

The December Board meeting marks the last board meeting of the year. At this meeting the Board adopted the 2012 operating budget as recommended by the Budget and Finance Committee. For 2011 the club will come in under its operating budget and the 2012 operating budget is less than 2011.

The Audit Committee has completed its review of financial information from September 2010 through September 2011. The review confirmed the integrity of the books, financial accounts and the financial procedures of the club.

The capital projects of the club, such as the dredge, piles, shed, and docks are now having cost estimates provided and this will enable the Board, hopefully within the next four months, to schedule the projects and put all or some out for bid. Included as a project to be scheduled after our primary projects will be a repair and repaying of the parking lot. The repair of the piles under the caretaker's office and home is now progressing to the bid stage.

Some of these cost estimates reflect the times and environmental requirements. As an example the cost to commercially construct a dock is \$90.00 to \$100.00 per square foot, plus tax, not including the demolition and disposal of the existing dock. Each dock we are considering for replacement would cost well into the hundreds of thousands of dollars.

It is unrealistic to assume OYC can commercially contract dock replacement at this cost. We will, as in the past, need to rely upon our own labor to do as much of these projects as possible, using commercial companies only where absolutely necessary. When the time comes to do this work please make a commitment to the club to donate some of your time, labor and expertise to these projects.

The damage to the 600 dock caused by the April boat collision is now repaired and the cost is now under an insurance claim for complete reimbursement to the club.

The club has been working with members who have inoperative boats or deficiencies in boathouses in order to bring all members into compliance with OYC rules. At this point over a dozen boats and boathouses have been either brought into compliance or are in the process of doing so. Each month additional members are notified and involved in this process. The club, working through the Moorage Master, is moving towards a goal of obtaining one hundred percent compliance by the end 2012.

The issue of an operating boat, and in many cases boathouse issues, is a safety concern for the club so please make sure your boat can operate under its own power when called upon. If for no other reason, you are protecting your investment by maintaining your boat and boathouse.

The Board of Trustees would like to thank all of the committees and committee chairs whose work and efforts brought the club in under budget and who place great effort into maintaining the club and insuring it operates for the benefit of all members.

We wish all members and their families a happy and prosperous new year.

Thanks to everyone who has completed their 2011 Fire Prevention Checklist. A few members have still not completed and turned in the 2011 Fire Prevention Checklist, which was due the end of this past September. "Please" get them completed and turn them into the Moorage Master before it becomes a BOD issue. The Fire Prevention Checklist is an entire vessel & moorage A/C & D/C & systems checklist. Use it throughout the year to help prevent a fire.

Orion issues recall notice for hand-launched aerial signals

Orion Safety Products has issued a recall for two models of its hand -launched aerial signals, citing problems with the devices failing to launch and/or ignite.

The recall applies to older Orion XLT and 12-gauge signals made with orange ABS plastic. XLTs are self-contained, hand-launched signals, while 12-gauge signals have a pistol-style launch and a plastic shell.

In 2008, Orion switched from orange ABS to red-colored, glassfilled polyethylene for its better strength, durability and resistance to moisture. The last XLTs that used orange ABS in

the launch tube body expire this month, while the last 12-inch gauge shells using the orange ABS plastic expire in March 2012.

If you have an XLT signal with an orange launch tube that has an expiration date between November 2011 and December 2011, or an orange 12-gauge shell that has an expiration date between November 2011 and March 2012, you are eligible to receive a free, four-pack replacement at no cost.


Customers are also asked to submit a photo of their signals, clearly showing the expiration date and lot number. Do not ship any signals back to Orion.

Replacement packs cannot be shipped to a P.O. Box.

HOW TO HELP PREVENT A/C ELECTRICAL PLUG FAILURE.

When you are going to connect or disconnect your shore power, turn off your pedestal breaker first. It will prevent a sparking (arcing) of the contact points of both the plug and receptacle. Continuous arcing of the plug contacts builds metal high points that allow corrosion to develop sooner and prevents a solid contact of the connection points of both the plug and receptacle. Add corrosion and poor contact, then heat builds up, which causes more corrosion and compounds the failing connection, adding to more heat build up and finally MELT DOWN & A HIGH RISK OF FIRE. Yes it may be a little more inconvenient to go out and disconnect the A/C power at the pedestal before disconnecting or reconnecting your shore power however it will save you money in the long run, with longer lasting plugs. Adding electrical OX-Guard contact grease will also help prevent corrosion when added to the male plugs.

