At our January meeting, the Board approved the 2019 OYC Community Grants program developed by the Community and Governmental Affairs Committee (CGAC). #### **Single Payer**

Insurance – that's where lots of people pay relatively small premiums in the hope that bad luck won't catch up with them, but if it does, the insurance company will handle the very large bills. To drive your car legally, the government says you have to have insurance. The "individual mandate" required you to have health insurance or pay a "fine." Thanks to Congress, that is gone and a person can decide to trust their good health or have the public pay for their bad fortune. Instead of going to see the doctor in an office, they go to the ER which is perceived as "free," while it is very much more expensive. The cost doesn't go away just because you don't have insurance.

Think of insurance like cars. You can go in luxury or drive a utilitarian model – both will get you there, but at different costs. Drive a "beater" (or maybe a Jaguar), and you may find yourself helpless alongside the road hoping a Good Samaritan or the government will rescue you. Most of health insurance comes through a few large, wealthy companies who sell their different "models" based on what you want to "drive." An actuary wearing a green eyeshade and housed in a mountain in Montana tells them to the fraction of a penny what they should bill for any given benefit. Want a mid-sized luxury SUV with a certain number of cup-holders, the price will be similar among the ma-

jor players. Employed people and young people don't use much in health care, so companies "cherry-pick" them with attractively low premiums. Sick or old, you will pay through the nose if they will insure you at all.

Sixty years ago, I was told by a neighbor doctor not to go into medicine because this new Medicare thing was going to ruin medicine. While it is not perfect, at least every old person has medical insurance now. Medicare tells providers what they will pay for a given "dent" in your body just as Safeco tells collision repair shops the same.

"Single Payer" insurance can be thought of as Medicare for all. Canada has had this since 1984. It will cover "essential" care. Taxes will pay for the basic policy and everyone will be covered. Won't my taxes skyrocket? You won't be paying all your present health insurance premiums and you won't be paying for St. Pete's "free" care. You won't have to "pay" for the large staff of insurance specialists in the back of every physician's office. Provided Big Pharma's hold on outrageous drug prices will be loosened, our drug costs will be decreased. You may buy a supplemental policy and a prescription coverage as I do for my Medicare (best health coverage I've ever had). Is "Single Payer" perfect – not by a longshot, but eventually an improvement over the present situation.

What about my friends at Premera and other companies? They may also locally administer some of the Medicare claims. There will still be extra insurance you can buy and many of those people may be absorbed by the government. Hope they get a paycheck!

## Feel the Earth Move under your Feet?

It may be just a heart throb. Or it may be the sloshing of liquid iron in the earth's core...a phenomenon that has recently affected magnetic compasses so much that it has given NOAA heartburn. NOAA is the federal agency responsible for environmental information and nautical charts, among other things.

Magnetic compasses have been central to successful vessel navigation for hundreds of years. The earliest navigators floated a piece of lodestone in a bowl of water to show the position of the magnetic north pole, and even today with all our GPS and electronic chart technology, electronic fluxgate compasses that detect magnetic north typically guide autopilots and properly orient our electronic charts.

While "true north" (the north pole of the axis on which the earth spins) doesn't change, "magnetic north" (the place that magnetic compasses point to) is different than true north and changes over time. The difference in location is measured as compass variation which is traditionally published on the compass rose of nautical charts. The value of compass variation depends on where you are located on the earth, and on when you measure it.



#### MAGNETIC MOTION

The north magnetic pole is heading from Canada into Siberia, and recently crossed the International Date Line. Its rapid motion, plus other shifts in Earth's magnetic field, have forced scientists to revise the magnetic models that guide navigation.



On a nautical chart, the average variation for the geographical area covered is shown on the magnetic compass rose, and a forecast for the annual change is included (see Figure A). For electronic charts and equipment, information regarding magnetic variation is contained in a database (the World Magnetic Model [WMM]) which is typically updated and distributed every 5 years. This data is typically incorporated into marine electronic equipment, and WMM updates are distributed in periodic software updates.

(If this is all Greek to you, you really should get in touch with the OYC Safety and Education committee and enroll in a Piloting class!)

As it happens, the location of Magnetic North is changing much more rapidly than ever before, so much that the most recent WMM (2015) is now so inaccurate that it is about to exceed the acceptable limit for navigational errors (see Figure B). As a result, NOAA is planning an unprecedented move: to issue a revised WMM in January 2019, one year ahead of schedule.

