

The Department of Licensing no longer mails paper renewal reminders to boat and watercraft owners. However, they will be sending out **email reminders** on June 9 to those who have signed up online.

Board of Trustees Actions



During the September 14, 2011 Board of Trustees meeting, PC Ted Shann requested that the Bylaws Committee prepare a revision to Article 3, Section 5 of the OYC Bylaws. Specifically, the amendment needs to "...reflect that dues shall be paid on a monthly basis rather than quarterly." To fulfill this request, changes are needed to two sections in Article 3 Membership of the bylaws; Section 2 Classes of Membership and Section 5 Dues.

Existing:

Section 5 DUES.

Shall be as follows:

A. Active Member and Associate Members – per annum, payable quarterly, in advance:

Dues: 2004 - \$200.00; 2005 - \$233.00; 2006 - \$266.00; 2007 - \$300.00; 2008 - \$333.00; 2009 - \$366.00; 2010 - \$400.00; 2011 - \$400.00 + CPI thereafter annually

B. Jr Members – 15% of Active/Associate member Dues - per annum, payable quarterly in advance.

Proposed amendment with track changes:

Section 5 DUES.

Shall be as follows:

A. Active Members and Associate Members - \$\frac{\$400 + Consumer Price Index}{Price Index}\$ per annum, payable monthly quarterly, in advance:

Dues: 2004 - \$200.00; 2005 - \$233.00; 2006 - \$266.00; 2007 - \$300.00; 2008 - \$333.00; 2009 - \$366.00; 2010 - \$400.00; 2011 - \$400.00 + CPI thereafter annually

B. J<u>unior Members – 15% of Active/Associate member Dues - per annum, payable monthlyquarterly,</u> in advance.

Proposed amendment without track changes:

Section 5 DUES.

Shall be as follows:

A. Active Members and Associate Members – \$400 + Consumer Price Index per annum, payable monthly, in advance:

B. Junior Members – 15% of Active/Associate member Dues - per annum, payable monthly, in advance.

Section 2 Classes of Membership

Section 2(c)(2)

Existing:

The initiation fee for junior membership shall be approved by the Board of Trustees as recommended by the Juniors Committee. Quarterly dues for junior members shall be established at 15 percent of the quarterly dues paid by active members. Junior members shall be exempt from payment of bond interest and special assessments.

Proposed amendment with track changes:

The initiation fee for junior membership shall be approved by the Board of Trustees as recommended by the Juniors Committee. MonthlyQuarterly dues payments for junior members shall be established at 15 percent of the monthlyquarterly dues payments for paid by active members. Junior members shall be exempt from payment of bond interest and special assessments.

Proposed amendment without track changes:

The initiation fee for junior membership shall be approved by the Board of Trustees as recommended by the Juniors Committee. Monthly dues payments for junior members shall be established at 15 percent of the monthly dues payments for active members. Junior members shall be exempt from payment of bond interest and special assessments.

This is the perfect time have both your home and vessel fire extinguishers checked and serviced. Learn first hand the simple steps to keep dry chemical extinguishers fresh and ready to use at home and on your vessel.

Many of you know OYC has modified the Boathouse Standards that allow aluminum exterior and require fiberglass type light & burn out panels in the roof. A good example of why the burn out panels are so important is a March 30, 2012 fatal marina fire in Bellingham. The fire leveled a private large shed style boathouse at the Squalicum Marina. The 5:30 blaze that destroyed 12 boats was reported by one of the two who were killed in the fire. They called 911 and reported fire and they were trapped in their vessel. The cause is under investigation and may be related to previous damage to a main electrical conduit serving the facility in a previous accident.

Looking at the photos and checking on the facility, it was a wood structure with sheet metal roof and sides. The solid tin roof appears to not have burn out panels and only twisted and buckled keeping the fire inside until the entire wood structure burned away, and the roof settled over the top of the debris. This tragic event only reinforces why we are so active in our fire prevention program. It only works if everyone seriously takes an active part in our fire prevention program.

The History Corner

Lisa Mighetto, OYC Historian



The OYC's historical records include membership applications dating back to the 1930s. These provide a fascinating look at how the club has changed over time, in terms of finances, types



of boats, and social conventions. An application from 1938, for instance, reveals that during the Great Depression the OYC charged an initiation fee of \$12.00 and dues amounting to \$1.50. Another application from 1940 lists a moorage charge of \$5.00.




There are nearly a dozen applications from the Schmidt Family, including one from Leopold Schmidt, who founded the Capital Brewing Company at Tumwater Falls in the 1890s. In 1902 his firm became the Olympia Brewing Company, which gained international fame with its slogan "It's the Water." Leo Schmidt's application identifies his residence as the

"Elks Club" and lists no boat. Other members included Adolph Schmidt, who helped found the Capital-to-Capital Race and Peter Schmidt Jr., who in his youth served as commodore of the Junior Yacht Club.


Trueman Schmidt's application, dated 1956, is interesting for the increase in fees as well as the line labeled "wife's name," revealing the assumption that only a man would be completing the form. He listed "brewing" as his business. By the early 1980s the Schmidt Family had sold the brewery and the facility was closed in 2003. The OYC's membership applications provide a brief glimpse into this story, demonstrating how our club's history is connected to the development of the larger community.






