

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MAKE A DIFFERENCE

Every October, Altrusa San Antonio participates in Make A Difference Day, a national day of giving. This year, we assembled 300 activity bags for the children that will be going through Child Protective Services (CPS).

Studies have shown that constructive activities help children process and handle grief, stress and fear. All things that must be happening in their lives as they are processed through CPS.

Thanks to a \$4,000 grant from Altrusa International,

our project was bolstered to make the activity bags even better than originally planned! Preparation work for the activity bags began as early as June with the purchase and cutting of material used to make the individual cloth backpacks that the items were placed into. All the cloth

bags had to be serged, sewn, and strung with cord before they could be stuffed with all the goodies. Members scoured every HEB, Dollar Store, Walmart, and thrift stores stocking up on pens, colors, coloring books, activity books, toys, age appropriate reading books and plush toys that went into each bag.

In October, Altrusans, community volunteers, and ASTRA members came together to stuff the bags. Channel 12, KSAT, came out and covered the event giving us live coverage on Good Morning San Antonio. Additional coverage was shown at the 5 pm and 10 pm newscasts. Thank you Jonathan Cotto for spending the morning with us and enabling us to share some of the great work Altrusa San Antonio does for San Antonio and **Bexar County!**



RED ROVER

Red Rover, formerly known as United Animal Nations, was founded in 1987 by Belton Mouras to save forgotten and abused animals. Out of this organization the Red Rover Readers were created.

After a

community needs assessment of the area around Bob Hope Elementary, it was determined that the



community needed more assistance in providing education on the humane treatment of animals. With several animal lovers, who also enjoy working with children, in our Club, it was decided to use our Club's focus on literacy to teach children empathy, kindness, and responsibility for animals.

We received a Grant from the International Foundation and were able to incorporate the Red Rover Program, a literacy program, that helps children explore the human-animal bond through stories, discussions, and literacy-based enrichment activities. A few of our Members, former educators attended a six-hour workshop to become "Certified Readers."

In 2011, our Certified Readers began the Program with the fourth graders at Bob Hope Elementary. The Readers began going into their



classrooms once a month, reading an animal themed book from a preselected list, followed by a class discussion and literacy-based activities.

The Program was introduced to the school's community at their "Meet the Teacher/PTA meeting at the beginning of the school year. Several of our Club members, wearing Altrusa shirts, attended this function. An overview of what Altrusa is and does was given. It was announced that the Red Rover Program would be implemented in the Fourth Grade classrooms. The Program was explained and the parents were encouraged to view all the selected books that would be used. A set of the preselected books was also donated to the school library for all the students to enjoy.

Later in the Program we invited the Director of Development from the Humane Society to be the

guest speaker at the school's PTA meeting. She reiterated the value of the Program and the importance of education on the proper care of animals. Altrusans, wearing their Club shirts, once again mingled with



city-wide event, "Kids Day At The Park." Our Club members, wearing Altrusa shirts, partnered with our sponsored ASTRA Club to provide a fun-filled afternoon of animal-related story-telling with the use of puppets. Our ASTRA members served as Puppeteers and Readers while

the community members present and answered questions about Altrusa. They also passed out "Puppy Chow" which was prepared by some of our members. A Fundraiser was held for the Humane Society. During that time, students read during the morning announcements interesting facts about animals to keep the children aware of the value of animals and their chance to give back. A Donation Drive was also held for Animal Care Services.

We were also invited to read our stories and do our literacy-based enrichment activities at the Human Society's " Camp Humane, " a day camp for elementary age children that allows them to learn about pets and how to care for them.

For our culminating End of the School Year activities we have had speakers from the Humane Society with their puppies, members of The Therapy Dogs with their dogs, a Veterinarian with her three legged dog, and a representative from Animal Care Services.


We began the Program with the Fourth Graders. After a few years we began working with the Third Graders and our currently working with the Second Graders.





