Meetings in Review

October 6: Our speaker for the day was International Trustee John DeVilbiss. Harry Bradbury received a certificate honoring him as Kiwanian of the Year and New Member Mindy Simes was introduced. Bobby

Beavers gave the year in review and then passed the gavel to Mark Cooper. John DeVilbiss started off the program



by inducting all the officers and board members present as this was our Annual Meeting where all the new officers terms begin. He then told us about his journey as a Kiwanian starting back in 1967 when he joined after being a Lions Club member for over a year. Once in Kiwanis he worked his way up through the ranks serving his club through committees and as a club leader. He then became the Lt. Governor in 1975-76. Served as District Treasurer and then as Ohio Governor in 2010-2011. He then had the opportunity



to run as an International Trustee in Tokyo but lost that year by 45 votes. He was encouraged by several people to run again this past year during the convention in Indianapolis and won. He spoke to us about the process with lots of

paperwork and speech giving to delegates before the convention. One thing he learned through the mistakes of others was don't rely on the teleprompter when giving your speech. As International Trustee he counsels three districts: Capital District, Montana District and New Jersey District. He must attend numerous meetings and many conference calls throughout the week. He ended with a personal story about a woman he helped many years ago who ran out of gas and how he met up with her much later and she recognized him and thanked him for what he had done so many years ago out of kindness.

October 20: Our speaker was Monnie Bush, President & Founder of The Victory Project. The Victory Project was founded in 2007 but didn't become active until 2009 as they spent 18 month doing research and development. Monnie is a former police officer and during that role he was taken back by the lack of support many families had. No male role models and often single moms turned to law enforcement officers to enforce discipline. Monnie left law enforcement in 2004 and went into the corporate community but he felt compelled to start a mission to serve young men. The Victory Project operate on the 3E Curriculum: Education (tutoring); Entrepreneurship (1st job-through Victory Landscape Management LLC); and Enlightenment (bible study & dinner every night as a "family"). The most important thing with these youth is consistency. Youth in the Victory Project Program are not "made" to be there they have to want to be there and participate. In fact there is a waiting list with over 30 people on it and interview process for students to participate in the program. Each youth who participate signs a one -year membership agreement. The Victory Project takes no government funding and no per diem per client funds. This allows them to express and share their faith openly. Their goal is to create an environment with love and accountability with a chance to develop your passions and talents for these young men. They also are trying to break the cycle of dependence on government support and poverty and violence that this youth currently live in. On the business side of The Victory Project is the landscape business that they work on the weekends—they currently have 50 contracts to manage landscaping and a tree farm to maintain. Working is the reward for these youth if they meet their goals during the week then they get to work on the weekend and make some money. The students receive help setting up a PNC savings account where they can put their pay. Last year The Victory Project issued 40 W-2s to the youth who are in their program and all but 11 of these were the ONLY ones in their household who received a W-2 for employment. What's Next: They want to increase capacity for youth; add additional businesses; franchise the concept in other areas; and start a girls program. What can WE do to help: Prayer, volunteer and give. They need tutors for homework assistance or volunteer to bring in a meal for the 6:00 p.m. dinner. They are at their facility Monday- Saturday 12-8 and are open every day of the year except Christmas Day.

Annual Book Drive to Benefit Brighter Futures Collecting Children's Board Books



We have begun our 8th annual Board Book collection for Brighter Futures under the Help Us Grow Program. Collection will take place October 1st—December 15th

Brighter Futures is a comprehensive nurse home visiting program for low income, first time pregnant women. Specially-trained nurses regularly visit mothers and

family members in their homes during pregnancy and teach prenatal care. After the birth, they emphasize parenting skills and healthy infant and Brighter Futures child development.

We will be collecting <u>Board Books</u> for young children to read and enjoy with their parents. Nurses in the Brighter Futures program leave the books during their visits so that parents can share fun learning moments with their children. Last year we collected around 400 books! Can



we match or exceed that total this year? Let's shoot for 700 books to distribute to the children!



We will be making the presentation of books to Pam Albers, Executive Director of Brighter Futures in January...so we have plenty of time to collect a record number of books. Books should be new or used in good condition. Board books are the thick cardboard type

books for small children. (No paper pages!)
