Youth Service Narrative for Rotary Club of: Downtown Honolulu

RCDH has chosen to focus many of our service projects on improving the lives of youth. This year we strengthened our relationship with Central Middle School (CMS) and began a relationship with the Nuuanu YMCA thanks to new member Randal Ikeda who is their Executive Director.

Our service to Central Middle School included a school supplies drive at Keaumoku WalMart. Club members solicited monetary donations and collected supplies requested by CMS teachers. The drive lasted 5 hours and was a great opportunity for the public to see Rotary In Action. This year we collected two truck loads of supplies and over \$1100 in cash. The supplies were delivered to the school and the check was presented to Principal Anne Murphy at a club meeting.

In 2016, RCDH chartered the CMS Interact club and Carrie Fizer, a CMS special education teacher and RCDH member, is one of the advisors. In October 2017, we sponsored the CMS Interact club at the WIELD leadership training at Kapolei HS and provided transportation for both the CMS and the Kalani students to the event. RCDH members accompanied the Interact students and participated in the training. During the year, RCDH supports the CMS Interact club in a variety of ways such as attending Interact meetings, including students in our Campus Beautification projects and supporting the Interact Charity Run that the Interact students organized to raise money to create hygiene kits for the homeless.

In November, our Rotary Gives Thanks service was at CMS with the Interact Club, McKinley HS ROTC, and CMS staff joining RCDH in campus beautification and maintenance of the Learning Garden. We picked up trash, raked leaves and other organic material, planted trees and other plants near the garden and painted picnic tables for the campus. We also continued our effort to frame historic photos from the school's archives to instill pride in the school's rich history.

RCDH supports the CMS Library by having each speaker who visits our club sign a book which is then donated to the library. We invited the CMS Woodwind Ensemble to our December 1 meeting for a concert and provided them with a breakfast bento as they went on to school.

In March we held the CMS Four Way Test Essay contest. Students are encouraged to write an essay relating a topic of interest to the Four Way Test. Essays are submitted to their teachers who chose four finalists. RCDH members reviewed the finalist essays and awarded first place and 3 runners up. The students read their essays at our March 9 meeting where we hosted their family members and teachers. Monetary awards were presented to all four essay finalists. This project familiarizes the students, families and teachers with Rotary and the Four Way Test and provides valuable writing and public speaking experience.

RCDH awarded an HRYF scholarship after interviewing 5 students and participated in the judging of the area finalists. We also supported HRYF through the Foodland Give Aloha program, donating almost \$800 and encouraged our members who shop on Amazon to designate HRYF as a recipient in the AmazonSmile program.

In February, RCDH continued our annual project to deliver dictionaries to third grade public and private school students. We have delivered 169 dictionaries at 8 schools and have 5 more schools on the schedule for April. At least two members participate in the deliveries and the presentation includes hands-on activities to look up words and familiarize the students with the sections of the dictionaries.

Other RCDH youth service activities during the year included serving as judges for the Hawaii State DECA conference at the Hawaii Convention Center; helping to organize books at the Jefferson Elementary School Library; supporting the Nuuanu YMCA toy drive for the victims of the Houston hurricane; and supervising the Key students who do regular clean ups of Kamamalu Park.

Youth Service Narrative for Rotary Club of: Hawaii Kai

Hawaii Kai has the BEST Interact club, Island wide. They are energetic, participatory, and always present to help. They adopted the Lunalilo retirement Home for Kapuna elders and are meeting with them weekly for a Bingo game and monthly to play music for them. We currently have 46 members.

We held a special dinner with them to induct them at a Chinese restaurant. 44 /46 attended.

Interact club was invaluable for our DUCK Dash event. We had a special evening (pizza etc.) where 24 of them helped us 'tag' 3,000 ducks. Then on race day, they brought the ducks down and washed them and replaced them at the end of race day. Kaiser band played music as entertainment on race day. They also helped us move our items from a very expensive storage area to another storage area under a members home. Lastly, forgot to mention, that they provided Keiki entertainment during our annual DUCK Dash race day event. Very important to the success of the day.

