#### What was the most impactful international project completed? (Describe in 1000 characters or less)

We have been the prime sponsor of the Eye Hospital in the slums of Delhi, India. This is now in its 4th year and have provided several thousand cataract surgeries at no cost.

In addition we are the main sponsor of a Vocational Service International grant to train Pediatric Orthopedic Surgeons in Uganda. This project started in 2019, then was put on hold for 2 years due to the pandemic, and is now restarted and has recently recruited two Pediatric Orthopedic surgeons as trainers. This program significantly improves the skills for Pediatric Surgery throughout Uganda.

What was the most impactful international project completed? (Describe in 1000 characters or less)

Our member, Dr. Anne Biedel, visited Nepal as part of a D5000 grant RCLS supported to bring water directly to villages on top of mountains in the Demauli Valley, a rural farming area. Twelve villages were given access to pumping stations that the local farmers maintained. This allowed women to spend more time farming and childrearing rather than carrying water up trails to their homes. This area was also included in a grant providing delivery kits to a rural hospital to staff their obstetrical clinic. Finally, representatives from Hawaii, Maui, Oahu, and Kaui visited Demauli, Nepal, in December of 2022 to participate in educational programs at two secondary schools to bring engineering, agriculture, and hygiene courses to their students and teachers. There were also cultural exchanges for Rotarians, Villagers, and Students. The Rotary Clubs of Kathmandu and Demauli organized these exchanges and for taking the visiting D5000 members to visit the various water projects.

What was the most impactful international project completed? (Describe in 1000 characters or less) Our Club, for the first time, became the international sponsor for a Global Grant project. It is to rehabilitate water tank, toilet, shower and sink in the dormitory of a public high school in central Vietnam. 80 ethnic students must trek a long distance to attend school so they can live in a hygienic environment. Our Club made several presentations about the project to the clubs in D5000 and beyond. As a result, we mobilized \$40,000 from 12 clubs from D5000, California, New Jersey and Japan. We expect the approval of the project from RI soon so that the rehabilitation work of the facilities will start soon after. Rotary Clubs in Vietnam closed their operations after the Vietnam War and only restarted in 2021 after 46 years. This project is one of the first Global Grant projects in Vietnam. We are planning a service trip to Vietnam in November 2023 and hope this project will lead to many future projects that D5000 clubs can engage in this country.

In February 2023 the Rotary Club of Pearl Harbor welcomed the Rotary Club of Hiroshima Tonan (Japan) for a visit in Honolulu, the first exchange in 4 years due to the pandemic. This year marks the 40th anniversary of when the two clubs created a relationship as Rotary Sister Clubs. It is especially meaningful because of the historical significance of Pearl Harbor and Hiroshima during World War II.

Activities during this visit included a Joint Rotary meeting, tree planting at Manoa Heritage Center, learning hula, a welcome dinner at the Outrigger Canoe Club in Waikiki, and a departure dinner hosted by the Hiroshima club.

During the joint meeting on February 27 Hiroshima Club President Yoko Sano ended the meeting, "We would like to continue to treasure our purpose, which is "Build Bridges of Friendship Throughout the World" and further deepen our friendship between us, Rotary Club of Pearl Harbor and Hiroshima Tonan Rotary Club."
