The Board of Trustees, recognizing that all financing options had been explored, reluctantly removed the rebuilding of the Shed as an OYC project. It was never a question of the value of the shed to OYC or the direction by the membership to rebuild the shed. As in most matters it turned upon the financial demands of our club and the prioritization of other approved projects to fit into those finances. There simply was no financially responsible method of proceeding with the shed in light of other priority commitments.

We have a new Main Station Chair, PC Jerry Budelman who takes over from our interim chair, George Baker. By the time this is published we will have a new main station caretaker and we will be settling into our cruising season.

I welcome as new Trustees to your Board, Dr. Theresa Madden and Bob Wolf, who will assume those positions in June. Both come with significant qualifications and experience and, along with the senior members of the Board, will maintain the club in excellent standing. Vice Commodore Jeff Pape, who will be on the Board as Commodore, has been a Trustee and Chair of the Board in the past and his council and experience will only add to the strength of the Board.

Concluding our terms on the Board will be I, Bruce Snyder and Commodore Mike Contris. Both Bruce and Mike have been invaluable members of this Board. Bruce, on many occasions, when the Mainstation Committee was in between Chairs and with the help of that committee, carried the Mainstation. The time and effort he has expended has been substantial and his council both to the board and me personally will be missed. Mike maintained the dual role of Trustee and Commodore. Mike had earlier served as a trustee and Board Chair and his contributions on both Board and Bridge will be missed.

In my three years on the Board I have had the pleasure of working with Board members, members of the Bridge, committee chairs and individual members, all who contributed positive service and support to this club. We have accomplished much on behalf of the club and those of us leaving our positions are leaving the club in a better condition than when we began.

We are leaving a club that is financially sound with, other than cost of living increases, no present need for increases in dues, assessments or moorage rates. All of the club's capital projects and operating expenses are fully funded or provided for with a sufficient emergency reserve set aside. Our future financial analysis shows a club that remains solvent.

Through the persistence of Rick Bergholz and his environmental committee, we have attained a "Clean Marina" classification with all of the positive environmental and public relations benefits that will bring. We continue to be a central and visible force in our community and, through the Anchorettes and their charities, continue to give back to that community. Our Juniors program run by PC Bob Connolly is insuring future sailors and members. Considering the contributions of these and many other members, it is with a sense of pride that you should look upon your club.

While there are always differing views and opinions, I have found no members who were not genuinely concerned with the club and its future. There have been disagreements over policy and decisions made but I was never of the opinion that the Board was not supported and the Board strived, even in areas of disagreement, to respect both the opinions and the individuals who appeared before us.

I would like to thank the membership of OYC for giving me, Bruce and Mike the opportunity to hold the positions to which we were elected. It has been an honor to serve as Chairman of your Board and it is something I will always look upon with pride and consider a significant personal accomplishment.

As I have always stated, no one joined OYC just to serve in the governance of the club or the Bridge. Please participate when you can, use your boats, enjoy the club and its facilities and your fellow members.

WORK A PALOOZA

Spring has definitely arrived, and it appears that summer is not far off.

On April 27th we had our annual Island Home "Spring Clean and Improvement Cruise". The IH committee; PC Tom Skillings, Laura Skillings, PC Matt Mills, Tim Maxey, Earl Hughes, Mike Minton, Dan Martin, Rick and Barb Bergholz and Bill Thomas had a pretty ambitious program this year. The weather was good, and we were able to accomplish the following: spread 15 ton of driveway gravel (donated by the WDFW), spread and grade 15 ton of recycled asphalt (provided by PC Tim Ridley), spread 21 yards of beauty bark on the trails to the North point of the island, relocate and restack 6 cord of wood, cut-up split and stack an Alder tree that fell across the upland trail, plant some perennial flowers, put wood preservative on the swing set and the Bobby Brown fire pit, replace the swings and trapeze, repaint the bridge edge rails, till and rebuilt the planting area behind the clubhouse, super clean the clubhouse, build 3 oyster rafts and 20 grow bags.

