It has been a great cruising summer for OYC boaters. Our members have cruised throughout the Puget Sound and the San Juan and Gulf Islands. Several have spent a considerable amount of time in the Broughtons and other expanses in the northern Salish Sea. A few brave souls even ventured to Alaska and back. It is great to hear about all these adventures.

So why are we members of OYC? A few may be here only for the inexpensive moorage and, much to their loss, do not participate in any other way. But most of us are here because we love the camaraderie of the boating community, and especially the OYC members. We share stories and advice, we help each other, we cruise together and party together. And most importantly, we treat each other with courtesy, respect and dignity. I know that those of you who are reading this fall into the latter category. Unfortunately, not all members seem to see it this way.

At our last meeting, the Board of Trustees (BOT) adopted a proposed Code of Conduct for the Yacht Club. It will be posted on the bulletin board, emailed to you and read at the October dinner meeting as a new rule.

Why did we think this was necessary? Over the past several months, and in some cases longer, a handful of our Club members have exhibited behavior that was not consistent with what we all agreed to when we were sworn into OYC membership. We have had members using heavily profanity-laced language around our children and grandchildren.

Others have threatened other members, and a student, with bodily harm. Another refused to allow a boathouse inspection and then sued the Club in small claims court to recover his fines. One has blatantly violated explicit Club rules, even after being warned several times. Unfortunately, this has led to disciplinary action against one member, a planned disciplinary hearing of another and the expulsion of one member. Fortunately, they represent a very small percentage of our membership.

Please look at our new Code of Conduct and offer your insights on how it can be perfected. Feel free to contact any of the BOT members with your suggestions.

The BOT meets on the second Wednesday of each month at 6:00 p.m. at the Club House.

You are invited to attend and see how the business-side of our Club functions. Minutes of the meetings are posted on the bulletin board.

Greetings OYCers!

FLASH!! Our Committee has been working hard to take the information you gave us back in May and June on the types of safety training you want. We are pleased to announce that in November we will be sponsoring several courses covering topics the majority of members were looking for. We are still finalizing the details, but we will be sponsoring courses in DIESEL ENGINE MAINTENANCE, ADANCED; FIRST AID; RADIO COMMUNICATIONS; and DEALING WITH ONBOARD EMERGENCIES. More details will be out soon. Look for Email Blasts and flyers on details of timing and registration.

In the meantime, as we turn our attention to Fall and Winter boating, it's appropriate to consider the unthinkable: onboard emergencies involving the loss or incapacity of our boat's Skipper! No one likes to think about this because it is so emotional. What is your backup plan if YOU are the one with a medical emergency? Does your significant other, or your crew, know how to steer the boat and stop the boat? Does your crew know where the First Aid kit, fire extinguishers, life preservers, and flares are stowed? Do they know how to call for help on the VHF radio? Can they find the latitude/longitude on the GPS system to relay your position to authorities? Can they deploy the anchor or dinghy?

When you go out on the water, make it a habit to give a short briefing for the crew when you start a trip, even if it is your wife/husband or significant other. Cover the basics, such as the location of life jackets, first aid kits, emergency radio procedures and your route plan.

Stem Cells

What are stem cells and why do they matter? Way back when we were all just a single-celled fertilized egg, that cell was the ultimate stem cell and look what sprouted from that. As that cell divided and divided, any of those cells could be anything in your body until they found themselves somewhere special such as in the kidney, and then they would become one of the many kinds of cells and structures there. This process happens throughout the body and the "everything" cells become specialized cells and can no longer be anything else even though the DNA information is still within them. It really is a miracle that all those things happen with very few mistakes, and out we come. Those "I can become anything" cells persist in small percentages among the cells in our tissues.

What if we could put one of your "everything" cells in a jar and command it to become a kidney. It would become your kidney without any rejection problems and it would be brand new and ready to put back into you. What about a heart...a brain! Wow. This is science fiction now, but how about in the future?

So what is going on with stem cell research and where do we find stem cells to practice on? A while back, stem cells for research came from in-vitro fertilization embryos that were not used, but that is no longer allowed. Those stem cell lines would still available for research. Stem cells are also present in newborn umbilical cord blood, in placental tissues, and in bone marrow. The bone marrow involves drilling into the hip bone and sucking out cells. Stem cells are also found in the fatty tissues and certain places use these. Each source has it's own pluses and minuses. Generally, cells from your own body are best because of potential rejection problems from someone else's cells. Scientists have

Please call Kim Shann 360-491-3786 or Kathy Beckman 360-260-459-9669 been experimenting with reprogramming adult stem cells by injecting new genetic information to make them more like the embryonic ones. Stem cells can then be grown over the course of 6 months to produce large numbers of cells.

