It is hoped that you have polished off the LAST BOTTLE of BUBBLY!!!

Last month the club had quite a variety of issues. We had a FIRE, BOATS TAKING ON WATER, FREEZING PROB-LEMS, VERY HIGH WIND DAMAGE and a few others!! Please remember to make sure during the WINTER months to check your BOATS and BOATHOUSES on a REGULAR BASIS! Please make sure that if you do have extra HEAT-ERS on that they aren't close to anything that could catch FIRE!! WE have a lot of boats and boathouses that need to be both chained and tied better as well as boathouses needing NEW EYEBOLTS to secure them to the docks. Please remember to check your night lights to make sure they work. We had about 20 boathouses with no lights on at night. A great idea is to put new light bulbs in as well! This next spring we will be installing new eyebolts to the club's docks and working with the members to also install new eyebolts to boathouses as well as replacing rotten wood where eyebolts are located.

Again this year I'm looking for members to serve on the Main Station Committee for 2011!! The BIGGEST REA-SON that I do this to get more members involved with our great club and to give NEW MEMBERS a Great way to not only get involved but also UNDERSTAND what is going on and why we need to FIX or REPLACE certain items. 2011 will be a very difficult year for a lot of projects. Just a few items this month to update everyone on. The buoys that were painted red and green will be returned to white.

During freezing weather the waterlines on the docks will be left to drip so please do not turn off.

Beginning January 10th the Department of Wildlife and the Squaxin Tribe will once again use our docks to transfer and transport fingerling salmon to the pens near Squaxin Island.

We will have a work party on February 19th and 20th to work on the Oyster beds. Anyone interested is welcome to join in.

There were several members who thought that one of the rules I listed in the last Beachcomber was obsolete so the IH Committee has voted to change it. It will take effect 14 days after the reading at the next dinner meeting. See the proposed change below.

Current Rule #6:

Electrical service will be limited to one connection per boat.

Proposed Rule #6:

Two electrical connections per boat will be allowed ONLY if available. During club functions or other such times that the docks are full, please limit your connection to one per boat.

Proposed Bylaw Changes

The following is a proposed amendment to the bylaws of OYC replacing Article 4, Section 4. The proposed amendment replaces the present requirement for majority vote for each candidate with a new plurality system electing the candidates with the most votes to the position(s). This will avoid the lengthy election process experienced this past election for trustees. In addition, the amendment recreates the

nominating committee as a standing committee with its members selected on a rotating basis by the chair of the committee, the PC, rather than by the Board of Trustees. This is a change from the present bylaw which vests this authority in the Board. This is a summary of the two major changes to the bylaw amendment which is printed, in full, below. Other changes of a minor nature appear but are not noted in this explanation.

The Board of Trustees has approved the amendment for submission to the membership.

Article 4

Section 4

A. Nominations: The Nominating Committee shall be a committee consisting of a chair and six active members in good standing. The Immediate Past Commodore shall serve as the Chair of the Nominating Committee and shall appoint two new committee members for three year terms. Each Committee shall present a slate of candidates, in writing, to the Secretary at the April regular meeting. The list shall consist of at least one Nominee for each position. The Secretary shall then read the list to members present. The initial slate of candidates shall be the responsibility of the Nominating Committee.

Nominations may then be made from the floor and the names of the nominees accepted by the Secretary, subject to the nominee's consent. All nominees must, at the time of their nomination, be qualified for the office for which they are nominated and be in good standing. <u>Marital</u> partners or two unmarried persons who constitute an Active or Life Membership may not hold office jointly nor serve on the same Board of Trustees. <u>Formal</u> <u>closing of the nominations shall be the last order of business prior to the distribution of ballots.</u>

B. Elections: <u>Elections shall take place during</u> the regular meeting of the Club in May of each year. The Secretary shall furnish each member in good standing present at the Club, a printed ballot containing the names <u>of all</u> nominees for each position. The election shall be by a secret ballot. This printed ballot shall also contain a provision for write-in candidates. <u>Members may vote for any eligible candidate for each open position</u>. Ballots are to be collected and counted by Trustees who are not running for office. The candidates with the most votes shall be elected to the open positions. If there are two open positions, such as with the Board of Trustees, and the two top candidates are in a tie, then they will both be elected. In the event of a tie in any position, a runoff vote on such position shall be held immediately by secret ballot with only the tied nominees on the ballot.

ARTICLE 4. GOVERNMENT

Section 1. Government

Except as provided by these bylaws, the Government of this Club shall reflect a separation of the Club's Governmental duties. The Flag Officers group shall plan, manage, and attend to the social functions and obligations of Olympia Yacht Club. The Board of Trustees shall be responsible for conducting the business and operations of the Club.

- (A)BOARD OF TRUSTEES: The Board of Trustees shall consist of the <u>Commodore, Vice</u> <u>Commodore, Immediate Past Commodore</u>, Secretary and six Trustees, elected from among active members who have been members of Olympia Yacht Club not less than two full years. The Trustees shall be elected for three-year terms, staggered so that there will be two new Trustees elected each year. The Treasurer shall serve as an advisor to the Board of Trustees and shall attend all Board meetings. No member of the Club shall hold two elected offices at the same time. Robert's Rules of Order shall govern the conduct at all meetings when not in conflict with these Bylaws.
- (B)BOARD MEETINGS: The Board of Trustees shall meet once a month and at such other times as required to conduct Club business. The Board will annually elect a presiding, nonvoting Chairman, (except to break tie votes), from among the Trustees. The Secretary shall attend all Board meetings and shall keep minutes. These minutes shall be posted and reported to the membership at the next general membership meeting following approval.

