

The question of what to do when you lose a gate card has come up a few times in the last month. The procedure is as follows: attend the BOT meeting on the second Wednesday of the month with \$10.00 in hand and you will be granted a new gate card. DO NOT go to the caretaker. He has no authority to replace lost gate cards.

The City Council has turned over the SMP plan to Ecology with a favorable outcome for OYC. Ecology is expected to have the plan for 8 or more months. This was a big win for OYC. Please thank Gary Ball and his committee for all their hard work.

Skilling's & Connolly have reported that the dredge is scheduled to start November 1st. This date could change so please be flexible. We are waiting to hear from the Contractor that he has all his ducks in a row and ready to mobilize to our facility. IF the dredge does start on November 1st, PC Richard Erwin will start contacting those members whose boats will be displaced on or about October 15th. Some boathouses will need to be moved when the piling project starts. Those involved have yet to be determined. PC Erwin will have more information for the membership as soon as he has dates.

The BOT has adopted a ruling on double 30 amp connections at the mainstation pedestals. Only livaboards will be allowed 2 (two) 30amp connections. Those with 2 connections will have until January 1, 2014 to remove the second connection

We will be voting on a by-law change at the October dinner meeting. The by-law change is as follows:

Section 4. Initiation Fee:

Shall be as follows:

(A)Active Member\$2500.00Plus State and Federal taxes, if any
(B)Associate Member\$2500.00Plus State and Federal taxes, if any
(C)Junior Member\$50.00Plus State and Federal taxes, if any, except that this requirement shall be waived for
applicants for Junior Membership who are dependents of any Active Member.

The proposal is to move this by-law to the rule section. This will allow the BOT the flexibility to change the membership fees as needed.

Government Affairs

On Tuesday night, August 27th, the City Council held what was potentially its final round of deliberations on the SMP. It was a marathon session. The Council began at 5:30 and, with limited breaks, closed the deliberations shortly before midnight. The results were almost universally good. (Note: you may have thought differently based on next morning's Olympian article – but it wasn't totally accurate.) Surprisingly, Mayor Pro Tem Jones proposed a 30-foot across-

Surprisingly, Mayor Pro Tem Jones proposed a 30-foot acrossthe-board setback for our area, with a zero foot setback for water dependent uses, and no Vegetative Conservation Areas (VCA), all without a requirement to apply setback reduction incentives. So, the Council has now essentially reverted to a proposal similar to what existed prior to the Planning Commission draft. Heights in our area remain unchanged: 35 feet waterward of streets and 90 feet in the remainder. The Council approved our revisions to the non-conforming use and structure provisions in their entirety. Our edits ensured that our existing structures can be re-built, repaired, remodeled (interior and exterior), and our existing uses can remain, without the need for shoreline permits even following 100% destruction by fire or other disaster. Language was removed that would have required the creation of VCA areas when rebuilding or remodeling existing structures. This is a major victory and one we will monitor closely as the SMP proceeds through Ecology review. Recently proposed SMPs from other jurisdictions (including Pierce County and the City of Tacoma) do not contain non-conforming provisions with the level of protection the Olympia draft SMP now has. The Staff will provide a final draft for the Council on September 17th.

The first topic this month is parking. If you were at the last dinner meeting, you saw the results of our member poll on towing unstickered cars; about 80 for and about 8 against. Many people have complained about having to park in the public lot while unstickered cars are present. Your Mainstation committee has also discussed this in depth and examined proposals for changing the system. Ultimately we decided to keep the present sticker system but with some enhancements. Here is how it will work. New parking stickers will be made which feature a serial number. These numbers are unique to each member, thus we can identify whose cars are parked in the lot. These stickers will be INSIDE only and must be permanently attached on the FRONT driver's side windshield, lower left. The "standard" position makes the sticker visible (no window tinting) and facilitates a rapid check by the caretaker. You can leave the old stickers in place if you wish, but they will NOT prevent you from being towed if you don't have the new ones properly displayed.

Each member family gets two new stickers which will be sent out with your monthly bill. Additional stickers (up to 2 more) can be requested from the Mainstation Committee and will cost an amount TBD. Stickers can only be used on vehicles owned and operated by resident members of your immediate family; not friends, not neighbors, not co-workers, not grown children, not vendors etc. We may choose to record your auto license # on the sticker. Stickers will be good for an indefinite period, but if you sell your car, you MUST report this to the caretaker so we can invalidate the S/N. Each member family may only park a maximum of 2 vehicles in the lot at a time; a third is subject to towing. Registration of guest cars (unstickered) is still an option when permitted (read rules carefully) but you may only park two vehicles (stickered or not) per member family.

What about motorcycles? We can record your license # since there are relatively few to monitor. For other unusual, temporary circumstances like rental cars, see the caretaker for accommodation.