Stem cells are being actively used in the treatment of certain leukemias (bone marrow transplants). Some experimental work is being done injecting cells directly into tissues such as at the time of open heart surgery. Lots of research is going on and there is the hope of some great breakthroughs similar to what we have seen with immunotherapy in cancer and other chronic diseases.

And then there is the ugly side. I followed up with one of the full page ads for a local stem cell treatment seminar and tried to listen with an open mind. The presentation was smooth and devoid of detailed facts although they cited many treatments with 75-85% improvement. There was no detail as to % cures as opposed to a lot better or some better. They use stem cells harvested from your fat, process them for an hour or so and then inject then into joints or give them IV. They propose to treat erectile dysfunction, ALS, MS, bad joints, diabetes, heart and lung diseases, and even cerebral palsy. \$9500 up front and \$3500 if they bank your cells for repeat treatments. I have read that these clinicians take a 2 day course and pay \$30,000 for the centrifuge to process the cells. Insurance does not pay for these treatments. These centers claim to be doing investigational work, but no research facilities charge for experimental treatments. At least for now, keep your hand on your wallet and walk away fast!

As they say, the 56th annual FOOFARAW is in the books and despite several snafus it is declared a success. Our 2018 motto was "Indecision is the key to flexibility" and we lived by it. To start, the boat signups were very slow this year. Just a few weeks out we were short ten boats, there have been many boats sold this past year. RC Mitch on his own (But thank you RC) sent out a call to arms to all members and we picked up a few more. In the last 2 weeks, we had 8 drop outs or changes. Several didn't notify us wanting to participate until the very end. Regardless of our nervousness, it all worked out and we had 44 for the event. Several normally participating big capacity boats were unable to this year. The smaller capacity boats saved the day and I am grateful for their willingness to take their time and money to do so.

Every year there is a large drop out rate between military RSVPs and who actually shows up. As much as 30% some years. However for perhaps the first time ever we had more military show up than RSVP's! 27 more to be exact. The Chamber members that sponsor F-fraw and buy tickets however had 15 no shows also a rarity. All in all we hauled 361 invited guests plus our crews and bridge members.

As you may have heard we had some angst over a minus 1.5 tide at 1030. Many of us don't really know how much water we really need, often times the "book" draft number for our boat is not accurate. A timely suggestion; next time you haul out, bring your tape measure and determine for your self. Unless you are anal and keep your waterline paint spotless there probably is a scum line indicating what your real waterline is. Believe it or not, it seems some manufacturers publish your hull draft, forgetting the props may hang well below the hull (maybe the prop repair shops are involved?) Another de-

tail learned is many of us don't know if or how to do a "keel offset" in our depth finders. On the morning of our arrival at IH, inches made a difference. Twenty six



of our boats made it in on the first or second try, 18 anchored out and we had shuttles just like many cruise ship destinations to haul folks in to the dock. It really was quite neat and I am proud of our gang displaying "flexibility". A special shot out to Capt. Mary Fitzgerald for offering up one of the sailing programs tenders for shuttling and BOT Member Bill Wilmvosky for towing it out. Also to Chris Shemel for the extra effort to bring his mondo rib out, Bobcat Bob did also. There may have been more but I have lost track. In the end about ten more larger boats got to the dock at about 1300, a handful enjoyed being on the hook so much they didn't come in and had their guests shuttled back out for departure.

I delayed the opening ceremonies to 1100 to allow most that wanted to observe the tradition to do so. In 2017 we started at 1045 so all the hassle factors didn't delay us much. Most don't know and probably even less care but I started choreographing much of the event 4 years ago after I realized the operation was done because the chamber had developed a script long ago and it never changed nor accounted for differences year to year.

The old script was opening ceremonies start at 1000. A color guard did the flag raising and a tape played the national anthem. I personally did not know there was an opening tradition, many years half the boats are not in by 1000. So not only our guests but our crews never had the opportunity to be involved. So now my counterpart from the Chamber and I text or talk several times as the boats proceed to the island, and each of the last four years I have delayed the start. Also, I learned we have some real singers in the club and they were anxious to sing the anthem live, acappella. Thanks to Ed and Nancy Stolarik for heading that up. With much sadness my choreographing went awry this year. I wrote up a moment of silence in honor of very recently departed brother and huge supporter/participant of Foofaraw, Bill Thomas. I do not know why the MC blew it but she called for a moment of silence for a "member". Most didn't have a clue what it was about. Sorry Bill, you deserved the recognition.