One of our annual events is providing dinner and entertainment for the Elders at the Retirement Home. We provided the food and the kids helped serve and provided music and entertainment.

Another annual event is doing Valentines day with the Elders, doing a Bingo game and giving them a very small, stuffed Dog with hearts on them as they win. This is followed by the Interactors mingling and giving them Valentine cards etc.

We love participating in the 'Liveable Hawaii Kai' project. I don't know the correct name for it. Forgive me. This is where we attend to the small stream and pull out weeds etc.

We also participated in the Homeless Village sponsored by Laura Steelquist, (forgot the name of the Village again), by donating funds and items picked out by several of our members, to bring to the new tenants moving into the Village

Scholarship Program: One of our favorites. Our chair called Kaiser several times to try and promote more applications. This year we had 12 applicants, 8 of which were from Kaiser. We were very happy that a Kaiser student won the \$5,000 award. Also as part of our Fund Raiser we raise money to give scholarships to students. One of our sponsors, who also interviewed the kids, gave us \$3,000 with the stipulation it is to be spent for scholarships or services only in Hawaii Kai. Therefore, we will be giving an additional \$1,000 scholarship to three more students from Kaiser.

Also, part of our Fund raiser, is to give funds to a Community College. We give out five to six scholarships, every year, depending on how much money we raise and we did that as well, this year - five scholarships in addition. The interviews are very touching, because most of the applicants are older 20-69 years of age and tell us very heart-warming stories of how they want to better themselves and help their families.

Youth Service Narrative for Rotary Club of Hickam Pearl Harbor

The Rotary Club of Hickam Pearl Harbor has a Youth Service Committee which includes Lisa Jensen, Vernon Wheeler, Mylene Reyes, and Allen Kamemoto. The Hickam Pearl Harbor Club has begun its initial planning and development of their youth service focus on two primary initiatives largely focused within Kalihi Elementary with the 1) “Read With Me” Program and 2) Ram’s Club. Being a new club with minimal experience, community involvement, and a small number of members, the club leaders determined that it was best to focus on one primary local organization which would benefit the most from our service, as with Kalihi Elementary.

As a new club, there was no foundation by which to participate in the annual Hawaii Rotary Youth Foundation, however, efforts were spent building the foundation for Rotary year 2018-2019. Initially, the club utilized the collection of Happy Dollars to provide the funding for the payment of \$200 in order to participate in HRYF. Member Allen Kamemoto, spent time with another club, Sunrise Rotary, in order to have a full understanding of what the club needs to do in the next year.

The club sponsored two students from Moana Lua High School for participation in the Rotary Youth Leadership Awards camp weekend. Mr. Allen Kamemoto and Mr. Vernon Wheeler volunteered during the camp weekend to have a fuller understanding of the program.

In order to further support the youth of Kalihi, Mr. Allen Kamemoto and Ms. Lisa Jensen are in the beginning stages to participate in the Nuuanu YMCA mentoring program. This will enable the club to more fully see out the vision to create a Saturday program “Kalihi Kids” to teach and mentor school age students in the Kalihi Valley.

Hickam Pearl Harbor Rotary established a “Scout Reach” program with Kalihi Elementary School. It is a modified program, subsidized by the City & County, that encourages participation with the Scouting program and American values, without the requirement of buying uniforms and other things normally associated with Scouting.

We have also established a program in conjunction with Harris Methodist Church and US Navy volunteer organizations to interact with Kalihi kids once a quarter at the regional park close to Kalihi Elementary to have activities with the Kalihi kids in various fun and games. We are also working on a mentoring program with kids in groups of 6 to help kids that are having problems in school.

On various occasions the club has been able to participate with youth in Interact Clubs. Primarily this has been made possible through mutual participation in the Kahauiki Village project, working with students from the McKinley High School Interact Club painting and doing work on the grounds.

