ROTARY CLUB OF DOWNTOWN HONOLULU YOUTH SERVICE AWARD

As a small club of 22 members, the Rotary Club of Downtown Honolulu focuses on improving the lives of youth in downtown Honolulu. We strengthened our relationship with Central Middle School this year. Currently we have 11 club projects directly benefitting youth. All speakers who come to our club sign a book that we donate to the Central Middle School library.

Our year started in July with a School Supply Drive partnering with Wal Mart Keaumoku. Members solicited donations for supplies for the students at CMS. This year we collected and donated a truckload of paper, pencils, backpacks, highlighters and other supplies along with a donation of nearly \$1500 of cash that was applied toward the new CMS Aquaponics Enclosure.

We chartered the Central Middle School Interact in August and then took the kids to the WIELD leadership training at Kapolei HS that Fall. The CMS Interact club toured the Kalaeloa Heritage Site with Interact members from around the island and with RCDH members.

The CMS Interact helped RCDH with the Fall Campus Beautification in November this year. This project included cleaning out and reorganizing the CMS Library, eliminating unneeded shelves and creating a school pride section/Hawaiian studies area that highlights the school's historic royal legacy. RCDH reframed with museum glass and matting multiple photos of the old graduating classes, the school building, and portraits of the school's matriarch Princess Ruth Keelikolani. The photos are now hung and are a source of pride for the faculty and students. RCDH members worked on the school Learning Garden and partnered with Lowes to donate over \$1000 worth of supplies.

In December, the Central Middle School Orchestra ensemble was hosted at our club where they played holiday music, the children were given breakfast and witnessed a fun Rotary meeting.

In January, RCDH continued our project of delivering dictionaries to multiple classes of third grade students, for a total of 10 public and private schools across Honolulu.

In February, RCDH members participated as judges for the Hawaii State DECA conference at the Hawaii Convention Center.

In March, RCDH members also conducted a Financial Literacy Class at Kaimuki High School sponsored by the Friends of the Library of Hawaii.

Also in March RCDH held its third annual Central Middle School Four Way Test Essay Contest with finalists reading their essays at a morning meeting with their parents and teachers hosted at the Pacific Club. The contest is all voluntary and works with the CMS teachers to provide the children both argument writing and public speaking experience. Students apply the Four Way Test to controversial topics that interest them. Also in March, two RCDH members served as judges for the CMS all school Pep Rally.

April is our second CMS Campus Beautification for Rotarians at Work. This year we will be power washing, cleaning and painting the bathrooms. We will be also working in the Aquaponics Enclosure and Learning Garden. In May we will tour the iHeart Media Radio Station with the CMS Interact and other student leaders.

Youth Service 2016-2017 Rotary Club of West Pearl Harbor

Interact Club: Waipahu High School has a very active club (35-40 members) and are eager to participate in RYLA, WIELD, and any other Rotary activity. Annually we have a Christmas Party at the Waipahu Elderly Hall and this year was no different than previous years in that the students take the lead and plan the entire event-menu, program, games, prizes). The only job for the Rotarians is to cook the main dish which is usually stew or chili and give guidance when needed. It a fun evening for the seniors and it's a time for them to meet and get to know other seniors that live in the housing and also interact with the young, energetic, vibrant students and Rotarians.

WIELD (Westside Interact Earlyact Leadership Day): The purpose of WIELD is to introduce attendees (especially those new to Interact and Earlyact) to Rotary and club service. It provides an affordable opportunity for individual club officers to hone their leadership skills by taking charge of an "Ohana" and mentoring their members through leadership exercises and managing them in a community service project. West Pearl Harbor, Kapolei, Kapolei Sunset and Waianae clubs sponsored this leadership day attended by 150 students from West Oahu schools.

<u>Club Scholarship Program</u>: Annually the club awards 6-8 scholarships to Waipahu High school graduating seniors. Last year the club awarded 7 scholarships amounting to \$5,250. This year the club expects to award \$6,000 in scholarship.

HRYF: The club received four applications and interviewed the students on Feb 7th and based on the qualifications and their scholastic achievements we selected April-Joy Laxamano whose has chosen the field of nursing.

4-Way Test Essay Contest: Annually the club has the Dr. Charles Nishioka 4-Way Test Essay Contest offered to Waipahu High Schools students and last year 40 Early College students participated and excerpts from one of the winners can be read in the Vocational narrative. This year's contest will be held in May.

