The Board had a long meeting in October. A significant portion of the meeting was devoted to a lively discussion on membership. I would also like to apologize to the Sailing Education Program, instructors, and other parents that witnessed my inappropriate and excessive reaction to this event.

I have accepted all of the Board's components of discipline and assure you that this behavior will not happen again. While I know that a meaningful contribution to the Sailing Education Program will not make up for my actions, I am hopeful that my donation, as well as this formal apology, will help everyone I have hurt know of my deep regret. I hope it will ease some of the tension I have caused for the program and Yacht Club members.

Greetings OYCers!

Hopefully, you have registered and/or have taken one or more of the recent OYC Boating Trainings we offered this month. Because of the support of the BOT and the valuable information you gave us last spring on our Membership Safety Survey, the OYC's Boat Safety Training Program is off to a great start!

Thank you all! Keep your eyes peeled for future Safety trainings in 2019.

Speaking of boat safety, the US Coast Guard has released its annual Recreational Boating Statistics for 2017. See the full report at http://www.uscgboating.org/statistics/accident_statistics.php. Key highlights of the report include:

- The number of accidents DECREASED 3.9%,
- The number of deaths DECREASED 6.1%, and
- The number of injuries DECREASED 9.4%.
- Of drowning victims, 84.5% WERE NOT WEARING A LIFE JACKET.

- Where data was known, open motorboats had the highest (47%) and kayaks had the 2nd highest percentage of deaths (15%).
- Where instruction was known, 81% of deaths occurred on boats where the operator DID NOT RECEIVE BOATING SAFETY INSTRUCTION. Only 14% percent of deaths occurred on vessels where the operator had received a nationally-approved boating safety education certificate.

This last bullet gets to my message this month: **Educated Boaters Make Safe Boaters!** Take advantage of our OYC Safety and Education Program by participating in boat safety trainings (no matter if you're new to boating or an Old Salt). Attend and participate in our Safety and Education Committee meetings the 4th Wednesday of the month, 5:30 at the Main Station.

Finally, take advantage of free, online Boat Safety training courses. The fall and winter months are excellent times to go online on a dark and dreary day to learn and test your knowledge and skills about safety. Go to https://www.boatus.org/washington/ for a free and interactive (and intense!) online boat safety certificate training. Enjoy your time on the water.

What if almost everyone in Olympia and Lacey Died?

That is the magnitude of the number of deaths last year from the flu, across the US. Now 90% of those deaths were in people over 65 (pretty young to my way of thinking), but that still leaves the deaths of everyone in Yelm representing those under 65. 180 deaths were in children and teenagers.

The CDC reports that the vaccine last year was about 40% effective. Those kinds of numbers may just be the result of the lead time needed to prepare the vaccine, the researcher's best guess as to the makeup of the virus, and the fact that the virus frequently mutates and changes.

That does not necessarily mean that 60% of those immunized will get sick as they may have at least partial immunity and their illness may be much less than had they not been vaccinated.

There is also "herd" immunity in that, if everyone were immunized, there would be so little flu in the community that exposure would be minimal. You have to do your part and become part of the herd!

Researchers are developing a vaccine that will dovetail with the seasonal one and give better immunity. They are also working on medication that will significantly shorten the duration of the flu.

So....if you are over 65 or have any chronic respiratory problems or have diabetes or any of a host of chronic illness, this is a no-brainer...... Just get it done.

And if you are under 65 and don't live in Yelm, I'd still recommend you get the vaccine. The flu, even if not fatal, is no fun.

The History Corner Karol Kersh



As I'm sure you know, both the old and new club parking lots are on dredged fill. (The clubhouse and the caretaker's residence are over the water.) But there is a story about how this fill came about.


Originally, before 1870, Budd Bay had not been dredged and the deeper water channel was on the west side of the inlet. Commercial ship traffic came south and anchored in what was then the Deschutes Estuary, so that the fresh water would help remove the growths on their bottoms. About 1870 a wooden viaduct was constructed on pilings from about where 4th street ended near the present Childhood's End Gallery. The viaduct ended about where the present 4th street bridge connected to Chehalis Road- the West end of the present 4th Avenue bridge.

The city and the county agreed to build the viaduct on driven pilings, which were eaten by the teridos in relatively short order – requiring several viaduct replacements. In each iteration a draw bridge at the west end of the viaduct was installed.

In about 1900, a concrete bridge without an opening across the Deschutes estuary was commissioned by the city and the

county in roughly the same location as the original viaduct – across the open estuary and across the low-tide exposed tidelands. In 1908, after the 'new' concrete' bridge was about completed, the city and the county decided to fill the tidelands on most of the north east end of the estuary adjacent to the bridge. The fill, called the Carylon Fill, began and the Corps of Engineers deposited the dredged fill material on the tidelands at the east end of the estuary (including the OYC site) leaving only a small exit channel for what is now called Capitol Lake. The state decided the fill removed from state controlled tidelands also belonged to them, so until the late 1940's both the clubhouse and present parking lots on the filled area were on land owned by and

leased from the state. The clubhouse and the caretaker's residence are still on leases from the state because they are over the water, although the two parking lots are now deeded to the club.

Mr. McGuire: I just want to say one word to you. Just one word.

Benjamin: Yes, sir.

Mr. McGuire: Are you listening?

<u>Benjamin</u>: Yes, I am. Mr. McGuire: Plastics.

Benjamin: Exactly how do you mean?

Mr. McGuire: There's a great future in plastics. Think about it. Will

you think about it?

Benjamin: Yes, I will.

Mr. Maguire: Okay. Enough said.

That was good advice for an investor when the movie, <u>The</u> <u>Graduate</u>, was released in 1967. By 2015, plastic production

increased to 322 million tons annually¹. In the past 10 years, more

plastic has been produced than in the previous century.

