Board Action

PROPOSED RULE CHANGE ADOPTED BY THE BOARD ON SEPTEMBER 12, 2012

ON SEPTEMBER 12 THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES ADOPTED THE FOLLOWING RULE CHANGE TO BE READ AND POST-ED TO THE MEMBERSHIP PRIOR TO FINAL ADOPTION. THIS RULE CHANGE WILL ALSO BE READ AT THE OCTO-BER 3 DINNER MEETING AND WILL BE VOTED ON AT THE NOVEMBER 14 BOARD MEETING.

RULE 11 OF THE OLYMPIA YACHT CLUB MOORAGE AGREEMENT, RULES AND REGULATIONS GOVERNING USE OF THE OYC MOORAGE FACILITIES AFTER SEPTEM-BER 1, 1992 IS AMENDED TO READ:

I shall maintain a current insurance policy on my boat and boathouse (if applicable) of not less than \$300,000.00 liability. The Olympia Yacht Club shall be <u>named on the member's policy in a</u> <u>manner acceptable to the insurer so that the Olympia Yacht Club is</u> <u>notified by the insurer</u> of any change <u>or cancellation</u> of the policy including annual renewal. I also agree that I have reviewed the FIRE SAFETY CHECK LIST and will return a completed and signed copy to the moorage master annually.

The Board has been presented with a report by our Budget and Finance Committee regarding OYC's present reserve funds, future reserve needs and the capital and maintenance projects, both authorized and anticipated.

As was known, our authorized projects, in terms of total cost, exceed our reserve funds now available. Without additional funding we cannot do the dredge project, repair and replace pilings and, in addition, the covered moorage (shed and dock) project along with other approved capital expenditures, all at the same time. Proceeding with one of these projects, while delaying another in order to rebuild the reserve fund, will push the delayed project past its permit period.

The Board has taken all reasonable steps to reduce the cost of the dredge and that project will be going out to bid. It is my view that of the major projects, the dredge is the priority. The defective and failed pilings impact the safety of club and members property and, in my view is also a priority. We have sufficient reserve funds on hand to do these two projects in 2012-2013. We would not, however, have sufficient funds to also build the shed and its related dock.

In order to do the dredge, pilings and the shed we will need to look for additional short term funding in the form of a loan, either commercial or private. The alternative is not to do the shed and related dock at all, in which case a loan is unnecessary.

Budget and Finance report that the periodic loan payment for such a loan, in an amount necessary to build the shed, is within our ability to pay without an increase in dues, moorage or the assessments or without cancellation of other necessary projects or maintenance. It would certainly impact our available funds and require some adjustments in the timing of our future projects but no increases in dues, moorage or the assessment would be necessary. A loan may result in reopening the amount of the shed fees for the shed occupants in order to allocate their share of a loan payment but, at this point, the Board has not discussed such an adjustment.

The Board has made no decision regarding the shed or a loan. The Budget and Finance Committee did not recommend a loan. They were neutral on the issue and reported it only as an option. The Board has not considered these issues and at this point has an open mind. A loan is, however, the one option that will allow the shed to move forward.

We anticipate making a decision on these matters at the November 14 Board of Trustees meeting. Any decision by the Board which recommends a loan will come to the membership for a vote. That recommendation, if made at all, will be specific in terms of amount, payments and interest rate. All members of OYC entitled to vote will be mailed a ballot and will require a two thirds affirmative vote of the ballots.

The Budget and Finance Committee also reported that our long term ability to meet our scheduled future expenses, including future dredges, dock replacement and the like can be met by adding a cost of living adjustment (COLA) to our present assessment rate. It was reported that in the long term, if this COLA were adopted, no new assessment or increase in our present base assessment amount would be necessary to meet our presently scheduled list of maintenance and capital improvements. This COLA is another issue that will be coming before the membership.

In summary, OYC is financially healthy, needing no new assessments to meet our scheduled future long term needs other than an annual cost of living adjustment to our present assessment.

The issue of the shed, dredge and piling repair and replacement is a short term problem. The shed can be constructed as the members voted but only if we elect to obtain a loan. These are issues the Board will consider at the November 14 Board meeting. As always, please attend or at least let me or any other Board member know your opinion.



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
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
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Safety Committee Richard Erwin, Chair



COLD WEATHER AND THE HOLIDAY SEASON ARE JUST AROUND THE CORNER - -

It's also time to keep "SAFETY" in mind in your planning.

