not interfere with donation, and as long as a person's general health is good, they are eligible to donate blood as often as every 56 days.

ASK A DOCTOR

QUESTION: What medicines would prevent me from donating blood?

Answer: Donors must have completed the course of antibiotics one day prior to donating. You cannot give if you are taking Accutane, Propecia or Proscar. Platelet donors cannot give if currently taking aspirin.

You are okay to give if you are taking vitamins, birth control pills, medicines for allergies, blood pressure, thyroid replacement, female hormones, anxiety or high cholesterol, as well as many other medications.

Always bring a list of your current medications with you whenever you give blood.

Drive Coordinator's Corner

Tips for hosting a successful blood drive:

Build a Committee As the blood drive coordinator, you want to include members throughout your organization, church or business to help get the word out. Ask people who already give blood to help organize the drive, as they make the best recruiters.

A small committee of *dedicated* individuals will be the <u>most</u> <u>important</u> step the blood drive coordinator can take for a successful drive.

Set up a "strategy meeting" including the committee and the blood center representative. Working together to design a specific plan of action is a key to success.