The Good. Plastics are durable, cheap, and lightweight. They help to reduce food waste by keeping products fresh longer, reduce packaging mass and improve transportation efficiency, are used to manufacture lifesaving healthcare equipment, and have large potential for use in renewable energy technologies.

Many of us have plastic boats--plastic resins bonding a

structural material like glass, Kevlar, or carbon fibers. In fact, fiberglass boats have been one of the democratizing forces in yachting, making boats and boat ownership much more affordable than yachts of wood or metal.

The Bad. Many plastic products are used only once and become a large component of waste stream where their durability becomes a liability. In the US only 9% of plastic is recycled, and the remaining 91% is simply discarded². We could do better: in Europe 26% of plastic waste is recycled; 36% is incinerated for energy generation, while only 38% winds up in landfills.

Many plastics contain toxic additives--colorants, flame retardants, and plasticizers such as bisphenol A (BPA) that leach into the environment. According to the US Centers for Disease Control, BPA is detected in 93% of the US population, although the effect of this exposure remains controversial³.

The Ugly. Approximately 10–20 million tons of plastic end up in the oceans each year, adding to the 165 million tons currently floating in the world's oceans. Seabirds, whales, and dolphins become entangled in plastic matter, and floating plastic items can transport invasive microbes, algae, invertebrates, and

fish into non-native regions.

Mechanical and chemical processes break down ocean plastics into smaller and smaller fragments--microplastics-- over the years.

Ultimately, these microplastics are eaten by the microscopic creatures that form the foundation of the marine food chain⁴. The plastic hinders feeding by reducing the rate at which they can consume algae, which in turn can make it harder for them to survive and reproduce.

The long-term effects of microplastic consumption are still unknown, but potentially ominous. And ultimately, we consume these bits of plastic whenever we enjoy a plate of oysters or a bowl of clam chowder⁵.

What Can You Do?

REDUCE: Avoid single-use plastics when possible. Use metal tableware and glass beverage containers instead of single-use plastics. They're washable--and much classier and satisfying to use! Avoid disposable plastic: straws, grocery bags, etc. Substitute canvas totes, metal straws, and bring mesh totes from home for fruits and vegetables rather than using plastic bags supplied by the store.

RE-USE: For example, you can re-use spent oil containers or milk jugs to recycle used oil and antifreeze in the OYC Hazardous Waste facility.

RECYCLE: Avoid pollution through capture and recycling of plastic products before they go into our landfills or oceans.

Put a recycling container on your boat: separating recyclables (plastic bottles, beer cans, paper)
doesn't increase the amount of waste you have to store on board, and it simplifies recycling
when you take boat trash to shore.

Please use the RECYCLING CONTAINERS at the OYC Mainstation and Island Home. Check out
the OYC Waste Management Guidelines on our website for additional information on recycling
and our Clean Marina program.

Many people don't recycle plastic because they are unsure how to do so. In general, the "best" plastics are those embossed with a 1 or 2 on their bottoms; those with higher numbers are either more toxic or less reusable. When you buy plastic objects, try to stick with the lower numbers.

Shape also matters. In Thurston County, transparent bottles and jars can be recycled *only if the neck is narrower than the base*. Opaque food tubs, (like yogurt or sour cream) are recyclable but clear tubs are not. Rigid, but not soft, plant pots are also recyclable. Prescription medicine bottles are recyclable only if their openings are narrower than their bases (often not the case).

Plastic lids are never recyclable—they gum up recycling equipment. So do plastic bags. Plastic clamshells are not recyclable. Put these items in the dumpster.

WHAT ELSE?

Make a habit of picking up plastic beach litter during shore walks and dispose of it properly. Better to move plastic to a landfill than have it as a main course on your dinner plate.

Washington CoastSavers sponsor three cleanups a year on our state's coastal beaches⁶. One is held in April near Earth Day, one on July 5th, and one on the third Saturday in September. Grab your kids (or grandkids) and participate.

Finally, check out the June 2018 issue of the <u>National Geographic</u> magazine on-line⁷ for further information on the global crisis of plastic pollution and what you can do to help.

Remember, every piece of plastic you recycle is one less problem for our grandchildren to solve!

Most marine fuel docks sell "dyed" diesel, which has no refundable tax (i.e. road tax), and "non-dyed" gasoline, which *is* eligible for fuel tax refund (info from Swantown fuel dock)

Fuel tax refunds for marine use

You could receive a refund of Washington State fuel tax for non-dyed fuel used in marine vessels for business or pleasure.

Fuel tax rate

As of July 1, 2017, the fuel tax rate is 49.4 cents per gallon for gas or diesel.

Sales tax

Refunds of fuel tax may be subject to sales tax at 8.2%.

Coastal Protection Fund

Motor fuel refunds for marine use are subject to a tax of 1 cent per gallon. These funds are used for the restoration of Washington's waterways.

How to claim a refund

Complete a Fuel Tax Refund Permit Application You may:

- Complete and submit the application online through the Taxpayer–PRFT Access Point (TAP) available at https://wadolprft.gentax.com/TAP/_/. After your application is processed, you will be able to access your account online. Or,
- · Submit the application by mail
 - Locate the form at www.dol.wa.gov/forms
 - Complete the application and mail it to the address on the form. After your application has been approved, you will receive a claim form by mail.

Note: Do not send fuel invoices with your refund application.

Submit a claim form

- Through TAP, attaching all fuel invoices/receipts.
 Or.
- Via US mail to the address listed on the form with all fuel invoices/receipts.

Requirements for filing a claim

- Claim 41 gallons or more of refundable fuel per claim. Dyed diesel and dyed biodiesel are nonrefundable fuels and should not be included with your claim.
- File within 13 months from the date the fuel was purchased.
