#### In Remembrance of those who choose the ultimate sacrifice.

Memorial Day is a very solemn day for many of us who served. For me I am humbled by my Brothers in Arms' unselfish and supreme sacrifice of themselves. For most of those who gave their lives, there is little to remember them by. So in remembrance of someone who gave his all, an excerpt of a Medal of Honor Citation Awardee, and Submarine Hero – CDR

Howard Gilmore, Captain of the USS Growler (SS-215):

Medal of Honor Citation for Commander Howard W. Gilmore. For distinguished gallantry and valor above and beyond the call of duty as Commanding Officer of the USS Growler during her Fourth War Patrol in the Southwest Pacific from 10 January to 7 February 1943. Boldly striking at the enemy in spite of continuous hostile air and antisubmarine patrols, CDR Gilmore sank one Japanese freighter and damaged another by torpedo fire, successfully evading severe depth charges following each attack. In the darkness of night on 7 February, an enemy gunboat closed range and prepared to ram the Growler. CDR Gilmore daringly maneuvered to avoid the crash and rammed the attacker instead, ripping into her port side at 11 knots and bursting wide her plates. In the terrific fire of the sinking gunboat's heavy machineguns, CDR Gilmore calmly gave the order to clear the bridge, and refusing safety for himself, remained on deck while his men preceded him below. Struck down by the fusillade of bullets and having done his utmost against the enemy, in his final living moments, CDR Gilmore gave his last order to the officer of the deck, "Take her down." The Growler dived; seriously damaged but under control, she was brought safely to port by her well -trained crew inspired by the courageous fighting spirit of their dead captain.

Signed by Franklin D. Roosevelt.

For sacrificing his own life to save his ship, Commander Gilmore was posthumously awarded the Medal of Honor. In September 1943, the submarine tender USS Howard W. Gilmore (AS-16) was named for him and sponsored by his widow. Even today, "Take her down!" remains one of the legendary phrases of the U.S. Submarine Force. Sixty six US Submarines have been lost to the deep and remain on Eternal Patrol. It is with reverent pride that I count them as my Brothers. I leave you with a Submarines Prayer:

O Father, hear our prayer to Thee. For your humble servants, beneath the sea In the depths of oceans, as oft they stray. So far from night, so far from day. We would ask your Guiding Light to glow, To make their journey safe below. Please oft times grant them patient mind, Then 'ere the darkness won't them blind. They seek thy protection from the deep, Please grant them peace when 'ere they sleep. Of their homes and loved ones far away. We ask you care for them each day, Until they surface once again. To drink the air and feel the rain. We ask your guiding hand to show, A safe progression sure and slow. Dear Lord, please hear our prayer to thee, For your humble servants beneath the sea.

The first yacht club was the Water Club of the Harbor of Cork in Ireland, established in 1720. In the very early days of yachting, the steam, sail, and oil boats were only for the extremely wealthy. In 1850 there were only four or five live steam yachts. By the early 1930's Lloyd's Register showed a total afloat yacht count at about 5,000. Boy have we come a long way in 80 years. Well, that's it for May.

# **Board of Trustees**

New Bridge Officers and two new Board of Trustees will be elected at the May 2nd dinner meeting. Please plan to attend and participate.

The Community and Government Affairs and the Long-Range Planning committees are developing a plan to build greater, positive community recognition and support of the Olympia Yacht Club. The plan will be available within the next couple of months. The goal is to create community support ahead of our lease renewal as well as be an active participant in our community. Our current 30-year lease will need to be renewed in 2027.

If you are planning to change the floatation on your boat house, check out the new rules before you begin. It appears that unwrapped and plastic wrapped Styrofoam floatation will no longer be allowed.

The Safety and Education Committee has received their order for safety ladders. Club members will begin installing them on the docks beginning April 22. If you are interested in helping and earning CSP hours, contact Committee Chair Dan Wyre or project lead Bill Hamaker.

The Department of Ecology has announced a new "No Discharge Zone" for Puget Sound. The Zone goes into effect on May 10, 2018. Starting that date, recreational boats will not be allowed to dump sewage (black water) whether treated or not. The Zone includes Lake Washington and Lake Union. As members of OYC with our Clean Marina designation we need to set an example. We have a pump out stations available only a few yards from our marina and at Swantown Marina.

