For myself and Lorie, and I suspect many of our fellow OYC members, the highlight of our boating year is our extended summer cruise. That certainly was the case this year for Lorie and me as we headed north to our niece's wedding on a bluff overlooking Fisherman's Bay on Lopez Island. We ran into some OYC members there, Ed and Nancy Stolarik, who had had good luck crabbing. After the wedding, we joined Commodore Walt and Catherine Schefter's Commodore's Cruise, meeting up with twenty plus OYC boats in the beautiful waterfront town of Ganges on Salt Spring Island in the southern Gulf Islands of Canada. The town is beautiful, the people are friendly and Lorie and I had an unexpected bonus.

A couple of years ago, I inadvertently broke the quarter inch copper line between the evaporator in my boat's refrigerator and the compressor. I

bought a new unit, copper line attached and pre-charged with the compliant refrigerant fluid, and had it installed, but the refrigerator never would get as cold as it should. I tried unsuccessfully to have the original installer, or anyone in Seattle, Bremerton, Tacoma, or Olympia to come and service my refrigerator. Calls never returned or some Seattle firms, recommended by others, said they could service my refrigerator, in October.

In Ganges, we went in to Mouat's House Hardware store in downtown and asked at the marine supplies counter if there was anyone who could service our boat's refrigerator. We were given three names, three phone numbers. I called all three and left a message on each, saying we were in town for about 36 hours and need help with our refrigerator. This was about 2:00 PM on Monday. Two people called me back, one man telling to call one of the names I had already called. That man called me at 7:30 PM that night and said, yes, he could come by the next morning at 11:00 AM. Sure enough, there he was the next day at my boat with another man, a vacuum pump and a bottle of refrigerant with him.

An hour later, he had evacuated the air and refrigerant from the copper line and recharged the refrigerant fluid, my refrigerator was getting colder for the first time in two years. He stuck around until he confirmed the system was working. I ask what I owed, and he scratched his head, and said, "how does \$85 sound?" Let's see, two men, one and one half hours of service, that's three hours or \$28.33 per hour. "Sure I said." Let me get the money.

Cruising, like traveling, reveals the world to us outside our own little corner of the globe. I recommend it highly.

CAMERA PROVES LOCH NESS SEA SERPENT IS JUST A WHALE

By IDENTIFYING the sea serpent of Loch Ness, Scotland, as a familiar species of whale, naturalists have just shown how easily the human eye may be fooled into thinking it sees an unfamiliar monster. Worldwide interest was drawn to Loch Ness, within recent months, by repeated eyewitness reports of a longuecked, aquatic apparition of huge size, resem-

bling no known marine animal. Finally Dr. Robert K. Wilson, noted British surgeon, managed to get a snapshot of the fabulous creature, and the mystery vanished. The picture showed the curved fin of a killer whale projecting in typical fashion from the water strongly suggesting an elongated neck and head. According to Dr. Roy Chapman Andrews, noted explorer and zoologist, and others who agreed on this identification, the whale evidently had strayed up an inlet from the sea into the lake. This was the second sea monster mystery to be cleared up recently. Examination showed a strange marine creature, washed up dead on French shores near Cherbourg (P.S.M., May, '34, p. 38), to be a basking shark of a common species, made almost unrecognizable by the waves.

Immunizations

When I was a boy, in the last century, we had 4 choices – left or right arm or left or right butt – for tetanus. That was

thought to be good forever unless you needed a booster for a puncture wound. We survived and almost nobody got and died of tetanus after that.

Now there is MMR (measles, mumps, rubella-3 day measles), meningococcus (MCV), Hepatitis A, pneumococcal, influenza, TDap (tetanus, diphtheria, and whooping cough), polio, rotavirus, H. influenza, and Varicella (chickenpox). And you can add the vaccine for Human Papillomavirus to that. I interviewed a young immigrant from South America who was about to enter school here. No known immunizations. He left the clinic a human pincushion.

Phew – so why get immunized – we hardly ever see that stuff anymore. There is such a thing as herd immunity. If virtually everyone is immune, then these diseases can't get a foothold in our society when someone from an underdeveloped country visits or we visit them. There are a few in our society too sick to get these immunizations and the herd protects them. Years ago, a now <u>totally discredited</u> theory got into society and many were afraid to be immunized. Washington law requires immunization (see attached schedule) with exemptions for medical or religious reasons.

