o here I am at my penultimate Commodore's newsletter, looking back on the last three years and wishing to share some of our experiences going thru the chairs. As I've mentioned to many of you, I started on the bridge feeling like I was 'taking one for the team', not expecting to have it be anything but a great deal of work. Even with the promised (and delivered) support of PC Leslie Thompson and PC Carol Robinson, I was fairly apprehensive of my ability to pull off the effort.

And then...

The first event with the Grand 14 was the August Officer's Cruise-in at Bremerton Yacht Club, where we first met BYC RC Rob Bruins and Tacoma Yacht Club RC Alan Rencowski, as they helped me back into a slip at BYC (not my favorite maneuver, half the time I make it look like I

know what I'm doing and the other half I'm sideways and looking like an idiot). That began something that I was hard pressed to explain to others in our club at the time... the benefit of our connection with the other clubs in the Grand 14. It has come to me over the last 3 years why the G14 is important to OYC: relationships. We all build our lives around relationships: our families, our friends, our co-workers. I now understand why every PC I've talked with has stated that serving on the bridge has been one of the best things they've ever done!

We'll be attending several more Commodore Balls thru June, with the last actually occurring at Port Orchard YC after our Change of Watch on June 5th. I look forward to beginning work on the October Commodore's Ball and helping find folks to serve our club next year.

The May dinner meeting is our annual election meeting at which we elect our Bridge and two new Board members. Please plan on attending, at least to vote for the candidates of your choosing. It is the primary way you can influence the direction and governance of your club.

The Bridge, with the cooperation of the Board, has set aside a portion of the May dinner meeting to acknowledge each OYC Committee Chair for their work on behalf of the club. This is the second year in a row that we have done this and acknowledgement of the efforts of these members is well deserved.

April has been a month of coasting, so to speak, regarding projects and the work of the Board. The club remains actively engaged in the politics of the Shoreline Master Plan as well as in our major projects. We are yet in the search for a new Main Station Caretaker and hopefully that search will have ended by the time this article is in print. In the meantime our Mainstation Committee headed by George Baker and with special help from committee member Andy Paris have pulled the heavy oar.

Ongoing maintenance projects of note include a replacement of the sanitizer/dishwasher in the galley, a revision of the Clubhouse shower and a remodel of the Caretakers cottage bathroom. These projects were headed by our Clubhouse Chair, PC Carol Robinson as to the sanitizer and our Main Station Chair, George Baker regarding the other tasks.

A special thanks to our Anchorettes who, with a contribution from the Clubhouse committee, purchased new silverware for the galley to be used for special occasions.

Our efforts to attain a "Clean Marina" environmental classification are moving forward through the efforts of Rick Bergholz and his committee. We expect to attain that designation in the near future. It is our goal to be recognized as a leader in maintaining our marine environment to the highest standards. Once attained we will be acknowledged along with only a handful of other Yacht Clubs in the Salish Sea to have attained that designation.

The dredge permitting is on schedule with National Fisheries acknowledging our mitigation proposals and moving the permits through the final stages of the process. We are on schedule to have the permits in hand and to commence the dredge project in the fall of this year. Additionally, we are continuing to move the piling project permits forward with a view of accomplishing that project concurrently with the dredge.

With Opening Day just a few weeks away please plan on using your boats and enjoying the club and its facilities for the purpose for which you joined. I hope to see you on the water.

Board of Trustees Candidate Statements

OYC Board of Trustees Candidate Bob Wolf

Sandy & I bought our first serious cruising vessel in 1988 but didn't join the Olympia Yacht Club until February 1990. We were already members of the Olympia US Power Squadron, taking classes to enhance our boating skills, when OYC members we met while cruising South Sound waters, invited us to join; PC Tom Skillings sponsored us.

We have been residents of Thurston County since July 1987; however, we had been boaters when the Army allowed, since 1966. We finished 30 years in the US Army here and then I taught social studies at Capital High School for ten more years. During the 23 years we have been active in OYC I have served 15 years on committees such as Chair of the Finance Committee, Chair of the Long Range Planning Committee and as a Board of Trustee member. Sandy and I have also worked on other projects such as cruises at Island Home, the Lunch Bunch, setting up for dinner meetings and many work parties at Island Home.

