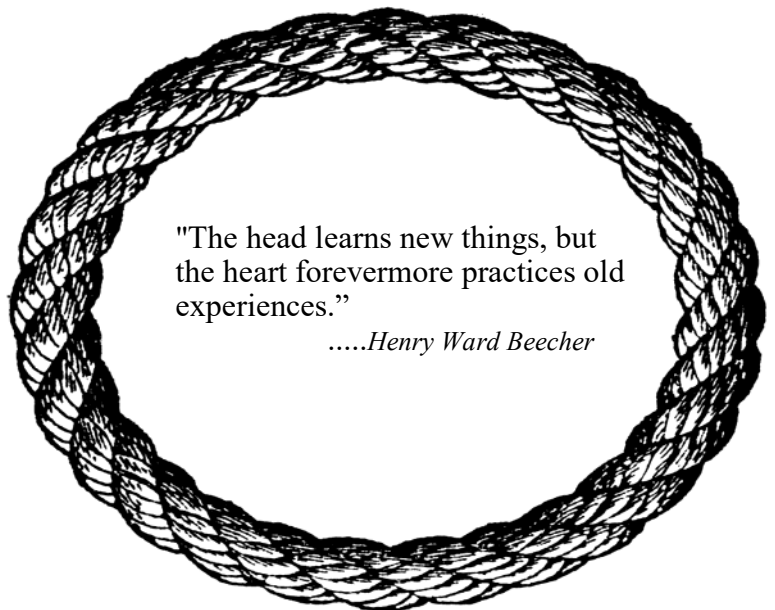

The Board of Trustees had a busy meeting on April 13. Here are some of the highlights.....

- The Board approved four applicants for OYC membership. Please welcome them at the next dinner meeting.
- Environmental Awareness Committee Chair John Sherman presented a resolution to strengthen OYC's ongoing commitment to our Clean Marina goals. New members will receive an information packet on the Clean Marina certification including Best Management Practices and OYC Waste Management Guidelines. These items will also be distributed to all members annually and will be included in the Member Directory. **May 7 is Environmental Day at OYC. Plan to attend.**
- Audit Committee Chair Mark Pearson presented the results on the audit of our 2015 finances. Mark and his committee found no significant financial concerns during the audit. Mark will continue to work with the Junior Sailing program to continue to develop financial statements that will aid the Juniors Program in monitoring their finances and in managing the Program. Thanks to Mark and Jim Sheerer for their work and to Treasurer Jon Bryant for his continual diligence of our financial health.
- At the request of the Government Affairs Committee, the Board approved the OYC sponsorship of **Harbor Days**, specifically the Tugboat Captains dinner which has been hosted at OYC for many years. In addition, we approved OYC sponsorship of the **Soldier Sailing program on June 11**. The Soldier Sailing program supports wounded veterans. Both sponsorships allow the complimentary use of the Club House and galley and will result in excellent positive community recognition for OYC.
- The Board wants to remind all boat house owners considering selling their boat house that an inspection is required prior to the completion of the sale. Contact the Moorage Master or Main Station Chair for more information.

We discussed the results of this year's Legislative Reception and confirmed we would host it again next year. We need to continue to find ways to increase the attendance.

Committee member Jinny Beekman will write some short articles to be published in the Olympia Downtown Association newsletter over the next year. Topics will highlight things that the yacht club does to support the local community. These will include the Junior Summer Sailing Program, FooFaraw, Special Peoples Cruise, Christmas Parade of Boats, etc.

Balance

In all things – wonderful!

We, however, enjoy tippy things – boats. Some of these are tippier than others. I think power boats are tippier than sailboats which really lean and then get stable. No matter. It is our balance that keeps us from hurtling to the deck with every passing ripple or wake. It is our inner ear combined with our vision that do most of the work. Nerves in the legs also contribute to our position sense.

The inner ear has 3 semi-circular canals filled with fluid that have hair cells holding a very small otoconia or rocks. When these are accelerated, such as in an elevator or plane, we experience sensation of movement. With 3 canals in different orientations, we can sense changes and help keep ourselves upright. These nerves can be tricked with minor changes like the "frog in the hot water" story. This information goes to the brain, and the brain learns that all this bouncing around is the new "normal," and you develop sea legs. Do that for a while, and you develop "disembarkment legs" when you get off the boat.

Your eyes are the most protective of balance as long as some sort of horizon can be visualized. Most places, even at night, have some sort of horizon to help. Your brain knows to trust this as the primary balance input. This is why pilots trust their instruments and never the "seat of their pants."

Proprioception is the input your muscles and nerves provide to the brain as you feel an uneven change in pressure as your body lurches with motion.

All well and good, Doc, but what can we do about it? And so we get back to practice, practice, practice. Balance is something we can learn. Take Yoga classes and learn to stand in weird positions. When you dress or undress, stand on one foot for as long as you can. Then the other foot. Build the strength in your legs and core (center). Be careful about mixing alcohol or medications that can upset your sense of balance (see Falls).