Literacy Project Related to Youth Service: The dictionary project is also a literacy project as the dictionaries are not only distributed but we go over with the students on how to read the table of contents, find the page number of a particular subject in the table of contents and go to that page and have the student read aloud to the group the first sentence on the page. We give them words to look-up which helps them with their spelling. We also have them read the 4-way test label on the front cover of the dictionary.

VALLEY ISLE SUNSET YOUTH SERVICE NARRATIVE

Our club focus is Ohana, and anything to do with healthy keiki, healthy families and healthy communities.

The way RYLA is implemented on Maui fits the vision of our club. We (the three adult mentors) have worked hard to evolve our RYLA from Adult led to Youth Led. The Teens supervise the buses, activities, workshops, ropes course, cabins and service projects. This has allowed us to go from spending the first day trying to create connections to simply watching them pile off the buses already connected, already excited and already moving beyond their normal school 'cliques'.

One piece of RYLA that our club is directly responsible for is what we call the "Sparks" section. This activity has evolved over the years via direct input from the teens, annual evaluation and feedback and of course, implementation. It's a powerful time designed to allow the teens to delve deep into not only who they are, but what they do. Their spark is their internal passion for something. Once identified, they then work on creating teams, resources, projects. Any experiences that create connection and relationships that result in growing their spark counts. This year we added another layer of networking the teens with Rotary members who are experts in the area of their 'spark'.

We have been both honored and humbled to see the incredible RYLA students take leaps of faith and learn to fly with their spark power. It's a special connection that continues beyond RYLA and we know will help our teens become future Rotarians.

The other RYLA piece is the service project in the loi. Charles Serapina is not only kupuna, but one of our newer members. Watching him tie culture and Rotary together during this project is a special way to give back to our RYLA students and the Keanae community.

We were fortunate to be able to team up with Camp Keanae last summer and help implement a Day Camp for the local Hana community. It was a first time collaboration for the event team, but the success made it something we will continue to replicate on an annual basis. Serving an average of 45 students a day, many of whom had never been to Keanae or a daycamp, we created good connections with local families and children. We are looking at creating paid positions in future day camps for RYLA graduates.

We are thrilled that our HYRF candidate is the recipient of the \$10000 Scholarship. Our club has committed to not only continuing to being mentors and support for him, but also to going the extra mile and connecting him with opportunities such as space camp, State Space Initiatives and paid aeronautical internships.

Our other favorite project was the Dr. Suess read aloud. Lahaina Sunset helped us with Pomakai, and we also read to the classes at Haiku elementary. Dr. Suess is always fun, but this years event was extra special for one of our members — who found her favorite grade school teacher in the Haiku Kindergarten room! The teacher hadn't seen her student for over 40 years, but instantly remembered her and started talking story. The connection resulted in reading to another classroom.

Youth Service

Our Club's sponsored Interact Club is located at Mililani High School. It is one of the largest Interact Clubs in the state, with over 100 active members. Two students attended this year's RYLA, and presented what they learned to our Club. Our club consistently participates in the yearly HRYF Scholarship, using that as an opportunity to interview for our additional Club Scholarships currently totaling over \$12,000 in scholarships each year. Our Club currently awards four \$2,000 academic scholarships, two \$1,000 community college scholarships, one \$1,000 voc-tech scholarship, two \$1,000 athletic scholarships (one female, one male), and one \$1,000 Interact scholarship. We have participated in the Mililani High School Carnival (over three days), which served as a fund raiser for the Interact and our Rotary Club. We regularly have at least one Rotarian at each club meeting, and have worked with the Interact Club on the Salvation Army Bell Ringing this past Christmas Season. A few of our members and a Friend of the Club helped conduct speaker presentations on Career fields at the Mililani Middle School Career Days, and others helped with the coordination efforts, such as passing out lunches and passing out and collecting evaluations. RCMS annually participates in the Dictionary Distribution for 3rd graders in the local elementary schools. The Club also conducted a school supply drive for local elementary schools, and participated in Kipapa's Elementary School's School Supply Distribution night. Club members also helped supervise MHS Interactors at Mililani Uka Elementary's Family Fair night, the Mililani High School Race for the Cure Cancer Walk. Club members also participated with the Interact Club for the Mililani High School Beautification Day. RCMS also provided adult supervision for the Interactors at the YMCA Trunk n' Treat activity. The Club also presents one boy and one girl from each local elementary school (graduating 5th or 6th grader) with a "Service Above Self" award each year, recognizing two students for reflecting the principles of Rotary and the Four Way Test.

