Because the pandemic has created such change in our cruising plans, I thought I'd provide some updates that I have received. I would encourage all members to send in any information that they have discovered next month. (JG—Ed.)

#### From Roche Harbor YC FCP Dennis McCrea:

Ahoy fellow club members,

I just want to give you a quick update as to the status of cruising effective April 19, 2020.

San Juan Island (county) marina's are closed (Roche, Friday Harbor) but still are available for fueling.

Kingston remains closed for fuel and moorage. Dock Street is available, but no line handling is available.

The majority of the reciprocal slips from other Yacht Clubs remain closed - so don't count on being able to use while cruising.

Call ahead to any marina you are considering to visit to find out the status of fuel and moorage availability. Anchoring out is an option and you may have to dinghy into shore because some marina's and public docks are closed to any arrivals to the docks.

The Canadian Border Patrol and US Customs announced today (Saturday April 18th) that the Canadian Border remains closed to recreational boat traffic at least until the 15th of next month (May) and will probably be extended again. Failure to follow the closure rules may subject the boat to be seized and impounded, and fines issued. Also any passengers may be subject to mandatory 14 day quarantine.

#### The USS Olympia lives on



When I look at OYC's detailed model of the U.S.S. Olympia (the pocket cruiser, not the submarine), I think of a visit I made through the ship, which is moored in Philadelphia as part of the Independence Seaport Museum. Launched in 1892, Olympia (C-6) is the oldest steel warship afloat in the world.

The ship was closed to tours when I came by, but fortunately a volunteer working on the deck let me go through the ship, which became famous during the Spanish-American War of 1898. It was the flagship of Commodore George Dewey at the Battle of Manila Bay. Dewey uttered the famous quote, "You may fire when you are ready Gridley" to the ship's captain. The Spanish fleet and shore batteries were dispatched with little damage to the American fleet.

The ship subsequently had a long career, being decommissioned and recommissioned several times, serving during World War I and afterwards and finally bringing back the body of the unknown soldier for internment in the Arlington National Cemetery. She was decommissioned for the last time in Philadelphia in 1922. Several web sites have detailed information on the ship's career, including Wikipedia, the Naval Historical Foundation, and of course the museum web site, <a href="https://www.phillyseaport.org/olympia">https://www.phillyseaport.org/olympia</a>.

Not surprisingly, it has become increasingly difficult to maintain the ship as its hull rusts away and grew so thin in places that sections had to be replaced while in the river using unique cofferdams, and drydock work is urgently needed, adequate funds being an obstacle.

What impressed me the most is the admiral and captain's quarters which were large and nicely furnished, with couches, nice paneling and other peacetime amenities if memory serves me correctly. I did take pictures of the interior but I have been unable to find them, darn it. Anyway, the most interesting part was the presence of cannons jutting out the sides of the hull in the admiral and captain quarters on port and starboard, respectively.

If you are ever in Philadelphia, I encourage you to plan a visit and while you are there visit the U.S.S. New Jersey across the river. I didn't get to visit it, but will do so the next time I'm in town.

#### Potpourri - Submitted by PC Jim Shearer

From: Commanding Officer, USCGC Swift Sure (WMWC 327)

To: Commander First Coast Guard District Dear Admiral.

It is with regret and haste that I write this letter to you, regret that such a small misunderstanding could lead to the following circumstances, and haste, in order that you will get this report before you form your own preconceived opinions from reports in the world press, for I am sure that they will tend to overdramatize the affair.

As you know while visiting foreign ports on our present cadet cruise the port regulations require that we utilize a pilot and tug assistance. We had just picked up the pilot, and a cadet had returned from changing the "G" flag for the "H", and being his first cruise, was having difficulty in rolling in the 'G' flag. I therefore proceeded to show him how, coming to the last part I told him to 'let go'. The lad, although willing is, not too bright, necessitating my having to repeat the order in a sharper tone. LET GO!

At this moment the executive officer appeared from the chart room, having been plotting the vessel's progress and thinking that it was the anchors that we were referring to, repeated the "LET GO" to the first lieutenant on the forecastle. The port anchor, having been cleared away but not walked out, was promptly let go. The effect of letting the anchor drop from the 'pipe' while the vessel was proceeding at full harbor speed proved too much for the windless brake and the entire length of the port cable was pulled out 'by the roots'. I fear that damage to the chain locker may be extensive. The braking effect of the port anchor naturally caused the vessel to sheer in that direction, right towards the swing bridge that spans a tributary to the river up which we were proceeding.