OYC Safety & Environmental Awareness Day May 7, 2016

Are you and your trusty vessel completely ready for Opening Day? Are you prepared to breeze through the borderland on this summer's Commodore's Cruise? If not, the upcoming OYC Safety & Environmental Awareness Day can help!

Between 10 am and 1 pm, Saturday, May 7, (one week before Opening Day) stop by the OYC Clubhouse and pick up some products, ideas, and services that will help prepare you and your boat for a safe and successful summer boating season.

1. Pick up some **Free Bilge Pads**--to keep your engine compartment spick and span.
2. **Replace Outdated Flares** and signaling devices to comply with USCG regulations and pick up some environmentally-friendly cleaning materials at the **West Marine** table.
3. Get your **Fire Extinguishers Certified** and refilled (if need be) for another season of (hopefully passive) protection at the **AmeriSafe** table.
4. We will also have a fire extinguisher burn pan and **Experience Putting Out a Real Fire** -- learn the difference between types of fire extinguishers and how long a 2-½ & 5 lb. extinguisher lasts (in case you're tempted to economize).
5. Get a voluntary **Boat Safety Inspection** by a US Power Squadron member to make sure you've covered the bases and comply with applicable boating regulations; if so, you will be awarded a useful Decal, which may help if you're selected to be boarded by the Coast Guard this season.
6. **Safely dispose** of old, outdated pyrotechnics (flares)--OR, **Shoot 'em Off** on the end of the dock between 11am and 12 pm to get some hands-on experience with how they behave before you need them.

In addition, there will be boater information on **Washington State Marine Parks**, material from the **South Sound Estuary** to help you identify those tide-pool critters (and be a wise hero to your kids), and information on **recycling** and **hazardous waste disposal** at the OYC.

.....Not to mention **coffee and cookies** to help fuel you through all of these preparations!

By the time you read this, hopefully all OYC boats are back in their OYC moorage and enjoying their new slips. I want to send out a special thanks to Gene Testa and Tim Ridley who stuck it out for the day to day supervision of the new dock install. Greg Whittaker was hugely helpful as well. Thanks, you guys. If you like your improved, de-algae-ized dock box, give thanks to Gary Nichols and Jack Behrend. It's almost like magic what one can do with a pressure washer.



Open Slip and Boat House Inspections are in the works, please help out as you can and go ahead and prepare your moorage to meet the published criteria ahead of time. In order to get these inspections done in a timely fashion, sign up for an appointment on the sign-up sheets and make sure you keep your appointment. These appointments are not carved in stone, but please give us plenty of notice that you cannot keep your appointment.

Coming up in the next couple months, look for work crews building a new dinghy dock. After some pretty serious talk at the last Main Station meeting, the group favored a go-ahead to build a dinghy dock. There are a lot of members who have a platform behind their dock box and the Main Station members feel it is imperative that we not deface the new docks with these structures. Though this may change in the future, the consensus was to fine and remove any additional structures built onto finger piers unless specifically pre-approved. This gives further impetus to build a special dock just for members' dinghies.

We have a renewed initiative in place to upgrade our OYC Wi-Fi system; stay tuned.

Safety Committee

OYC SAFETY DAY MAY 7 2016

Between 10 am and 1 pm, AmeriSafe of Tumwater will again provide our members with hands on experience extinguishing a real fire in a burn pan.

FIRE EXTINGUISHERS -- Learn the difference between types of extinguishers and how long different size extinguishers last in fighting a fire. Bring your fire extinguishers to the clubhouse parking lot for a safety check and service if necessary. **Note:** If your fire extinguisher gauge is in the green and the extinguisher has been sitting in its mount all year, especially if you have used the boat often (lots of vibrations) the dry chemical will be caked in the bottom of the extinguisher internal feed tube and will most likely clog the extinguisher, and it will not function properly. Learn how to dislodge the caked dry chemical powder in your extinguisher, so it will function properly. On your vessel or at home, know how to keep your fire extinguisher dry chemical in powder form and usable.

C.O. DETECTORS -- We still have a few salt water environment style marine carbon monoxide detectors available. Because I have diesel engines, and I don't need them. **WRONG** -- any gas engine (boat) exhaust fumes next to or close to you can enter through your vessels hatches, windows or doors. A few prevention measures could save your life. **Note:** Household style C.O. detectors and or smoke detectors are not designed for salt water marine environments and will deteriorate and become nonfunctional. A few extra \$ is well worth your safety.

SS RETRACTABLE LADDERS -- We still have a few SS retractable ladders for your own open slip or boathouse. Yes, they are like the ones you see around OYC. From my own personal experience several years ago, when you fall in the water your clothes become saturated, and you are so heavy you cannot climb up on the dock or your swim step. I know because several years ago when I fell in the water in my boathouse and I needed help to get out of the water. Thankfully I had help and trudged up to the clubhouse dripping large amounts of water on the way to the outside shower and to change to dry clothes. After I put the wet clothes in a plastic bag, I was surprised at how heavy the wet clothes still were. Yes, it is easy to remember when we were all young bucks, lots of muscle and strong, however that was a long time ago for some of us at OYC. Today many of us are much older, and I don't know about you, but I not only lost the youth but also the strength. Sometimes I seem to be a slow learner, but I have installed an OYC style SS retractable ladder in my boathouse. Because I am not always at our OYC moorage, I also installed a retractable SS ladder under my swim step with a handle on top to assist in getting out of the water and back on board by myself.