There was an interesting article in the April 8 addition of the Seattle Times about a rescue of kayaker in Saratoga Passage. The kayaker and his companion in another kayak were caught by a shift in the weather. The young kayaker's kayak flipped. Fortunately, the crew on a 28-foot sailboat spotted him and were able to rescue him using a Lifesling. The other kayaker was still in his kayak and was picked up by another boat. All of us should consider having a Lifesling on board and know how to use it. Or at least have a plan on how you might use a throwable cushion and a line to pick up someone in the water, just like you would pick up your water skier.

Several OYC members have attended an excellent two-day course on Diesel Engines. The course was taught by an excellent young woman mechanic from Portland. The Safety and Education Committee sponsored three, two-day sessions with a dozen students in each. We disassembled a small engine and even put it back together. While I will never tear-down my 300 HP Volvo engine like that, it certainly is great to now have a much better understanding of how the engine and all its systems work together. Thanks to the Committee and Mary Campbell for putting this excellent training together.

Get out on the water. The Commodore's Cruise will be August 3-9. The cruise stops in Bell Harbor, Edmonds, Langley and Poulsbo. Please plan to join us.

The Board of Trustees meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at the Clubhouse. Minutes of the meetings are posted on the bulletin board. The next scheduled BOT meeting is on May 9, 2018.

# Fleet Surgeon Richard Hurst, M.D ("Rich")



It is pouring rain outside, but I have to believe that by the time you read this, the sun will have returned to our Northwest and we will be out on the water. And no, this is not the article where I remind you to use sunscreen (but please do), this is where I remind you that we are on the water, not in it. Our waterways are fed from snowmelt that slowly warms until it gets to the sound. In many areas, the water stays 45-55 degrees year round and our hot house bodies do not do well in it. The top few inches may warm, but below that only minimally.

If you go in unexpectedly, you may reflexly gasp and pull in water into your lungs and things will go rapidly downhill from there. Here is a link that I really recommend everyone who boats should view. It shows an experienced boater in 41 degree water and the effects and survival techniques he uses. He demonstrates how you rapidly lose function of your hands and how your ability to self-rescue quickly goes away. You might get back to the boat, then be unable to climb back on.

We carry a Lifesling retrieval system aboard our boat. We participated in a class through SSSS where we had the opportunity to use it to bring a Gumby-suited over-board volunteer back as if there were only one person left on board. It was great practice.

If you do go in, hope you are wearing a life jacket. If you get retrieved, get the wet clothes off and gently wrap in warm clothes or blankets. Stocking caps are great to help control heat loss. Because the body tries to protect the good stuff (heart and brain) by clamping down the blood vessels elsewhere, do not move the victim excessively and don't rub the extremities. That can force the cold deeper into the body. Rewarming, bare, under the covers, is recommended, but conjures up the scenario of someone's fat brother-in-law. If they are awake and coherent, give them warm liquids and never alcohol.

Always be mindful that we are "on" the water. Use extra care when conditions may kick up. Use life jackets while on deck.

# **Recreational Boaters Association** of Washington Report

# **Summary Report to Olympia Yacht Club April 2018**

Aquatic Invasive Species – New Vessel Permit requirement for commercial carriers, out-ofstate recreational boats, and seaplanes: The AIS permits – which recreational boaters in the state are not required to have – technically have been required since last October. However, WDFW is now starting the education and awareness campaign on the requirement, timed to coincide with summer boating season. But, suffice to say that WDFW has a lot of work to do to get the word out and their online purchasing option for the permits (\$22) is not at all intuitive.

**No Discharge Zone:** A June 7 hearing before the Pollution Control Hearings Board (PCHB) is still queued up. That hearing will focus on whether the Department of Ecology should have gone through a certification process and in fact did not. The projected effective date of May 10th, announced recently, may not be implemented.

National Electrical Code (NEC) Standard applying to ground protection standards for marinas: L&I is now in the process of starting rulemaking for a more permanent regulation to go into effect as soon as next year. A public hearing will be held on May 9th regarding their rule adop-

SHB 2634, addressing anti-fouling paints on recreational water vessels: NMTA-led and RBAW-supported 2634 passed the Legislature and the Governor signed it into law on March 15. It takes effect June 7. The bill extends the date by which recreational boat manufacturers were to have phased out the use of copper-bottomed paint on vessels. Ecology is finding that alternatives to the copper-bottomed paint may be more toxic than copper, and needs more time to evaluate options.

Governor's Executive Order 18-02: Governor Jay Inslee issued an executive order regarding Southern Resident Killer Whale recovery and task force. The order directs select state agencies, in consultation with the appropriate local governments, federal agencies, and tribal governments, to conduct actions to further the purpose of the order. The order further creates a Southern Resident Killer Whale Task Force to identify, prioritize, and support the implementation of a longer term action plan needed for the recovery of Southern Residents and necessary to secure a healthy and sustained population for the future.

