The Rotary Club of Kapolei Sunset (RCKS) Community Service projects narrative:

“Gifts That Open Opportunities” – Our club obtained a list of needs from the Women In Need (WIN) shelter, Ho’omaulu Children’s shelter, and US Vets staff. Club members shopped for, assembled, and delivered goods to staff at each facility to include toiletry kits, sheet sets, new underwear, pajamas, laundry baskets, socks, craft items, single player games, and playground equipment. During the holidays, Club members shopped for, assembled and delivered holiday gift bags to the Women In Need shelter which included holiday mugs with hot cocoa packets, nail polish and files, lotions, hair accessories and much more. Club members shopped for, assembled and delivered gifts for US Vets to include backpacks, men’s and women’s wallets and ear buds. Club members shopped for and donated items to furnish a toy area at the WIN home with large play items to include a kitchen, work shop, and craft easel. Small toys and craft items were also provided and set up. Children immediately started playing in the newly furnished children’s area!

“Cupcakes for a Cause” – Our Club’s first “Cupcakes for a Cause” event was to raise awareness about the Rotary’s “End Polio Now” campaign and to raise funds for PolioPlus. We educated Interactors, Rotaractors, Rotarians, and our community about polio while raising funds for PolioPlus and supporting a local bakery during Covid-19. We sold 4 packs of cupcakes with \$1 from each cupcake going to PolioPlus. One of the cupcakes in each 4-pack had purple frosting to symbolize the purple dye used to identify children that had already been vaccinated to PolioPlus workers in countries where polio is still a threat. Interactors made flyers to attach to each 4-pack which contained information about how Rotary is helping to eradicate polio. Safely distanced Interactors and Rotaractors waved “End Polio Now” signs along the street by the COVID-safe drive thru pick up for cupcakes that was staffed by our Rotary members. We raised just over \$400 for PolioPlus.

“Adopt-A-Highway” – RCKS members have completed 3 of 5 Adopt-A-Highway events with 2 more scheduled before the end of June. We also completed one “Kapolei Clean-Up” while the Department of Transportation shut down Adopt-A-Highway operations due to Covid-19 restrictions. We also ran one Adopt-A-Highway event for the Rotaract Club of West Oahu. Clean up events ran for 2 hours each and included a safety brief, COVID-safe distribution of safety vest and trash bags, social distanced pick up of trash, reporting of trash, and breakfast afterwards at a locally owned restaurant for some fellowship.

“Hawaii Foodbank” – RCKS members participated in 3 different volunteer efforts for the Hawaii Foodbank sorting dry goods and produce at the Foodbank’s warehouse. One event included the Rotaractors. Volunteers followed COVID-safe procedures directed by the Foodbank. We also held a virtual food drive supporting it with social media posts and emails to advertise this event. We raised \$1008.00 for the Hawaii Foodbank.

US Vets – RCKS members shopped for, assembled, and delivered 40 hygiene kits for US Vets. Kits included full size shampoo, conditioner, soap, toothpaste, toothbrushes, hand towels, hand sanitizers, and masks. We also provided laundry pods.

Eco Club Tree Planting – Club members participated in the tree planting project at Gunstock Ranch. One event included our Interact Club members.

Ridges to Reef clean up – Scheduled to do a clean up in Kapolei focusing on bus stop areas with the Interact Club.

6K for Water – RCKS has a team with World Vision’s 6K for Water on May 22, 2021 to raise funds to provide clean water to needy communities around the world.

July, 2020: SCHOOL SUPPLY DRIVE

RCMS set up a table outside of Longs Mililani at Town Center and collected donations of new school supplies and money. The club collected more than 30 boxes of school supplies. Monies collected was used to purchase backpacks, slippers and personal protective equipment (PPE) for the schools in the Mililani community,

July, 2020: HEALTHY SNACKS TO YMCA

District grant monies were used to buy snacks that supplemented grab-n-go lunches provided by the Mililani YMCA to needy families affected by the pandemic.

September, 2020: PERSONAL PROTECTIVE EQUIPMENT (PPE'S) TO MILILANI SCHOOLS

District grant monies were given to Mililani schools to purchase PPE's.

September, 2020: HEALTHY SNACKS TO YMCA

Monies from Emergency District Grant were used to buy snacks that supplemented grab-n-go lunches provided by the Mililani YMCA to needy families.

September-November, 2020: SCHOOL SUPERHERO MASKS

Collected \$5,000 from community donations in less than two months, to buy and print 1,200 masks for teachers and school staff at all 8 Mililani community schools. The masks were imprinted with the words SCHOOL SUPERHEROES and a small RCMS logo, and were given to teachers to thank them for their tireless efforts on behalf of children in our community.

November, 2020: PACIFIC GATEWAY CENTER THANKSGIVING MEALS

Joint project with RC West Pearl Harbor to donate and distribute free meals to needy families.

December, 2020: DONATION TO JAPAN ORPHANAGE

Donated \$470 to Peace Bridge to benefit the Holy Family Home in Osaka, Japan for their Christmas celebration.

December, 2020: CHRISTMAS DINNERS TO KIPAPA FAMILIES

Donated money to buy Christmas dinners for 5 Kipapa families chosen by Kipapa Elementary School principal.