Many are wondering why I am running to be a trustee again. (Sandy has asked the same question.) The answer is, I want to ensure that OYC remains in its present location as a viable yacht club for our children, grandchildren and the community at large where we contribute annually by sponsoring/co-sponsoring many civic events such as Foofaraw, Special Peoples Cruise, Parade of Lighted Ships, Lakefair Princesses Cruise to Island Home and the junior sailing classes which have been growing more popular each summer. These sailing classes are planting the seeds for future members. We need to continue to develop programs that will strengthen our connection to the community

The "Purpose of the Olympia Yacht Club", clearly stated in our By Laws, "is to encourage and promote yachting, the science of seamanship and navigation, and to provide and maintain suitable facilities for the use and recreation of its members". This highlighted portion of OYC's "Purpose" is critical for our current members and daily operations and requires the attention of our Board of Trustees continually. This organization is no longer a small business; it has projected revenues for 2013 of approximately 940K, projects approved and/or scheduled with a cost of about 2 million dollars; all being supported by roughly 240 active members with their discretionary dollars. It is critical that these dollars are managed closely and provide the most for each dollar committed. We also need to boost our active membership to the 275-285 level which history demonstrates is OYC's "sweet spot" for active members. Our challenge is to develop an OYC Marketing Plan to find and accept 40 new members (plus any demits) in the coming 24 months. With my experience in so many of these issues, I bring valuable background and expertise to the Board. Further, since I am retired I have the time and energies to ensure my priorities as stated above are continually in the vision for OYC while maintaining safe/updated facilities at both main station and Island Home. Please allow me to serve you, protect your boating investment in OYC, and keep OYC a valued part of the South Puget Sound.

OYC Board of Trustees Candidate Theresa Madden

Most of you know I joined the club in 2009 and have a small Power Boat on 500 dock and a sailing catamaran in the Sunsail Charter fleet in Tortola, BVI. I am running for the Board and would appreciate your vote. I have volunteered in excess of the CSP requirement to help make events a success. Mike Contris asked me to serve temporarily as Fleet Captain Power, when no other member came forward mid-term. Please vote for Gary Waldherr, who is running for the 2013-2014 position. He will make a terrific new Fleet Captain!

I have served on 6 Boards in the past, including the Portland Opera, Virginia Garcia Memorial Health Centers Foundation, American Association of Women Dentists. I worked my way up the officers position of Multnomah Dental Society and an international dental research organization called SCADA. In addition, I served on 7 Steering or Executive Committees of multicenter clinical research project, with budgets in excess of \$25 million collectively. I know how to balance a budget and run a small business.

My publication list includes 23 original research papers, 5 book chapters, 10 articles and 33 abstracts. Some, you might even enjoy reading! I recently earned International Bareboat Skipper certification with the American Sailing Association (level 104).

My leadership style tends toward the analytical, cooperative, seeking consensus and compromise. However, I will make a firm stand when necessary. I promise to bring a thoughtful, level head to the position.

The Olympia Yacht Club has a lot of things going for it and always has. The oldest yacht club on Puget Sound with a very participatory membership. However, we are faced with multiple expensive maintenance issues. While many were very upset when the shed came down (before my time), the recent vote indicates members aren't willing to take out a loan to rebuild it under a "condo" situation. I was glad to hear Walt's report about possible alternate options now that the dredging is delayed. This may already be decided before I would theoretically take office. If not, I pledge to continue to seek reasonable solutions.

I would guard against placing the club in a financially precarious position for any reason. In these times, it only takes a few poor choices by a organization's leadership to run it aground. We can learn from a local country club which has been forced to sell out to a commercial entity. I promise to protect our assets assuring another century of greatness.

Lastly, I have a real interest in growing the club and expanding the roster with additional desirable members sharing a real interest in safe boating. This takes constant outreach, which I believe is an important responsibility of each Board member. Fleet Surgeon

Richard Hurst, M.D ("Rich")



The several days of sunshine and almost warm weather brings up the subject of cold water survival.

For those of you who are also lake boaters and fishermen, remember that most of our lakes are snow melt-fed and are barely above freezing this time of the year. The Sound is minimally warmer at a chilly 45 degrees.