And everyone that brought wheel barrows, shovels and rakes. 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Our History



W. J. "BILLIE" FOSTER, (1867-1952) Olympia's First Commodore

Bits of early history of the Olympia Yacht Club published in various Year Books of the Olympia Yacht Club over the past ten years have served to stir up more and even earlier memories among the few remaining who recall the true beginnings of boating in Olympia.

These stirrings have brought to light many hitherto obscure facts concerning events which occurred at or near the turn of the century. Bit by bit your editor has pieced together from conversations with Mrs. W. J. Foster and from information which she sent us in a letter several years ago the historic facts herewith presented. As a followup to last month's column, here is a reproduction of another OYC history written 60 years ago. It describes W.J. "Billie" Foster, the first commodore of the predecessor of the OYC, and the early days of "the Olympia boating fraternity."

W. J. "Billie" Foster was the first commodore of the predecessor of the Olympia Yacht Club and as nearly as we can trace the origin of that club it was organized about 1906 as the Olympia Boat Club. But even earlier than that—close to the turn of the century—Captain Billie Foster was busy with his beautiful 30-foot sailing sloop DAPHNE upholding and defending the racing honors of the South Sound area.

Mrs. Foster recalls that in those days, even as now, the Seattle Yacht Club was the "high and mighty" of Puget Sound yachting and held about all of the sailing titles—that is, until Captain Billie Foster and his crew came along with DAPHNE.

One day the mails from Seattle brought to Olympia a challenge from the Seattle Yacht Club for Captain Foster and his upstart crew to produce DAPHNE on the Seattle waterfront in answer to a challenge to meet SYC's 30-foot sailing champion.



Nothing could have given Captain Foster and his youthful crew greater pleasure, and at the appointed time DAPHNE was there. The race course is hazily recalled as a triangular one in Puget Sound off Elliott Bay. Anyway, the picture shown herewith gives you one leg of the course because the two vessels were on a northerly course midway between Magnolia Bluff which shows at the right background of the picture and West Point on the extreme left. The picture shows DAPHNE overhauling and about to pass her SYC challenger. Mrs. Foster recalls that DAPHNE took the lead a moment after this picture was taken and was never again headed.

Just added to the trophy case of the Olympia Yacht Club and quickly becoming its most historic piece is a silver mug presented to Captain W. J. "Billie" Foster by his crew and most of the names on the cup will be well remembered by early members of the Olympia boating fraternity. They were: First Officer, H. H. Cowles; Boatswain, D. A. Williams; Ablebodied Seaman, E. A. Graves; Cabin Boy, E. K. Reynolds; Ass't Cabin Boy, J. K. L. Mitchell; Musician, George G. Mills.

Bright Angel



After a feverish three weeks in the yard, and another week at the dock, our list of boat projects is all but "ticked off" (as they say here in "N Zed"), and *Bright Angel* is almost ready to head back to the tropics for the winter - and none too soon, as the weather

here is turning cold and wet, much like a Pacific NW fall!

All in all, *Bright Angel* fared quite well on her 7000 nm voyage across the Pacific last year - most of the work was maintenance, although we also had the bow pulpit straightened (after we were hit when another boat drug anchor during a squall in Moorea) and we replaced the last two of the original 23 year-old stainless steel water tanks that were rusting apart at the seams (all five of our water tanks are now plastic). The marine trades industry here in NZ is top notch, as you might imagine, and right on the premises of the yard where we hauled out there is a general boat works shop, a stainless steel fabricator, a painter, an engine repair shop, and a well-stocked chandlery - "sweet as" - so it is easy to "get things sorted."

Linda is now busy provisioning for our passage back to the islands, which we have decided means going to Fiji instead of back to Tonga. That also means Linda will have to make me a "sulu" (a wraparound ankle length skirt) before she stows her sewing machine, so I will be properly attired for "sevusevu" - a traditional Fijian ceremony where visitors present kava root to the village chief before being given permission to stay and visit.

We are looking forward to a much slower pace this cruising season, with the only long passages being from here to Fiji (about 1200 nm) and back again in the spring (November). Next week we will start looking for a "weather window" to jump. Although for the start of the passage we will be dressed in foulies and long johns, the shorts and tee shirts will soon come out of hiding temperatures in Fiji are now in the high 80's and low 90's!

