The New Year is upon us and on behalf of the Board of Trustees I wish all a healthy and happy new year.

Looking back over the past year, OYC can do so with pride of accomplishment. We will finish 2012 and enter 2013 with strong revenues and a balanced budget. Our Board, Bridge and committee chairs have, in the main and for the second year in a row, decreased our operating budget from the previous year. While no one can predict future events we can report our present and future finances to be sound.

All of our present and future capital projects and improvements, with exception of the shed, have sufficient funding from our reserve fund, both on hand and projected, to allow our dues, moorage fees and assessments to remain at present levels, subject only to cost of living increases. Because of time constraints on the shed permits you will be voting on a funding source for the shed which, if approved, will allow that project to proceed.

The present direction of the Olympia City Council and their recommendations for the Shoreline Master Plan and the Comprehensive Plan are increasingly pro OYC. Those recommendations recognize OYC as part of the fabric of the community and include OYC in Olympia's future waterfront on a permanent basis. OYC is one of the central and active stakeholders in this debate. Any suggestion that OYC would vacate its present location has been answered with a firm no. In short, as the cards are now on the table, OYC is here to stay.

These results are in no small part due, not only from the efforts of our Governmental Affairs committee and members of the Board, but from our continued presence through the OYC Bridge in community affairs. We play a central part in the fabric of this community whether by our presence in Lakefair, the Lighted Ships Parade, PC Budelman's Lighted ship, Foofaraw, Opening Day or any number of other contacts and events in which OYC is front and center. This central and visible presence was recognized in open comment by the Mayor of Olympia.

We are an active and identified stakeholder in the dam/mud flat estuary issue and a leading participant in that conversation. Our annual Legislative Reception which is attended by invited state representatives as well as city and port officers and elected officials puts OYC in the middle of the legislative process affecting not only OYC but all other waterfront stakeholders.

To those members who have expressed concern and perhaps skepticism regarding the continued viability of OYC please be assured we are financially sound and there is every indication we will be right where we are, in the heart of Olympia, for the next century.

I neither engage in nor particularly appreciate cheerleading nor am I one to express Pollyannaish opinions. On this occasion, however, when we are closing out a past year, I feel the foregoing "State of The Club" message needs to be given. In the face of dramatically challenging economic times and escalating costs we are welcoming new members. We remain fiscally sound without a need to increase revenues. We are a vital and visible player in the politics and environmental policies of governmental agencies that affect our club and in the policies of our city and have been successful in moving those conversations towards insuring our continued presence.

That is not to say we can rest on our laurels or that we do not have continuing challenges that need to be met. All facts and circumstances change and some of the issues we face are not yet resolved. We need to continue our ongoing efforts and continue to build a better OYC, both our physical facility and our social environment. New challenges will arise, both foreseen and unforeseen. We are, however, in a position to meet them. We are where we want to be at this point in time and we will remain so.

NOTICE RE POSTPONEMENT OF DREDGE

We have been working towards commencing and finishing our dredge project within the 2012-13 "fish window" or construction season, which ends in mid February of 2013. Our dredge permits had issued subject to the normal permit appeal periods applicable to each permit. We selected the contractor for the project based upon the lowest acceptable bid but have not signed any contracts pending the expiration of those appeal periods.

A protest was filed in the City of Olympia's Determination of Non Significance process which is part of that permitting process. We answered the concerns of that party and that appeal period expired without further challenge. Only the appeal period relating to the Corp of Engineers permits remained.

Within the past week the same party who filed the protest in the City of Olympia process filed once again in the Corp of Engineers permitting process. Basically the same issues are questioned and we immediately responded with the information necessary to allow the permit to issue.

Unfortunately the process necessary to resolve the issues raised by the protest will take time and by the time it is concluded there will be insufficient time remaining in the 2012-13 construction window to complete the dredge. In anticipation of this possibility, the club has not incurred any expenses or signed any commitments which will result in a loss of money or jeopardize the project.

Because of this pending protest we have no choice but to postpone the dredge project until the 2013-14 construction window, which we anticipate will commence in mid July of 2013 and should run to mid February of 2014. The project will be scheduled within that time period with advanced notice to you.



Island Home

I have been notified by the Dredge Committee, that during the duration of the dredge contract, it will be necessary to relocate some boats from the Main Station, to Island Home for temporary moorage. If your boat is going to be moored at the Island, please review the following information.

1. For the boats that are being transferred to the Island during the Dredge, Rule #7 of the Island Home Rules will be suspended. Note: Rule #7 should read " Moorage at any time will be limited to 16 days, and boats will be occupied by an OYC member overnight".

