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Meetings in Review

May 1: Our speaker for the day was Bill Pees a member of the Kettering/Centerville Club to speak to us about "The Formula" The Formula is a Kiwanis International program for growing your membership. Bill shared with us some tips based on the program. Prospecting: Make a list of personal/social family, spouse, adult children, par-

ents, cousins, neighbors and friends and church. Then a list of business/professional—co workers, guest speakers, agencies supported by your club, lawyers, CPAs, real estate agents, bankers. MDs, dentists, insurance agents, reporters and business owners. Lost members—go back to former members and see if the situation that kept them from continuing on has changed and they may rejoin. Newspapers—watch for newsmakers in your area or those who serve on other board you serve on. You should have at least 20 names to start with and select 12 names and commit to speaking in person to all 12. Invite then to a meeting and a service project. He spoke about having a tri-fold brochure for our club and a "be our guest" card. Another part of the program is cold-calling—go to a main street or a strip mall and go door to door. Set up an informal table at a local event do and drawing for a prize to collect contact information from prospective members and contact visitors who didn't join. Wear Kiwanis apparel and your Kiwanis pin when meeting with prospective members. Get the prospect talking about themselves—ask about their business. Share with them 3 things that your club does that touches lives in a positive way and let them know that in order to maintain your club's level of service, tell them how Kiwanis has impacted your life. How to overcome objections—no often means not now or maybe—never take no as a final answer the first time you hear it. And don't take no personally. You must keep following up. What if they say "I don't have time" or "I can't make every meet- ing" give what you can when you can is all that is required.

May 15: Our speaker for the day was Sue Hanna, Family Engagement Coordinator for NAMI (National Alliance on Mental Illness) and CMMC Children Matter Montgomery County). Many people are not aware of how prevalent mental health conditions are in the U.S. approximately 1 in 5 adults experiences mental illness in a given year. Nearly 60% of adults with mental illness did not receive mental health services and suicide is the 10th leading cause of death with 90% of those who die from suicide having an underlying mental illness. Mental health conditions are the leading cause of disability across the U.S. and depression is the leading cause of disability worldwide. Youth statistics; 20% of youth ages 13-18 live with a mental health condition. 50% of all lifetime cases of mental illness begins by the age of 14 and 75% by the age of 24. Suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death in youth ages 10-24 and the second leading cause in ages 15-24. Sue then shared her personal story where she had a grandmother, mother and brother all die from suicide and another brother an accidental death . Sue first came to NAMI as a family member and then later as a staff member. NAMI is the nations largest grassroots mental health organization, offering support, education and advocacy, founded in 1979, with about 1,200 affiliates across the nation and about 40 Ohio chapters. They offer support groups and educational classes facilitate y trained peers. All programs are free of charge but memberships are encouraged. Stigma free is an initiative of NAMI national as the average delay between the onset of symptoms of mental illness and intervention is 8-10 years and stigma is one of the reasons people do not seek treatment earlier. Individuals living with mental illness often face discrimination, rejection, and bullying. They and their families a=may also live with isolation, blame and secrecy. NAMI hot Topics in Mental Health Educational Meetings are held monthly at Christ United Methodist Church on the 4th Thursday 7-8:30 p.m. and are open to all interested persons.

We have begun our 10th annual Board Book collection for Brighter Futures under the Help Us Grow Program. Collection will take place April 1st—December 18th

Brighter Futures is a comprehensive nurse home visiting program for low income, first time pregnant women. Specially-

trained nurses regularly visit mothers and family members in their homes during pregnancy and teach prenatal care. After the birth, they emphasize parenting skills and healthy infant and child development.

We will be collecting Board Brighter Futures Books for young children to read

and enjoy with their parents. Nurses in the Brighter Futures program leave the books during their visits so that parents can share fun learning moments with their children. Last year we collected around 700 books! Can we match or exceed that total this year? Let's shoot for 800 books to distribute to the children!

We will be making the presentation of books to fellow Kiwanian Pam Albers, Executive Director of Brighter Futures in January...so we have plenty of time to collect a record number of books. Books should be new or "like new" in good condition. Board books are the thick card-
