share their job requirements, training, schooling and experiences. In November, we devoted a meeting to a Campbell High School teacher who was recognized as a top educator in Hawaii. He spoke of the teaching profession in the 21st century and how his technical skills and teaching methods have had to evolve with the times and with growing issue of computers, the internet and social media.

We have provided Vocational Fellowships throughout the year to Interact/Earlyact Students and Advisors at their club meetings to touch base and to assist in any way possible. Our Club Trainer has been instrumental in following up in those fellowship meetings for topics concerning Rotary, Membership and Youth, thus positively impacting the students at four area high schools and a middle school.

We have had two vocational tours of the Queen's Medical Center West Oahu. Their facility is expanding and doctors are starting to work additional specialties to support the population on the West Side. While volunteering at a job fair in June at UH West Oahu, we met the general manager of Hampton Inn and Suites and will be taking a tour of their facility on March 30. Our community is so welcoming to our club, and as each new business nears completion in our area, we have leaders representing these businesses speak at our club. When a major issue involving large businesses impacts our community, we provide a forum to inform Rotarians and the larger community. As an example, we had bot the leadership of Hawaiian Electric Company and NextEra present their views of how they would grow to provide superior service, prior to the decision by the PUC to reject the NextEra bid to acquire and merge with Hawaiian Electric Company.

We have been actively involved for three years in the Hawaii Literacy Adult Reading Program, and have an ongoing Read-To-Me program at Ho'okele Elementary School with 1st graders, assisting the educators at this school.

In April, we will award two vocational scholarships in nursing and healthcare to graduate students in college this year. The recipients are selected and the award is imminent.

Finally, the Executive Director of the Kapolei Chamber of Commerce is a club member, so we stay well-informed and involved in the business community.
