The City of Olympia is in the process of updating the local Shoreline Master Plan as is required by state law. Currently the City of Olympia Long Range Planning Commission is developing Shoreline Master Plan recommendations to present to the Olympia City Council. Meetings of the Planning Commission are ongoing and open to the public. These meetings often afford opportunities for the public and interested parties, such as OYC, to give testimony.

The end result of this planning process will mean more restrictions on what OYC can do, how it can expand and in fact, in what form it will maintain it's presence at the tip of Budd Inlet. The stakeholders include not only OYC and all other businesses located on the city's portion of Budd Inlet and who will be directly affected, but also organized groups of interested citizens. Some of these stakeholders and some commissioners have a vision of a future Olympia waterfront that does not include OYC as it presently exists. There is no doubt that the proposed Master Plan, once adopted, will significantly impact our plans to expand or maintain our facilities.

Does this mean OYC will not be at our present location years from now? Absolutely not! We are presently designated as a Conditional Use and that designation will continue. We will be able to maintain our facility in its present configuration but any attempt to expand or upgrade, as opposed to ordinary maintenance and upkeep, may be difficult. As is the case now, major rebuilding of our facilities, as opposed to ordinary maintenance and repair, will require adherence to new standards and codes but that is no different from the situation we or many businesses and homeowners face at present. Those new standards and codes, as proposed in the new Shoreline Master Plan, will, however, be much more restrictive.

OYC, through our Governmental Affairs Committee, has been monitoring the planning commissions work for the past two years. We have had committee members in attendance at almost every planning commission meeting. Through our committee we have provided testimony to the commission and the Board has provided written testimony and suggested amendments. We have, to the extent possible, coordinated with other stakeholders, such as the commercial marinas. We have met with stakeholders whose interests are not supportive of OYC in the hopes of gaining understanding and perhaps some concessions. We have also retained outside legal counsel to advise and represent us in this process. PC Jim Lengenfelder as the previous Chair and now Chairman Gary Ball need to be commended along with all other members of the Governmental Affairs Committee.

This process is important to OYC and I would urge you to consider joining the Governmental Affairs Committee as help and assistance is always needed. Please call Chair Gary Ball if you have an interest.

On an unrelated matter the OYC Audit Committee has recommended OYC clarify the method of calculation of moorage fees and establish a uniform method of calculation. The Board agreed and authorized the committee to study the matter and make a recommendation to the Board. The Board directed the committee's recommendation be as revenue neutral as possible. In so doing the committee discovered that very few slips and boathouses were uniform in size and, using a square foot calculation method for each slip and boathouse, few would have similar monthly moorage fees.

The result of their measurements and calculations results in slight increases in moorage fees for 123 slips and boathouses, mainly in the \$1.00 to \$20.00 per month range, and slight decreases in moorage fees for 93 slips and boathouses, again, mostly in the \$1.00 to \$20.00 per month range.

The Board has taken no action on the recommendation of the Audit Committee and will take no action until the committee's recommendation and reports are made available to the membership and the membership has an opportunity to comment on the issue. Any action on this issue by the Board will be announced prior to such action.

I wish to thank the Audit Committee for their work on this project.

Covered Moorage Survey

To all members of OYC

As part of our ongoing project to rebuild our covered moorage, the shed, we are now at a stage where we need commitments from members who wish to be assigned a slip under the proposed shed. There will be fourteen slips available, some of which are already committed to those on the covered moorage waiting list. If we have more commitments than slips the excess commitments will form the waiting list.

The Board has increased the moorage rates for the shed slips by \$150.00 per month. This amount, which is in addition to the standard moorage fee for each shed slip will be treated as all other OYC moorage fees and may be subject to increases or decreases as future Boards may deem necessary. OYC will be responsible for the maintenance of the new shed.

The rules governing the shed will, however, be modified so that a shed slip may no longer be transferred by the holder of that shed slip upon sale or transfer of his or her boat. While the holder of the shed slip may retain that slip if he or she sells and replaces the boat per club rules, the slip will go the next person on the covered moorage waiting list if the vessel is not replaced.

This solicitation of interest is designed simply to judge the interest of OYC members in obtaining moorage under the shed. By signing and returning this survey you will not lose your present slip in the event the shed is not built. If you are interested in being assigned moorage under the shed, please sign and return this form to the OYC Moorage Master, Bridget Shreve. Under your signature please print your name. You can place the signed form in the club mailbox immediately inside of the side door to the clubhouse or mail it to the club at 201 Simmons St. NW, Olympia, WA 98501.

ACTIVITIES & EVENTS

- 1. 9:00 AM Start of Courtesy Vessel Safety Inspections
- 2 AmeriSafe will be on site to service vessel and home fire extinguishers.
- 3. 11:00 AM & 1:00 PM Live on-site use of a fire extinguisher to put out an actual fire
- 4. 11:30 AM & 1:30 PM Experience firing a 12 ga. flare gun and lighting a hand flare.

Our own Pat Brower and members of the U.S. Power Squadron will start at 9:00 AM through the early afternoon. AmeriSafe will be on hand to service both your home and vessel fire extinguishers. We will also have four on site demonstrations using a fire extinguisher to put out a real fire. In addition you can have the opportunity to fire a 12 flare gun and the lighting of hand held flares and what drips from the flare.

Just think, you can complete your 2012 Courtesy Vessel Safety Inspection and get hands on experience in using distress flair guns and hand held flares, all in one day. For early vessel courtesy inspection call Pat Brower at 943-1678.