District Nine Book Club



HISTORY

Helen Matusevich Oujesky

August 14, 1930 - February 1, 2010

Altrusa San Antonio has some impressive leaders! Back in 1980, our then club president was Dr. Helen Oujesky. Born

and raised in Fort Worth, Texas. After finishing primary school, she went on to study at Texas State College for Women (now Texas Woman's University – [TWU]) and finished with a bachelor's degree in 1951. Her first job was teaching chemistry and biology at Trimble Tech High School in Fort Worth. Even though she had married and had three sons, Helen went back to school and received a master's degree in 1965 from Texas Christian University. She finished her education back at her alma mater, Texas Women's University, in 1968. She taught at TWU until 1973 when she joined the faculty as a professor of microbiology at the University of Texas at San Antonio.

While at UT San Antonio, Helen had a distinguished career and was recognized locally, statewide, nationally, and internationally for her contributions to science, social justice, and education. Dr. Helen contributed valuable environmental microbiology research concerning pollution of soil and water, particularly of toxic wastes. She routinely presented her research findings at local, state, and national levels. She was an invited speaker on her research at the prestigious 5th International Biodeterioration Symposium in Aberdeen, Scotland.

In addition to Altrusa, Dr. Helen was involved in numerous local, state, and national organizations, including the Alamo Regional Academy of Sciences & Engineering, Texas Academy of Sciences, American Association for the Advancement of Science, American Association of University Women, Society for Industrial Microbiology, and Sigma Xi. In many of these organizations, she lent her considerable leadership skills by serving as an officer. Helen was dedicated to helping pre-college students develop an interest in scientific research and presented her work at school science fairs and junior science academies around the state. Helen assisted and mentored young women, particularly high-risk minorities, in their endeavors to become involved in science, math, and engineering. She gave numerous presentations throughout the country for educational equity for girls and women. She received numerous awards from the National Science Foundation, the Student Science Training Programs for High School Students, the Minority Research Programs for Minority High School Students, and for an Intervention Model Program for Girls Using Laboratory Activities in Science, Math, and Engineering. Helen was inducted into The San Antonio Women's Celebration and Hall of Fame (now known as the San Antonio Women's Hall of Fame) in 1987. Helen dedicated 45 years in education to help students further their knowledge of science and math and, more importantly, help students develop a belief in themselves!

These are some really big shoes to fill!

Editing Personal Information in Altrusa ClubRunner Site

Have you signed up for ClubRunner yet? Have you ensured your information if correct? If not, this article is for you!

- 1. Go to Altrusa's new home page at <u>https://</u> <u>altrusadistrictnine.org/</u>
 - a. Click on Members Only
 - b. Click on Edit My Profile
- 2. Screen prompts for Username and Password; enter information received from District Nine.
- Or you can use the option for forgotten password and will be sent an email with your username and a link to reset your password.
 - a. To reset enter your Club, Last Name, and Email Address then click on Submit.
- 4. Once logged in, click on blue EDIT button. Enter needed information. Please be sure to supply your email address so you receive District Nine updates. If you enter a phone number, please enter your ten digit number to include the area code.

FYI - Birthday and anniversary years can only be viewed by Club Executive level or higher. Only Members can see phone and address information.

Guide for Password Reset: (instructions from clubrunner)

https://www.clubrunnersupport.com/kb/articles/ how-do-i-edit-my-profile-district If you cannot login to ClubRunner or you forgot your password this guide will help you.

- To start, go to the Club or District website you want to login to. At the top right of the screen, Click on Member Login.
- 2. Click the Forgot login name? or Forgot password? link.
- 3. You it will ask you for your Club, Last Name and Email Address. Click Submit when done.
- 4. If your name and email are found, an email will be sent to you containing instructions on resetting your login name and password. A message will display with this information.
- Open the email that was sent and click on the Reset Password link or copy and paste the URL into the address bar of your internet browser. Please note this link will only remain valid for 24 hours!
- You should now be taken to the Reset Password Page. Section 1: contains your Login Name; please make note of your login name. Section 2: contains the reset password fields.
- Enter and confirm your new password and click the Submit button. Note: the bar is to help you get an idea of how secure your password is. Using a combination of letters and numbers, six characters long or more is recommended.
- 8. If your password reset is successful, you will receive a confirmation message. Click the Return to go back to the login page.
- Enter your Login Name (the name provided in Step 6) and your new Password. Once done, click Login.