Exact implementation dates and details will be announced when we receive the new stickers. For now, we will be more closely monitoring the lot and will issue a single warning for unstickered cars after which we will tow unauthorized vehicles. Over the next year we will see how this system works and make adjustments as necessary. Your committee is trying very hard to address the membership's needs without imposing needless restrictions.

Sometime toward the end of September, the power for 300, 400, 500, and 600 floats may be interrupted for about 2 hours in order to conduct repairs on the power transformer. Watch for signs posted with more specific information. Afterwards, Greg will check every pedestal breaker in the marina to make sure none have been tripped. If you have concerns about circuits internal to the boat or boathouse, you may want to visit your slip and check. As we have said in the past, occasional individual pedestal power interruptions, usually lasting no more than 10 minutes, are required to conduct testing and maintenance on our marina power system. If you have any concerns, please contact me @ 867-9880. Other than your VCR or digital clock losing the date/time, there should be no ill effects from such a brief outage. Next month I hope to be able to publish a comprehensive report on the health of our power system with some individual recommendations for members.

For those needing CSP hours, we offer the opportunity for more piling scraping. Our gang of 9 got about 60% done, but we needed lower tides and more time to finish it. Arrange with Greg, and plan a time when the tide level is less than 3 feet.

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The History Corner

Have you noticed the new addition to the display case on the south wall of the Mainstation? It is a model of the "USS Olympia." OYC member George Carle had owned the model, and his estate gave it to the OYC during the summer. It is not clear at this time who assembled the model.

The "USS Olympia," a protected cruiser, was named for the city of Olympia during the late 19th century, in recognition of the capitol of the new state of Washington and the growing economic and political importance of the Pacific Northwest. This vessel became famous during the 20th century for its association with several significant historic events.



Commissioned in 1895, the "USS Olympia" was the flagship of Commodore George Dewey at the Battle of Manila Bay during the Spanish-American War in 1898. Dewey's victory at this battle was widely reported in the press – bringing recognition to both Dewey and the ship and marking the emergence of the U.S. as a world naval power. When the "USS Olympia" returned to the U.S., her officers and crew were celebrated and the ship was repainted and adorned with a gilded bow.



The ship measures 344 feet in overall length, has a beam of 53 feet, and a draft of 21 feet, 6 inches. The design displacement was 5,865 long tons, with a full combat load of up to 6,558 long tons displacement. The ship is powered by a pair of vertical triple expansion engines, each supplied with steam from three coal-fired cylindrical boilers. Her crew included 396 enlisted men and 33 officers.



The "USS Olympia" was decommissioned after returning to the U.S. in 1899, but quickly returned to active service as a training ship for naval cadets and as a floating barracks in Charleston, South Carolina. During World War I, the vessel patrolled the American coast and escorted transport ships – and after the war ended in 1918 was dispatched to support

the Allied intervention in the Russian Civil War. In 1921, the "USS Olympia" carried the remains of World War I's Unknown Soldier from France to Washington, D.C., where his body was interred in Arlington National Cemetery. In 1922 the vessel was decommissioned for the last time and placed in reserve.



In 1957, the U.S. Navy ceded title to the Cruiser Olympia Association, which restored the ship to her 1898 configuration. Since then, "USS Olympia" has been displayed in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania at the Independence Seaport Museum. The "USS Olympia" is the oldest steel U.S. warship still afloat and the only surviving naval



ship of the Spanish-American War. Although designated a National Historic Landmark in 1966, the future of this historic vessel is uncertain, as expensive repairs are required to keep her afloat.

Be sure to stop by the display case at the Mainstation to see this artifact and reminder of the ship that brought national – if not worldwide – recognition to Olympia.

Safety Committee

FIRE PREVENTION CHECK LIST: Sept. 30, 2013 is the due date for completing this year's OYC Fire Prevention Checks. Fill out, sign it <u>attesting</u> you or a person on your behalf did the checks and return your checklist to our "*communication inbox*". The communication in-box is on the wall next to the side door to the club house, or you can mail it to the Moorage Master.

If you're new to OYC, or a long time member, and have any questions about the club's FIRE PREVENTION CHECK LIST requirements, please call one of the Safety Committee members: Richard Erwin 507-4520, Jim Smith 491-1817, George Smith 943-9549 or Bill Hammer 943–2087.

Remember, Fire Prevention is <u>only as good as the effort you put</u> <u>into it</u>. Do the actual checks and work together on FIRE PRE-VENTION. Our check list is a <u>minimum</u> annual requirement. Consider checking your vessel more often, especially in the cold weather when we have a higher demand for A/C power and have more vessel movement that places extra strain on our vessels' mooring lines and A/C power connections.