VESSEL PREVENTIVE MAINTENANCE GUIDE

ENGINE ROOM: Check, clean, service, repair or replace:

- 1. Shaft and rudder logs. Both propeller and rudder logs clean, adjust as necessary.
- 2. Engine lube oil, fresh and raw cooling water pumps for signs of leaking or corrosion. Include fuel tanks, lines, fittings the fuel system water separators. Include the generator.
- 3 All equipment v-belts and spares.
- 4. Through hull (sea valves) hoses and connections, especially below the water line. Two (2) clamps are recommended on all below water line hose connections. Replace any rusty hose clamps (screws)
- 5. Both main engine(s) and generator sea water strainers, remove the basket, clean & check for leaks after reassembly.
- 6. Bilge & sumps. Make sure any floating debris is removed, check all pump(s) & sump pump(s) & strainer (s)
- 7. CHECK bilge pumps & float switches make sure they work correctly *ADDING* a high water alarm is cheap insurance.
- 8. All engine & transmission fluid levels, fuel and cooling pumps for leaks. Adjust v-belts. as needed. Having spare v-belts is additional get home insurance, if the need arises. Replace pencil zincs.
- 9. Batteries, battery cable connections should be clean and tight. Check for cable chafing (A shorted battery cable is a certain

fire). Include checking your battery charger and inverter. 10. Check your hydraulic steering (pump oil level at helm wheel and hydraulic cylinder at the rudder.

COMMUNICATION AND NAVIGATION:

- 1. Radios & navigation equipment for proper operation. Clean any corroded antenna connectors. Have spare fuses for all communication and navigation equipment. Radar and GPS units often take a small mini fuse.
- 2. Navigation equipment for proper operation.
- 3. Navigation lights. Have the spare bulbs on hand

PLUMBING:

- 1. Test your potable water, flush tanks and treat if needed, change any fresh water filterS.
- 2. Potable water lines, fixtures (under the sink) for leaks.
- 3. Fresh water pump and pressure shut off switch
- 4. Head /gray water lines and holding tank & valves.
- 5. Head for proper operation and leaks.
- 6. Holding tank macerator and valves for proper operation.

FUEL TANKS:

- 1. Check fuel lines, filler hoses and hose clamps.
- 2. Check fuel filters and water separators.
- 3. Keep a spare set of engine & generator filters on hand

CRUISE REPAIR KIT: Having a box of spare common use parts on board all the time is not only an item of safety but can save you lots of money or even the cost of a tow. It can keep your 1St Mate much

happier. Some items to include:

- 1. Shaft log packing (New Teflon fabric & filler works a lot better)
- 2. Extra engine & transmission and hydraulic steering oil
- 3. Engine and generator fuel filters
- 4. Have the spare navigation, interior and interments light bulbs
- 5. Spare main & generator raw water impellers.
- 6. Main engine & generator v-belts
- 7. Varity of hose clamps and black electrical tape
- 9. Navigation, instrument and communication fuses for all equipment.
- 10. Specialty small fuses that fit your communication and navigation equipment.
- 11. Potable water filters
- 12. Common caulk & gasket sealers
- 13 A roll of duct tape and black electrical tape
- 14. Engine thermostat & pencil zincs

PFD's

You are required to have one serviceable PFD of proper size, ready and available for every person on your vessel, regardless of age. (includes a baby being carried).



The History Corner

Lisa Mighetto, OYC Historian



Pacific salmon have long been an important symbol in Puget Sound. For centuries native people revered these fish, drawing cultural as well as physical sustenance. During the 19th century commercial salmon fishing and processing became essential to the region's economy and by the 20th century a significant sport fishery had emerged. These fish (which include chinook, sockeye, coho, chum, humpbacks, and steelhead) came to represent the abundance of nature in our area as well as the perils of over-use and destruction of habitat. They also became the focus of conservation and fisheries management efforts and tension among various user groups. For more than a century, Pacific salmon have formed a center of political, economic, and cultural debates in Puget Sound. With their mysterious biology, amazing migrations, and

tasty pink flesh, salmon have captured our imaginations as well as our commercial and recreational interest. It is difficult to picture our region without them.

The OYC has been involved in this story. The Washington Department of Fish and Wildlife,



April 2012

in conjunction with the Squaxin Island Tribe, have used Island Home as a launching spot for coho, also known as silver salmon, for approximately four years. Each winter a state truck delivers the juvenile coho from the Skookumchuck Hatchery, south of Olympia, to Island Home. A temporary pipe running along the OYC bridge transports the salmon to a tribal barge, which uses the OYC's dock. These salmon, one year old and measuring three inches, are destined for tribal net pens in Peale Passage, where the tribe maintains them for several months before release.

Once released the salmon migrate through Puget Sound to the ocean, returning to the Peale Passage area during the fall of

the next year, when they can be caught by sport and tribal fishers. This program, responsible for releasing approximately 1.8 million coho, has been operating for around 30 years. Initially the transfer of juvenile coho took place at another landing north of Island Home, but



after that facility was damaged during a storm the OYC outstation became the preferred transfer point.

Hatchery specialist Lee Pilon explained how he discovered Island Home. "We just drove down the road looking for sites,"

he recalled, "and noticed the OYC's [perfect] location." He expressed deep appreciation for the OYC's permission to use Island Home as the coho transfer site, noting "the tribe feels the same way." While the state operates an extensive hatchery system, there are few programs like this one in Puget Sound that include a transfer of juvenile salmon to net pens. "The club has been very good about working with us," Lee concluded. This arrangement has been "user-friendly for us and for the fish." This is an example of how the OYC provides a public service and contributes to the community, while playing a part in the continuation of salmon runs.
