How to share your Rotary story with a potential member

DITCH THE PITCH

by Steve Yastrow is a compelling book that teaches the art of improvised persuasion.

Many times, when we try to impress upon a person why they should join Rotary, we fall into the trap of reciting a presentation about Rotary and missing out on the opportunity to engage that person. As Steve puts it in his book "...the undeniable fact is that [people] ... don't care that much about us. They care about themselves. The best way to get a [person] to develop an interest in you is to weave elements of your story into your [person's] story, **Creating a Shared Story**."

Another key element is to never use the words "No" or "But", no matter what someone says, always pick up on the conversation by saying "Yes and", that way the conversation continues on until you both create a common outcome. The "Yes" doesn't have to be an explicit "Yes" by using the word, but can be an implied "Yes", by using a positive connotation.

The same idea is shared by Daniel Pink in his book SELLING IS HUMAN, although I really like his idea of using the "Pixar pitch".

"Emma Coats, a former Pixar story artist, has created a six sentence template for an irresistible story:

'Once upon a time _____. Every day _____. One day _____. Because of that _____. Because of that _____. Until finally _____.'

Let's try using this with ROTARY

And finally, rather than tell, ask a lot of questions and listen for cues on what the person really is interested in. Most importantly, **HAVE FUN**!!

The need to develop leaders who are self-directed and civic minded is so important to the future of our island and the world."

Besides an introduction to leadership principles and practices, the ladies walked away with a deeper understanding of what it takes to choose to lead from within. At the end of two days, the goal was for the campers to know: who are you? what is your passion? where do you see yourself contributing in your community? and who are your mentors? They also practiced how to implement the Rotary 4-Way Test in problem-solving and decision-making, and learned tools that would reinforce their leadership abilities.

"These extraordinary young leaders didn't waste any time diving into the projects and making things happen. What we didn't know would happen was how quickly they bonded and made promises to stay connected amongst themselves. Leadership is about inclusiveness, relationships, doing something, making choices, and these young leaders demonstrated these principles beautifully." -Char Ravelo, Camp Director.

"Career Speed-Dating" took place on Sunday morning. Fourteen Rotarians represented careers in agriculture, business, education, entrepreneurship, finance, real estate and technology. In a "round robin" style, the girls explored several future options by talking to the professionals of their choice.

Service above Self is a core value in Rotary's work. To that end, the ladies removed invasive plants under the guidance of Katie Cassel and her team from the Kokee Resource Conservation Program. Being in nature and learning the importance of Kaua'i's native forest was a highlight for the group.



Other highlights were inspirational guest speakers. PMRF Commanding Officer Captain Bruce Hay shared his experiences of becoming a leader and tools he has used for setting goals and making decisions.