Changes in the location of the North Magnetic Pole are driven by the churning of liquid iron in the earth's interior, and something weird has been happening lately causing the pole to make a beeline for Siberia. Due to the Federal government shutdown, release of the 2019 WMM has been delayed from January 15 to at least January 30, and only critical updates to nautical charts are being processed.

Just in time after our Digital Selective Calling (DSC) training, the Coast Guard issued the following Notice to Mariners....

WASHINGTON – PUGET SOUND – GPS testing

US Strategic Command has proposed GPS testing encompassing the majority of the Puget Sound area. The center point of the test will be at position 47-01-47.437N, 122-32-57.893W, near Fort Lewis, WA, with a radius of 52 NM. The GPS navigation signal may be unreliable due to testing on GPS frequencies used by shipboard navigation and handheld systems. Systems that rely on GPS, such as e-911, AIS and DSC, may be affected. The testing frequencies will be GPS L1 and L2. Testing dates and times are as listed below, using Pacific Standard Time as local time: 26 Feb 2019: 0700 -1900 27 Feb 2019: 0700 - 1900 28 Feb 2019: 0700 -1900 For additional information or to express concerns, contact the Coast Guard Navigation Center at (703) 313 -5900 or at https://www.navcen.uscg.gov/? pageName=dgpsSiteInfo&currentOutages.

#### **2019 Moorage Inspections**

This being an odd year means all odd numbered moorage spaces (open slips and boathouses) will be inspected to ensure marina safety and compliance with established standards as noted in OYC's Agreements, Rules, and Policies. Inspections will start in April at the latest and hopefully completed by the end of May.

We will have probably five inspection teams and one of them will contact you by email or phone to schedule the inspection of your open slip or boathouse. We encourage you to be present, however, if you cannot, you can provide the team access to your moorage and permission to complete the inspection. Upon completion of the inspection you will receive a copy of inspection by email soon afterwards.

You can go to the OYC Web page and review the "SAFETY & COMPLIANCE CHECK LIST" for both Open Slips & Boathouses in the Download Section. Open slip inspections take approximately 30 minutes, while boathouse inspections take approximately 45 minutes. There will be a "water side inspection" completed prior to the dockside portion for all boathouses; deficiencies noted for waterside will be included on the inspection sheets when dockside is completed.

Boathouse standards are listed in the OYC 2018-2019 Directory for your review. Please assist us with this program by closely observing your property and ensuring standards are maintained and vessels are ready for safe cruising throughout 2019. Thanks for your assistance in keeping OYC a SAFE & SECURE MARINA.

Dear 48° North,

I just received notice from the Maritime Documentation Center (MDC) that my renewal is coming due. The notice was not in the same form as previous ones from the National Wessel Documentation Center (NVDC). I went to MDC but did not complete the process as the site wanted to charge me a total of \$140.

What was once a free renewal jumped to \$26 from NVDC last year, and this year renewals are listed as \$70 from MDC. This was all confusing and concerning.

So, I called NVDC, and they clarified their vessel documentation procedure. First, they confirmed that my boat certificate does not actually expire until March 31 (which I knew and was what precipitated my call), and thus it is NOT expired as the Maritime Documentation Center (MDC) informed me by letter.

The NVDC stated that MDC is a third party agency (not USCG related) providing this service so it cannot be classified as a scam, per se, although I would disagree. In my case, MDC sent me my notice about 3-4 weeks prior to the one NVDC said they would send out, which is 45 days prior to expiration. Second, the NVDC fee is the same as last year (\$26), and not the MDC (service) charge of \$70.

It would be helpful to inform fellow readers that this is a case of someone making a business out of providing an unneeded service normally provided adequately by legal entities. I have come across this as well when renewing my FCC permits and HAM licenses. All boaters need to be made aware of *third party* attempts to obtain inflated fees; some owners may choose to no longer document their boat due to the much higher cost.

The bottom line is that we don't need these businesses misleading us or increasing our boat operating costs.

Thanks for the message, Mike! This is the second time we've had a friend of the magazine point this out to us in recent weeks. It is indeed a concern, and hard to believe it's not illegal! The USCG Deputy for Operations Policy and Capabilities Third Party Awareness Alert says the following:

"The NVDC is aware that there are commercial entities that offer to manage the certification/renewal process on behalf of vessel owners for a fee. The Coast Guard does not endorse any of these companies, and the companies do not operate on behalf of the Coast Guard in any way. Any fees charged or agreements offered by such companies are in no way associated with the NVDC certification process. In addition, these companies are not authorized to issue any form of documentation, including travel letters and/or permits that authorize operation of ANY vessel.