2. Any boat that is moored in the basin must display their emergency contact information. This information will be given to the caretaker as well. The information will consist of: The vessel name, owners name, and a 24/7 emergency phone number, or phone numbers.

3. In the eventuality of snow, you will be responsible for the removal of the snow from your boat.

4. The Island does not have an emergency power source if there is a loss of power. If your boat is going to be left unattended, you might want to consider; turning off your inverter, removing any perishable foods from your refrigerator or freezer.

5. If you plan on visiting the Island for New Years or the Sweethearts Cruise in February; there may not be dock space available (if dredging is in progress). You may have to raft onto another boat. As always dock space is on a first come basis.

6. At the completion of the dredge contract; all boats that were moored at the Island temporarily, will have two weeks to return to their Main Station Slip. Then rule #7 will again be in effect.

This dredge will only last for two months. I want to thank everyone for their cooperation, and their adapting during this process. Please be alert for the Dredge Committee's notifications.

Out Cruising......

Hope all is well with you guys! I'm sure winter is settling in around the Pacific Northwest, and *Sidetrack* is done cruising for a while. Here in Opua, New Zealand, in the beautiful Bay of Islands, we are enjoying spring (warm days, cool mornings and

evenings, with a mix of sun and

rain), with summer just around the corner. The idea of summer in December takes some getting used to, as does driving on the "wrong" side of the road, but we're working on it!

The passage from Tonga was one our best yet; the only tough part was the last 125 miles or so, when we had 15-20 knot winds and 1.5 meter waves on the nose, but it is hard to complain about that when we had days on end of great sailing and never saw winds over 25 knots or seas over 2 meters. We did a fair amount of motoring, too – whenever the winds eased and the boat speed dropped much below 4 knots; we were trying to get south and west as fast as we could to avoid any potential problems from a tropical depression that formed over Vanuatu after we left Tonga, that was predicted to (and did) track SE below Fiji, but it could just as easily have turned more southerly and come chasing after us!

We spent one night anchored at North Minerva Reef – a very strange experience, especially so since we were the only ones there. Minerva is just a fringing reef – no island – around a 10-30 meter deep, 1.5+ mile-wide lagoon right in the middle of the ocean! We cleared into New Zealand here in Opua last Monday, November 26; our total time for the 1275 nm passage from Vava'u, Tonga, including the overnight stop in Minerva, was just 11 days. We will be moving down the coast to Whangarei next week sometime; we plan to keep the boat there until it is time to head back up into the islands next fall (late April or May). Our plan at this point is to go back to Tonga for a while, then spend the rest of the cruising season in Fiji.

It will be nice to slow the pace down a bit, and not be so rushed moving from one place to the next; we covered a lot of ground since leaving Mexico in April – almost 7,000 nm – and felt at times like we were on a whirlwind tour of some of the island groups we visited.

Here in New Zealand we plan to do mostly "land cruising" – we bought a car, and will do some traveling around the country once we get the boat "tucked in" in Whangarei . We will also fly home sometime in January or February for a while to visit family and friends.

Well, that's about it for now. Say hi to the folks at OYC for us, please. I've enclosed a photo of something you are

not likely to see that often – a little bit of OYC in NZ! Take care, and have a great Holiday Season!

What is a BMP?

A BMP is a Best Management Practice. It can be low technology way of doing business. In this day and age of oversight by leasing authorities, rules and regulations, the Club's best response is a good offense. We can make a real statement to the casual citizen walking by the club on the boardwalk that we are a clean marina.

Why should we care what a BMP is?

As a business operator we are responsible not only for having our house in order but we also are responsible for any spills, discharges as well as a level of preparedness for any hazardous, toxic or oily release from our marina operations.

Implementing BMPs reduces our environmental liabilities. At the same time we send a strong message to all outside observers that the Olympia Yacht Club cares about the health of the waters that we use and want to take every preventable measure we can to keep them that way. This is why your Environmental Committee is considering applying for a Clean Marina Certification. This process certifies that the Olympia Yacht Club has its BMPs in place and is doing everything possible to ensure that our use of the Budd Inlet Boat Basin is being properly managed.

The Environmental Committee's cursory review of the club's rules and agreements about moorage, boat house, live aboard, and grid already holds the club in good stead. Add to that our use of the personal Fire Prevention check list that all of us complete each year we are ahead of the game. We will be working over the upcoming months with the Mainstation, Safety and other OYC committees to possibly update some of these OYC policies and practices to ensure compliance.

The technique for CPR has been significantly changed in recent years so you need to know the improved method that promises better outcomes and may not require the loathsome mouth-to-mouth part.