Lahaina Sunset

Youth Service Narrative for Rotary Club of:

KIHEI ELEMENTARY EARLYACT: The Kihei Elementary School Student Council EarlyAct was chartered in October 2017 by the Rotary Club of Lahaina Sunset. One of the Student Council members is the son of a club member and one of the co-advisers is the Co-President of our club. The mission of the EarlyAct Student Council was to work with the Rotary Club to conduct service projects for the school and community. This group held three VERY successful projects since it's charter. The all-school Food Drive for Maui Food Bank was a class competition for two weeks in November. The drive generated 1529 items collected for the Maui Food Bank. In December the group held a "gently-used" toy drive for the children supported by Maui Family Support Services. This was not a competition yet every one of the 36 classes donated and over 125 toys were collected for these children in need. In February a two-week Pennies for Polio competition was sponsored by the EarlyAct group. \$1704 in coin and currency was generated; ¼ of the amount will go to the EarlyAct group for future projects and ¾ will be deposited to the Rotary Polio Plus account. For the 2 community service competitions the Rotary Club provided a Jamba Juice/Healthy Snack party for the two classes that generated the most items/funds for their project. These students are mentored in the Rotary philosophy using the 4-way test as a guide by our club members. Students were asked to write "what I learned" from these projects. According to a third grade student: "The most important thing I learned about these projects is that Sharing is Caring."

MAUI CAMP RYLA/ETHICS/D5000 YOUTH SERVICE CHAIR: Three of our club members served as the co-Directors of the Maui Camp RYLA program – Curriculum, Operations, and Funding. 8 additional members also assisted with Maui Camp RYLA operations and needs – making 50% of our membership actively participating in the program. Our club paid for 9 students to attend the camp. Part of the RYLA Curriculum written by our club member is an Ethics/Decision Making module using the 4-Way Test. Student Facilitators are responsible for recruiting the campers each year, making this a self-perpetuating program. Student Facilitators also sign up to serve at additional community service projects throughout the year. One of our club members is concluding her 4th year as D5000 Youth Services Chair.

TWO SCHOLARSHIP PROGRAMS: Our club selected the recipient of the \$5000 HRYF Scholarship who is a senior at Kihei Charter HS. She placed first among 10 selected Maui recipients in the all-island interview. Our club members collected over \$800 to support continued HRYF funding. Our club is also in the third year of the "Go for the Green" scholarship that our club funds. This \$2500 scholarship is for a graduating senior in West Maui or Molokai who must be pursuing a field of study that will benefit the environment.

LITERACY PROJECTS: Many of our members serve as Volunteer Readers for Read Aloud America evening family literacy programs held at local schools; Back to School Expo Childrens Literacy Game at Outlets of Maui; Provided 150 dictionaries to 3rd grade classes at 5 Molokai and 2 Lahaina schools; Ridge to Reef event- Childrens Literacy game; Worked Photos with Santa Booth at Banyan Tree Christmas Tree Lighting - every child received a new book with their photo; Lahaina 2nd Friday-Lahaina Loves Literacy--ran Childrens Literacy game

YOUTH SPEAKERS AT CLUB MEETINGS: Two of our meeting speakers featured youth that were "touched" by our Rotary Club. AynMarie Eastridge spoke about her experiences as an Outbound Youth Exchange Student. Santana Huck was a "Camp RYLA kid", attended the Global Peace Forum and as a result his college career and college senior project was sparked by both. His presentation on his business plan, "Happy Feed" was a credit to the experiences that "changed his life" because of Rotary.

