Membership

The RI theme for the month of August is **MEMBERSHIP**.

District Membership chair Menno De Wet, who himself has introduced many new members to Rotary, has created **Project Rotary Gro**, targeting over 300 new members for this Rotary year! Sounds impossible?

Not at all! Remember Upington conference's RIPPR, Frank Devlyn, who simply asked the two very high profile speakers: *"Would you like to join Rotary*?" And they were both delighted and instantly agreed. Two minutes, two questions, two new members !! **So....... JUST ASK !**

To help clubs, Menno has created a simple 7 point plan to ensure clubs set & meet membership targets:-

1.Membership Director: Ensure you have one on board.

2. Prospective Members: At your first August meeting, all members to list people who would be potential assets to your Rotary club.

3.At your second August meeting Membership Director collects contact details of prospective members & gets your club to commit to increasing membership by an average of **4-7 members** by the end of October. Some examples of how this can work :-

- ✓ Gordon's Bay went from 9-36 members in 3 years!
- ✓ Roggebaai Club was closing in June and now has 14 members and 3 more in the pipeline.

Potential new members can be business acquaintances, next-door neighbours, local estate agent, tennis partners, church colleagues, people who like to serve! What professions are missing in your club ?

4. Set date for a New Member Meeting: Visitors' costs of refreshments & drinks should be carried by the club. Membership Director invites all prospective members, encouraging the member who nominated them to bring them to the meeting & be part of the welcome party.

5. New Member evening:

- Hold an informal meeting with a warm, welcoming reception by all current members, ensuring your potential new members feel at home on arrival.
- Invite a good speaker who can enthusiastically share what Rotary is all about, such as "Avenues of Service" or Areas of Focus, which provide excellent bases for discussion, as does the article below:-"20 reasons to join Rotary"

6. Follow up: The board should within a day of the New Member function, which seem like ideal potential new members. Within 48 hours, the Membership Director then invites those confirmed as potential Rotarians, to attend the next Rotary meeting as a guest of the club. Again, the cost of dinner to be covered by club funds. Also invite them to participate in club projects and if keen to join, host a fireside chat.

7. Induction of new members.

Do not delay the induction process. If someone is recognised as a bad fit, simply do not invite them again. Importantly, appoint a mentor for each newly inducted Rotarian. The mentor's responsibility is to ensure the new members understand all aspects of the club, are given the hand of friendship and involved in meetings and projects and whose enjoyment is evaluated quarterly. Did you know? 60% of Rotarians leave in their first year ! so do appoint mentors! Good luck.

20 Reasons to Join Rotary

1. Friendship:

In an increasingly complex world, Rotary provides one of the most basic human needs: the need for friendship and fellowship. It is one of two reasons why Rotary began in 1905.

2. Business Development:

The second original reason for Rotary's beginning is business development. Everyone needs to network. Rotary consists of a cross section of every business community. Its members come from all walks of life. Rotarians help each other and collectively help others.

3. Personal Growth and Development:

Membership in Rotary continues one's own growth and education in human relations and personal development.

4. Leadership Development:

Rotary is an organisation of leaders and successful people. Serving in Rotary positions is like a university education. Leadership – learning how to motivate, influence and lead leaders.

5. Citizenship in the Community:

Membership in a Rotary club makes one a better community citizen. The average Rotary club consists of many active community citizens.

6. Continuing Education:

Each Rotary club's monthly programme is designed to keep one informed about what is going on in the community, and world and provides opportunities to listen to a variety of speakers & topics.

<mark>7. Fun:</mark>

Rotary is fun. Each meeting is fun. Club projects are fun. Social activities are fun. The service is fun!

8. Public Speaking Skills:

Many individuals who joined Rotary were afraid to speak in public. Rotary develops confidence and skill in public communications and the opportunity to practice and perfect these skills.

9. Citizenship in the World:

Every Rotarian wears a pin that says 'Rotary International'. There are a few places on the globe that do not have a Rotary club. Every Rotarian is welcome – even encouraged – to attend any of the 34000 clubs in 210 nations and geographical regions. This means instant friends in both one's own community and in the world community.

10. Assistance when Travelling:

Because there are Rotary clubs everywhere, many a Rotarian in need of a doctor, lawyer, hotel, dentist, advice etc. while travelling, has found assistance through Rotary.

11. Entertainment:

Every Rotary club and district has parties and activities that provide diversion in one's business life. Rotary holds local and international conferences, conventions, and assemblies that provide entertainment, in addition to Rotary information, education and service.

12. The Development of Social Skills:

At all the various club meetings, events and functions, Rotary develops one's personality, social skills and people skills. Rotary is for people who like people.

13. Family Programmes:

Rotary provides one of the world's largest youth exchange programs and primary school, high school and young adult clubs for future Rotarians; opportunities for spouse involvement; and a host of activities designed to help family members in growth and the development of family values.

14. Vocational Skills:

Every Rotarian is expected to take part in the growth and development of his or her own profession or vocation, to serve on committees and to teach youth about one's job or vocation. Rotary helps one to grow and share in one's own and other professions.

15. The Development of Ethics:

Rotarians practice a 4-way test that governs high ethical and moral standards. Rotarians are expected to be ethical in business and personal relationships.

16. Cultural Awareness:

Around the world, practically every religion, country, culture, race, creed, political persuasion, language, colour and ethnic identity is found in Rotary. Rotarians become aware of their cultures and learn to love and work with people everywhere. They become better citizens of their countries in the process.

17. Prestige:

Rotary members are often prominent people: leaders of business, the professions, art, government, sports, religion and all disciplines. Rotary is the oldest and most prestigious service club in the world. Its ranks include executives, managers, and professionals, leaders – people who make decisions and influence policy.

18. Nice People:

Rot<mark>arians a</mark>bove all are nice people, the nicest people on the face of the <mark>earth!</mark>

19. The Absence of an "Official Creed":

Rotary has no secret handshake, no secret policy, no official creed, no secret meeting or rituals. It is an open society of men and women who simple believe in helping others.

20. The Opportunity to Serve:

Rotary is a service club. Its business is mankind. Its product is service. Rotarians provide community service to both local and international communities. This is perhaps the best reason for becoming a Rotarian: the chance to do something for somebody else and to derive the selffulfilment that comes in the process. It is richly rewarding.

Our District is achieving well on the fourth Rotary Objective:- The advancement of international understanding, good will and peace through a world of fellowship, of business & professional persons united in the ideal of service. A brief overview of our projects shows a wonderful outreach across our world.

- 4 Vocational Training Teams (VTT) are in the planning phase for this Rotary year:
 - o Renewable Energy VTT exchange with Germany
 - Two Early Childhood Development exchanges , one with Switzerland & one with USA
 - Possible agriculture/ horticulture exchange with Nigeria
- 3 International Friendship Exchange programmes, one with Finland, one with USA and a possible with India
- International Youth Exchange Progamme . We are receiving and sending both short and long term students to a wide cross section of countries including Finland, Brazil, Columbia, Argentina , Italy, France, Germany, Spain, and now possibly Hungary and Netherlands
- Country to Country Project support programmes . We have an excellent link with Germany and are planning to formalise our links with Britain, France and Netherlands this year.
- Clubs continued contributions to Polio Plus have helped ensure that as of 1 July this year Africa(in particular Nigeria) has been polio free for a full year ! a HUGE achievement ! Only two more countries to go , Afghanistan and Pakistan and then our 30 year challenge to rid the world of polio will have been achieved!