# **Practice Makes Perfect and Equals Experience**

OYC and SSSS both conduct many of their events, including races and cruises, on weekends, when most of us would normally be free to do many other things. The same thing is true for our middle school and high school sailors. Our OYC high school teams race on many weekends, and just like you, they are juggling sailing with school work, family commitments, and traveling to the regattas, often getting up before it's light to travel. We have mostly young teams, some of them have been sailing for several years, but many are just starting out. I am impressed that our teams are in the winning top 3 or 4 teams on a regular basis now. We even had teams go to national events this year. So last week someone asked me what has changed. Looking back I can say instruction, experience and a commitment to PRACTICE.

As adults we often forget about the importance of practice, relying on experience and hoping someone in a dock discussion may pass on a tidbit of knowledge. Two years ago when our teams were just starting out, we weren't placing in races or even getting close. But

what has changed all that? Well, a lot of the credit, of course, goes to Sarah Hanavan and the commitment she asks for from these young athletes. If you are paying attention to our waterfront, you will see the high school team practicing three times per week, and the middle school teams practicing twice per week, in all types of weather. This is not a fair weather effort. Our coach Sarah and her sailors are out on the water practically every day no matter the weather. And what do they do with her guidance? They practice! They practice starts, they practice strategy, they



practice changing roles as skipper or crew, they practice downwind legs, rounding marks – just to name a few... and they practice and they practice and they practice and that equals experience!

So if you are an OYC or SSSS member and you want to know how you can be a better boater, better racer or cruiser, the answer is Practice! Our kids were out there in the rain the week before the regatta last weekend practicing as they have been since the middle of February. They placed 2nd and 4th.

So as summer approaches, include Practice in your sunset cruises. Throw a cushion or fender overboard and then practice picking it up; time yourself. If you are a sailor; do it under sail. Practice flying your spinnaker; practice reefing your main sail; practice dropping your anchor under sail. Practice slowing your boat down alongside a marker to come to a complete stop. Practice anchoring or picking up mooring buoys. Practice docking, practice backing up, practice using hand signals with your mate, instead of yelling! ..... the list goes on and on. And here's the good part, .... if you don't know how to do something or want guidance from a more experienced person, both OYC and SSSS have members who can help you with that. Just ask. Someone will give you pointers, show you how it's done and then guide you into being a more experienced and successful boater. If the kids can practice and win, you can too! Honing your skills may make the difference in bad weather or dangerous situations. Practice means you have more tools in your belt to solve a problem.



Safety and Education Committee

Greetings, OYCers! Your Safety and Education Committee has had a busy first quarter of 2018. First, we took on the task and re-chartered our committee to add an education component. Next, we ordered and installed new "FloatStep" safety ladders at the Main Station. Finally, with the OYC Environmental Awareness Committee, we co-hosted OYC's Safety and Environmental Day. We had a great time with many of you who attended and/or volunteered for these events. Your participation is what makes the Olympia Yacht Club a "top cabin" organization!

One of our first educational opportunities was the recently completed Diesel Maintenance training. We are hearing excellent reviews of the weekend class in Marine Diesel Basics recently offered twice at OYC. The class is taught by Meredith Anderson, a diesel mechanic and engineer currently employed by Cummins diesel in Portland. Using a 2 cylinder Volvo marine diesel (donated by Bill Hamaker) as a prop, Meredith walks people through the various systems within a diesel engine: fuel, air, raw water, coolant, oil, and exhaust. Participants get their hands greasy taking the engine apart, and find out

what is inside that mysterious hunk of metal. One participant observed that he learned as much from his fellow students as he did from the class, because the class offered a venue to share tips and experiences.

We are working on an on-line survey of OYC members to help identify and focus additional training opportunities. More to come soon on that.

Finally, in previous Beachcombers, we have written articles pointing out the importance of planning for "man over board" events, and we have pointed out the disturbing national statistics issued by the Coast Guard on the increase of boating accidents involving human powered vessels. # Requirements for Long term Moorage as per Chapter 195, Laws of 2014 Second Substitute House Bill (SSHB) 2457

	Effective June 12, 2014, a moorage provider that provides long term moorage (more than 30 consecutive days, including continuing month-to-month moorage agreement) must obtain the following information and documentation from persons entering into or renewing long term moorage agreement
