#### Vocational Service Narrative for the Rotary Club of Hanalei Bay

This year, The Rotary Club of Hanalei Bay launched the inaugural **Catch A Wave Business Competition**. The inspiration for the event was the fact that Rotary initially began as a group of business leaders working together to help each other. With this in mind, we decided that supporting our local small businesses in some way would be a great way to give back to the community we love.

Adapting from the television show "Shark Tank," our committee of ten Rotarians set out to create an event where we get a group of finalists on stage to present in front of a panel of judges, with an audience of business leaders, investors and community members. We began back in the fall of 2017 by putting out a simple application on a Google Form and tapped our vast network to get local small businesses to apply. Our focus was on companies that were already operating - we didn't want ideas for companies that hadn't begun yet. We got our local newspaper to write a couple articles, asked the local Small Business Development Center (SBDC) and Kauai Economic Development Board (KEDB) to send it out to their groups and asked our neighboring Rotary clubs to spread the word.

We ended up with 32 applicant companies! For our tiny little island community, we were very pleased with that result. Our applicants cover a wide array of business shapes and sizes, representing the wide diversity of this island. One of our applicant companies has even advanced to the later stages of qualifying for the actual "Shark Tank" television show! Our committee of Rotarians has been fantastic - we've scheduled an interview for each of our applicant companies with two of our Rotarians. These meetings have been part 'interview' and part 'mentoring session.' We did our best to pair our interviewers' areas of expertise with the needs of the applicant company based on their application so that, even if the applicant company doesn't make it to the finals, they'll walk away from this whole process gaining some insight and valuable relationships from the interview.

The event itself is taking place on May 18, 2018 and will feature 6-8 finalist companies presenting to a panel of four judges, who themselves have diverse business backgrounds. Our club has been kind enough to set aside funds in this year's budget for this event and we've also been able to gather outside sponsorship from the local Chamber of Commerce, the local newspaper and a handful of other sources. Each finalist company will have time to present their business and then time for Q&A from the judges. Our judges will select our first-, second-, and third-place winners, who will receive monetary and in-kind grants from our sponsors. All the while, we hope to provide a night of entertainment to the community!

Finally, we're really looking forward to where this can go in years to come. We already have companies that missed this year's application window asking us to get on a waiting list for next year.

Come Catch A Wave with us.

In May we will present the Business of the Year.

#### **Vocational Service Narrative for Rotary Club of Honolulu Sunset**

<u>Honolulu Sunset Rotary Newsletter</u> Each month a different member has been featured. The member wrote their own article explaining how and why they decided to join Rotary. The member **explained their vocation** and how they began working in their given profession.

<u>Vocation Talks At Weekly Meeting</u> Using the style of a "talk show", President Nicole interviewed several members at a special meeting. The relaxed style allowed membership to understand a given member's vocation without a stuffy formal presentation. We then paired off and shared a brief vocational exchange after which we discussed something interesting we learned about our partner.

<u>Mentoring</u> RCHS Rotarian mentors **UH Nursing Students** as part of their curriculum. Students participate in hands-on patient care under the direction of skilled Registered Home Healthcare Nurses

<u>Aloha Medical Mission</u>: Rotarian Glen Bailey is a magician and annually volunteers to provide Magic Shows for the children awaiting medical treatment by Aloha Medical Mission physicians. Rotarian **Jonathon Okabe, DDS** provides free dental services for the Palama Settlement, serving low income families.

<u>YWCA</u>: Rotarian Lore Woodley works closely with the YWCA assisting needy women by providing mentoring for the "dress for success" program. This is part of an Adult Literacy program for transitioning women back into the community.

<u>Rotary Means Business</u> Several members are active and participate regularly in the Rotary Means Business mixers. One of our members holds a leadership position in Rotary Means Business and provides our club with insight into locations that host the meetings

<u>Jefferson Elementary School S.T.E.M.</u> We support the S.T.E.M. projects at Jefferson Elementary School. We funded three 3D printers last year which are being used this year to build parts for robotics activities. This year our funds provided for a Quadcopter allowing students to photograph their school from the air. Money was provided for buying and building submersible cameras. We toured their facilities to appreciate the resulting advanced training available to students at this k-5 grade school. Our support allows them to begin to train Kindergarten students to learn basic coding. By the time students are in the  $5^{th}$  grade they design and build robots to perform specific tasks.

<u>Men's Shed Community Corps</u> In a joint ceremony, we recognized **State Senator Brickwood Galuteria** with a certificate of appreciation for his support in the community for the acquisition of a facility to house the Shed and all our equipment. Senator Galuteria has been instrumental in working with the City of Honolulu and the State of Hawaii in getting the attention of Department Heads to locate working spaces for our members. **We could not have been as successful as we have without his assistance.** 

<u>Vocational Meeting at JABSOM</u> On December 13, 2017 we had a vocational meeting at the John A. Burns School of Medicine to meet with and be briefed on the H.O.M.E Van Project. We provide funds for equipment and vaccines while JABSOM medical students and Professors provide free medical care to homeless on the Island of Oahu. **Dean Jerris Hedges, Dr Julie Ormori and Michael McNulty** spoke about how the program makes a difference to homeless women and children. *Michael's presentation was extremely poignant* as he explained how, as a college graduate, he found himself homeless on Oahu. The story of his struggle provided a glimpse into life on the street. His determination to succeed led him to the position he fills today as *Program Director*. His success story reinforced our support for this program.

# Vocational Service Narrative for Rotary Club of; West Honolulu

## Vocational Service Activities

Recognized a community member (non-rotarian) for their outstanding achievements. On October 20, 2017 our club put on a banquet of about 200 people recognizing someone of Hawaiian Ancestry. This award is given yearly to someone of Hawaiian Ancestry who contributed to the Hawaiian people, culture, and community in various respected vocations. Dr. Claire Ku'uleilani Hughes is the 61st recipient of this award dating back to 1957. This banquet is our club's premier event and is well respected in the Hawaiian Community and District 5000. Our 2017 recipient has spent more than three decades raising public awareness of Hawaiian health needs. She is a longtime champion for Native Hawaiian health care and advocate of the traditional Hawaiian diet. This award is indicative of the person who the award is named after: David Malo. David Malo was a renascence man who excelled in different areas of service for the people of Hawaii.

## Vocational Scholarships to Non-Rotarians

Awarded college scholarships to current high school students in the amount \$21,000. The decision to award these scholarships were based on academic achievements, need, and vocational passion. It is communicated to these students what Rotary is about and stressed to someday give back and help the community in the same way that Rotary and these scholarships has impacted them.

### Literacy Project

Our club's literacy project was the distribution of dictionaries to elementary schools in our area: Kalihi Uka, Ka'ewae, and Fern Elementary. A presentation was made to these students about the importance of education, reading, and writing which will help them determine an area of interest and type of occupation they want to pursue. We also educated the students about Rotary and the importance of service to the community and world.

## Rotary Recreational and Vocational Fellowship

From 3/1/18 – 3/6/18, 9 rotarians from our club visited our sister club Kyoto West Rotary Club's 60th Anniversary. This was a time for celebration for their club and reflection on all the wonderful service they provided to their community and the world. The RC of Kyoto West has 3 sister clubs: RC of West Honolulu, RC of Taipei West, and the RC of Tokyo West. Together we connected and networked with the result of building good will and better friendships. We learned about our unique cultures and differences. The common bond was Rotary and that we all accomplish similar things wherever in the world we may be. We also learned about the different vocations of our sister club members and how they use their talents to serve Rotary.

## Initiated a Career Development Program