The swing bridge operator showed great presence of mind by opening the bridge for my vessel. Unfortunately, he did not think to stop the vehicle traffic. The result being that the bridge partly opened and deposited a Volkswagen, two cyclists, and a cattle truck on the foredeck just forward of the 5" gun mount. My ships company are at present rounding up the contents of the truck, which from the noises I would say were pigs. In his effort to stop the progress of the vessel the first lieutenant then dropped the starboard anchor, too late to be of practical use for it fell on the swing bridge operator's control station.

After the port anchor was let go and the vessel started to sheer I gave a double ring full astern on the engine room telegraph and personally called the engine room to order maximum astern revolutions. I was informed that the sea temperature was 53 degrees and asked if there was a film tonight! My reply would not add constructively to this report.

Up to now I have confined my report to the activities at the forward end of my vessel - back aft, they were having their own problems. At the moment the port anchor was let go, the operations officer was supervising the making fast of the aft tug, and was lowering the ship's towing hawser down onto the tug.

The sudden braking effect on the port anchor caused the tug to 'run in under' the stern of my vessel, just at the moment when the propellers are answering my double ring full astern. The prompt action of the operations officer in securing the inboard end of the towing hawser delayed the sinking of the tug by some minutes thereby allowing the safe abandoning of that vessel.

It is strange, but at the very same moment of letting go the port anchor there was a massive power outage ashore. The fact that we were passing over a 'cable area' at that time may suggest that we may have touched something on the riverbed. It is perhaps lucky that the high-tension cables brought down by the foremast were not live, possibly being replaced by the underwater cable. But owing to the shore blackout it is impossible to say where the high-tension towers fell.

It never fails to amaze me, the action and behavior of foreigners during moments of minor crisis. The pilot for instance is at this moment huddled in the corner of my cabin, alternatively crooning to himself and crying after having consumed a bottle of gin in a time that is worthy of inclusion in the Guinness book of records. The tug captain on the other hand reacted violently and had to be forcibly restrained by the hospital corpsman, who has him hand cuffed in the ship's sick bay where he is telling me to do impossible things with my ship and my person.

I enclose the names and addresses of the drivers and insurance companies of the vehicles on my foredeck, which the first lieutenant alertly collected after his somewhat hurried evacuation of the forecastle. These particulars will enable us to claim for the damage that they did to our railings.

I am closing this preliminary report for I am finding it difficult to concentrate with the sound of police sirens and their flashing lights.

It is sad to think that had the cadet realized that there is no need to fly pilot flags after dark, none of this would have happened.

#### **Budget and Finance**

Gary Ball, Chair



From the office (a subsidiary report of the Finance Committee):

We are still focused pretty intently on improving the movement of money to and from the Club. We now have 110 members (out of 264 paying memberships) who are receiving emailed invoices. Of those, approximately 70% are paying electronically and of those, nearly all are using the ACH (Automated Clearing House) function. While it is possible to pay with a credit card, the 3% charge we have to add to an invoice is a lot of money so should be considered carefully.

What is ACH? It is a batch processing system in which financial institutions accumulate ACH transactions throughout the day for later batch processing. Instead of using paper to carry necessary transaction information, like with checks, ACH Network transactions are transmitted electronically, allowing for faster processing times and cost savings. The ACH Network processes two types of transactions: Direct Deposits via ACH (like payroll, government benefits, tax refunds) and Direct Payments via ACH to make payments, either as an ACH credit ('push') or ACH debit ('pull'). There is a difference between these types of payments:

An ACH debit **pulls** funds from an account. An example of this is when a consumer establishes a recurring monthly payment for a mortgage or utility bill, and his/her account is debited automatically. An ACH credit **pushes** funds into an account. An example of this is when a consumer initiates a payment

through his/her bank or credit union to pay a bill.