CO detectors are in and ready to be picked up. Call me at 507-4520 to make arrangements. They will be billed through quartermaster and added to your OYC moorage billing.

FALL & WINTER: Rain and winds are just around the corner. Before cold weather and winter storms create problems -- check and replace worn mooring lines, boathouses chains, eyebolts, cleats etc. If you see an unsafe condition or problem area of concern contact our caretaker, Greg Whittaker (357- 6767) or our Mainstation Chair, Jerry Budelman C 402-4642, H 867-9880 or the Safety Committee members listed above. Don't assume someone else is going to see the problem or take care of a safety issue.

SECURITY: As you may have heard by now, a 22 year old man stole a 35' boat at Queen City Yacht Club. He began ramming the docks and other boats causing extensive damage to QCYC docks and other boats. A man on the docks feared for his life and the lives of others who were on the docks. He fired a shotgun at the man wounding him and stopping the rampage. The man, naked from the waist down and believed to be high on narcotics, tried to exit the stolen boat as police arrived and took him into custody. Last year a person gained entrance to OYC docks by an unknown way. He found a $\frac{1}{2}$ open window on a boathouse and gained entry. He ransacked the boat, took alcohol and some food and put it in an OYC cart. He also at some point broke into the caretaker's house and tried to cook food, however new appliances had not been installed. He had been seen by an OYC member who called the police. He was apprehended by Olympia Police as he was walking up 4th Ave. with an OYC dock cart full of his stolen goods. BE ALERT! If you see a stranger on the dock, ask if they are members. If you see unusual activities or sounds especially at odd hours call the Olympia Police. Make sure the gate locks when going in & out, and be observant. Help make OYC a safe and secure facility.

OLYMPIA YACHT CLUB FIRE PREVENTION CHECKLIST

This check list is our insurance carrier's recommendations for OYC fire prevention and is **required to be completed and submitted to the OYC moorage master annually by September 30**. Any member (vessel) obtaining moorage at OYC (except reciprocal visitors) after Sept 30, shall complete and submit the checklist within **15 days** of arrival. <u>The fire prevention check list will only work with your full and active participation.</u>

As a member, mooring my vessel at and/or boathouse at Olympia Yacht Club main station facilities, I am certifying I have completed or had someone acting on my behalf complete the fire prevention checklist and am in compliance with the following requirements or will correct any deficiencies within five working days from the date completing check list. Mark an **X** for each item checked, **N/A** if item does not apply. All items must be indicated with an X or N/A.

- 1. I have inspected my boats to dock pedestal AC electrical system including boathouse if applicable:
 - ____a. My AC electrical power cord is a weatherproof power cord, minimum 12 gauge for 20 AMP, 10 gauge for 30 AMP service, with a ground, is not cracked or chafed and is free of visible defects.
 - ____b. AC power cord is dedicated from the pedestal to the vessel with respective size marine twist lock plugs.
 - _____ c. AC plugs have been checked for signs of burning/melting or other defects and replaced as needed. (no 15 amp convenience receptacles are directly attached to the shore power cord between the pedestal to vessel)
 - ____d. AC cords passing through boathouse walls have permanently installed non-metallic chafe protection.
 - ____e. The AC plug connected to the vessel is secured by a locking ring.
- ____ 2. Make sure electrical heaters are plugged directly to permanent receptacles. No extension cords.
- _____3. AC heater cords are not tightly coiled or bundled. (it will cause them to get very hot)
- _____4. No reflective type heat lamps are being used on the vessel.
- ____ 5. No AC heat devices (heat lamps) with spring-type clip hangers are used on the vessel.
- ____ 6. Hot water heaters are not energized when vessel is unattended.
- ____7. No thermostat controlled electric heaters are being used in gas engine enclosures or tank area.
- _____8. No unprotected light bulbs are being used in machinery and tank spaces.
- 9. No visible fuel leaks or seeping exist on engines, fuel lines or fuel tanks.
- ____10. If the vessel has LP tanks, the valves are closed when the vessel is unattended.
- ____11. Dual range electric heaters (800/1500 watts) are only set on the low range when unattended.
- ____12. No AC electric heaters above 1500 watts are being used when the vessel is unattended.
- ____13. All AC heaters are placed to insure no flammable materials may come in contact with heater.
- ____14. All shore power and heater cords and plugs are not hot to the touch when under a service load.
- ____15. All vessel fire extinguishers are proper USCG size & type, inspected annually and serviced as required
- ____16. Boat houses will have a (5) five pound ABC fire extinguisher inspected annually and serviced as required.
- ___ 17. No containers with material emitting flammable or toxic fumes may be stored in dock boxes or boat houses.

Nautical Notes

from out there.....

