
The History Corner





The OYC's archives include a wide variety of valuable records, ranging from the practical to the interesting to the whimsical. In addition to original annuals and directories, we have collected newsletters from the 1930s; membership records dating back to the 1930s (changes in the membership application forms over time are revealing); log books from the 1940s; newspaper articles from the 1970s and 80s; original burgees; charts from various decades; and photographs and images dating from the early 20th century to the present.

Below is a sample of ephemera now being preserved, including a small 1946 yearbook for the Anchorettes, an early copy of the OYC constitution and by-laws, and a commemorative flyer for the Golden Anniversary of the Capital to Capital Race. The nautical fashion show flyer lists a number of intriguing clothing articles, including a "bare look swimsuit," a "fishnet swimsuit," and a "sailor circles saltwater shirt." 

OYC Governmental Affairs Happenings

Capitol Lake Improvement and Protection Association (CLIPA)

The group of citizens whose goal has been to "Save the Lake – Preserve the Past, Improve the Future," has been busy this summer. Its Science and Policy Panel, an independent group of subject matter experts, have produced several key documents on the Lake. These documents clearly raise issues with the science that CLAMP used to make their recommendation. The articles are:

2011-13 Capital Budget

The legislature took a special session, but they finally passed the 2011-13 budgets – in fact they passed two capital budgets – one for state bond projects and one for cash-funded projects. This was one of the strangest budget sessions in many years. There was an attempt by the senate to pass a resolution that would require a vote of the people to change the debt limit within the state constitution. The house was opposed to this approach and after much debate; the two houses agreed to and passed a bill that will reduce the state debt limit over time. This is important as it will result in fewer state bonds being sold for construction projects in future years. Because of the debate, the capital budget was held in limbo. The good news is that the state bond budget includes \$200,000 for the department of General Administration (GA) to start the permitting process for the dredging of Capitol Lake. CLIPA and OYC's GAC will be working with GA in this process.

Olympia Planning Commission and the Shoreline Management Act Changes

Increased coordination between OYC's Long Range Planning Committee and the GAC has had to be stepped up as the permit process for dredging our boat basin and replacing pilings has started. We expect what we can do on the waterfront and shoreline property in the future to get more complicated and limiting. There are ongoing discussions between our shoreline attorney and the planning group to get as many projects as possible under current regulations. Covering all of the bases now is an investment we expect will pay big dividends in the future.

The OYC GAC continues to monitor and track the deliberations of the Olympia Planning Commission. At this point we expect the next draft of the SMA late this year and another round of public hearings early next year.

September 2011 Safety Message

SEPTEMBER. 30, 2011, the due date for completing this year's OYC Fire Prevention Checks. Fill out, sign attesting you did the checks and return your checklist to our communication

in box. The forms are also in the form rack on the wall just inside the side door to the club house. When you have completed the checks on your vessel and if appropriate boathouse, place the completed form in the correspondence box next to the form rack on the same wall or give to the moorage master.

Remember, Fire Prevention is only as good as the effort you put into it. Please do the actual checks and work together on FIRE PREVENTION. Our check list is a minimum annual requirement. Why only do the minimum? Consider checking your vessel more often, especially in the cold weather when we have a higher demand for A/C power and have more vessel movement placing extra strain on our vessels and A/C power connections. Don't forget a good post cruising season check of all your vessel systems and components like rudder & propeller shaft stuffing box, batteries & cables, fuel lines, control cables etc just to name a few. Develop a good system check list for your own vessel is a good way to include everything.

Coast Guard could require pleasure boats to carry emergency beacons

Boaters may not realize that deep within the U.S. Coast Guard 2011 authorization bill is a paragraph allowing the agency to require that pleasure boats have emergency beacons when travelling offshore.

Don't assume someone else is going see the problem or take care of it. Report a safety issue. We need to work together to maintain safe moorage.

Taking your boat on FOOFARAW? Be sure you have enough PFD's for all your guests and crew. Yes in serviceable condition, readily available and proper size. No!A child's PFD does not count for an adult. Consider making a safety briefing of your vessel, crew & duties for your guests before you depart. **Safety First!**

OLYMPIA YACHT CLUB FIRE PREVENTION CHECKLIST

This check list is our insurance carrier's recommendations for OYC fire prevention and is required to be completed and submitted to the OYC moorage master annually by September 30. Any member (vessel) obtaining moorage at OYC (except reciprocal visitors) after September 30, shall complete and submit the checklist within 15 days of arrival.

The fire prevention check list will only work with your active participation.

As a member, mooring my vessel at and/or boathouse at Olympia Yacht Club Main Station facilities, I am certifying I have completed or had someone acting on my behalf complete the fire prevention check list and am in compliance with the following requirements or will correct any deficiencies within five working days from the date completing check list. Mark an **X** for each item checked, **N/A** if item does not apply. <u>All</u> items must be indicated with an X or N/A.

1. I have inspected my boats to dock pedestal AC electrical system including boathouse if applicable:
a. My AC electrical power cord is a weatherproof power cord minimum 12 gauge for 20 AMP, 10 gauge
for 30 AMP service with a ground and is not cracked, chafed and free of visible defects.
b. AC power cord plugs are a marine twist lock type, minimum 20 AMP, Maximum 30 AMP.
c. Male & female AC plugs have been checked for signs of burning/melting or other defects and
replaced as needed. (at AC plug connections from pedestal to vessel)
d. AC cords passing through boathouse walls have permanently installed non-metallic chafe protection.
e. The AC plug connected to the vessel is secured by a locking ring.
2. Make sure electrical heaters are plugged directly to permanent receptacles. No extension cords.
3. AC heater cords are not tightly coiled or bundled. (it will cause them to get very hot)
4. No reflective type heat lamps are being used on the vessel.
5. No AC heat devices (heat lamps) with spring-type clip hangers are used on the vessel.
6. Hot water heaters are not energized when vessel is unattended.
7. No thermostat controlled electric heaters are being used in gas engine enclosures or tank area.
8. If twin-engine block heaters are used, only one is energized at a time.
9. No unprotected light bulbs are being used in machinery and tank spaces.
10. No visible fuel leaks or seeping exists on engines, fuel lines or fuel tanks.
11. If the vessel boat has LP tanks, the valves are closed when the vessel is unattended.
12. Dual range electric heaters (800/1500 watts) are only set on the low range when unattended.
13. No AC electric heaters above 1500 watts are being used when the vessel is unattended.
14. All AC heaters are placed to insure no flammable materials may come in contact with heater.
15. All shore power and heater cords and plugs are not hot to the touch when under a service load.
16. All vessel fire extinguishers are proper USCG size & type, inspected annually and serviced as required
17 Boat houses will have a (5) five pound ABC fire extinguisher inspect annually and serviced as required.
18. Check dock A/C power pedestal GFI (1. Push test button - no power at vessel. 2. Reset – power restored)