Don't Become Complacent - Just because you completed your 2012 "Fire Prevention Checklist". Winter weather and wind put a lot of additional strain on your vessel, its systems, A/C power connection and mooring lines. Frequently check your power cord to make sure it has a solid connection to your vessel, and is not hot to the touch. Twist your dock pedestal and vessel plug back and forth a few times to knock off any corrosion build up, it helps keep a good connection – also treating it with oxgard or similar electrical anti corrosion grease helps. MAKE SURE THE LOCKING LUG IS CONNECTED WHEN YOU FINISH.

If you have a boathouse, check chains, shackles and mooring eyes. Replace defective connections before the bad weather. That ounce of prevention can save many pounds of cure & for a lot less money or damage to your vessel and OYC facilities.

Frost & Ice Hazards on the docks - At our Main Station or Island Home, don't wait for the caretaker or someone else to spread salt on the docks. If you are the first one on the docks, be a responsible member and spread the salt on the dock. You will find salt containers along the docks – don't be bashful, use them. It's all part of being a responsible member.

PARADE OF LIGHTED SHIPS & SPECIAL PEOPLES

CRUISE - For old hands at these events or new members these are some SAFETY CONSIDERATIONS to keep in mind. . a. Complacency - It's easy to just assume your trip on the water will be uneventful, more of a party atmosphere with guests on board... like you have done before. A little Bravado and over confidence can be hazardous to the event. Never Assume! b. Fatigue - The Parade of Lights is a night time cruise of about 4 hours. It is a really great and rewarding fun event for everyone. Four hours at night at the helm for a skipper is a long time when he or she is keeping track of his or her location, parade intended route, other vessels, proper spacing. Floating objects like mooring floats and similar objects do not show on the GPS and may not show on a radar. In the past we have had several examples of just following the vessel ahead of them have resulted in collisions and running aground. Stay alert, follow the parade route and know your position. It's not that hard, however you have pay attention.

c. Safety and Planning Guidelines

1. Create and use a safety briefing outline for your guests before you depart, include location of PFD's which are to be readily available, 1 for each person aboard and of correct size, adults to infants all with a PFD. Readily Available is not stored in a remote location.

2. Departure and docking and procedures, (crew and guests expectations) during the cruise.

3. On the Special Peoples' Cruise, give chaperones a briefing of their duties and your expectations. Include the chaperone in the duties of moving special people along the dock, boarding

your boat and use of the head etc. It is not just a joy ride for them, they have responsibilities .

4. Have a second person on board capable of safely operating your boat under existing conditions.

5. Use all of your navigation tools available on your vessel. Radar, GPS, depth sounder especially at night and the Parade of Lighted Ships.

6. If you have radar and are not comfortable using it, practice in advance, before the event. Use an observer for safety so the skipper can focus using radar and simulated zero visibility conditions. Remember your primary instrument to maintain your heading is the compass. Operate at 5 knots and course corrections should be small, 5 deg. If you have auto pilot it makes using radar in limited visibility much easier. Be able to include and use all your navigation aids such as chart plotter, depth sounder etc. If you have the equipment on board, you should be able to use it with reasonable confidence. Caution: Do Not only rely on the GPS, it does not tell where other vessels are (false security).

7. Make sure your USCG Regulation NAVIGATION LIGHTS WORK. Turn them on during the lighted ships, they are the only way to show your position if you lose AC power (failure of decoration lights - generator)

8. Attend the skipper briefing prior to the events. You will receive a handout regarding radio channels, event procedures, parade route, emergency procedures, etc.

9. Monitor the parade VHF radio frequencies, refrain from non essential chit chat on the radio. The VHF is for needed information, parade control, safety and emergencies. If you want to gab, use your cell phone

10. It is important to keep even spacing between vessels and try to maintain steady speed as designated by the parade lead vessel.

11. Manage your vessel, know your location and position of others. Do not have the false security of just following the vessel ahead of you.

12. Keep VHF radio talk to Parade Information and Safety, It is not for idle chit chat.

13. With all the boats and lights, it is quite easy to see the parade and the water and other objects, so just stay alert and keep track of your position.

d. Placement of Decoration Lights

1. Decorations should not impair doorways or getting on or off the boat.

2. Night operations are not difficult if you make sure you do not place white or bright (decorating) lights in your field of vision – white, bright lighting or sequential moving lighting in your field of vision makes it next to impossible to see and/or navigate safely.

3. If you lose your generator and your lights go dark, make sure you have your navigation lights on so other vessels can see you.

Both of these events are very rewarding and enjoyable for everyone. We look forward to seeing everyone on the water.

Additional Safety Reminder The docks are usually wet and with a little algae or frost they become very "SLICK!" - Remind your crew & guests.