Just some food for thought for you and your family's safety on the water.

The History Corner

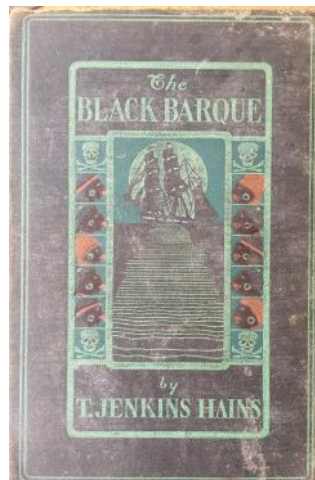
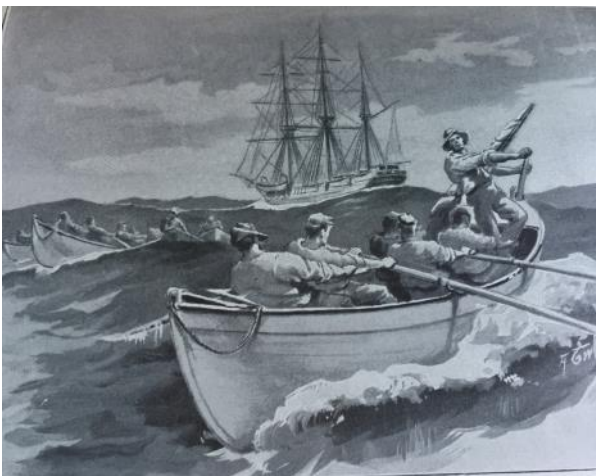
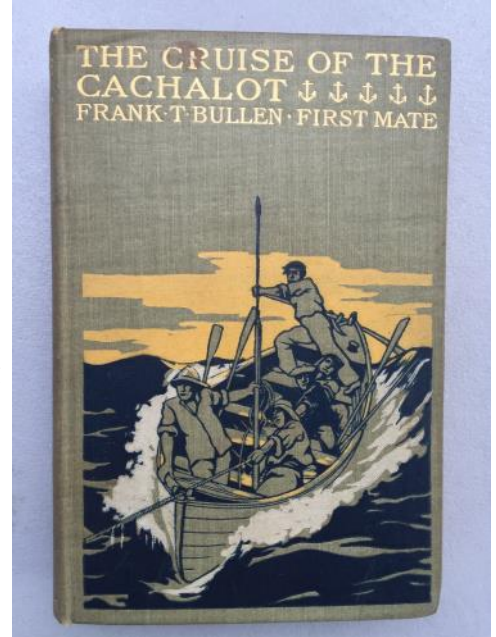
and embossed covers. I placed a few of them temporarily in the history cabinet (western corner of the Main Station) in case anyone would like to see them or borrow them. Some of these books are available online, without the illustrations. Online books have many advantages (affordability, sustainability, ease of storage), but the hard-copy illustrations and embossed covers truly add something to the experience of reading seafaring stories. A few of the covers and illustrations are provided here.

Special Notice:

Yacht clubs need history. A recent article in *BoatUS*, for instance, offered advice on how to “build up” a yacht club. It includes the following suggestion: “Each club inevitably has a club historian, whether formally recognized or not. Find yours, and encourage these members to do historical boating presentations at your local maritime museum, lighthouse, or neighborhood civic association. Historical presentations using old photographs and trophies can showcase an organization as truly embedded in a neighborhood or city.” (See “Building Up America's Boat Clubs,” by Troy Gilbert and Bernadette Bernon, 2016. <http://www.boatus.com/magazine/2016/april/boat-clubs.asp>).

History provides a context for understanding our current and future activities. “The past isn’t dead,” wrote William Faulker. “It isn’t even past.” The past is part of us – and preserving and studying history is more about the future than it is about quaint stories that happened long ago.

OYC annuals indicate that our club has had an official historian off and on for many decades. PC Mike Contris served in this position before PC Tony Re appointed me in 2008. It has been an honor to serve the OYC in this manner, and I have cherished the opportunity to meet and interview many members, who have generously shared their amazing stories, photos, and documents. **After eight years I am stepping down (as of June 2016). If anyone is interested in becoming the official OYC historian, please call me at 206-465-0630 – I will pass along your interest and information.** Responsibilities include collecting and organizing historical records and providing information for *The Beachcomber* and website. This is a wonderful opportunity to engage with members while contributing to our club by preserving its heritage. I am still an OYC member and will be available for help and consultation. Next month’s column – my last – will include samples of my favorite documents collected over the years.