LAHAINA SUNSET

EARLY ACT/ELEMENTARY STUDENT COUNCIL SPONSOR: A member of our club serves as the co-advisor to Kihei Elementary School Student Council. Our club sponsored the Student Council in holding a month-long "Pennies for Polio" Contest at this school of 800 kindergarten-5th grade students. The 38 Student Council members were introduced to the End Polio Now campaign by our member. As a result the Student Council members made 60 posters for all classrooms and provided collection jars for each classroom. Collection jars were gathered at the end of October and a total of \$1460.00 was the result of this school-wide effort. Our club provided the winning class in each grade level with a "healthy snack" party during their morning recess. These elementary school students also help at Rotary-sponsored Food Drives for the Maui Food Bank for another Rotary Club on Maui. Our member arranges for the students to assist with the two Food Drives.

INTERACT CLUB/PARTICIPATION: Our club assists two other clubs in our community with the large Interact Club at Lahainaluna HS. Our club contacts the Interact Club advisors and student officers and their members have volunteered to assist with a number of our community service projects such as two Food Drives for the Maui Food Bank, helped with the "Walk Safe" project, and setting up for our Signature Go for the Green Fundraiser.

MAUI CAMP RYLA/ETHICS/D5000 YOUTH SERVICE CHAIR: Three of our club members serve as the co-Directors of the Maui Camp RYLA program – Curriculum, Operations, and Funding. 6 additional members also assisted with Maui Camp RYLA operations and needs – making 1/3 of our membership actively participating in the program. Maui Camp RYLA is a very successful program that served 50 new campers and 24 Student Facilitators in February. Our club paid for 9 of these 74 students to attend the camp. Part of the RYLA Curriculum written by our club member is an Ethics/Decision Making module using the 4-Way Test. Student Facilitators are responsible for recruiting the campers each year, making this a self-perpetuating program. These Student Facilitators made Camp RYLA presentations at all 10 Maui Rotary Clubs during Spring Break. Student Facilitators also sign up to serve at additional Rotary-sponsored programs throughout the year such as Food Drives, hosts at the District Assembly and other projects in our community. One of our club members is in her third year as the D5000 Youth Service chair.

TWO SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS: Our club selected the recipient of the \$5000 HRYF Scholarship who is a senior at Molokai High School who has participated in Camp RYLA for three years. Our club flew her from Molokai to Maui for the HRYFP Interview. Our club members collected \$810 to support continued HRYF funding. Our club is also in the second year of the "Go for the Green" scholarship that our club funds. This \$2500 scholarship is for a graduating senior in West Maui or Molokai who must be pursuing a field of study that will benefit the environment.

INBOUND YOUTH EXCHANGE STUDENT: Our club serves as the co-sponsor with another West Maui Club for YE Student Moritz Leiendecker from Germany. We provide \$100 per month for his expenses.

the *Dr. Seuss* "5 Million Word Challenge" to almost 400 first graders at 3 Maui Schools and 4 Schools on the island of Molokai. 18-1st grade classes were read aloud to and each class received 2 Dr. Seuss books for their class library and each student received a 16-page Dr. Seuss activity booklet. Many of our members also serve as Volunteer Readers for *Read Aloud America* evening family literacy program held four times at an elementary school in our community. Our members also presented *Dictionaries* to 155-3rd grade students at 6 elementary schools in West Maui and Molokai. Teachers were provided with a follow-up lesson plan to use with the Dictionaries.

OTHER YOUTH PROJECTS: \$250 contribution to the After School Tutoring program at 2 West Maui elementary schools; School Supplies Drive for West Maui Schools and \$450 in collected funds were given to Hana Elementary School to purchase school supplies for students in need.

The club co-sponsored an inbound exchange student with the Kona Club. Unfortunately the student had some issues and actually went home to France after Christmas.

Club members visited four schools and conducted vision screening with all the grade 3 students plus other students upon request of a teacher. Each grade 3 student was also given a dictionary. Approximately 250 students were screened and given dictionaries. 10-15% of students were found to need further testing. Notes were sent to parents advising of the need.

The club was delighted to participate in the Dr. Seuss 5 Million Words Campaign. 3 new members and one seasoned member read to eleven classrooms over a 2 day period. They all wore Dr. Seuss hats and told the students of the things our Rotary Club had done for their school. The books read were left in the classrooms. There were approximately 20 students in each class.

Our District Grant was used to provide much needed computers and desks for the new Kona Literacy Center. We heard of the need at last year's District Assembly. One of our club members, an IT expert, installed the computers and provided training to the staff. The center provides services to parents so they can learn to read and learn computer skills so that they can help their children with class assignments.