Section 2. Officers

(B) VICE COMMODORE: The Vice Commodore shall be elected from among the active members of the Club who have served at least one term in an elective Flag Office previous to his nomination for Vice Commodore. He shall assist the Commodore in the discharge of his duties, and in the event of the Commodore's absence or disability, shall officiate in his stead. *He shall report to and be a voting member of the Board of Trustees.*

(F) PAST COMMODORE: The immediate Past Commodore shall serve as an advisor to, and member of the Flag Officers Group. He shall hold office for a period of one year until a new Commodore shall be inducted. In the event the immediate Past Commodore is unable to serve in office, the Board of Trustees shall elect any Past Commodore to this office. *He shall report to and be a voting member of the Board of Trustees*.

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The History Corner By Lisa Mighetto



If our local weather has seemed apocalyptic lately, perhaps there is some comfort in realizing that OYC members have successfully tackled heavy snow, ice, wind, rain, and floods in the past. Studying history shows us that there is rarely anything new under the sun (so to speak). As the photo of the OYC's mainstation on New Year's Day in 1969 demonstrates, past members had to do their share of shoveling snow off the docks (quite a bit of snow from the looks of this photo). And the facilities at our first outstation on Flamingo Cove were routinely battered by winds, as shown in the 1965 photo of the cleanup crew removing debris. "Storms of the past winter have turned the matter of maintaining moorage at Flamingo Cove into a problem," the OYC's 1965 Annual reported. Strong winds carried the floats away, and OYC members had to reopen the path to the picnic site while clearing "a goodly share of the ground around the concrete slab." Heavy weather and fierce currents in fact prompted our predecessors to seek a new location for our outstation in the early 1970s, eventually resulting in the move to Island Home.

During the last half century, our yacht club has endured several significant weather events, including the mother of all wind storms, which occurred on October 12, 1962. The National Weather service rates this event as Washington's worst weather disaster of the 20th century. Known as the "Big Blow," the Columbus Day storm killed 47 people between Vancouver B.C. and San Francisco, including 9 in Washington. Gusts of 150 miles per hour were recorded early in the storm before power outages disabled the instruments. The winter of 1949-1950 was similarly noteworthy for being the coldest on record in Puget Sound, with an average temperature of 34 degrees over a several-month period. One storm in 1950 dumped two feet of snow on the region – and 13 people died in Washington that year of weather-related causes. The floods of November 1990 and the Inaugural Day windstorm of January 20, 1993 also deserve (dis)honorable mentions for extensive damage and widespread power outages.

The National Weather Service has predicted a strong La Nina pattern for 2010-2011, which means a colder, wetter winter for our region. So, batten down the hatches and keep safe as we look forward to warmer, drier weather next summer. Happy New Year!

The City of Olympia Planning Commission has issued draft regulations which have the potential of having significant impact on our club if finalized. The effect will be on: dredging, coverage moorage, piling repair, and live aboards as well as ability to expand our club house. The draft creates set backs and height limitations. HAPPY HOLIDAYS!!

We had some excitement in November and again the strength of OYC Members rose to the occasion. We had some wind early on in the month. Thanks to the keen eyes of some members, problems were avoided on dock. As I continue to say, thank you for all the input. If you see something that needs attention please let me know.

We also had an electrical fire at the corner of the lighthouse in the main power feed to the caretakers' house, 100 dock, 200 dock and Guest dock. This came along with snow, ice and freezing temperatures. Thanks to the assistance of Chuck Eich, Carol Robinson, Brian and Leslie Thompson, Andy Paris, Steve and Bridget Shreve, Jeff Pape, Diane (my wife), Jerry Budelman and Chuck Papiez and his crew from Capital Electric the situation was handled much faster than anticipated. We lost power Nov 22 at around 8:00pm and power was back on at 6:30am on Thanksgiving Day.

The main docks were cleared of snow by Chuck, Andy, Steve and Bridget. Salt was continually spread. We purchased and moved nearly 1400lbs of salt from the parking lot onto the docks, over half done by my wife. Chuck Eich, Chuck Papiez and Brian Thompson were paramount in getting the power back on. Jerry got the gates and alarm system up and running to help insure the security of the facility while power was out.Please give these folks a big THANK YOU!!

It is colder and many boat and boathouse heaters are coming on. Please, check where your heater exhaust and other heaters are pointing. We found a couple that are potential fire hazards pointing at flammable materials and dock structure. We had another fuel issue on dock. An ounce of prevention could eliminate future occurrences. Check your bilges and help keep contamination from being pumped into the sound. It is much easier cleaning the bilge, rather than having to try to contain contamination in the sound. Plus we don't need any extra attention from the authorities. All spills will be reported to the proper agencies as required. So, please check your boats and help keep our facility safe and clean.

Please check your chains and tie down eye bolts. Old chains and hoses should not be hanging in the water and will need to be cutoff. Due to the extent of mussel growth these are issues that have been overlooked for a long time.

Again, boathouse and boat lights, if you have a light on easily visible from the dock on your boat, I can tell if your power is on or not. Also, boathouses are supposed to have a light on making boat visible from the dock. Thank you.

CSP hours are winding down. We will have more work after the start of the New Year. Docks are being pressure washed. All cleats are being checked and repaired. Dock maintenance is an ongoing process as is piling cleaning, deck cleaning and tightening. We will be making new flower boxes for the clubhouse deck and installing over 100 new eye bolts on dock. If you need to put in any hours, please contact me. There is a Caretaker Note board at my office door and you have my phone number and email address. 360 280-5757 or oyccaretaker@gmail.com.

A final note, please check your wallet for expired gate cards, they will set off the alarm in my office and can cause problems opening the main gate.

Hoping 2011 will be a good year for boating!