Out Cruising...... Bright Angel

We have truly arrived in Paradise - the island of Fulanga (spelled Vulaga in Fijian, but pronounced "Fulanga") in the southern Lau Group of Fiji (our current anchorage within the lagoon is 19 09.138S, 178 32.351W). The weather here is still typical "windward

trades" - mix of sun, wind, clouds and some rain - but the scenery here is fabulous, and the villagers are extremely outgoing and welcoming. In addition to the quintessential white sand beaches, palm trees, and stunning aquamarine waters, the lagoon is studded with small coral islets, the bases of which have eroded over time leaving a "mushroom"

like appearance. The beach combing here (one of our favorite pastimes) is wonderful - with even an occasional chambered nautilus to be found! - as is the snorkeling around the many coral heads near the fringing islands and



reef. In the next day or so we plan to try "drift snorkeling" the entrance pass - we'll take the dinghy outside the reef on an incoming tide, and then jump in and hang onto the dinghy as the current brings it back through the pass into the lagoon. Large schools of fish supposedly feed at the entrance; we'll see!

We spent almost two weeks in our first anchorage, near the trailhead to the Chief's village (where upon arrival we did our sevusevu - the traditional presentation of kava root to the Chief). We have truly enjoyed getting to know many of the villagers. We have been to church twice; although the services are entirely in Fijian, the singing is beautiful! After church services, we were invited to have lunch with a family in their home. The first week was very traditional, where we sat outside on mats on the ground with the extended family and ate with our fingers; the second week was in the home of a more "modern" couple (who met while attending university in Suva) where we sat inside at a table, and ate with utensils! In each case, the fare was focused on seafood (whatever had been caught recently) and locally grown root crops and leafy vegetables. In each case, Linda brought chocolate cake, which disappeared in a heartbeat! We also

took a "gift" for each of the host families of rice, canned corn beef (a favorite of the islanders) and tea, to help replenish some of their food stores, as these islands are very remote; they only see a supply ship from Suva on average of once a month. There is no Internet or electricity in the villages. There is a primary school in the main village, that serves all three villages on the island, and a nursing station that is not staffed at present. If the villagers need medical or dental care, about the only viable option is to hop the supply ship and go to Suva; the same with secondary school - the kids have to go to Suva and either board at a school or stay with relatives. The main source of income for the villagers is the production of wood carvings (men), and woven pandamus mats and coconut oil (women), which are shipped to Suva for resale. Linda has been gifted with some wonderful woven purses, and a mat with our names and boat name woven in. We have purchased a number of beautiful carved bowls, a turtle and masks; it is fun to sit and watch the carvers work with the most basic hand tools. Being here and getting to know these wonderful people certainly helps put life as we know it in perspective!

We will probably stay here in Fulanga for another couple of weeks, before heading over to Suva (about 200 nm to the west) to reprovision and see the "big city." (I also need to get back to "Internet land" so I can sign up for Medicare!) From there, who knows - perhaps we will go down to Kandavu Island and the Great Astrolabe Reef, about 50 nm south of Suva. We have all but given up on the idea of spending any - or any amount of - time in western Fiji this year, as there is just too much to see and do on the east side, where it is much less "touristy" (all the big resorts are on Viti Levu and in the western islands). But darn, that just means we will have to come back - if not next year (when we plan to visit New Caledonia and Vanuatu) then the year after that. We are going to try for an earlier departure for New Zealand this year - hopefully no later than the first week of November - so we will have time to "put the boat to bed" before we fly home in early December.

Take care, and say "Hi" to everyone at OYC for us!

FUEL DOCK UPDATE

Swan Town A-dock continues to be the location of choice for the new fuel dock. The permitting process for the underground fuel tanks is expected to take 8 to 12 months. The Port plan is to include fueling capacity for the two tug boats that are operating at the Port of Olympia, they will require higher capacity fuel tanks and pumping ability. Boston Harbor has expressed concern the new fuel station will cut the fuel prices and harm their business. The Port has indicated the price of fuel at the new fuel dock will be competitive with Boston Harbor.

IT IS NOT A DONE DEAL YET - - we still need your show of support. Another public hearing is scheduled for the evening of October 23. We have been asked to have as many boaters and OYC members present as possible at this public meeting. There are those who oppose the fuel dock and YES, WE NEED AS MANY OF US AS POSSIBLE TO SPEAK IN FAVOR OF THE FUEL DOCK at this meeting. The time and location of the meeting is not known at this time and we will email everyone when we know the specifics.

The tentative date for the Commissioners to vote on the new fuel dock is October 28th. OYC has played a major roll in promoting and supporting the fuel dock in Olympia. We are very close to seeing the final approval of the new fuel dock, so please help in the final large SHOW OF SUPPORT on the October 23 public meeting. Watch for a club email announcing the time and place of the meeting.
