Happy New Year! During the long weekend of Martin Luther King, Jr. holiday, Lions from throughout the state gathered in Manchester, Tennessee, three days for of fellowship and training at the Lions Learning Retreat. One of the most moving parts of the weekend was when Lion Amie Green introduced

us to her 4-year old daughter, Layla, a Lion Cub in the Manchester Lions Club. At seventeen months old, Layla was diagnosed with Type 1 Diabetes.

Amie talked about the challenges that Layla faces on a daily basis and how even if they do things just right something can go wrong. The Manchester Lions Club held a Strides Walk in the Fall and raised almost \$4,000 to donate in Layla's name to the Juvenile Diabetes Foundation. As we were leaving the banquet area at the Lions Learning Retreat, the attendees raised an additional \$733 to donate. Layla's story reminded me what great things we are doing to help Layla and others like her. It also reinforced how generous and kindhearted Lions are.



Past President Madden is an insurance agent and a certified insurance counselor.

A member of the Auburn Lions Club since 1984, he has held many offices within the association, including club president, zone chairperson, region chairperson, state council chairperson and district governor. In addition, he is a past president of the Indiana Lions Foundation. He served as a District Governor-elect Seminar faculty member five times and as Campaign SightFirst II sector coordinator for Multiple District 25.

In recognition of his service to the association, Past President Madden has received many awards, including the 100% Club President Award, Life Membership in the Association, the Senior Master Key Award, four Extension Awards, an International President's Leadership Medal, nine International President's Medals and the Ambassador of Good Will Award, the highest honor the association bestows upon its members. District 12-O Sight Service Spends Record Amount to Help the Needy

In the last six months of 2014 the District 12-O Sight Services spent a record \$25,111 for cases in White County, Overton County, Athens, Crossville, Cleveland, Etowah, Meigs County, and Fairfield Glade (paid for by the club.) On the waiting list are cases from Cleveland and Red Bank.

These are the cases that have gone through the Lions Sight Service since July 1, 2014. At this time Sight Services is not taking any additional applications due to the combination of lack of funds and waiting for our doctor in Chattanooga to reduce the waiting list.

Cases around the Chattanooga area use a doctor who provides cataract surgery free of charge. He provides one surgery per month. If a patient has 2 cataracts, the case is scheduled over two months. Cases in the north end of the district use Dr. Galloway, who charges a very reasonable rate of \$2,000 per cataract.

I first learned about canvassing when we decided to start a new club in Spring City. After we decided to go ahead with this effort we contacted International, set a date, and International sent us a New Club Coordinator from Kentucky. He was real helpful in getting us organized and that is where I got most if not all the points on canvassing. With the help of DG Mel Tryon, GMT John Moon, PDG Barbie Blansett, 2nd VDG Sheila Chesanow, PDG Keith Pontius from our district, as well as PDG Marvin Keener and PCC Carol Rhines, we canvassed the Spring City area on Wednesday, Thursday, and Friday. Through this we got 22 members signed up. One year later the Spring City Club has 32 members. Spring City has a population of 2000 people.

After seeing the results, it occurred to me that we could do the same thing in Dayton. With a population of about 6500 we got 13 new members. Note: New people who give you an application with a check can be approved by the Executive Board by phone or the Internet for membership. As you can see by the numbers, canvassing does work for new clubs as well as existing clubs. One common comment of those we approached was that people did not know there was a lions club in town.

Each club that does canvassing will need one person to head it up to take care of details and see that everything gets done.

To start, we met at 8:30, had coffee, and chose teams. If you have Lions from other clubs they should be paired with a local Lion. Each team gets a prepared folder filled with what they need to do for their job. This should include a map to show teams the area they are to cover. We then met at Noon. Some of our ladies prepared a chili lunch and we were able to discuss things. We decided about canvassing in the afternoon.

• Clubs may get help the first day but after that it is up to the club to finish the job. Canvassing can be ongoing.

• Canvassing can also be done any place there are large numbers of people such as voting places, or golf tournaments. If there is a factory they may let lions canvas during shift change.

• Most people we talked to during canvassing have never been asked to join the Lions Club.


Your schedule should probably be done through the District Governor.

He was a veteran of the United States Army, a charter member of **Dallas Bay Lions Club** and a charter member of **Dallas Lions Club**. Bob was also an avid fisherman.





HICKS: Bert Leonard Hicks, 73, of Ringgold, Georgia, died on January 18, 2015. He was an elder at East Ridge Presbyterian Church for several years. He retired as a vice president in wealth management from AmSouth Bank. He was past president of the **Chattanooga Downtown Lions Club** where he received the Melvin Jones Fellow Award. A graduate of the Tennessee Bankers School of Vanderbilt, School of Banking of the South at LSU and Covenant College, he was a board member of the following: Bonny Oaks Foundation, Bethel Bible Village and VITAL (Visually Impaired Training and Learning).



Rothberger: Glenn S. Rothberger, 87, of Signal Mountain, died on Tuesday, December 2, 2014. Glenn was born in Chattanooga and worked in the area following college and a stint in the United States Army. As a member of the **Signal Mountain Lions Club**, he served as King Lion in 1990-1991.



SCHRIBER: Floyd A. Schriber passed away on January 22, 2015. Floyd served in the U. S. Air Force for twenty-two years as an Air Weapons Controller, with assignments in NORAD, Alaska, and Viet Nam. He retired as a Lieutenant Colonel. Floyd joined Lions Clubs International in 1972 and served as **District Governor for Western Tennessee in 2003-2004**. He was past president and member of the Board of Directors of Mid-South Lions Sight and Hearing Service. In 2004-2009, he spearheaded the successful effort to bring over 2800 Lions to Memphis for a four-day leadership conference. In May 2010, he served as vice chairman of the Tennessee/LCIF flood relief efforts. Most recently he coordinated a pilot project in Shelby County to provide free eye exams and glasses for indigent adults.

SKIDMORE: Irene Parker Skidmore, 100, of Chattanooga, died at her home on November 30, 2014. Irene graduated from Central High School and Edmondson Business College. During the 1930s and 40s, she worked at the Chevrolet dealership on Market Street. She then moved to Albuquerque, New Mexico where she lived for 20 years. Returning to Chattanooga, she became an active member of the **Lookout Valley Lion's Club** in 1997, having served as a Lioness before that.
