TUESDAY, September 19, 2017 SPEAKER: Lela Klein PROGRAM: "The Gem City Market"

Meet at Sinclair Community College, Bldg 12, Room 231

Lela Klein is the co-founder and executive director of the Greater Dayton Union Co-op Initiative (GDUCI), an incubator for worker-owned businesses that broaden economic opportunities and strengthen blue-collar communities. With much of the West side considered a food desert by the USDA, Dayton has been ranked the second worst city in the nation for food hardship in households with children. 30% percent of Dayton households with children surveyed by Gallup reported trouble obtaining enough healthy food. Lack of access to fresh food deeply impacts the health of our community. Researchers have demonstrated that residents who live near supermarkets have lower rates of diet-related diseases than their counterparts in neighborhoods lacking food access. The Gem City Market is an innovative solution to the food access crisis in Dayton. Community leaders have come together to use a sustainable business model to move the needle on Dayton's food insecurity crisis by opening a cooperative, community and worker-owned grocery store on lower Salem Ave. The Gem City Market will be a vibrant full-service store featuring affordable, quality kitchen staples, including well-stocked fresh produce and meat departments currently lacking in the target area. Well-trained and friendly worker-owners will ensure exceptional service, and a community space will offer healthy food and nutrition classes and programming accessible to all.

Meetings in Review

August 1: Our speaker for the day was Lyle Lockwood with the Affiliate Societies Council who sponsor TechFest every year in February at Sinclair. Our Kiwanis Club sponsors the balloons for the event. TechFest is all about the

curiosity of children and exploring a career while having fun. The exhibits are all over the campus in multiple buildings on the weekend of the event. TechFest is free to all which makes it family friendly. The feature what they call INFOTAINMENT—with experiments, speaking, classroom activities and music and science. This past year there were 71 exhibits. The ASC recognizes engineering and science professionals in the Greater Dayton Area. The exhibitors include professional societies, colleg-



es, universities, government organizations and High School Clubs. Some of the more popular exhibits were the welding simulator and the soap box derby cars. The target market for TechFest is children grades 4-9 but they serve all ages and boys and girls attendance is about the same. 69% of the students are from public schools and 44% of those in attendance are from Montgomery County 70% are first time attendees and most spend 3 or more house at the event. In all the 2017 TechFest reached 2,060 youth. Personal contact is key to spread the word about this program and to increase attendance. He asked our members to help them link up with other Kiwanis Clubs to have them inform their members and their families to get involved. The 2018 TechFest will be the 16th annual event and will be held on February 17-18.

August 15: Our speaker for the day was Marianne Pohlmann, Marketing Director for Help Me Grow- Brighter Futures. She spoke to us about the mission of their programs "Our vision is to empower families with young children to succeed." They provide a range of home visiting services to educate, support, and advocate for Healthy births, Child development to the fullest potential, Strong family units, Economic self-sufficiency, and School readiness. The Home visiting Family Support Programs include prenatal programs, parent/grandparent support programs, early intervention programs and primary caregiver infant programs. They are focused on preventing infant mortality as Montgomery County is 5th worse in the country with African American babies 3x more likely to suffer infant mortality. How they are doing this: central access point—with a phone # to call in to—connect families with community partners and engaging health care providers. They employ 50 nurses and service coordinators. Home Visiting Works as shown by improved newborn and maternal health; prevention of child abuse and neglect; improved school readiness; reduced crime and domestic violence; improved family economic self-sufficiency; and greater access to community support. Early intervention programs are free to anyone however the prenatal programs are income threshold dependent. They also address safety concerns such as car seats and safety latches. One in 4 children under the age of 6 are at risk for developmental and behavioral delays and children are escaping early detection of these services and even if detected they may not get