At Christmas we partnered with Family Support Services to provide Christmas gifts for 12 children. Members shopped for gifts, wrapped them and delivered them through Family Support Services.

In January 4 members attended a parent and student scholarship/financial aid information night at our local high school. We answered questions and gave out applications for the HRYF scholarship and for club scholarships.

We supported the HRYF scholarship program and have interviewed and selected our student. We will interview for club scholarships in April and attend awards night/nights in May to present the scholarships

The club provided \$ 1000.00 to SKEA, a non profit that provides art, music and drama programs for keiki. The money was used to provides scholarships for underprivileged keiki to attend programs.

ROTARY CLUB OF KAPOLEI

Youth Service:

Our Earlyact and Interact partners have joined with us for an abundance of services including Mini RYLA, and the U.S. Vets Thanksgiving Outreach. We conducted mock interviews in the first semester for Hawaii Youth Challenge in Kalaeloa (for at-risk youth) and in the second semester with Kapolei High School and Hawaii Youth Challenge.

For our U.S. Vets Thanksgiving Outreach project, Earlyact supplied thank you cards to all the veterans and donated toiletries they could use. The Interact clubs helped with decorations, donations, food service and clean up. Earlyact and Interact from various schools supplied Christmas cards to service members in Afghanistan this year. Our club paid for five students to attend RYLA this year.

Our Interacts also helped this year with our inaugural Fundraiser. They helped with Food Service, Floor Duties, Front of the House and Trash Pick Up. We solicited help from Kapolei High School culinary students to cook our hotdogs and to sell baked goods, and had had community vendors selling their wares. This family oriented event was a great success, and scholarships for our students will be a major benefit for the event.

In our Mini RYLA, termed Westside Interact and Earlyact Leadership Development (WIELD), students formed teams and worked together to achieve teamwork, leadership, ethics, and a course on how to handle bullying. Camaraderie with the Interact and Earlyact students showed a sense of bonding very early in their training. We also visited the Kalaeloa Heritage Park and learned the history and value of the first Hawaiian culture in our area 1400 years ago. Our partnership with the Waianae Rotary Club, West Pearl Harbor Rotary Club and Rotary Club of Kapolei Sunset during WIELD provided a role model on cooperation for our student participants. They learned much about personal courage, leadership, motivation, teamwork and community service.

With our youth partners, we conducted a total of eighteen service activities which included campus beautification, a collection for the Humane Society, MS Walk, Westside Interact Earlyact Leadership Day (WIELD), Malama Learning Center Beach Cleanup, Homecoming Game Clean-up and Carnival/Fundraiser.

Our annual scholarship reception will be held in April and the scholarship committee interviewed recipients and will award seven scholarships this year. Their field of study ranged from Pre-Med, Pharmacy, marketing, culinary arts, engineering and communications/media. One very touching story is that one of the recipients brought his dictionary from 3rd grade all tattered and torn to the interview and showed it to the committee, and he said I kept this book because it was so helpful to me. Our club had donated that dictionary, which inspired him to study diligently.

It is a measure of our dedication to youth services that we meet in a high school, support Interact and Earlyact at several area schools, and focus upon scholarships. We devised the mini-RYLA program and curriculum to bring leadership values of numbers of students who could not attend the limited slots in the District 5000 RYLA. Our mini-RYLA, conducted over two days in partnership with our three West Side Rotary neighbors, trains over 100 student leaders each year. It is significant that we lobbied successfully to move the District Interact Workshop to Kapolei, on the Ewa Plain, where the most rapidly growing youth population lives, and we continue to be staunch supporters of all the Rotary youth initiatives.

Youth Services

Rotary club of Kapolei Sunset (RCKS) sponsors two Interact Clubs: Campbell High School (CHS) in Ewa Beach and Island Pacific Academy (IPA) in Kapolei. The IPA club has been in existence for several years; the CHS club was re-chartered under RCKS leadership two years ago.

Island Pacific Academy:

IPA does regular service on campus (general campus clean-up to assisting with special events). They participated in the Honolulu Walk to Raise Cancer Research Funds in the fall 2016 and organized Thanksgiving treat baskets given to local police, fire station and library staff. At Christmas, they joined with the Rotary Club of another IPA staff member to collect slippers for Waipahu needy through campus appeal with a total of about 90 pairs collected. In conjunction with campus Global Issues Month in Feb/March 2017 they organized a monetary collection for UNICEF to benefit Syrian refugee children. RCKS is sponsoring the prizes for class groups raising the most funds for UNICEF.