If you go into water that cold, the first thing may be a gasp reflex that may suck cold water into your lungs and without a life jacket to hold you up, that might be your last breath. Shortly after that, you have your best time to do something – inflate your vest, pull out a knife to free yourself if trapped, call or whistle for help, pull down a ladder, or swim to a nearby float. Within minutes, your ability to do anything requiring dexterity will be lost and that includes the ability to assist in your own rescue. You won't be able to board your swim ladder, turn on a light or MOB device, grab a float, or don and buckle your PFD. Keep as much of your body out of the water as possible. Water will suck away vital heat much faster than even a cold wind. With a PFD on, you can assume a fetal position that covers your greatest heat loss zones. Thrashing around increases your heat loss as warm blood gets shunted to your muscles.

Re-boarding the boat will be incredibly difficult. Rescuers should count on no help from the victim. The clothing will be heavy and wet and their strength nil. The LifeSling is invaluable for sailboats which commonly have a high freeboard. The sling will work for powerboats as well, but they may not have a winch that can be used.

The victim needs a mindset for survival. Think ahead to being warm at the hospital. Many have seemed to muster all their resources to the rescue, then fail to leave enough left over for the recovery. They just collapse even as they are rescued.

Re-warming with warm liquids and skin to skin body contact under covers may be sufficient for lesser exposures, but EMT care is critical for the longer exposures which may frequently progress to a stage with no shivering (bad sign). Very slow heartbeat and breathing may be a sign of extreme cold, but CPR is frequently NOT indicated in these situations until the person has been warmed. People's brains and bodies have survived incredible periods of cold exposure intact with proper care.

The adage is: No one is considered dead until they are warm and dead.

So.....

- Wear a PFD either always or at least appropriately for the boat or the conditions.
- **Don't intentionally go into the water** or tempt fate...Guys, you know who you are!
- **Lifesling** get one and sign up for a practice event.

outfit that provides food and medical care for animals that otherwise might suffer.



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
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The History Corner

Our History

The first boating society in Olympia, which later grew into the Olympia Yacht Club, was organized in 1889. William J. Foster was elected Commodore, and although "Billy" Foster sailed one of the crack sailboats of the lower sound, he also pioneered in motor-driven craft.

Bicycling and other sports turned the interest away from motor boating around the turn of the century. The operator of an early-day steam launch had to be somewhat of an engineer, and the internal-combustion gasoline engine had not yet been developed into its present state of high reliability. The old naptha launches, using the vapor-pressure of naptha "boiled" at low temperature and pressure, operated somewhat similar to a steam launch, but were eleganor and quieter to handle but were cleaner and quieter to handle.

By 1909 a sufficient number of boating enthusiasts existed to organize the Olympia Yacht Club. The meeting of organization was held in the office of the Olympia Chamber of Commerce, and 25 prospective yachtsmen were present. The exact ratio of wind-ship to monkey-wrench sailors at that time is not recalled, but the feuding then was even more pronounced than now. Few sailors would condescend to have a "stinking, noisy clump of cast iron" in their craft, even as an auxiliary power source, and the now-ubiquitous out-board motor was then in its earliest stages of development.

Probably among those present at the organization meeting for the Olympia Yacht Club in 1909 were some of the following, who, with their craft, were mentioned in this article in The Daily Olympian in the July 7, 1904, issue:

"The launch craze which struck Olympia in the spring is now at its highest wave of popularity. Among the latest additions to the fleet are A. H. Christopher's Rocket, Fred Erb's Pokey, and Bob Blankenship's Ben Bolt."

Nearly ten years before the above article was written, many Olympia boat owners considered, for a time at least, tying their craft to their front gateposts. The files of the paper for January 17, 1895, give us this sidelight:

"The highest tide in 17 years occurred in the bay this morning, flooded the lower end of town and backed up the sewers. The water

in the Northern Pacific tunnel was a foot deep.

Old residents are unable to account for the rise.

All of the houses on lower Main Street (now Capitol Way-Ed.) were flooded. The long wharf (at the foot of Main Street-Ed.) was submerged and water covered the sidewalks on Third Street. At South Bay several meadows were flooded.'

High tides and bicycles notwithstanding, the boating interest increased. More and more launches, powered with the big, slow-speed heavy-duty engines of their day, were making Olympia their home port. Remember those old power plants—when an engine was an engine? Frisco Standard, Eastern Standard, Union, Regal, Palmer, N. & S., Kermath—some of us still remember the starting bars, igniters and sight-feed oilers. White duck pants didn't "wear well" with those mills.