February, 2020: RYLA LEADERSHIP CAMP

RCMS paid the registration fee for 4 teens to attend the RYLA Camp; signed up 2 more teens, whose registration was picked up by other clubs.

March, 2020: AWARDED \$5,000 DISTRICT GRANT

Working with the Mililani High School PTSO, RCMS submitted and was awarded a \$5,000 grant to purchase air purifiers for Mililani High School (MHS). MHS is the only high school in the Mililani area and consists of approximately 2,600 students and 300 faculty and staff members. The PTSO has been using its own funds to purchase 40 out of the 190 air purifiers required to add another layer of protection to all the classrooms. This grant enabled the school to purchase 9 more.

March, 2020: SCHOLARSHIPS

\$13,000 in scholarships were awarded to 5 Mililani seniors based on academic achievement and financial need.

Narrative:

RCWW: Community Service is a Priority!

If there's one thing that drives our club, it's COMMUNITY SERVICE! Nothing gets our club's hearts pumping more than a project where we can roll up our sleeves and make a difference. This year, we identified two locations that needed our attention: First, the entrance into Wahiawa from the freeway: It was overgrown with weeds, trash and soot (completed). Second, the area by Goodale Circle in Waialua, where the overgrown bush has made driving there quite risky (in planning). So we rounded up the posse and hit the road to the freeway entrance. In two hours on a Thursday meeting time, we whipped that place into shape like its never seen in over a decade—and all it took was some initiative and our Rotary club and friends! Just about every member came out and they brought friends and equipment. We bagged and disposed over 20 trash bags of rubbish and cleaned up the area, which months later still looks better than it has years.

The subsequent month, we took a trip out to Waialua to take inventory of the work to be performed. This project may take city involvement, but we plan to knock it out before yearend. We ended the survey with a nice in-person meeting at a local outdoor restaurant that was right across the street!

Most recently, when we learned of the flood in Haleiwa and the resulting damage that occurred, I knew that we had to take action. I hopped into my truck with a few cases of iced tea (from one of my businesses, Teapresso Bar Wahiawa) and headed out to assess the need. The teas didn't last more than 10 minutes! It was then that I realized that there was a need for nourishment for the community members and volunteers that were helping in the town.

Our club quickly mobilized and we received donations from multiple club members. We reached out to our local Lions club and they matched the monies donated. President Nahoku Ahlo and I headed out to pick up snacks and supplies, and the next day, we all met to make over 100 peanut butter and jelly sandwiches. I reached out to Scott at Marian's Catering, and he donated a TON of chicken curry and rice for us to serve at the triage site—over 200 bowls to be exact. Teapresso Bar Wahiawa donated 200 milk teas, all with handwritten words of encouragement for the people out in Haleiwa—it was a loving touch that was well-received!

We found a spot, set up a tent, and worked for about 5 hours handing out food, drinks, and snacks to anybody who showed up. It was a great project and we really felt like we had contributed in a good way. We made a lot of new friends—including Rotaracts and Leos from the mainland! We shared social media handles, started following one other, and became instant friends. It was an experience that I will never forget, and it truly embodied the Rotary mantra, "Service above self."

Community Service Narrative – Rotary Club of Volcano

The Rotary Club of Volcano is small, but very active. This past year the club carried out 31 projects involving 597 volunteer hours. There are six more projects scheduled to be finished by the end of the Rotary year. Every club member has participated in at least one project with most participating in several. Our work is augmented by the “Friends of Rotary.” This is a group of community members who have asked to be notified of upcoming projects so they can participate.

Best Project (1): Monthly Road Cleanup

On the third Thursday of every month club members pick up trash along a two mile stretch of Highway 11 that runs through the Volcano area. The project is part of the State of Hawaii Adopt a Highway Program and the club name appears on signs at the beginning and end of the stretch. The county trash transfer station is in the middle of the two miles so there is never a lack of trash on the side of the road. This year every club member participated in the road cleanup. We also advertise the event in the Volcano Community Newsletter and twenty-seven additional volunteers joined us, including a Rotarian from San Diego and his daughter.

Best Project (2): Work at Volcano School of Arts and Sciences

Volcano School of Arts and Sciences is a K-8 school located in Volcano Village. The club has had various projects with the school. This year every third grader received a dictionary from the club. Monthly reading to Kindergartners, which the club had done the past two years was curtailed due to Covid. However, the club volunteered to remove invasive plants from the native rainforest on the campus since this could be done without violating Covid restrictions. Club members also helped put up three 20’ by 40’ tarps on the campus so students will be able to spend time outside as in person teaching resumes.

Other projects of note:

Rotary Gives Thanks – The club worked with two churches (one in Volcano and one in Pahala) to identify individuals and families in need of food assistance. Seventeen \$75.00 gift cards were purchased from KTA supermarket and distributed to those in need by the churches. The \$1,275 came from the club and donations from individual members.

Partnership with Kilauea Military Camp (KMC) – In normal years, the club assists KMC carry out its Veterans Day and Memorial Day ceremonies. Once again, Covid interfered. However, club members, joined by local veterans, raised and lowered the garrison/holiday flag on national flag holidays. The husband of a club member, who is also a veteran, played taps.

Peace Pole – The club purchased and installed a Peace Pole at the Volcano Art Center. A dedication ceremony was held on August 30.
