Meetings in Review

most significant thing to happen to C2C in the last 18 month was their move from their former Kuntz Road location to 1750 Woodman Drive in August of 2016. They have been a partner of Goodwill Easter Seals since 2008. Goodwill provides space to rent at a good rate and they share back end services with Goodwill which saves them quite a bit in salaries. Goodwill has no governing relationship with C2c however. Their new location is much more of a retail environment and allow for them to be much more efficient. Steve shared with us a visual tour by power point of their new location. Their space allows them to be able to focus on preschool more than before. Another partner they work with is Joanne Fabric Stores which provide them with donations of seasonal merchandise that is set aside for the following year and can allow teachers to decorate their rooms. They also now have room to have a dedicated Craft Section, Writing Section, and Office Section. The total store and warehouse are 14,000 square feet (9000 of that warehouse). They also still have an offsite warehouse (8000 square feet) in the Miller Lane area with over 4 million dollars in inventory. The new store also allows for dedicated area for volunteer support activities. Monday Wednesday and Thursday from 3:00-6:00 are teacher shopping hours. They can go online and schedule an appointment to come in and shop for their classroom. Crayons to Classrooms currently serves 100 schools (in 3 counties including Dayton and Suburbs, Springfield and Xenia) where they have a 70% participation rate from teachers serving approximately 3000 teachers per semester.. On average the value to the teachers when they leave is \$890 and 90% of the products are brand new. They also have a partnership with Think TV to provide them with educational materials related to some of their programming. How can you help? Donate school supplies, donate money, volunteer in their store or host a supply drive at your place of employment.

April 17: Our speaker for the day was Norm Miozzi, Executive Director, Habitat for Humanity of Greater Dayton. Habitat for Humanity has 17 on their staff including restore employees. Their mission is seeking to put God's love into action +bring people together = to build homes, communities and hope. Children are the most valuable resource our community has and its best hope for the future. He shared with us a story about a son of a habitat owner who graduated in 2017 from Trotwood H.S. and is attending Urbana University with full academic and athletic scholarships. Who said the best thing was having a home to come home to. That allowed to keep his focus on school. Habitat offers educational classes for kids and adults on: nutritional and healthy lifestyles, child homes safety and fire prevention, money skills and financial literacy and home maintenance. Norm reported that habitat generally handles 10 new build or renovations in a year. They have been empowering families for 35 years. There are 52 affiliates in Ohio and 1300 in the United States. The try to complete new construction as much as they can with volunteers however for electric, foundation, plumbing, HVAC and roofing they hire professional contractors.

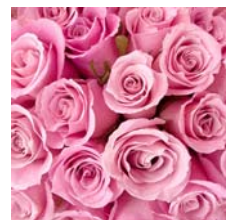


\$25 per dozen roses—Kiwanians are asked to deliver the roses that they order.

Collecting Children's Board Books

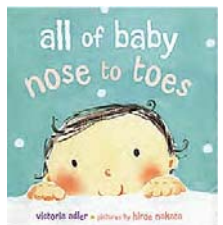


We have begun our 10th annual Board Book collection for Brighter Futures under the Help Us Grow Program. **Collection will take place April 1st—December 18th**

Brighter Futures is a comprehensive nurse home visiting program for low income, first time pregnant women. Specially-trained nurses regularly visit mothers and family members in their homes during pregnancy and teach prenatal care. After the birth, they emphasize parenting skills and healthy infant and child development.

We will be collecting Board Books for young children to read and enjoy with their parents. Nurses in the Brighter Futures program leave the books during their visits so that parents can share fun learning moments with their children. Last year we collected around 700 books! Can we match or exceed that total this year? **Let's shoot for 800 books to distribute to the children!**

We will be making the presentation of books to fellow Kiwanian Pam Albers, Executive Director of Brighter Futures in January...so we have plenty of time to collect a record number of books. Books should be new or "like new" in good condition. Board books are the thick cardboard type books for small children.