World War One came along to interrupt this idyll, and after the war it seemed that nearly everyone owned an automobile, so boating was carried on by only a few of the faithful. Some more of those old timers who plowed the waters in diminished ranks during the decade from 1915 to 1925 are W. F. Tietz, Clarke Savidge, Dick Lindsay, Bill Lilian, Walt Draham, Peter G. Schmidt, Harry McElroy, H. C. Heermans and Joe Ritner. Some of these pioneers are still with us, hale and hearty, and Joe Ritner's old pride, the Limited, is presently tied up at the OYC moorings and faithfully serving her latest owner. Still a fast boat, too.

With records unavailable, the Historian must depart from history and reminisce a bit. It is hoped that in the future, information will be available to make the history more accurate. Some of us can remember back to the day when the Ione, a converted Navy pulling whaleboat, won the cup as the fastest boat in the Olympia club. Bill Foster's Daphne and H. C. Heermans World War One came along to interrupt this idyll, and after the war

History has always been a topic of interest at the OYC. This article from our archives, written 60 years ago, looks back at the bicycle craze in the early 20th century, the persistence of "the boating interest" in early Olympia, and the musings of "doddering greybeards."

Sea Wolf were the two "yachts" that graced Olympia harbor. Tom Blauvelt would go his fishing around Mud Bay Spit, W. F. Tietz would head his Naida toward Oyster Bay (Totten Inlet), and Bill Lilian usually favored the area around Walker's Landing on Pickering Passage. How many of the club's present membership would recognize "R.A." Point, and know for what those initials stood? Today's yachtsmen know it from the chart as Briscoe Point. "Doc" Mowell was another of the old clan.

Well, to get us doddering greybeards back on the track, by the mid-1920's, Ole Evenrude's contraption began to grow up. The Olympia YMCA Boy's Camp had a sixteen-foot Long-Built craft, powered by an early Evinrude. A square, tin gas tank partially surrounded the flywheel with its "stick-up knob" crank handle. The big cylinder head, like the head of an octopus, protruded into the boat over the transom below this gas tank, and the operator on the rear seat was flanked by the hotshot battery, coil; and tool kit that were standard equipment. It was a sturdy job though, and "put-putted" a boatload of us from Harstine Island to McNeil Island and back one day, and through some sloppy water.

With people getting acquainted with the water through the medium of the outboard motor on a rowboat, boating began to boom again. By the time the Olympia Yacht Club moved to its present location from its old moorings, a block to the east, many of the club's present "old timers" were enthusiastic young yachtsmen. Ernie Mallory and Herndon J. Maury were sparkplugs, and Adolph Schmidt, Sr., Dr. J. F. Bird, Joe Speckart and Walt Draham really got around.

The predicted log race is a popular pastime with present day yachtsmen. In this type of race, the skipper sets his own starting time and hopes to cover the pre-arranged course to arrive at the finish line precisely at the finish time scheduled. He is not allowed to alter course or speed during the race except in case of emergency. It makes an interesting race, and keeps the navigator on his toes.

Probably the most famous of the Olympia Yacht Club sponsored predicted log races was the Capitol to Capitol race, inaugurated in 1928. That first race ran from Olympia to Juneau, Alaska. The distance proved too long to arouse sufficient popular interest among participants, and the event was subsequently shortened. The name was changed to the International Cruiser Race, and the contest now begins at some port on Puget Sound and ends at some port in British Columbia.

Nowadays, the younger set has the Junior Yacht Club, and the ladies have organized themselves, bless 'em, as the Anchorettes. It is only natural that in these days when an outboard motor means one that is too big to get in the boat, there are many outboard-powered runabouts and small cruisers in the club.

Constant maintenance work keeps the club's facilities in first class and safe condition, and extension and improvements are always kept in mind. The last big job was the dredging that made way for the present south float, and this year saw the completion of the concrete grid. The club now has gridiron facilities for three boats at the same time, so their owners may utilize the low tides to clean and paint and make minor repairs to the underwater portions of their craft.

For sixty-five years, the sport of boating has had its place in Olympia, and the constant growth of the Olympia Yacht Club points up the ever-growing number of people who appreciate Olympia's strategic location at the head of Puget Sound, the yachtsman's paradise. Skippers from Grays Harbor and Portland, as well as those from inland cities, moor their craft at Olympia as the most convenient spot from which to commence their vacation cruising.