This operation would never succeed at the level it does without our fantastic dock crew headed up by Rick and Patti Taylor

(sailors) and assisted this year by Bron Lindgren, Steve Jones, Curtis Dahlgren and Sal Elguera (the last three being sailors). I



wish we had recorded Rick on the radio as dockmaster, unflappable, patient and easily could put many air traffic controllers to shame. Great performance gang!

Cindy Smith the Queen of the food and hospitality part of FOOFARAW and her crew once again performed world class, feeding well over 450 folks. Many of her crew (I don't think I know many of them) are sailors. The Chehalis Tribe and

Lucky Eagle provided much of the food and of course cooked the salmon the traditional way. Corn came from Rutledge farms, L&E bottling provided the coffee bar and drinks, Taylor Shellfish had a shortage of clams this year but provided mussels and Chelsea Farms the oysters. Once again

She left her office at 2130 Thursday night, went home and worked on the computer trying to finish the boat assignments, print a bunch of documents and then be at our clubhouse before 0630 to head up the sign in crew, then race out to IH before the boats arrive. WOW--Thank you Krystal, you the woman!

I must tip my hat and say thank you to my "elders". Obie Won PC Bob Job is still quite active and constantly has my back. PC George Smith a long time leader in the FOOFARAW management is always there for whatever is needed. And PC Jim Sheerer who says F-FRAW is like Christmas to him jumps in when asked, which he was at the last minute this year.

You may find it curious that I pointed out sailors by name several times. The reason you ask?? Because FOOFARAW is an OYC event, granted power boats are the mode of transportation for our guests, but the event is a club event, all are invited to help out a you can.

Mark your calendars for September 6, 2019 for the 57th FOO-FARAW! (BTW, I am not going to look up the tide yet).

Personal note: I think the most embarrassing moment in my life was the September dinner meeting giving the F-Fraw update. I knew it was going to be hard, but all the tricks I knew to not become a blithering idiot, failed me. Pam has been down now for 21 months and was not expected to live even a month. Her physical body is totally shot, incapable of moving but can feed herself if the food is cut up first. She has been under hospice for several months and I have been trained to administer comfort and end of life meds. My family all suffered burnout taking turns caring for Pam and I actually think she became hostile to the family as she realized they had lives to live and kids to raise, she wanted to move onto the boat. And has been a fulltime live

aboard since April. We got good at the two (actually I single handed, but she had a radio and thus felt we did it together) of us taking the boat to IH, which she loved. In early July she told me she wanted to go to Vancouver BC for the annual international fireworks competition, it would be our 20th consecutive year. There were some logistical issues to deal with and we did find a pro crew member that has crewed all around the world, but only on sailboats. This was her first time to America and first power boat. We had planned an 8 to 10 day cruise to Vancouver and then come back. In the weeks leading up to the departure Pam had great difficulty and I had to give her a sedative to slow down her anxiety over breathing and morphine several times a week. Vancouver was great as usual but sad in that all Pam could do was sit on the boat and look out the window. After a few days, she said she wanted to return to Lagoon Cove. A favorite of ours, in fact they have 2 or 3 recipes of hers in the LC Cookbook (they are still selling them). We headed up and stopped in Pender Harbour another favorite. She asked can we go back to Princess Louisa one more time? I said of course babe (wishing I had known of these possibilities, didn't provision for the several hundred extra miles). Glorious as usual at the "Holy Grail" of yachting. I stuck the bow in 9 ft of water in the stream from the falls and Pam could hear the waterfalls roar all night. In the AM, got the hook up, pulled out and then turned around and backed into the stream. Pam was in her wheelchair at the back door with a close up view of Chatterbox, she cried, so did I. The trip hit most of the high points south of Cape Caution. Pam had become a new person, and had asked for no meds, no sedative, no morphine. She wanted to get off the boat every opportunity. We hooked up with OYCs Tom Ripple who was solo for awhile. Mr "can do" Tom, said no problem and the two of us got Pam off at Lagoon Cove, Echo Bay for the prime rib, Pt. McNeil, etc. Pam was alive and engaged and funnier than hell, always laughing. Pam saw Orcas several times, many humpbacks and a bunch of grizzlies (up Knight Inlet) from her wheelchair in the back door. We had to head back to get ready for FOOFARAW, but not wanting to return home, we went straight to IH for Labor Day. We got Pam up to events three days in a row, she had a blast and many were incredulous at how alive she was. We returned to OYC and 14 hours later she had another stroke. I thought I was going to die, after 41 days of nirvana, no drugs, a great adventure, she went in the shitter. Couldn't speak or at least intelligibly and looked like a broken person. What to do? Get her somewhere on shore to be taken care of? My daughter and family doc told me how bad I would feel for the rest of my life if I did that and she passed away..... I knew they were right. That's what was on my mind at the dinner meeting. The next morning she was a different person, sweet articulate and using big words I had never heard her use before. A miracle! Except the next night, she went the other way (which I understand is common in stroke victims). I awoke at 0100 to loud cussing at me for not helping her get down to the bathroom (she has not been in a head for two years) as she fell out of bed. All kinds of hell right up to 0630 when I had to go to the clubhouse for FOOFARAW check in. Pam had made it clear she wanted to do FOOFARAW as she had always helped me with the paperwork and ideas. Cherie Richmond (The Other Woman) offered to come along, she is a professional caregiver and that clinched the deal. Pam enjoyed visiting our guests and being on the water.

