HIIT

Measles may be over – for now. Haven't heard about Zika in a while. Haven't seen enough sun to entice foolish skin exposures. It would be too hypocritical for me to rale on about diets, so I guess the only other elephant in the room to write about is exercise.

If your thoughts of exercise conjure visions of some 20something dripping sweat on a spin bike or a linebacker lifting hundreds of pounds - forgedaboutit! The latest idea for exercise involves High-Intensity Incidental Training (HIIT). Think 6 seconds to 4 minutes of intense activity. So walk the treadmill leisurely, but about 4 times, turn that thing up to just before you take the fast exit off the back, until you feel your heart really going, you breath getting short, then slow it down. Incorporate the HIIT into your daily chores – vacuum with real vigor, take the stairs at a fast pace instead of the elevator, park at the edge of the lot instead of using parking karma and hoping for a close spot, step up "walking sprints" while out and look for uphill opportunities. Doing these things for about 30 minutes a day qualify you for some great cardiac conditioning. Add some stretchy bands or lifting heavy grocery bags and you have a good workout.

Walk the mile to the grocery store (they are always a mile uphill). Wander the towns with short sprint walks. Pull on those crab pots and row your dink.

Want a 6-pack like the 20-something? Better to settle for one bottle of Alaskan amber and do arm raises from the tranquility of the boat.

Safety and Education Committee

Greetings, OYCers!

Now that we have sprung forward to more daylight in the evening, did you follow the advice of fire officials nationwide to replace the batteries on your Smoke Alarms?

Use the semi-annual Spring Forward, Fall Back times as reminders to push the test button on your smoke and CO2 alarm. If your alarm does not sound, you should replace the battery. Or maybe even the entire alarm. If you do need to replace the alarm, consider a combination smoke/CO2 alarm! An alarm with a dead or missing battery is the same as having no alarm at all.

Now is also the time to have your voluntary vessel safety inspection. Merely call or email Jim Harden, Safety and Education Committee Member, to schedule your boat inspection for a time that is convenient for you! Jim will also be doing vessel safety inspection during SEA Day (see below). Jim's phone number is (360) 438-9742. Email is jdharden@msn.com.

Finally, mark your calendars for two major OYC events coming up in APRIL! First, on **April 20th**, it is OYC's **AN-NUAL SAFETY AND ENVIRONMENTAL AWARENESS (SEA) DAY!** There will be table-top displays and mini-workshops, boat safety checks and discounts and giveaways for OYC members. This is a great time to reconnect with our passion for clean water and safe cruising. **The event is free** and runs from 9 am to 1 pm.

Immediately after SEA DAY on **April 20th, from 2 to 5 pm, stick around for an informative training on AUTO-MATIC IDENTIFICATION SYSTEMS (AIS)** from Doug Miller, MillTech Marine, Port Orchard. Doug is an expert on these systems and previously provided training to OYC members in January on Digital Selective Calling (DSC). There is a \$10 charge for OYC members for this event, \$15 for non OYC members.

Finally, concurrent with SEA Day activities, the **OYC Parking Lot rummage sale** will be going on. So, plenty of activities and events happening April 20th to the entire boating community in the South Sound! Come join us.

The following weekend, April 28th, OYC's own PC Jerry Budelman will be providing an all day training on boat electrical systems. DC systems will be the subject 8 to noon and AC systems will be addressed from 1 to 5. The fee for this training is \$10 for OYC members and \$15 for non OYC members. 2019 Moorage Inspections

This being an odd year means all odd numbered moorage spaces (open slips and boathouses) will be inspected to ensure marina safety and compliance with established standards as noted in OYC's Agreements, Rules, and Policies. Inspections will start in April at the latest and hopefully completed by the end of May.

We will have probably five inspection teams and one of them will contact you by email or phone to schedule the inspection of your open slip or boathouse. We encourage you to be present, however, if you cannot, you can provide the team access to your moorage and permission to complete the inspection. Upon completion of the inspection you will receive a copy of inspection by email soon afterwards.