FIRE PREVENTION CHECKLIST

This check list is our insurance carrier's recommendations for OYC fire prevention and is **required to be completed and submitted to the OYC moorage master annually by September 30**. Any member (vessel) obtaining moorage at OYC (except reciprocal visitors) after Sept 30, shall complete and submit the checklist within **15 days** of arrival. *The fire prevention check list will only work with your active participation.*

As a member, mooring my vessel at and/or boathouse at Olympia Yacht Club main station facilities, I am certifying I have completed or had someone acting on my behalf complete the fire prevention check list and am in compliance with the following requirements or will correct any deficiencies within five working days from the date completing check list. - ____ 12. No AC electric heaters above 1500 watts are being used when the vessel is unattended.
- ____ 13. All AC heaters are placed to insure no flammable materials may come in contact with heater.
- _____14. All shore power and heater cords and plugs are not hot to the touch when under a service load.
- _____15. All vessel fire extinguishers are proper USCG size & type, inspected annually and serviced as required
- 16. Boat houses will have a (5) five pound ABC fire extinguisher inspect annually and serviced as required.
- 17. Check dock A/C power pedestal GFI (1. Push test button no power at vessel. 2. Reset power restored)

Parade of Lighted Ships

Sunset is coming earlier every day! It's time to think about the Lighted Ships Parade. This event is the single most visible and popular community activity sponsored by OYC. Each year, hundreds of people show up at the Port Plaza to cheer the brightly lit flotilla, and on Saturday, Santa is on hand to pass out candy canes to the kids. All along Budd Inlet, folks are planning parties for the two cruise nights; Wednesday December 5th and Saturday December 8th. Hundreds more line the shore and even set off fireworks to celebrate the passing of the ships. If you're a newbie, joining in the fun is easy and provides some great opportunities to exercise some of those neglected boating skills; more on that later.

This parade is for ANY boater; not just OYC members. The parade runs at about 5 knots so sailboats can easily keep up. Free registration for participating boats will be held on Sunday, December 2nd and again Tuesday, December 4th at 6:00pm at the Olympia Yacht Club. There are awards for several different categories. CSP hours are available for participation for OYC members; talk to Colleen Nelson for details during registration.

Decorating your boat does NOT have to be elaborate, expensive or time consuming. The point is to participate, have fun and show our holiday face to the community. Here are some simple tips:

- Colored lights strings are best since white lights, especially in the bow area tend to diminish the night vision of the skipper.
- Strings using LEDs consume much less power, but even the miniature incandescents are fine. Costco has these at about the best prices anywhere.
- If you don't have a genset or inverter on board, even the smallest portable inverter that plugs into a cigarette lighter plug can easily power 10 or more strings of LEDs. Inverters can be found at West Marine or Radio Shack or even home improvement stores.
- Sailboats look especially cool with the lights run up the fore & backstays.
- Zip ties are an easy and inexpensive way to attach lights; Harbor Freight Tools in Lacey sells them in big tubes; 1,000 for about \$10
- Bring a handheld or deck-mounted spotlight. This will help spot unlit boats and kayaks as well as the stern of the boat you're following
- Put a few (colored) lights on your own stern to make yourself visible to the following boat
- There are also light strings available (Home Depot, Lowes etc.) with pre-programmed winky-blinky patterns in them if you want to crank it up a notch!
- If you're still unsure, give me a call and I will talk you through it or help point you in the right direction (Jerry Budelman 360-867-9880).

Can't make the cruise? No problem. If you're in an open slip, consider putting some lights on your boat and connect them to a simple timer to come on at 6pm or so. It makes the basin look very festive for downtown strollers. Remember: a positive community impression is a valuable resource for all boaters!

Now for those boating skills. Fire up the chart plotter and radar and you can practice limited visibility navigation in a perfectly safe environment. Be sure to adjust the screen brightness for nighttime conditions or you can be "blinded" (ask me how I know this......). Know how to adjust your instruments in dark conditions e.g. a small flashlight may be handy. Fire up the genset ahead of time and check for proper operation. Safety first! The harbor patrol will be with us and looking out for any hazards and we all keep in touch via marine VHF. If you have guests on board, be sure to brief them and have the proper PFDs and required safety gear aboard.

Once the parade is over, you can still promote OYC and boating by inviting your friends to the 5th annual Dancing Lights Marine Christmas Show. PC Jerry Budelman's 50 foot yacht is decorated with over 15,000 lights and moored across from Percival Landing. Each night, from December 9th through Christmas, an entire light show, synchronized to seasonal music, is presented beginning at 7pm. This free show is sponsored by OYC, and can be seen and heard from the new Percival Landing boardwalk. For extra-cool sound, bring a personal stereo radio tuned to 100.5 FM! Invite your friends and neighbors; especially the kids to meet Dora the friendly sea dragon.

So light up your boats and your life this year and support the Lighted Ships parade!!
