Summertime and the Blood Supply is Feeling the Heat

uring the summer, community blood banks around the country deal with a change in the blood supply, as travel takes people away from school and work, where they commonly participate in blood drives.

Over 1 million people are expected to need blood this summer due in part to an increase in traffic accidents and elective surgeries. However, the amount of blood donations greatly decreases.



Throughout the school year, donations from high school and

college students account for 10 to 20 percent of the overall blood supply. High schools and colleges are important as students regularly host blood drives on campus while school is in session. However, the number of these drives decline during the summer months, when schools are closed and college campuses are nearly deserted. Students become preoccupied with their summer jobs or other activities and don't tend to give as regularly.

Blood drives hosted at businesses also decline during the middle of the year. Businesses may be reluctant to sponsor blood drives during the summer when they might be short-staffed due to employee vacations.

Make time to donate blood and platelets as part of your summer plans. Giving blood is easy, safe and takes less than one hour.

June 14 is World Blood Donor Day. As of today we have collected over 35,000 lifesaving units of blood in District 5790 since we started the Governors' Challenge Blood Drive in 1996!

We now have about 58 of the 63 clubs in the District participating. Our Collaboration with District 5810 (our friends to the East) has enjoyed an average annual growth rate of 50% in life-saving units of blood in North Texas. QUESTION: What is an automated donation?

Answer: Automated blood collection, also known as apheresis (ay-fur-ee-sis), is a special kind of blood donation that allows donors to give specific blood components, such as red blood cells, platelets or plasma.

Unlike routine blood donations where blood components are separated in a laboratory, during automated donations the components are separated as your blood is drawn. Your other blood components and additional fluids will be returned to you, so your actual volume loss is less than with a routine whole blood donation.

An added benefit is that the automated donation components do not need extra laboratory processing time and can reach transfusions patients faster.

You may also prefer the smaller needle used for these donations, and because you receive fluid replacement, you may feel more refreshed after your donation.

Blood Donation Myths

"Donated blood can be stockpiled"

Blood is a living tissue – and like most living tissues, it is perishable and must be handled with care. To maintain its life-saving properties, blood is stored in special nutrient solutions.

Nonetheless, each unit of blood can only be stored safely for up to 42 days and platelets last only five days.

Therefore, continuous, daily blood donors are vital to a healthy blood supply.

Drive Coordinator's Corner

Tips for hosting a successful blood drive:

Repeat donors; Bring'em Back. Many people who donate on a regular basis will say "yes" when asked to pledge again. One way to ensure that your donors make a return visit is to greet donors at your blood drive and ask them if they will commit to giving at the next drive.

Also, contact your local blood center representative to provide a list of donors who have given at your organization's precious drives. You may use this list to contact your donors personally.

Many organizations form telephone committees to help "Bring'em Back." When you contact a repeat donor, remember to encourage them to "Bring a Friend."