OTHER YOUTH PROJECTS: Going away party for Youth Exchange Student; School Supplies Drive for Hana School; Purchased toys, candy and bags with West Maui Clubs and stuffed 500 goodie bags for Lahaina Keiki Halloween Parade; Parade marshalls at Keiki Halloween Parade; Donated \$250 to Lahainaluna HS Marching Band for Holiday Bowl Expenses; Purchased gifts for children Angel Tree Project; Purchased new permanent signs for the doors of the Kihei Elementary School Library where the EarlyAct Student Council group meets; Worked with members of Lahainaluna HS Interact to assist with a number of community service projects

Youth Service Narrative for Rotary Club of: **Mililani Sunrise**

What are we doing to positively impact youth and young adults through involvement in community and international service projects and foster world peace and cultural understanding?

Our community involvement begins with our school supplies project. School supplies are solicited at the neighborhood shopping center by members who ask the community to donate to the students whose parents/guardians are unable to afford all the school supplies that is necessary to further their education. After the school supplies drive, the supplies are taken to the schools who request the supplies. The community also donates cash and with the cash, we are able to purchase backpacks and slippers. Other organizations donate school supplies and some elementary schools in Mililani have enough supplies to last throughout the year. There is a Title 1 school in Mililani that is grateful for the school supplies. After the supplies are delivered to the school, our members are invited to their Meet and Greet event. This is when the students meet their teachers and the students are able to go to the "store" and pick up their supplies. The parents are so thankful and are touched by the generosity of the community.

Every even month of the year and on the third Sunday, our club cooks and serves dinner to approximately 400 men, women and children at the Institute for Human Services (IHS). We begin at 3:00 p.m. to prepare for the dinner and the women and children are served at 4:30 p.m. During the Christmas, Santa surprises the women with goodie bags of hygiene products and gives color books and socks to the children. The men are fed at a separate location at 6:00 p.m. Santa also surprises them with goodie bags filled with hygiene products. Why have we been doing this for years? It's knowing that Rotarians care enough to make a difference and very humbling to know how much we have and take for granted.

Members of our club also participate in the career day at Mililani Middle School. Rotarians share their vocations and give the students the benefits of choosing their careers. Students are given information on what courses to take in the different paths. They are also very curious about what kind of salary they can expect from the different vocations. Brochures are also made available to the students. Middle school students aren't quite sure about their careers but it allows them to begin to think about it.

We distribute dictionaries to third grade students attending schools in Mililani. We also do Keiki Vision which is an eye screening program. Students, with their parents/guardian permission are tested to determine whether they should see an optometrist. Students are tested in four areas and if they receive one "no pass", a note is sent home with a recommendation that they visit an optometrist.

Annually, we present Service Above Self awards to a fifth/sixth grade boy and girl student from each of the 6 elementary schools in Mililani who will be entering middle school. The award consists of a \$50 gift card. Students are selected on their participation in service to their family, school and community. The students are selected by their teachers and Rotarians attend the award ceremonies at each school to present the students with the Service Above Self award. This award has a huge impact on the students.

Mililani High School Interact club is very fortunate to have as its advisor, a teacher who was an Ambassadorial Scholar. She has a very active Interact group of approximately 80 students who enjoy doing projects with our Rotary club. Bell ringing at Walmart for the Salvation Army, marching in the Christmas parade, volunteering to help the Friends of Mililani Library book fair, selling baked goods at the Mililani High School carnival, marching in the Veterans Day parade and Mililani Holiday parade are some of the projects that we do with the Interact club.

We are very proud of our Interact who decided to have two (2) garage sales and donate the proceeds to PolioPlus. The students have done this in previous years. One year they had a bake sale and donated the proceeds to PolioPlus. We are proud that they know the importance of eradicating polio from the face of the earth and also are confident that polio will be eradicated during our lifetime.

One of the best Youth Service project that we do jointing with the Interact Club is to bell ring for the Salvation Army. It is very rewarding to have Rotarians and Interactors working together to raise money for the Salvation Army. The students and adults end up talking and "interacting", singing Christmas carols and often, the Interactors will bring their band instruments and sing and play for the audience.

Our Rotary club invests much time to the youth but we know it is very worthwhile and will benefit ALL in the future.