This issue of the Beachcomber begins our new delivery process, so here's a quick review of where we are:

The Beachcomber will be emailed to all members with current email addresses in our data base and if, in addition, you want to continue getting a paper copy, there will be a small fee.

Initially, the fee is set at \$2.00 per monthly copy, which is our conservative guess at a middle-of-the-road cost. Because printing and bulk mailing costs are based on the number of copies that are produced (and then mailed), the actual costs vary greatly. Advertising income offsets the costs to a greater or lesser degree, depending upon how many copies are printed and how many ads are included. Calculated costs, including postage for the different quantities are:

The History Corner

Reading is one of my favorite pastimes, especially when on a boat at a secluded anchorage. Recent conversations with several OYC members revealed that they, too, relish the opportunity to read while on board. Winter seems a particularly good time to delve into a good book, and with the encouragement of other OYC members I offer the following suggestions for nautical literature this season: The Curve of Time by M. Wylie Blanchet; Passage to Juneau: A Sea and Its Meanings by Jonathan Raban; and The Motion of the Ocean by Janna Cawrse Esarey.

All three of these non-fiction books are set at least in part in Pacific Northwest waters and all explore the heritage of this region, connecting current boaters with traditions and stories of the past. The Curve of Time is the oldest of these books and has become a classic. It recounts the adventures of a widow with five children who devoted their summers to cruising a 25-foot power boat "Caprice" through British Columbia. It is great fun to read this book while cruising north by boat, comparing modern views of Desolation Sound and Jervis Inlet with Blanchet's early 20th-century descriptions of these sites.

Blanchet and her children encounter all manner of adventures, including rough weather, treacherous rapids,

and potentially dangerous animals – and her bravery is remarkable. While her stories are vivid and lively, her portrayal of the challenges is often understated. "Johnstone Straits were running white," one brief passage reads, "and it wasn't any fun." It is Blanchet's account of the people they meet that truly sets her book apart - and her early 20th-century descriptions of the culture of First Nations peoples are particularly noteworthy.


> Similarly, Jonathan Raban's book is fun to have on board when cruising north from Seattle. His account, published in 1999, chronicles his voyage up the Inside Passage on a 35-foot sailboat. Raban is an exceptionally good writer – one that seems more at home in a library than on a sailboat. Accordingly, his narrative offers more philosophy and history than seamanship and action. "I am afraid of the sea," he explained at one point. Yet his fear did not prevent him from steering his boat - alone - through challenging seas. "The wind stung," he wrote at one point." I was soaked through with spray. The boat was beginning to crash into the troughs, going too fast for its own good." We've all been there - and for all Raban's sophisticated prose, it is easy to relate to his stories.

> Raban's recounting of George Vancouver's 18th-century voyage through Pacific Northwest waters is enjoyable and informative. Vancouver's stilted prose is difficult to read, even for many historians (Raban refers to Vancouver as an old "fogey" at one point). Yet Raban's description of Vancouver's observations of local sites and his relations with his crew - including the differences in their personalities - make for fascinating reading.

The Motion of the Ocean, the third of my recommendations, does not include much history, but like Raban's book it begins in Seattle and is exceptionally well written. In my view, the best books about cruising are reflective in nature, using the scenery and sites as a springboard for broader topics. Janna Cawrse Esarey's true-life account of sailing across the ocean with her new husband includes plenty of adventure, but it's her analysis of couple dynamics and couple cruising that makes this book worthwhile. Accordingly, this book is subtitled "1 Small Boat, 2 Average Lovers, and a Woman's Search for the Meaning of Wife."


"I [fell] in love with the sea," she explained. "Not the literal, wet, let's-go-surfing sea. Nor the Cousteauian get-a-degree-in-marine-biology sea. But the lyrical sea. The transformative sea. The sea that inspires me..." This book likens sailing to a couple's relationship – and the description of "Turning the Corner," or sailing south after exiting the Strait of Juan de Fuca, is interesting: "Turning the Corner in sailing is ... like marriage...Whatever the weather gods bring, whatever tricks Neptune plays, whatever equipment troubles you have, you just have to ride it out...you have to choose your moment wisely. And have an oceanful of good luck."

I would be glad to lend any of these books to interested OYC members; just let me know. And happy reading - here's wishing you all "an oceanful of good luck" in 2012!



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