Oh! Did I mention Flu shots are right around the corner? Rich Hurst

The last few weeks' clear weather and relatively empty marina helped when it came to re-decking a part of the 500 dock and now there are just a few less boards to trip over; also, the dingy dock is coming together. Thanks to our diligent work-crew members including Kelly Thompson, Brian Benson, Gary Nichols, Tom Hulbert, Gary Ray, and Greg, our OYC caretaker (if I missed anyone else, let me know and I'll check to make sure your CSP hours were awarded).

The Wi-Fi upgrade is in process due to the work of PC Mike Contris: thanks, Mike.

It is getting uncomfortable for me to continue to remind OYC members who need their boat houses and slips inspected and deficiencies/repairs/ upgrades re-inspected and approved. Don't let the deadline get away – it's coming up fast and it is significant: by



October 31 all inspections and fixes need to be completed and approved. Those in non-compliance will see a Board of Trustees preapproved fifty dollar penalty on their November 2016 OYC billing (increasing December to \$100 and January to \$200 and then \$200 per month until repairs/ upgrades are re-inspected and approved.) The penalty is an automatic process.

Please, if you have not had your moorages inspected or reinspected, then sign up on the bulletin board in the clubhouse or contact the Inspections' Sub-Chair, PC Jerry Budelman. Get and keep your moorage safe and shipshape and show your neighbors you care about the OYC facilities, let's get this done.

The 12 x 20 foot covered dinghy storage dock at the foot



and just south of the 100 dock ramp is for all members; there are 16 spaces or slips (see sizes below.) With the Marine Floats new docks installation, some members have lost or will lose the

platforms next to their dock boxes. Going forward, there is a consensus on the Main Station Committee (MSC) not to allow replacing these platforms or to allow dinghies on the new docks; thus, we have built our first dinghy specific moorage: The first Dinghy Dock.

The MSC will distribute these dinghy slips and will soon send out a notice via Clubrunner to all members soliciting those interested in a slot/slip at the dinghy dock. Slips are going to be let out on a first come first served basis (even if you expressed a prior interest or submitted a request, please resubmit your interest) and if demand amounts to greater than the number of slips a "waiting list" will be established. If you do want a slip, let the MSC know ON-LY by writing your name in order with date and time on the numbered sheet provided on the OYC Main Station Bulletin Board or by email at mscofoyc@gmail.com as soon as possible to get on the list, but consider whether your dinghy will fit. No telephone requests are acceptable and do not email me personally, only by sign up in the clubhouse or email to mscofoyc@gmail.com can you get on this list. If you do not have an email account or cannot make it to the clubhouse, then please have another member email your request.

All slips are 9 feet long and most of the slips are 55 inches wide x 21 inches of height clearance, but the four northern most slips are smaller: 49 inches wide x 21 inches high. The maximum length of dinghy or kayak allowed will be 10.5 feet. Some of the slips are high enough above the deck it will be a two person job to load. Nonetheless, all the slips will be priced the same, \$10 per month added to your ÔYC bill. Înitially the MSC will try to allocate the slips based on demand (and per request, e.g., located by the size of the dinghy), but recognize that some inflatables may need to be partially deflated to fit. The slips will be numbered 1 through 16 and it will be a rule that each member identify the slip with their name and contact information. The OYC member who is designated as the slip "owner" may allow that others use their slot so long as rules are abided by. All with Dinghy Dock storage must have email accounts on file with OYC.

If awarded a slip, you will need to sign a Dinghy Dock -Moorage Agreement before occupancy.

The rules are a work in progress, but should be finalized in the next month. Basically, the Dinghy Dock rules plan to encourage members to use the slip and give it up if they aren't and to keep the storage safe, neat and clean - shipshape.

The next MSC meeting is September 8th at 6 p.m. We've got lots of projects you can help with and earn CSP hours, too. Come find out more about how the marina is maintained and upgraded. We would like you to contribute your concerns and ideas.

FUEL STATION VOTE

EIGHT YEARS AGO, THE OLYMPIA YACHT CLUB INITIATED THE DRIVE FOR A MARINE FUEL STATION WITHIN THE CITY OF OLYMPIA. WITH THE ASSISTANCE OF SEVERAL LOCAL BUSINESSES, OYC COLLECTED 789 SIGNATURES ON A PETITION WHICH WAS SUBMITTED TO THE PORT OF OLYMPIA COMMISSIONERS URGING THEM TO CONSIDER BUILDING A MARINE FUEL STATION. THE PORT CONDUCTED A FEASABILITY STUDY AND DETERMINED THAT THE TIME WAS NOT RIGHT TO BUILD A FUEL DOCK AT THE PORT.

