Meetings in Review

February 2: Our speaker for the day was Jessica Saunders, Director for the Dayton Children's Center for Child Health and Wellness. The focus of the center in on prevention. A child's heath is attributed to more

than just quality healthcare it is also affected by the environment, social, genetics and behaviors that they are exposed to. The latest assessment of the health of our children here in the Miami Valley focuses on the main concerns of childhood obesity, mental health, infant mortality, asthma and injuries (which is the #1 killer of children). The Center is working on a community asthma initiative currently. Often children go without their inhalers when the parents face a choice of food or medicine. And even when they have their inhaler it does no good if they are going home to a house filled with mold. They are working to reduce the negative effects of asthma—it is a huge issue in our area. Kids are not controlled and showing up at the Emergency Room and being admitted 5-7 times a year. 14% of the students in the Dayton Public Schools have asthma. West Dayton has a much higher rate of ER & hospital admissions versus an area such as Centerville. Most homes in that area have mold and they live in an area of highways and industries polluting they air and often times it is hard for children in that area to get to the doctor. The approach they are using to work on this issue is a Community Alliance where they can make a collective impact of all groups together. Meaningful outcomes that will show the success of such an alliance would be to reduce the number of ER visits related to asthma, reduce the admissions and readmits and reduce absenteeism for students at school and parents to work. Some of the successes to date are the power in convening non-traditional partners, supplying asthma inhalers, legal interventions on behalf of the families and some of the landlords that need to improve conditions in the homes these children live in, and Alliance has been formed focused on the community versus individual organizations which allows for greater identification of barriers.

February 16: Our speaker was Bing Davis who was born in South Carolina but grew up in Dayton. Bing is an artists and he is using art as an Agent of Change to inspire young men and stay in school. Art is the vehicle through which Bing continues to teach our youth. He spoke to us about the Dayton Skyscrapers Project—Standing Tall in Our Hearts and Minds. Skyscrapers is a metaphor for African American Daytonians who made a difference by "standing tall". Young black males think that there are only three options in life to aspire to NBA. NFL or Hip Hop and Bing is trying to expand their relevant and realistic role models for life. The Dayton Boys Prep school which is on the site of the old Roosevelt High School is where 65 images of "skyscrapers" are hung throughout the building to make an impact on these young boys. Big also spoke about James Pate's KKK Series: Kin Killin' Kin - which is made up of images of African Americans killing one another to bring healing and promote unity through healing circles among these young men who see the images. Bing stated that more African Americans have killed each other than the Klan ever hung. "Be The Change You Want to See in this World". There is a curriculum with the images that has been put toghether for teachers to use in the classrooms and meets educational criteria. He also shared with us the background of the artists James Pate who was born in Alabama—no father in the picture and a mother that died when he was 3. He was raised by his grandma in Cincinnati. He was unable to complete his degree at Central State due to finances but has been supporting himself as an artist since the age of 19 and he is now in his 50s.