(Editor's Note-The foregoing bit of early history of the Olympia Yacht Club was written in 1954 by Captain Stanley H. Lilian whose father was one of the club's founders. Captain Lilian is temporarily retired from boating but plans to return to his first love-Puget Sound-one of these days. He now lives in Tanglewild and is a teacher in the North Thurston School District.-S.L.C.)

April 19, 2013

Dear BoatU.S. Member,

Do you own a federally documented vessel?

The U.S. Coast Guard is proposing to charge an annual fee of \$26.00 for the renewal of certificates of documentation for recreational boats. While the Coast Guard charges to issue new certificates of documentation for boats, currently there is no charge for annual renewal.

This fee will only apply if your boat is federally documented and would be in addition to any state registration fees. For current information on federal vessel documentation, visit the United States Coast Guard Documentation Center.

Use of Pressure Washers

As spring approached the marina, I became aware of the popularity of pressure washers. The BMPs sound like the use of pressure washers is prohibited. In a conversation with Andy Gregory, our Clean Marina contact person, I asked about pressure washers as I saw the use of pressure washers on the topsides as very different from the use we see at the yard in Swantown on bottoms. Andy's response was very reasonable. He said the use of pressure washers, especially the smaller non-commercial ones, is not a problem as long as they don't remove paint, especially bottom paint. If you don't change the color of the water you should be ok.

I want to thank the board, especially Board Chair, Walt; along with the Mainstation committee and the Safety committee for their support during this process. Jointly hosting our Waterfront Legislative Reception with RBAW had the positive effect of keeping our costs down. RBAW is sending us a check for \$1,500 for their share of the costs. Before committing to a joint reception with RBAW next year, we will meet with them to brainstorm ideas to improve the attendance. We were asked by the National Marine Trade Association if they could be included in the reception next year. We did not feel there would be any advantage to us to include them so we declined their request.

As I stated in last month's report, one of our goals is to start a dialogue with the leadership of the Squaxin Tribe to improve our relations with the Tribe. We continue to work on that issue.

The SMP revision effort continues. As it stands now, on May 14, the city staff will issue another revised draft and public comment will open. UP & OUT SS Safety Ladders: We have been able to arrange group purchase of SS Safety Ladders at discounted rate and the BOT has authorized the group purchase of 12 model SW1224 UP & Out SS ladders for sale to members. This is the same ladder you see retracted on the club docks without the yellow plate (which is prone for the yellow cover to peel off) The cost to members will be \$190.62 including sales tax & freight to OYC. It is quite a savings. They should arrive in the first week of May for sale. Many of you signed up for the ladders previously and may have already purchase ladders so we are starting fresh with a new list to purchase. I will handle the storage and delivery of the ladders using the Quartermasters receipt and billing procedures. You end up paying for your ladders in your monthly moorage billing. Please email me (erwins 11@juno.com) directly to purchase the ladders. Don't worry if we sell out ladders. We have established procedures and can reorder and have them in about a week.

CARBON MONOXIDE DETECTORS: We have made arrangements with Marine Technologies to direct buy the new Model 65-541 CO detector designed for pleasure boat use. The electronics are sealed to protect use in saltwater environments. They are a direct replacement for the old rectangular boat CO detectors and are 12 to 16 volt direct wire .06 amp draw. All CO detectors have a life expectancy of about 5 years. The new 65-541 has an end of life alarm so you know when to replace it. If you want to look up the details of the alarm go line to Marine Technologies Inc. and look up model 65-541. Most boats have 2 or 3 CO detectors on them. If you have Diesel you still need a CO detector so you will know if a little wind is drifting some other boats CO into your boat or boathouse.

One of the things Dixie Ellis told me is she wishes OYC would require every boat at OYC to have an operational CO detector. The bulk purchase price from Marine Technologies is \$50.15 + freight and tax, which would make them about \$61.15 each. That is about a \$19.00 savings on each detector. To insure we have enough interest to justify the BOT authorizing purchasing 100 CO Detectors (\$5,015 + freight), please send me an email listing the number and color of CO detectors you want to purchase. They come in off white and a tan color however MTI said 90+ % of the boats use off white. Please email me a separate email for the ladders and CO detectors at erwins11@juno.com and list the number of CO Detectors you want and color.

Individual safety ladders and operational CO Detectors in every vessel would help make OYC safer for members and guests safer.