OYC uses only the credit, or push, form of payments. Each payment by a member requires that member to — literally — push the button to send a specific sum of money through their bank to OYC's bank. Once the payment is made, an email comes to me letting me know the payment has been made and it is credited to the member's account. You can read more about the ACH process at <a href="https://www.nacha.org/content/what-is-ach">https://www.nacha.org/content/what-is-ach</a>

ACH is something to which all banking institutions belong. OYC was required to go through a screening process and complete documentation in order to be able to use it for our online payment processing. Members do not need to initiate any action with their bank or take any action other than to press the button that says "View and Pay Invoice," complete your banking information (which otherwise would appear on a paper check), and click "Pay \$xxxx."

Some members believe that sending payments via their bank's bill-pay system is just as efficient. It isn't, at least not on this end. It requires the mailing of a paper check to OYC that must first be retrieved (currently requiring a mask and gloves), then opened, hand coded into Quickbooks, endorsed, scanned, made part of a deposit slip, and taken to the bank (again in mask and gloves). It would be great if this could be eliminated in time for prime boating season so I don't have to come back to port to process checks.

#### Free is Always a Good Price!

Any of you who lived near Portland will remember Tom Peterson, the omnipresent late night furniture sales guy who would offer some piece of furniture on sale for \$\$ and then, get this, give you a lamp or whatever for FREE! And then he emphasized, "Free is always a good price!" And so, I looked to find you free substitutes for the CPR, AED, and First Aid courses that the club and I provided for free. Turns out the search for true eleemosynary sites comes at a price – usually ads. Try this one or Google CPR free.

Masks: There are some really good studies out there about the effectiveness of masks to keep infected people from spreading their germs. COVID 19 is a virus and as such is really tiny and a lone virus can easily pass through a mask's fibers, but these virus particles are usually glommed together in mucus droplets and these are filtered out by almost any mask. Hence the CDC's recommendation that sick people wear masks. All those years in surgery, I wore masks to keep my germs from infecting my patients. But wait, it is solid science that people shed virus for about 2 days before they feel sick so now the recommendation is for everyone to wear a mask in public because who knows who is shedding virus. If everyone is covered up, many more are safe. But wait, does anyone believe the healthcare workers we see on TV wearing protective gear are keeping patients from getting the workers' germs? No, of course not, we always wear protective gear when around infective patients for our personal protection and to keep from spreading their germs around. Ideally, we shed all the protective gear after each patient encounter – at least we did in the good old days before shortages. So now you know the medical secret that masks protect you and everyone else. Wear them when you are at the store where 6 feet is ideal, and not always possible. If you are outside and swing 10 feet around others, no need for masks. If you are around people exercising such as runners, give them a lot of room. Maybe 30 feet as they are breathing deeply and potentially spreading more germs. People talking loudly or singing are also projecting their germs.

Last month I recommended Desolation Sound for social isolation. Can't go to Canada now and our marine parks are closed. Not even supposed to drive around the bay. Go down and wax on the boat, if anyone comes close, offer to let them wax also – that should keep them away. My mother always said, "This too shall pass." It will.

Do Your Part. Keep at least 6 feet away from others on the dock unless one of you has to walk on water. Don't linger at close quarters. Even better – wear your mask!

#### **2020 OYC Moorage Inspections**


This being an even year means all even numbered moorage spaces (open slips and boathouses) will be inspected to ensure marina safety and compliance with established standards as noted in OYC's Agreements, Rules, and Policies. Inspections will start in September and hopefully be completed by October 31, 2020. This schedule has been slipped due to issues caused by our present virus conditions.

We will have five inspection teams and one of them will contact you by email or phone to schedule the inspection of your open slip or boathouse. We encourage you to be present, however, if you cannot, you can provide the team access to your moorage and permission to complete the inspection. Upon completion of the inspection you will receive a copy of the completed inspection by email soon afterwards.

You can go to the OYC Web page and review the "SAFETY & COMPLIANCE CHECK LIST" for both Open Slips & Boathouses in the Download Section. Open slip inspections take approximately 30 minutes, while boathouse inspections take approximately 45 minutes. There will be a "water side inspection" completed prior to the dockside portion for all boathouses; deficiencies noted for waterside will be included on the inspection sheets when dockside is completed. Boathouse standards are listed in the OYC 2019-2020 Directory (pages 151-154) for your review.

Please assist us with this program by closely observing your property and ensuring standards are maintained and vessels are prepared for safe cruising throughout 2020. Thanks for your assistance in implementing this program later than normal, while continuing to maintain established moorage standards within the OYC Marina.
