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Vocational Service Narrative for Rotary Club of; Mililani Sunrise

Members toured Waipahu Waikele Pet Hospital early this year. Working as a veterinarian is the niece of one of our members. We were all amazed that the hospital is a 24/7 hospital with a vet on staff 24 hours. We viewed their state of the art equipment and had a chance to see where the animals are kept overnight.

We have promoted the Declaration of Rotarians in Business and Professions by reviewing the high ethical standards expected of us. We also have copied the Declaration, made it look very professional, made copies and framed it before giving it to members. We asked that the members display the Declaration in their offices or hang on the wall for all to see that they are proud Rotarians.

We participated in a career development program with Mililani Middle School. Rotarians shared their careers with the students and answered questions from them such as "What courses should we take? What kind of salary do they make? Why did you choose that career?" We know that their career choice will change during the course of their school year but we just want the students to start thinking about what they enjoy doing and if it's something that they want to do.

VOCATIONAL TALKS: After induction into our club, all new members are asked to present a 5-7 minute Vocational Talk during a meeting. To date seven of the eight new members have presented their talks. We are inducting three new members in April and May and four more Vocational Talks will be scheduled this spring. UNCLE GEORGE'S FARM MORNING: Honorary Member Uncle George Kahumoku Jr. requested a group of folks willing to assist at his farm on a Sunday morning. 18 members and friends participated on 11/12/17 from 7:00-11am. Workers were provided with socks, rubber boots and tools to help weeding and planting a row of taro on his farm. At the conclusion of the work tasks Uncle George provided the volunteers with a farm grown meal and he shared his music. This project fit in not only with our Vocational activities but it also was part of a Hawaiian cultural service project that our club selected as a focus during our Visioning Activity held last spring. NETWORKING - FRIENDRAISER: On July 18, 2017 we held our first "Friendraiser" which was an amazing success. 16 of 22 club members attended, and 13 members invited 25 guests and we had a total of 48 in attendance. This 90 minute program featured free pupu for our guests and a number of members spoke about our club and the projects we provide to our community. There was time allowed for networking and getting to know the guests who attended. The follow-up was extensive as each of the 13 members pesonally communicated with their guests who attended. 5 of our 8 new members have been inducted this year as a result from this event. One of the guests was a Rotarian from Arizona who replicated this activity this Spring in his club. VOCATIONAL SERVICE AWARDS: In Spring 2018 our club will be recognizing 2 recipients for our Vocational Service Awards. The awards will be selected by the Board of Directors and presented to: A business or individual who provides outstanding service to our community and/or our club; and a non-profit or local organization who provides outstanding service to our community and/or our club. These awards replace the Employer and

Employee Awards.

LITERACY PROJECTS RELATED TO VOCATIONAL SERVICE AND UTILIZING THE VOCATIONAL SKILLS OF OUR MEMBERS: Two of our members are the Directors of the Read Aloud America Program. RAA (RAP) programs are fun family evening literacy events held at public schools on our island. The event starts with "Razzmatazz", then children go to age-level classrooms and are read aloud to while the adults remain in the cafeteria with the presenter. The evening ends with a light dinner and door prizes. Every child goes home with a brand new book at the end of this family event. Average attendance at a RAP program is between 350-400 participants. The RAP program sends families home with a hand-out with enjoyable "RAP-oriented" activities into the home, so RAP's momentum can continue after the program ends. One member, the Program Director, writes individual curriculum and handouts for each school based on the school's educational emphasis. The other member is the Operations and Grants Director. Many of our members serve as Volunteer Readers that read aloud to children in classrooms. In addition to these RAP evening programs, our club members volunteer at RAPsponsored outreach events throughout the community at a Children's Literacy Game booth. Such events include the Lahaina Loves Literacy 2nd Friday and the Back to School Expo at the Outlets of Maui.

MENTORING YOUTH: Our club chartered the Kihei Elemetary School EarlyAct Student Council group this year. Club members provide guidance to this group of young leaders and have sponsored and supported three community service projects since November 2017

4TH TUESDAY SOCIALS: Our club hosted four 4th Tuesday Socials. These socials are held at four different restaurants in our community and members are encouraged to invite and bring guests for an evening of pupu and networking. As a result of these socials new members have been inducted into our club.

MEETING SPEAKERS/VOCATIONS: We meet on the 1st, 3rd and 5th Tuesdays where we have a formal meeting with Speakers. Of our 19 meetings since July 1st, 6 have featured speakers that shared about their vocations. Such Vocations have included: Headmaster of Maui Prep Academy, a local published writer, the Director of the Maui County Department of Transportation and other vocations.