Campbell High School:

Rice Rally: CHS participated in the District 5000 Rice Rally by collecting rice and other food. CHS Interact delivered their contributions to a local Hawaii Food Bank distribution point and will continue food pantry support with two more deliveries planned in March and May 2017. RCKS members contributed food and supported a contest for collecting the most food items.

Mini RYLA and RYLA participation: Three CHS members (and 1 RCKS member) participated in the Fall one-day workshop and service day organized by the Rotary Kapolei Club and the Waianae Rotary Club. Two CHS members participated (funded by RCKS) in the Oahu RYLA in November 2016.

Rotary Youth Scholarship Participation: RCKS contributed to the scholarship fund, and solicited applications for 2017 scholarship consideration, interviewed applicants and forwarded a nominee to District interviews where she placed second. A member of RCKS participated in the District interviews as well.

Both Clubs with RCKS: Two best Service Project Details

1.RCKS has committed to helping Camp Palehua with their invasive plant and native vegetation restoration project on Makakilo mountain above Kapolei. Twice this Rotary Year, Interact members have joined RCKS members on work days. There are two more such events scheduled this year.

2.Like last year (April 2016), members of both clubs will again participate in a service project on Rotary At Work Day in April 2017 aboard the USS Missouri. Work details are assigned by the USS Missouri volunteer coordinator. Last year, rubbish was removed and large boxes with unneeded items below deck had to be removed. Afterwards, the areas had to be swept and cleaned to prepare for renovation. Other Interactors were assigned to yard work upgrading the landscaped areas with mulch at the entrance to the memorial grounds.

Early Act Club -

One of our main goals this year was to increase the membership in our Early Act Club at Niu Valley Middle School. We have over 24 students enrolled in the club. We had a table at the school the day of registration where we had interested students sign up that day. The parents were bringing their children so it was very effective in having the parents urge the students to join the club. In addition, we presented the whole Early Act Club concept to their Parent Teacher Organization – "Friends of Niu Valley". They were also very happy to help us get started. The club just finished their main project for this year which was a Campus Beautification Project. In addition, we had Early Act Students join us at the multi club event in Kaneohe at the Waikalua Loko 'Ia Fishpond Clean up. There were 8 students who joined our club at this event. We have the officers hold the meetings once a month, with an agenda, pledge of allegiance, committees, etc. They are very excited about their projects. The next item they are doing is to assist us in our Spam Drive by putting up posters around campus and collecting Spam for our River of Life Mission donation. Youth Mentoring - Career Day

Four Rotarians from our club participated in the Niu Valley Middle School Career Day. They spent the morning doing an active presentation for the students describing what their particular vocation was and how it could apply to their life. -14% participation

Student Dictionary Project - Youth Literacy

Four schools were given dictionaries this year – Palolo Elementary, Aliiolani Elementary, Liholiho elementary and Aina Haina Elementary. 90% of our club members participated with this project in various ways. We used fellowship time during our meeting to affix the 4 way test labels to all of the books. We had 50% of our members doing the actual presentations.

We have a very active Interact club of 53 members.

Events with Rotary and Interact:

We start our year with an Interact induction where we provide dinner/social for the students and their parents. We call each student up and give them a certificate and a Rotary pin. We also introduce our club members. Our AG, Sandy Matsui conducted the Induction.

The Interact club helped make our community fundraiser the 'Ducky Dash' a success. We had almost every Interact student attend this event. They helped by creating games with prizes, played music, dressed up in costumes and helped set up and clean up the event. We worked very closely with them through the planning of this project.

Rotary Gives Thanks: the Interact students helped with serving food to the elders at Lunalilo Home, as well as entertainment for the Kapuna's.

Scholarships: We were able to give out three different types of scholarships this year. Of the 30 scholarships we've handed out, to WCC, only one person hasn't finished their degree. Of this group, over 50% completed a BA and a few have gone onto graduate school.

We have helped provide both internship and leadership opportunities for the students with Livable Hawaii Kai. We have also had vocational people talk about their professions with the students.

We participated in the Dr Seuss read-a-thon by reading to three classes at Hahaione school, and as well we have a dictionary game day set up with Hahaione A+ students. With our Rotary Saves Lives we have activities for elementary students and sent home flyers inviting families to attend. It is our hope in May to do a Ducky Dash Beauty contest with Kamiloiki elementary and the Interact students. We will use these decorated Ducks as a fundraising tool at our Ducky Dash and give a donation to the classroom teacher who gets the most votes for their Beauty Duck