THE PROJECT THEN LAY DORMANT UNTIL COMMISSIONERS RECONSIDERED THE FUEL DOCK. FOUR PUBLIC MEETINGS WERE HELD AND THE PORT ASKED WASHINGTON STATE UNIVERSITY TO CONDUCT A MARINE FUEL STATION SURVEY DIRECTED AT BOAT OWNERS IN OLYMPIA. BASED ON OVERWHELMING SUPPORT FOR THE PROJECT, THE PORT PUT THE FUEL DOCK PROJECT OUT TO BID.

THE PORT HAS RECEIVED THE BIDS AND COMMISSIONERS WILL VOTE ON THE PROJECT ON MONDAY, SEPTEMBER 12 AT 5:30 PM AT PERCIVAL PLAZA, 626 COLUMBIA STREET, SUITE 1B.

IT IS IMPERATIVE THAT OYC ONCE AGAIN TURNS OUT IN FORCE IN SUPPORT OF THE FUEL DOCK. IT IS ANTICIPATED THAT THE VOCAL MINORITY WILL MAKE A LAST DITCH EFFORT TO DERAIL THIS PROJECT. PLAN TO ATTEND THIS IMPORTANT MEETING AND SPEAK IN FAVOR OF THE PROJECT. IT IS NOT NECESSARY TO IDENTIFY YOURSELF AS A MEMBER OF OYC.

This check list is our insurance carrier's recommendations for OYC fire prevention and is **required to be completed and submitted to the OYC moorage master annually by September 30**. Any member (vessel) obtaining moorage at OYC (except reciprocal visitors) after Sept 30, shall complete and submit the checklist within **15 days** of arrival. *The fire prevention check list will only work with your full and active participation.*

As a member, mooring my vessel at and/or boathouse at Olympia Yacht Club main station facilities, I am certifying I have completed or had someone acting on my behalf complete the fire prevention checklist and am in compliance with the following requirements or will correct any deficiencies within five working days from the date completing check list. Mark an **X** for each item checked, **N/A** if item does not apply. <u>All</u> items must be indicated with an X or N/A.

- 1. I have inspected my boats to dock pedestal AC electrical system including boathouse if applicable:
 - _____a. My AC electrical power cord is a weatherproof power cord, minimum 12 gauge for 20 AMP, 10 gauge for 30 AMP service, with a ground, is not cracked or chafed and is free of visible defects.
 - ____b. AC power cord is dedicated from the pedestal to the vessel with respective size marine twist lock plugs.
 - _____ c. AC plugs have been checked for signs of burning/melting or other defects and replaced as needed. (no 15 amp convenience receptacles are directly attached to the shore power cord between the pedestal to vessel)
 - _____d. AC cords passing through boathouse walls have permanently installed non-metallic chafe protection.
 - _____e. The AC plug connected to the vessel is secured by a locking ring.
- 2. Make sure electrical heaters are plugged directly to permanent receptacles. No extension cords.
- _____ 3. AC heater cords are not tightly coiled or bundled. (it will cause them to get very hot)
- _____4. No reflective type heat lamps are being used on the vessel.
- 5. No AC heat devices (heat lamps) with spring-type clip hangers are used on the vessel.
- ____ 6. Hot water heaters are not energized when vessel is unattended.
- ____7. No thermostat controlled electric heaters are being used in gas engine enclosures or tank area.
- _____8. No unprotected light bulbs are being used in machinery and tank spaces.
- 9. No visible fuel leaks or seeping exist on engines, fuel lines or fuel tanks.
- 10. If the vessel has LP tanks, the valves are closed when the vessel is unattended.
- 11. Dual range electric heaters (800/1500 watts) are only set on the low range when unattended.
- 12. No AC electric heaters above 1500 watts are being used when the vessel is unattended.
- 13. All AC heaters are placed to insure no flammable materials may come in contact with heater.
- ____14. All shore power and heater cords and plugs are not hot to the touch when under a service load.
- 15. All vessel fire extinguishers are proper USCG size & type, inspected annually and serviced as required
- 16. Boat houses will have a (5) five pound ABC fire extinguisher inspected annually and serviced as required.
- ___17. No containers with material emitting flammable or toxic fumes may be stored in dock boxes or boat houses.