We have no idea what's next, its kind of like riding on a runaway train. Pam wants to do more trips including the Oysterfest in Shelton and New Years Eve in Lake Union for the Space needle fireworks and Craig, AK next April/May to see our son who is a log scaler there. It doesn't seem possible she could make it, but I have learned to not bet against her, so we will go.

Thanks to all that made this years event a success, albeit somewhat different than in past years. Our new motto "Indecision is the key to flexibility", served us well.

A few differences this year. One, we actually had more military than RSVP'd! with 27 walkins!! And the Chamber had 15 no shows. These are folks that paid \$65 to go along. All in all we hauled 361 known assigned guests.

Hats off to Rick and Patti Taylor and their crew Bron Lindgren, Curtis Dahlgren, Steve Jones and Sal Elguera. What could have been pandemonium and even disaster actually went well, with the dockmasters coordinating the normal docking program, but also tracking who anchored out and the shuttle boats.

44 boats did the event, 26 got to the dock on the first or second try, 18 anchored out to come in at a higher tide and about 5 decided it was nice on the hook and had their passengers shuttled out for departure. I held the opening ceremony to 1100. Last year we started at 1040, so for all the extra steps this year I am happy how well we did and her food crew as usual did a fantastic a great job. I heard no grumblings or complaints this year, I usually do!

We had some hassles with radio comms--- some not answering when called repeatedly and really the biggest irritant to me sitting at command central is not listening when the all clear to depart broadcast goes out. I'm not kiddingit was broadcast 14 times. Also, for future reference, we have no way of knowing if more guests are headed your way, so it does no good to ask us if more are coming or where are your guests. Maybe next year some of you can comeback up to the clubhouse at 0750 or so and observe the zoo. For one you will see firsthand what we go thru and hopefully two, you may have some thoughts or suggestions to improve what we do.

I want to take a moment to gratefully thank all who offered help and condolences on Pam's situation. We had been on a 41 day cruise that culminated at IH for Labor Day. We got back specifically to chat up FOOFARAW and try to determine what options we had for the low tide arrival; Thanks to several of you that had dinks with DFs. We did a lot of soundings but couldn't create directions nor a map for entry. 14 hours after arriving OYC Pam had a stroke and there was nothing to be done about it. She was in and out of it Wednesday and I clearly was not on my game at the dinner meeting, one of the most embarrassing events of my life as I lost it in front of the membership. We tried to find someone to care for her on FOO-FARAW day as it seemed it would be overwhelming. In the end Cherie Richmond (a caregiver in real life) Admiral on "The Other Woman" joined us on Just4Us, a bunch of pressure was lifted off me and we had a great day.

Lastly, thank you Obi Won PC Bob Job, PC George Smith and PC Jim Sheerer for you efforts and help. Also once again Cindy "the Force" Smith and the Cookie Princess Dene Hartman. And all of our crews! BRAVO, Good job.

Oh ya, if you didn't get your F-FRAW coins I will have them at the October dinner meeting.