WHAT'S IN YOUR DOCK BOX?

Last year my moorage spot at the club changed and along with it I had to move to a different dock box. I knew what was on top of my "storage stack." A hose and a bucket used to clean the boat. But as I started to dig deeper there were discarded boat parts for a previously owned boat as well as several containers of cleaners one of which had lost its label. This article is not about my hording habits but what we should do to keep our dock box safe. Let's review them:

- Inspect the box at least annually. A good time to do this when you complete the annual OYC Fire Prevention Check List.
- Line the bottom with a trap. Adding an oil absorbing pads to contain any spills is a smart idea.
- Store all cleaners, paints, and chemicals safely in closed containers
- Label all containers

• Store only what you need for the job you're doing. Have you gone through your dock box this spring?

Please remember hazardous materials in vessels, dock boxes and boathouses must be in original containers in amounts appropriate for the intended use and not to exceed 1 gal. Fuel can exceed one gallon if in an approved marine container.

COUNTERFEIT PORTABLE FIRE EXTINGUISH-

ERS: The U S Coast Guard has reported counterfeit portable dry chemical extinguishers with the labels of Amerex and Buckeye. Both companies are major producers of genuine approved fire extinguishers, however the counterfeit dry chemical extinguishers may not have fire retardant power, functioning gauges and are not DOT approved. They are size B-11 and have several distinguishing features such as duplicate serial numbers, Amerex sr. # 8740;V-65490 and Buckeye sr. # 8470;K-094927 with a red handle and sr. # 8470;YMU6222 with a black handle. The labels on the counterfeit extinguishers are simple printed labels, genuine extinguishers have security printed labels, Amerex with a series of scored circles and Buckeye with S scored in the labels. They are not date stamped or DOT stamped on the extinguishers. If you find suspected counterfeit extinguishers please take pictures of the front, side and bottom of the extinguisher and submit to: mtypeapproval@uscg.mil with a copy to anticounterfeiting@us.ul.com.

SAFETY EQUIPMENT: If you want a safety ladder or new improved CO detector please email me <u>Erwins11@juno.com</u> and let me know. I don't always remember those who see me on the docks and say "OH – I want to get a - - - - " so I am working from the emails from those who request them. The billing is the Quartermaster procedure where I write up an order/receipt, you sign and I give it to Jon who bills you in your regular moorage billing. There is no profit or markup in the safety items, it is a straight pass-thru for safety equipment. We were able to get direct bulk purchase prices and save you about \$30.00 on the ladders and \$20.00 on the CO detectors. We only have 3 SS ladders left – 1st come 1st serve.

Ladders : Including sales tax \$ 190.59

CO detectors: including tax \$54.93

Marine Technologies new Model 65-541 CO detectors are packaged it boxes of 96. We need to have a commitment for most of them before the BOT wants to pay the up front cost. To date we only have 14 requests for CO detectors. If you are so inclined, please email me with your request so it can be added to list. IT IS NOT A RE-QUIREMENT THAT YOU MUST HAVE a Safety Ladder or CO Detector. The value you put on your safety and others is your choice. The Safety Committee has worked diligently to save members money with bulk purchasing of items you have shown an interest in. If you have a CO detector in your vessel and it is 5 years old or older it most likely non functional. The old style detectors had a 5 year life at best. Problem is they do not signal when they no longer work. The Marine Technologies #65-541 the same size as the old style for easy replacement however it has major technical improvements in CO detection & weight averaging, sealed electronics for use in saltwater environments. They are a direct replacement for the old marine CO detectors and are 12 to 16 volt direct wire .06 amp draw. All CO detectors have a life expectancy of about 5 years and include an end of life alarm so you know when to replace it.

EMERGENCY CONTACT DATA. Many slips have missing or non readable emergency contact and vessel data information. Make sure yours is current, easy to find and read. The Safety Committee will confer with Mainstation Committee to have a standard for size and information on the contact forms.