AEDs (Automated Electronic Defibrillators) are widespread in civilization nowadays, but don't assume the receptionist or cashier nearby really knows how to use it. It's easy - learn how.

When you are on the water, say in the middle of The Narrows or in remote areas of Canada, how long would it take to get an AED to you-if at all? If you or your boat-mates are of an "age" or have heart issues, consider the purchase of one to have on the boat. Warning, they are expensive (\$1,100 or more), but for treatable heart conditions, nothing can save a life as these devices do.

Safety Committee Richard Erwin, Chair



The Safety Committee would like to "Thank" everyone for all the efforts in having another safe Special Peoples' and Parade of Light Ships. It continues to demonstrate our cruise committees' and memberships' safety efforts. "Good Job" everyone.

With winter storms and cold weather, do not forget to check your mooring lines, boat house chains and power cords. I always twist my power cord plugs a few times to remove any corrosion build up (make sure the locking lugs secure the plug) For years I have added a anti corrosion grease to my dock power box and boat plug to prevent the corrosion that leads to plug burning and failure. I have not had a plug failure now that I use those procedures. Preventive maintenance saves a lot of time and money.

Remember the docks are slick and frost & ice is sometimes hard to see. Use extra caution and you can spread salt from the dock salt containers if you find ice on the docks.

IF YOU SEE A SAFETY ISSUE LET THE CARETAKER, MAIN STATION CHAIR OR SAFETY COMMITTEE KNOW.

Guess who fell in the water? --- did not follow good safety practices and has egg on his face? **ME**, your Safety Chair. I ignored all the normal safety precautions I always take when working close to the "can fall in the water" situations. In addition, my mind tells me I am 40 something but my body and strength is 73+, and I have some added physical limitations with bad shoulders, limited upper body strength and a right hip that needs rebuilt. Being men, we tend to think we can do what we used to be able to do and live in a fog of false reality....not recognizing the real limits of declining abilities and strength. Maybe you're not that way, but I tend to be - - and I often catch myself and stop, so I do not exceeding my limitations and safety issues.

I was working in the back corner of my boathouse, on a task beyond easy reach. The contractors had left their tender tied to the back of the boat so I thought - - no problem, I'll use the tender to get to the spot I need to fix. I did not unlatch my swim step ladder as I was going to be in the tender - - no need to. I untied the tender and maneuvered to the location I wanted to be, did not tie the tender off at my work area as it was a simple fix. I completed it and then saw another spot just a little further away - Oh, I can just adjust my position and I can fix it while I'm here.

I put my feet on a steel bracket to hold me in place, shifted my weight to get to where I needed to be, the tender went one way, my feet still on the bracket, I was holding onto the tender and now suspended over water. I had time to think about it, "don't panic, I know I am going to get real wet and cold". I could not hold on much longer. "Splash," I was under water. When I came to the surface, I tried to get in the tender but my winter clothing was real heavy and with reduced upper arm strength, I could not get into the tender or onto my swim step.

I know not to panic, that I had not unlatched my swim step ladder so I could climb out of the water. I knew Bill Garson was in his boat house next door. Rather than struggle trying to get out and get out as fast as I could (hyperthermia) I called for HELP.

Thanks to Bill Garson and his daughter Beth, they came right over, unlatched my swim step ladder and assisted me getting out of the water. Moments later new members, Dennis Backstrom and, Mike and Diana Fife (the new owners of NADIA they purchased from PC Fred DeBolt) were there to help. Dennis and Mike followed me up to the clubhouse for a hot shower while Diana retrieved some dry clothes from my boat.

Then the hardest part, going home and tell my wife I had fallen in due to being careless. We won't go into that conversation, however I did wonder how much my wet clothing weighed - - A lot of water had drained before it was put in a plastic bag, however it still weighed 26 pounds the next day. I would think it would have been 30+ pounds when I was getting out of the water. I was surprised at how heavy I felt.

I have thought about all the safety steps I did not follow, how quickly a simple project can go wrong, how hard it is to get out of the water with heavy wet clothing added to being older and not as physically capable. Perhaps knowing Bill Garson was next door, I could skip the few moments it takes to unlatch the swim step ladder or tie off the tender for safety. I was lucky. I got out safely, however my falling in the water WAS ALL AVOIDABLE and was my own failure to follow good safety procedures. I hope my sharing my experience will remind others to follow good safety procedures and not take short cuts.

I again want to say "Thank You" to Bill and Beth Garson, Dennis Backstrom, Mike and Diane Fife for coming to my rescue.