You can go to the OYC Web page and review the "SAFETY & COMPLIANCE CHECK LIST" for both Open Slips & Boathouses in the Download Section. Open slip inspections take approximately 30 minutes, while boathouse inspections take approximately 45 minutes. There will be a "water side inspection" completed prior to the dockside portion for all boathouses; deficiencies noted for waterside will be included on the inspection sheets when dockside is completed.

Boathouse standards are listed in the OYC 2018-2019 Directory for your review. Please assist us with this program by closely observing your property and ensuring standards are maintained and vessels are ready for safe cruising throughout 2019. Thanks for your assistance in keeping OYC a SAFE & SECURE MARINA.

"Living the Dream" - One Wave at a Time

A Presentation by Bob & Linda Hargreaves at South Sound Sailing Society on May 14, and You Are Invited!

Have you ever dreamed of leaving it all behind and sailing off into the sunset, bound for distant shores and idyllic tropical islands across wide open oceans? Have you ever yearned to experience the majesty and power of Mother Nature when all you can see is blue and the trade winds fill your sails, or the thrill of a landfall after weeks at sea? Has your mind's eye ever envisioned seeing the Southern Cross in the night sky, or the beauty of an Albatross gliding gracefully over the waves for miles? Have you ever imagined what it would be like to explore cultures, traditions and lifestyles vastly



different from ours? What are your cruising dreams and ambitions?



Long-time Olympia Yacht Club ('03) and South Sound Sailing Society ('95) members Bob and Linda Hargreaves nurtured many of these dreams for years as they looked forward to retirement; they were hoping for a "grand adventure" to give meaning and purpose to a new chapter in life. In 2003 they sold their beloved 1978 Ericson 29, a great Puget Sound / San Juan & Gulf Islands cruiser - but not one in which to sail off over the horizon - and bought their solid ocean-going vessel, a 1990 cutter rigged Mason 44. After they had both retired, sold their home and shed most of their earthly possessions, they moved aboard

Bright Angel in May 2010 to get used to living aboard, and to put the final touches on years of preparations and upgrades getting her ready to go to sea.

On a peaceful, early morning in August 2010, *Bright Angel* slipped her lines and moved away from her berth at the Olympia Yacht Club. In early October 2018, after eight years and nearly 35,000 nautical

miles of voyaging, *Bright Angel* brought Bob and Linda back home to OYC. In those eight years, Bob and Linda cruised first to Mexico, then in 2012 they crossed the Pacific to the Marquesas, the Tuamotus and Society Islands in French Polynesia, then on to the Kingdom of Tonga before heading south, via Minerva Reef, to New Zealand to wait out the South Pacific cyclone season. For the next three years, 2013-15, they sailed from New Zealand to Fiji and back again; in 2016 they sailed to Vanuatu and New Caledonia, before returning to New Zealand. In 2018 they



made the long passage back to Washington, via Tahiti and Honolulu. They left Whangarei, New Zealand, on April 19, and made landfall at Cape Flattery on August 22, after 8500 nautical miles and 76 days on the ocean. They slowly worked their way back to Olympia, with stops along the way in Neah Bay, Port Hudson in Port Townsend, Eagle Harbor on Bainbridge Island, and Gig Harbor, relishing the tranquility of Puget Sound and a golden Pacific Northwest late summer and early fall.



Bob and Linda will be the featured guest speakers at the May 14 meeting of the South Sound Sailing Society where they will share some of their experiences out there "living the dream" (and why they often chuckled a bit when people would say that!), as well as give some tips on how others might realize their own dreams of ocean cruising. Commodore Jim Larsen of SSSS would like to extend a cordial invitation to OYC to join them for this event; they meet at the OYC Mainstation doors open at 6:30 pm for socializing, meeting starts at 7:00 pm, with the presentation following the business meeting at

approximately 7:45 pm.
